

Cultural District Definition:

Under Chapter 107 of the Admin Code, a Cultural District is defined as:

- A geographically identifiable area in San Francisco with a strong concentration of cultural and historic assets;
- Rooted in the heritage of specific cultural or ethnic communities, particularly those historically marginalized, displaced, or oppressed; and
- Serving as a hub for culturally significant businesses, arts, and services.





The Cultural History, Housing, and Economic Sustainability Strategies (CHHESS) Report

Purpose: The report documents each district's cultural legacy and:

- Serves as blueprint for both culture and sustainability
- Supports intersectional issues and brings community voices together
- ✓ Strengthens the city-Community partnership

Addresses 6 policy areas:

- Cultural Preservation
- Housing & Tenant Protections
- Economic & Workforce Development
- Arts & Culture
- Land Use & Zoning
- Cultural Competency

The CHHESS Report Process

Unique because it is co-authored - led and informed by community, with deep City partnership and intentional alignment across departments. The process honors the past, informs the present, and prepares for the future.

1. Community Engagement & Drafting

- Cultural District uses focus groups, surveys, town halls, and other methods to gather broad community input
- Drafting of strategies grounded in community feedback and research

2. City Partnership & Review

- Iterative review and collaboration with MOHCD (program lead),
 OEWD, Planning Department, and Arts Commission
- Departments contribute sections reflecting their scope, initiatives, and work within each Cultural District's geography

3. Submission & Approval

- Final Report reviewed by all departments, then submitted to the Supervisor and Mayor
- Resolution introduced to the Board of Supervisors



HISTORIC & CULTURAL PRESERVATION

Preserving and promoting cultural and historic buildings, businesses, organization, traditions, arts, and events.



- **Expand and promote the digital archives of Bayview African American history and culture** through dynamic programs, partnerships and intergenerational engagement strategies that engage living legends and youth in the storytelling and documentation process.
- **Develop a Bayview Heritage Museum** with permanent and rotating exhibits that highlight the historical, cultural, and social contributions of Black San Franciscans, including a dedicated faith-centered exhibit honoring the community's spiritual legacy and religious leadership.
- Create a structure for intergenerational mentorship and a "Bayview Black Student Union" with cultural programming connected to the schools that formalizes learning local history and celebrating Black culture.
 - Advance new Bayview landmarks, cultural resources, and historic sites through official designation and citywide promotion

TENANT PROTECTIONS

Protecting tenants from displacement and promoting affordable housing and homeownership.



Identify a trusted Bayview Housing and Tenants Rights Ambassador

to serve as a trusted, visible, community-based housing advocate and referral hub, expanding access to tenant protections, homeownership pathways, and resource navigation, and to bridge the gap between residents and agencies and organizations focused on housing.

Advance a collaborative housing and tenants' rights education campaign coordinated through the Bayview Housing Ambassador and partnering City agencies and CBOs to proactively inform and engage residents.

Advance housing access for vulnerable groups —including unhoused youth, the formerly incarcerated, and African American seniors—through coordinated outreach, policy development, and housing partnerships.

ARTS & CULTURE

Attracting and supporting artist and cultural enterprises.

Establish an SFAAACD Design Toolkit with guidelines for design of Bayview buildings and community fixtures in the commercial corridor that include an afrocentric/African color palette, inspirational messages and African American art.

Advance cultural tourism through unique cultural experiences and Bayview-centric activities that attract San Francisco residents and tourists, advance arts and culture in the community, and uplift local businesses.

Establish an SFAAACD Artist Collective with community space for exhibits within the new Bayview Heritage Museum that showcases local artists and art-focused partnerships for local schools and educational organizations.



ECONOMIC & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Promoting jobs and economic opportunities that stabilize the Cultural District's economy.

 - **Establish free and accessible multipurpose community workspaces** for professionals and connect residents to existing neighborhood resource centers for legal services, accounting support, training, and certifications.

- **Expand apprenticeship and training programs to include a wider variety of occupations** and partner with OEWD to support more paid youth vocational and artistic programs.

- **Elevate workforce success story communications** by partnering with CBOs and storytelling organizations to increase awareness of the positive outcomes of Bayview programs, achievers, and investments.

- Advance financial literacy programming, work readiness, and entrepreneurship.
- **15**
- Support and promote Black-owned businesses and vendor opportunities through increased events for local artists and vendors, and advancing a Black-owned Business Directory.
- 16
- Support and promote culinary entrepreneurship, culinary training opportunities, and existing food businesses in the District to advance the unique culinary experiences and restaurants in Bayview.

Establish a revitalization initiative and place-keeping and public space management team to develop and implement a multiyear revitalization plan for "block-by-block" beautification of the district,
and activation and long term management of centrally-located public
spaces and vacant spaces.

18

Advance placemaking and placekeeping as a fundamental principle for investment in the African American Arts and Cultural District.

Empower residents—especially youth—with knowledge of local planning and land use systems.

Formalize a culture of collaboration among major entities and organizations on cultural events and programming in the Bayview.

Develop culturally relevant communication campaigns

in partnership with City agencies and CBOS to address leading community-identified public health, safety and social challenges.


Increase access to culturally responsive health and wellness resources

through partnerships to expand and promote hubs with a range of integrated physical and mental health resources and programming without referral by health care providers.
