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[Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks General Obligation Bond Sale – Not to Exceed \$75,009,139]

Resolution Authorizing and Directing the Sale of Not to Exceed \$75,009,139 Aggregate Principal Amount of City and County of San Francisco General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2012B; Prescribing the Form and Terms of Said Bonds; Authorizing the Execution, Authentication, and Registration of Said Bonds: Providing for the Appointment of Depositories and Other Agents for Said Bonds; Providing for the Establishment of Accounts Related Thereto; Providing for the Manner of Sale of Said Bonds by Competitive Sale; Approving the Forms of Official Notice of Sale and Notice of Intention to Sell Bonds; Directing the Publication of the Notice of Intention to Sell Bonds; Approving the Form of the Preliminary Official Statement and the Form and Execution of the Official Statement Relating to the Sale of Said Bonds; Approving the Form of the Continuing Disclosure Certificate; Approving Modifications to Documents; Ratifying Certain Actions Previously Taken; Declaring the City's Intent to Reimburse Certain Expenditures; Waiving the Deadline for Submission of Bond Accountability Reports; and Granting General Authority to City Officials to Take Necessary Actions in Connection with the Authorization, Issuance, Sale, and Delivery of Said Bonds.

WHEREAS, By Resolution No. 343-08 (the "Authorizing Resolution"), adopted by the Board of Supervisors (the "Board") of the City and County of San Francisco (the "City") on July 29, 2008, and signed by the Mayor of the City (the "Mayor") on August 5, 2008, the City authorized the issuance of its General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) (the "Bonds"); and,

WHEREAS, By Resolution No. 342-08, adopted by the Board on July 29, 2008, and signed by the Mayor on August 5, 2008, the City authorized the first series of Bonds not to exceed \$45,000,000 aggregate principal amount of said General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2008B; and,

WHEREAS, By Resolution No. 45-10, adopted by the Board on February 9, 2010, and signed by the Mayor on February 18, 2010, the City authorized the second and third series of Bonds not to exceed \$65,000,000 aggregate principal amount of said General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2010B and General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2010D (Federally Taxable Build America Bonds); and,

WHEREAS, The City has issued and sold, to date, a total of \$102,950,000 General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008); and there remains \$82,050,000 of authorized and unissued General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008); and,

WHEREAS, It is necessary and desirable to issue an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$75,009,139 City and County of San Francisco General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2012B (the "Series 2012B Bonds"); and,

WHEREAS, The Series 2012B Bonds are being issued pursuant to the Authorizing Resolution and Title 5, Division 2, Part 1, Chapter 3, Article 4.5 of the California Government Code, the Charter of the City (the "Charter"), and a duly held election called for by Ordinance No. 237-07 adopted by the Board on October 23, 2007, and signed by the Mayor on October 24, 2007 (the "Bond Ordinance"); and,

WHEREAS, The City has paid and expects to pay certain expenditures in connection with the projects to be financed by the Series 2012B Bonds prior to the issuance and sale of

the Series 2012B Bonds, and the City intends to reimburse itself and to pay third parties for such prior expenditures from the proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds; and,

WHEREAS, Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations promulgated under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Treasury Regulations") requires the City to declare its reasonable official intent to reimburse prior expenditures with the proceeds of a subsequent borrowing; and,

WHEREAS, The Treasury Regulations require that any reimbursement allocation of proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds to be made with respect to expenditures incurred prior to the issuance of the Series 2012B Bonds will occur not later than eighteen (18) months after the later of (i) the date on which the expenditure is paid or (ii) the date on which the facilities are placed in service, but in no event later than three (3) years after the expenditure is paid; and,

WHEREAS, Section 2.71(b) of the City's Administrative Code provides that a Bond Accountability Report shall be submitted sixty (60) days prior to approval by the Board of the sale of any subsequent series of bonds for the same project; and

WHEREAS, the Recreation and Park Department will not meet the sixty (60) day deadline for submission of its Bond Accountability Report; and

WHEREAS, the Recreation and Park Department will submit its Bond Accountability Report prior to approval by the Board of the Series 2012 Bonds; and

WHEREAS, Section 2.71(e) of the City's Administrative Code provides the Board may waive the requirement for any accountability report by resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Recreation and Park Department desires that the Board waive the deadline for Bond Accountability Reports to be submitted with respect to the Series 2012 Bonds; and

WHEREAS, The Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee shall conduct an annual review of bond spending and shall provide an annual report on the management of the program to the Mayor, the Board, the Recreation and Park Commission, and the Port Commission, and, to the extent permitted by law, one-tenth of one percent (0.1%) of the gross proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds shall be deposited in a fund established by the Controller's Office and appropriated by the Board at the direction of the Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee to cover the costs of such Committee and its review process;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Recitals. All of the recitals herein are true and correct.

Section 2. Conditions Precedent. All conditions, things and acts required by law to exist, to happen and to be performed precedent to the adoption of this Resolution exist, have happened and have been performed in due time, form and manner in accordance with applicable law, and the City is now authorized pursuant to the Charter and applicable law to incur indebtedness in the manner and form provided in this Resolution.

Section 3. <u>Documents</u>. The documents presented to the Board and on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors or his or her designee (the "Clerk of the Board of Supervisors") are contained in File No. ______.

Section 4. <u>Issuance and Sale of Series 2012B Bonds</u>. The Board hereby authorizes the issuance and sale of not to exceed \$75,009,139 in aggregate principal amount of the Bonds to be designated as "City and County of San Francisco General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2012B" for the purposes set forth in the Bond Ordinance and Proposition A approved by the voters on February 5, 2008. The Director of Public Finance of the City or his or her designee (the "Director of Public Finance")

is hereby authorized to determine the sale date, the interest rates, the definitive principal amount thereof, the maturity dates and the redemption dates, if any, and the terms of any optional or mandatory redemption thereof, subject to the other specific provisions of this Resolution, including the following terms and conditions: (i) the Series 2012B Bonds shall not have an interest rate in excess of 12% per year; and (ii) the Series 2012B Bonds shall not have a final maturity date after June 15, 2037. The Director of Public Finance is further authorized to give the Series 2012B Bonds such additional or other series designation, or to modify such series designation, as may be necessary or appropriate to distinguish such series from every other series of Bonds and from other bonds issued by the City.

Section 5. Execution, Authentication and Registration of the Series 2012B Bonds. The Series 2012B Bonds shall be in fully registered form without coupons in denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. The Controller of the City or his or her designee (the "Controller") is hereby directed to cause the Series 2012B Bonds to be prepared in sufficient quantity for delivery to or for the account of the purchaser thereof and the Controller is hereby directed to cause the blanks therein to be completed in accordance with the Authorizing Resolution, to procure their execution by the proper officers of the City (including by facsimile signature if necessary or convenient), and to deliver the Series 2012B Bonds when so executed to said purchaser in exchange for the purchase price thereof, all in accordance with the Authorizing Resolution.

The Series 2012B Bonds and the certificate of authentication and registration, manually executed by the Treasurer of the City or his or her designee (the "City Treasurer") and the form of assignment to appear thereon shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A (a copy of which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and which is hereby declared to be a part of this Resolution as if fully set forth herein), with such necessary

or appropriate variations, omissions and insertions as permitted or required by this Resolution and made in accordance with Section 19 hereof.

Only such of the Series 2012B Bonds as shall bear thereon a certificate of authentication and registration in the form herein recited, executed by the City Treasurer, shall be valid or obligatory for any purpose or entitled to the benefits of this Resolution, and such certificate of the City Treasurer, executed as herein provided, shall be conclusive evidence that the Series 2012B Bonds so authenticated have been duly authenticated and delivered hereunder and are entitled to the benefits of this Resolution.

The Controller shall assign a distinctive letter, or number, or letter and number to each Series 2012B Bond authenticated and registered by the City Treasurer and shall maintain a record thereof which shall be available for inspection.

Section 6. Registration Books. The City Treasurer shall keep or cause to be kept, at the office of the City Treasurer, or at the designated office of any registrar appointed by the City Treasurer, separate and sufficient books for the registration and transfer of the Series 2012B Bonds, which bond registration books shall at all times be open to inspection, and upon presentation for such purpose, the City Treasurer shall, under such reasonable regulations as he or she may prescribe, register or transfer or cause to be registered or transferred, on said books, Series 2012B Bonds as herein provided. The City and the City Treasurer may treat the registered owners of the Series 2012B Bonds (each, a "Registered Owner") as the absolute owners thereof for all purposes, and the City and the City Treasurer shall not be affected by any notice to the contrary.

Section 7. <u>Transfer or Exchange of Series 2012B Bonds</u>. Any Series 2012B Bond may, in accordance with its terms, be transferred upon the bond registration books required to be kept pursuant to the provisions of Section 6 hereof, by the person in whose name it is registered, in person or by the duly authorized attorney of such person in writing, upon

surrender of such Series 2012B Bond for cancellation, accompanied by delivery of a duly executed written instrument of transfer in a form approved by the City Treasurer.

Any Series 2012B Bonds may be exchanged at the office of the City Treasurer for a like aggregate principal amount of other authorized denominations of the same series, interest rate, and maturity.

Whenever any Series 2012B Bond shall be surrendered for transfer or exchange, the designated City officials shall execute (as provided in Section 5 hereof) and the City Treasurer shall authenticate and deliver a new Series 2012B Bond of the same series, interest rate and maturity in a like aggregate principal amount. The City Treasurer shall require the payment by any Registered Owner requesting any such transfer of any tax or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such transfer or exchange.

No transfer or exchange of Series 2012B Bonds shall be required to be made by the City Treasurer during the period from the Record Date (as defined in Section 8 hereof) next preceding each interest payment date to such interest payment date or after a notice of redemption shall have been mailed with respect to such Series 2012B Bond.

Section 8. General Terms of the Series 2012B Bonds; Redemption Provisions.

(a) General Terms. The Series 2012B Bonds shall be dated the date of their delivery or such other date (the "Dated Date"), as specified in the Bond Award (as defined in Section 13 hereof). The Series 2012B Bonds shall bear interest at rates to be determined upon the sale of the Series 2012B Bonds, calculated on the basis of a 360-day year comprised of twelve 30-day months, payable on June 15, 2012 (or such other date as may be designated in the Bond Award), and semiannually thereafter on June 15 and December 15 of each year.

The principal of the Series 2012B Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America to the Registered Owner thereof, upon the surrender thereof at maturity or

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earlier redemption at the office of the City Treasurer. The interest on the Series 2012B Bonds shall be payable in like lawful money to the Registered Owner whose name appears on the bond registration books of the City Treasurer as the Registered Owner thereof as of the close of business on the last day of the month immediately preceding an interest payment date (the "Record Date"), whether or not such day is a Business Day (as defined below).

Each Series 2012B Bond shall bear interest from the interest payment date next preceding the date of authentication thereof unless it is authenticated as of a day during the period from the Record Date next preceding any interest payment date to the interest payment date, inclusive, in which event it shall bear interest from such interest payment date, or unless it is authenticated on or before the first Record Date, in which event it shall bear interest from the Dated Date; provided, however, that if, at the time of authentication of any Series 2012B Bond, interest is in default on the Series 2012B Bonds, such Series 2012B Bond shall bear interest from the interest payment date to which interest has previously been paid or made available for payment on the Series 2012B Bonds or from the Dated Date if the first interest payment is not made. Except as may be otherwise provided in connection with any book-entry only system applicable to the Series 2012B Bonds, payment of the interest on any Series 2012B Bond shall be made by check mailed on the interest payment date to its Registered Owner at such Registered Owner's address as it appears on the registration books as of the Record Date; provided, however, if any interest payment date occurs on a day that banks in California or New York are closed for business or the New York Stock Exchange is closed for business, then such payment shall be made on the next succeeding day that banks in both California and New York are open for business and the New York Stock Exchange is open for business (each, a "Business Day"); and provided, further, that the Registered Owner of an aggregate principal amount of at least \$1,000,000 of the Series 2012B Bonds may submit a written request to the City Treasurer on or before a Record Date

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preceding an interest payment date for payment of interest by wire transfer to a commercial bank located within the United States of America. For so long as the Series 2012B Bonds are held in book-entry form by a securities depository selected by the City pursuant to Section 11 hereof, payment shall be made to the Registered Owner of the Series 2012B Bonds designated by such securities depository by wire transfer of immediately available funds.

- (b) <u>Optional Redemption</u>. The Series 2012B Bonds shall be subject to optional redemption prior to maturity as provided in the Official Notice of Sale or the Bond Award.
- (c) <u>Sinking Fund Redemption</u>. The Series 2012B Bonds shall be subject to mandatory redemption at par, by lot, in any year for which the purchaser thereof has designated that the principal amount payable with respect to that year shall constitute a mandatory sinking fund payment, as and to the extent permitted by the Official Notice of Sale. Any Series 2012B Bonds subject to mandatory redemption shall be designated as such in the Official Notice of Sale or the Bond Award. The principal of and interest on the Series 2012B Bonds subject to mandatory redemption shall be paid from the Series 2012B Bond Account (as defined in Section 9 hereof), pursuant to Section 9 hereof. In lieu of any such mandatory redemption for the Series 2012B Bonds, at any time prior to the selection of the Series 2012B Bonds for mandatory redemption, the City may apply such amounts on deposit in the Series 2012B Bond Account to purchase Series 2012B Bonds subject to such redemption at public or private sale, as and when and at such prices not in excess of the principal amount thereof (including sales commission and other charges but excluding accrued interest), as the City may determine.
- (d) Redemption Selection. Whenever less than all of the outstanding Series 2012B Bonds maturing on any one date are called for redemption on any one date, the City Treasurer will select the Series 2012B Bonds or portions thereof, in denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof, to be redeemed from the outstanding Series 2012B Bonds Mayor Lee

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maturing on such date not previously selected for redemption, by lot, in any manner which the City Treasurer deems fair.

The date on which the Series 2012B Bonds that are called for redemption are to be presented for redemption is herein called the "Redemption Date."

(e) Redemption – Notice. The City Treasurer shall mail, or cause to be mailed, notice of any redemption of the Series 2012B Bonds, postage prepaid, to the respective Registered Owners thereof at the addresses appearing on the bond registration books not less than twenty (20) days prior to the Redemption Date. The notice of redemption shall (1) state the Redemption Date; (2) state the redemption price; (3) state the maturity dates of the Series 2012B Bonds and, if less than all of any such maturity is called for redemption, the distinctive numbers of the Series 2012B Bonds of such maturity to be redeemed, and in the case of any Series 2012B Bonds redeemed in part only, the respective portions of the principal amount thereof to be redeemed; (4) state the CUSIP number, if any, of each Series 2012B Bond to be redeemed; (5) require that such Series 2012B Bonds be surrendered by the Registered Owners at the office of the City Treasurer or his or her agent; and (6) give notice that interest on such Series 2012B Bonds will cease to accrue after the designated Redemption Date. Such notice of redemption may be conditional as provided in Section 8(g) hereof.

The actual receipt by the Registered Owner of any Series 2012B Bond of notice of such redemption shall not be a condition precedent to redemption, and failure to receive such notice, or any defect in such notice so mailed, shall not affect the validity of the proceedings for the redemption of such Series 2012B Bonds or the cessation of accrual of interest on such Series 2012B Bonds on the Redemption Date.

Notice of such redemption also shall be given, or caused to be given, by the City Treasurer, by (i) registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, (ii) confirmed facsimile

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transmission or (iii) overnight delivery service, to (A) all organizations registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as securities depositories and (B) such other services or organizations as may be required in accordance with the Continuing Disclosure Certificate described in Section 18 hereof.

The notice or notices required for redemption shall be given by the City Treasurer, or any agent appointed by the City. A certificate of the City Treasurer or such other appointed agent of the City that notice of redemption has been given to the Registered Owner of any Series 2012B Bond in accordance with this Resolution shall be conclusive against all parties.

Payment for Optional Redemption. At the time the City Treasurer or the (f) Controller determines to optionally call and redeem any of the Series 2012B Bonds, the City Treasurer or his or her agent shall establish a redemption account to be described or known as the "General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2012B Redemption Account" (the "Series 2012B Redemption Account"), and prior to or on the Redemption Date there must be set aside in the Series 2012B Redemption Account moneys available for the purpose and sufficient to redeem, as provided in this Resolution, the Series 2012B Bonds designated in said notice of redemption, subject to rescission as hereinafter provided. Said moneys must be set aside in the Series 2012B Redemption Account solely for the purpose of, and shall be applied on or after the Redemption Date to, payment of the redemption price of the Series 2012B Bonds to be redeemed upon presentation and surrender of such Series 2012B Bonds. Any interest due on or prior to the Redemption Date may be paid from the Series 2012B Bond Account as provided in Section 9 hereof or from the Series 2012B Redemption Account. Moneys held from time to time in the Series 2012B Redemption Account shall be invested by the City Treasurer pursuant to the City's policies and guidelines for investment of moneys in the General Fund of the City. If, after all of the Series 2012B Bonds have been redeemed and canceled or paid and canceled, there are

moneys remaining in said Series 2012B Redemption Account, said moneys shall be transferred to the General Fund of the City or to such other fund or account as required by applicable law; provided, however, that if said moneys are part of the proceeds of refunding bonds, said moneys shall be transferred pursuant to the resolution authorizing such refunding bonds.

When notice of optional redemption has been given, substantially as provided herein, and when the amount necessary for the redemption of the Series 2012B Bonds called for redemption (principal, premium, if any, and accrued interest to such Redemption Date) is set aside for that purpose in said Series 2012B Redemption Account, as provided herein, the Series 2012B Bonds designated for redemption shall become due and payable on the Redemption Date therefor, and upon presentation and surrender of said Series 2012B Bonds at the place specified in the notice of redemption, such Series 2012B Bonds shall be redeemed and paid at said redemption price out of said Series 2012B Redemption Account. No interest will accrue on such Series 2012B Bonds called for redemption after the Redemption Date and the Registered Owners of such Series 2012B Bonds shall look for payment of such Series 2012B Bonds only to said Series 2012B Redemption Account. All Series 2012B Bonds redeemed shall be canceled forthwith by the City Treasurer and shall not be reissued.

(g) Conditional Notice of Optional Redemption. Any notice of optional redemption given as provided in Section 8(e) may provide that such redemption is conditioned upon: (i) deposit in the Series 2012B Redemption Account of sufficient moneys to redeem the Series 2012B Bonds called for redemption on the anticipated Redemption Date, or (ii) any other event specified in the notice of redemption. In the event that such conditional notice of optional redemption has been given, substantially as provided herein, and on the scheduled Redemption Date (i) sufficient moneys to redeem the Series 2012B Bonds have not been

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deposited in the Series 2012B Redemption Account or (ii) any other event specified in the notice of redemption did not occur, such Series 2012B Bonds for which notice of conditional optional redemption was given shall not be redeemed and shall remain Outstanding for all purposes of this Resolution and the redemption not occurring shall not constitute an event of default under this Resolution or the Authorizing Resolution.

(h) Rescission of Optional Redemption. The City may rescind any optional redemption and notice thereof for any reason on any date prior to the Redemption Date by causing written notice of the rescission to be given to the Registered Owners of all Series 2012B Bonds so called for redemption. Notice of such rescission of redemption shall be given in the same manner notice of redemption was originally given. The actual receipt by the Registered Owner of any Series 2012B Bond of notice of such rescission shall not be a condition precedent to rescission, and failure to receive such notice or any defect in such notice so mailed shall not affect the validity of the rescission.

Section 9. Series 2012B Bond Account. There is hereby established with the City Treasurer a special subaccount in the General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Bond Account (the "Bond Account") created pursuant to the Authorizing Resolution, to be designated the "General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2012B Bond Account" (the "Series 2012B Bond Account"), to be held separate and apart from all other accounts of the City. Any bid premium or accrued interest received upon the delivery of the Series 2012B Bonds shall be deposited into the Series 2012B Bond Account. All interest earned on amounts on deposit in the Series 2012B Bond Account shall be retained in the Series 2012B Bond Account.

On or prior to the date on which any payment of principal of or interest on the Series 2012B Bonds is due, including any Series 2012B Bonds subject to mandatory redemption on said date, the City Treasurer shall allocate to and deposit in the Series 2012B Bond Account,

from amounts held in the Bond Account, an amount which, when added to any available moneys contained in the Series 2012B Bond Account, is sufficient to pay principal of and interest on the Series 2012B Bonds on such date.

On or prior to the date on which any Series 2012B Bonds are to be redeemed at the option of the City pursuant to this Resolution, the City Treasurer may allocate to and deposit in the Series 2012B Redemption Account, from amounts held in the Bond Account pursuant to Section 8 of the Authorizing Resolution, an amount which, when added to any available moneys contained in the Series 2012B Redemption Account, is sufficient to pay principal, interest and premium, if any, with respect to such Series 2012B Bonds on such date. The City Treasurer may make such other provision for the payment of principal of and interest and any redemption premium on the Series 2012B Bonds as is necessary or convenient to permit the optional redemption of the Series 2012B Bonds.

Amounts in the Series 2012B Bond Account may be invested in any investment of the City in which moneys in the General Fund of the City are invested. The City Treasurer may commingle any of the moneys held in the Series 2012B Bond Account with other City moneys or deposit amounts credited to the Series 2012B Bond Account into a separate fund or funds for investment purposes only; provided, however, that all of the moneys held in the Series 2012B Bond Account hereunder shall be accounted for separately notwithstanding any such commingling or separate deposit by the City Treasurer.

Section 10. Series 2012B Project Account. There is hereby established with the City Treasurer a special subaccount in the General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Project Account (the "Project Account") created pursuant to the Authorizing Resolution to be designated the "General Obligation Bonds (Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, 2008) Series 2012B Project Account" (the "Series 2012B Project Account"), to be held separate and apart from all other accounts of the City. All Mayor Lee

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interest earned on amounts on deposit in the Series 2012B Project Account shall be retained in the Series 2012B Project Account. Amounts in the Series 2012B Project Account shall be expended in accordance with the provisions of the Authorizing Resolution for the acquisition, renovation and construction of the Project (as defined in the Authorizing Resolution) or portions thereof.

Amounts in the Series 2012B Project Account may be invested in any investment of the City in which moneys in the General Fund of the City are invested. The City Treasurer may commingle any of the moneys held in the Series 2012B Project Account with other City moneys or deposit amounts credited to the Series 2012B Project Account into a separate fund or funds for investment purposes only; provided, however, that all of the moneys held in the Series 2012B Project Account (including interest earnings) hereunder shall be accounted for separately notwithstanding any such commingling or separate deposit by the City Treasurer.

The City Treasurer is hereby authorized to pay or cause to be paid from the proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds in the Series 2012B Project Account, on behalf of the City, the costs of issuance associated with the Series 2012B Bonds. Costs of issuance of the Series 2012B Bonds shall include, without limitation, bond and financial printing expenses, mailing and publication expenses, rating agency fees, the fees and expenses of paying agents, registrars, financial consultants, disclosure counsel and co-bond counsel and the reimbursement of departmental expenses in connection with the issuance of the Series 2012B Bonds.

Section 11. Appointment of Securities Depositories and Other Agents. The Depository Trust Company ("DTC") is hereby appointed as securities depository for the Series 2012B Bonds. The Series 2012B Bonds shall be initially issued only in book-entry form. Upon initial issuance, the ownership of each Series 2012B Bond shall be registered in the bond registration books in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC. So long as the

Series 2012B Bonds are registered in book-entry form, the 2011A Bonds shall be registered in the name of Cede & Co. The City will not have any responsibility or obligation to any purchaser of a beneficial ownership interest in any Series 2012B Bonds or to any participants in DTC or any successor securities depository with respect to (i) the accuracy of any records maintained by such securities depository or any participant therein; (ii) any notice that is permitted or required to be given to the Registered Owners of the Series 2012B Bonds under this Resolution; (iii) the selection by such securities depository or any participant therein of any person to receive payment in the event of a partial redemption of the Series 2012B Bonds; (iv) the payment by such securities depository or any participant therein of any amount with respect to the principal or redemption premium, if any, or interest due with respect to the Series 2012B Bonds; (v) any consent given or other action taken by such securities depository as the Registered Owner of the Series 2012B Bonds; or (vi) any other matter.

The City Treasurer is hereby also authorized and directed to appoint one or more agents, as he or she may deem necessary or desirable. To the extent permitted by applicable law and under the supervision of the City Treasurer, such agents may serve as paying agent, fiscal agent, rebate calculation agent, escrow agent or registrar for the Series 2012B Bonds or may assist the City Treasurer in performing any or all of such functions and such other duties as the City Treasurer shall determine. If the City Treasurer appoints one or more paying agents, the procedures set forth in Section 8 hereof relating to registration of ownership of the Series 2012B Bonds and payments and redemption notices to Registered Owner of the Series 2012B Bonds may be modified to comply with the policies and procedures of such paying agent. Such agents shall serve under such terms and conditions as the City Treasurer shall determine. The City Treasurer may remove or replace agents appointed pursuant to this Section 11 at any time.

Section 12. <u>Defeasance Provisions</u>. Payment of all or any portion of the Series 2012B Bonds may be provided for prior to such Series 2012B Bonds' respective stated maturities by irrevocably depositing with the City Treasurer (or any commercial bank or trust company designated by the City Treasurer to act as escrow agent with respect thereto):

- (a) An amount of cash equal to the principal amount of all of such Series 2012B Bonds or a portion thereof, and all unpaid interest thereon to maturity, except that in the case of the portion of a Series 2012B Bonds that are to be redeemed prior to such Series 2012B Bonds' respective stated maturities and in respect of which notice of such redemption shall have been given as provided in Section 8 hereof or an irrevocable election to give such notice shall have been made by the City, the amount to be deposited shall be the principal amount thereof, all unpaid interest thereon to the Redemption Date, and premium, if any, due on such Redemption Date; or
- (b) Defeasance Securities (as defined below) not subject to call, except as provided below in the definition thereof, maturing and paying interest at such times and in such amounts, together with interest earnings and cash, if required, as will, without reinvestment, as certified by an independent verification agent, be fully sufficient to pay the principal and all unpaid interest to maturity or to the Redemption Date, as the case may be, and premium, if any, due on the portion of the Series 2012B Bonds to be paid or redeemed, as such principal and interest come due; provided, that, in the case of such Series 2012B Bonds that are to be redeemed prior to maturity, notice of such redemption shall be given as provided in Section 8 hereof or an irrevocable election to give such notice shall have been made by the City; then, all obligations of the City with respect to said outstanding Series 2012B Bonds shall cease and terminate, except only the obligation of the City to pay or cause to be paid from the funds deposited pursuant to paragraphs (a) or (b) of this Section 12, to the owners of such Series 2012B Bonds all sums due with respect thereto and the obligations of the City pursuant to

Section 17 hereof; provided, that the City shall have received an opinion of nationally recognized bond counsel that provision for the payment of such Series 2012B Bonds has been made in accordance with this Section 12.

For purposes of this Section 12, "Defeasance Securities" shall mean any of the following that at the time are legal investments under the laws of the State of California for the moneys proposed to be invested therein:

- (1) United States Obligations (as defined below); and
- (2) Pre-refunded fixed interest rate municipal obligations meeting the following conditions: (a) the municipal obligations are not subject to redemption prior to maturity, or the trustee has been given irrevocable instructions concerning their calling and redemption and the issuer has covenanted not to redeem such obligations other than as set forth in such instructions; (b) the municipal obligations are secured by cash or United States Obligations; (c) the principal of and interest on the United States Obligations (plus any cash in the escrow fund or the Series 2012B Redemption Account) are sufficient to meet the liabilities of the municipal obligations; (d) the United States Obligations serving as security for the municipal obligations are held by an escrow agent or trustee; (e) the United States Obligations are not available to satisfy any other claims, including those against the trustee or escrow agent; and (f) the municipal obligations are rated (without regard to any numerical modifier, plus or minus sign or other modifier), at the time of original deposit to the escrow fund, by any two Rating Agencies (as defined below) not lower than the rating then maintained by the respective Rating Agency on such United States Obligations.

For purposes of this Section 12, "United States Obligations" shall mean (i) direct and general obligations of the United States of America, or obligations that are unconditionally guaranteed as to principal and interest by the United States of America, including without limitation, the interest component of Resolution Funding Corporation (REFCORP) bonds that

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have been stripped by request to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York in book-entry form or (ii) any security issued by an agency or instrumentality of the United States of America that is selected by the Director of Public Finance that results in the escrow fund being rated by any two Rating Agencies at the time of the initial deposit to the escrow fund and upon any substitution or subsequent deposit to the escrow fund no lower than the rating then maintained by the respective Rating Agency on United States Obligations described in clause (i) above.

For purposes of this Section 12, "Rating Agencies" shall mean Moody's Investors Service, Inc., Fitch Ratings, and Standard and Poor's Rating Services, a division of The McGraw-Hill Companies, Inc., or any other nationally-recognized bond rating agency that is the successor to any of the foregoing rating agencies or that is otherwise established after the date hereof.

Section 13. Official Notice of Sale. The form of proposed Official Notice of Sale inviting bids for the Series 2012B Bonds (the "Official Notice of Sale") submitted to the Board is hereby approved and adopted as the Official Notice of Sale inviting bids for the Series 2012B Bonds, with such changes, additions and modifications as may be made in accordance with Section 19 hereof.

Bids shall be received on the date designated by the Director of Public Finance pursuant to the Official Notice of Sale. The Director of Public Finance is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be mailed or otherwise circulated to prospective bidders for the Series 2012B Bonds copies of the Official Notice of Sale, subject to such corrections, revisions or additions as may be acceptable to the Director of Public Finance.

The Controller is hereby authorized to award the Series 2012B Bonds to the bidder whose bid represents the lowest true interest cost to the City, all in accordance with the procedures described in the Official Notice of Sale, which award shall be set forth in a

certificate signed by the Controller setting forth the terms of the Series 2012B Bonds and the original purchaser thereof (the "Bond Award"). The Controller shall provide a copy of the Bond Award as soon as practicable to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and the Director of Public Finance; provided, however, that failure to provide such copies shall not affect the validity of the Bond Award.

Section 14. Publication of Notice of Intention to Sell Bonds. The form of proposed Notice of Intention to Sell the Series 2012B Bonds (the "Notice of Intention to Sell Bonds") submitted to the Board is hereby approved and adopted as the Notice of Intention to Sell Bonds for the Series 2012B Bonds, and the Director of Public Finance is hereby authorized and directed to cause the Notice of Intention to Sell Bonds, subject to such corrections, revisions or additions as may be made in accordance with Section 19 hereof, to be published once in The Bond Buyer or another financial publication generally circulated throughout the State of California.

Section 15. Sale of Series 2012B Bonds; Solicitation of Competitive Bids. The Board hereby authorizes the sale of the Series 2012B Bonds by solicitation of competitive bids for the purchase of the Series 2012B Bonds on the date and at the place determined in accordance with the Official Notice of Sale.

Section 16. Official Statement. The form of proposed Preliminary Official Statement describing the Series 2012B Bonds, including all appendices thereto (the "Preliminary Official Statement"), submitted to the Board is hereby approved and adopted as the Preliminary Official Statement describing the Series 2012B Bonds, with such additions, corrections and revisions as may be determined to be necessary or desirable and made in accordance with Section 19 hereof. The Controller or Director of Public Finance is each hereby authorized and directed to revise the Official Statement, as necessary, to conform it to the City's Comprehensive Annual Fiscal Report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011, subject to Mayor Lee

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review and approval by the City Attorney of the City (the "City Attorney"). The Controller is hereby authorized to cause the distribution of a Preliminary Official Statement deemed final for purposes of Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12 promulgated under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended (the "Rule"), and to sign a certificate to that effect. The Director of Public Finance is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be printed and mailed or electronically distributed to prospective bidders for the Series 2012B Bonds copies of the Preliminary Official Statement in substantially the form of the Preliminary Official Statement approved and adopted hereby, as completed, supplemented, corrected or revised. The Controller is authorized and directed to approve, execute, and deliver the final Official Statement with respect to the Series 2012B Bonds, which final Official Statement shall be in the form of the Preliminary Official Statement, with such additions, corrections and revisions as may be determined to be necessary or desirable and made in accordance with Section 19 hereof and as are permitted under the Rule.

Section 17. Tax Covenants.

(a) General. The City hereby covenants with the owners and holders of the Series 2012B Bonds that, notwithstanding any other provisions of this Resolution, it shall not take any action, or fail to take any action, if any such action or failure to take action would adversely affect the exclusion from gross income of interest on the Series 2012B Bonds under Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code") and the regulations issued thereunder, as the same may be amended from time to time, and any successor provisions of law. Reference to a particular section of the Code shall be deemed to be a reference to any successor to any such section. The City shall not, directly or indirectly, use or permit the use of proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds or any of the property financed or refinanced with proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds, or any portion thereof, by any person other than a governmental unit (as such term is used in Section 141 of the Code), in such manner or to

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such extent as would result in the loss of exclusion of interest on the Series 2012B Bonds from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

- Use of Proceeds. The City shall not take any action, or fail to take any (b) action, if any such action or failure to take action would cause the Series 2012B Bonds to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code, and in furtherance thereof, shall not make any use of the proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds or any of the property financed or refinanced with proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds, or any portion thereof, or any other funds of the City, that would cause the Series 2012B Bonds to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. To that end, so long as any Series 2012B Bonds are outstanding, the City, with respect to such proceeds and property and such other funds, will comply with applicable requirements of the Code and all regulations of the United States Department of the Treasury issued thereunder and under Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended (the "1954 Code"), to the extent such requirements are, at the time, applicable and in effect. The City has established reasonable procedures necessary to ensure continued compliance with Section 141 of the Code (or, if applicable, the 1954 Code) and the continued qualification of the Series 2012B Bonds as "governmental bonds."
- (c) Arbitrage. The City shall not, directly or indirectly, use or permit the use of any proceeds of any Series 2012B Bonds, or of any property financed or refinanced thereby, or other funds of the City, or take or omit to take any action, that would cause the Series 2012B Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code. To that end, the City shall comply with all requirements of Section 148 of the Code and all regulations of the United States Department of the Treasury issued thereunder to the extent such requirements are, at the time, in effect and applicable to the Series 2012B Bonds.

- (d) <u>Federal Guarantee</u>. The City shall not make any use of the proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds or any other funds of the City, or take or omit to take any other action, that would cause the Series 2012B Bonds to be "federally guaranteed" within the meaning of Section 149(b) of the Code.
- (e) <u>Information Reporting</u>. The City shall take or cause to be taken all necessary action to comply with the informational reporting requirement of Section 149(e) of the Code with respect to the Series 2012B Bonds.
- (f) <u>Hedge Bonds</u>. The City shall not make any use of the proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds or any other amounts or property, regardless of the source, or take any action or refrain from taking any action that would cause the Series 2012B Bonds to be considered "hedge bonds" within the meaning of Section 149(g) of the Code unless the City takes all necessary action to assure compliance with the requirements of Section 149(g) of the Code.
- (g) <u>Compliance with Tax Certificate</u>. In furtherance of the foregoing tax covenants of this Section 17, the City covenants that it will comply with the provisions of the Tax Certificate to be executed by the City with respect to the Series 2012B Bonds, dated the date of issuance of the Series 2012B Bonds, as such Tax Certificate may be amended from time to time. This covenant shall survive payment in full or defeasance of the Series 2012B Bonds.

Section 18. <u>Continuing Disclosure Certificate</u>. The form of Continuing Disclosure Certificate (the "Continuing Disclosure Certificate") to be signed by the City to permit the original purchaser of the Series 2012B Bonds to comply with the Rule, submitted to the Board is hereby approved and adopted as the Continuing Disclosure Certificate, with such additions, corrections and revisions as may be determined to be necessary or desirable and made in accordance with Section 19 hereof. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the Continuing Disclosure Certificate on behalf of the City and deliver the Continuing Disclosure Certificate to the original purchaser of the Series 2012B Bonds.

Section 19. Modification to Documents. Any City official authorized by this Resolution to execute any document is hereby further authorized, in consultation with the City Attorney and co-bond counsel, to approve and make such changes, additions, amendments or modifications to the document or documents such official is authorized to execute as may be necessary or advisable (provided that such changes, additions, amendments or modifications shall not authorize an aggregate principal amount of Series 2012B Bonds in excess of \$75,009,139 or conflict with the provisions of Section 4 hereof). The approval of any change, addition, amendment or modification to any of the aforementioned documents shall be evidenced conclusively by the execution and delivery of the document in question.

Section 20. <u>Ratification</u>. All actions heretofore taken by officials, employees and agents of the City with respect to the sale and issuance of the Series 2012B Bonds are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified.

Section 21. Relationship to Authorizing Resolution. In the event of any conflict between this Resolution and the Authorizing Resolution, the terms of this Resolution shall control. Without limiting the foregoing and notwithstanding the provisions of the Authorizing Resolution, the City is not obligated to transfer money from the General Fund of the City to the Bond Account to pay the principal of or interest on the Series 2012B Bonds.

Section 22. Reimbursement. The City hereby declares its official intent to reimburse prior expenditures of the City incurred prior to the issuance and sale of the Series 2012B Bonds in connection with the Project or portions thereof to be financed by the Series 2012B Bonds. The Board hereby declares the City's intent to reimburse the City with the proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds for the expenditures with respect to the Project (the "Expenditures" and each, an "Expenditure") made on and after that date that is no more than 60 days prior to adoption of this Resolution. The City reasonably expects on the date hereof that it will reimburse the Expenditures with the proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds. Each Expenditure

was and will be either (a) of a type properly chargeable to a capital account under general federal income tax principles (determined in each case as of the date of the Expenditure), (b) a cost of issuance with respect to the Series 2012B Bonds, (c) a nonrecurring item that is not customarily payable from current revenues, or (d) a grant to a party that is not related to or an agent of the City so long as such grant does not impose any obligation or condition (directly or indirectly) to repay any amount to or for the benefit of the City. The City shall make a reimbursement allocation, which is a written allocation by the City that evidences the City's use of proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds to reimburse an Expenditure, no later than 18 months after the later of the date on which the Expenditure is paid or the Project is placed in service or abandoned, but in no event more than three years after the date on which the Expenditure is paid. The City recognizes that exceptions are available for certain "preliminary expenditures," costs of issuance, certain de minimis amounts, expenditures by "small issuers" (based on the year of issuance and not the year of expenditure) and expenditures for construction projects of at least 5 years.

Section 23. Accountability Reports. The Series 2012B Bonds are subject to accountability requirements under the City's Administrative Code and the Bond Ordinance. The deadline for submission of the Recreation and Park Department's Accountability Report under Administrative Code section 2.71(b) is hereby waived with respect to the Series 2012 B Bonds. Accountability report(s) with respect to the Series 2012B Bonds shall be submitted in all other respects in the manner required by the Administrative Code and the Bond Ordinance.

Section 24. <u>Citizens' Oversight Committee</u>. The Series 2012B Bonds are subject to, and incorporate by reference, the applicable provisions of San Francisco Administrative Code Sections 5.30 - 5.36 (the "Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee"), and, to the extent permitted by law, one-tenth of one percent (0.1%) of the gross proceeds of the Series 2012B Bonds shall be deposited in a fund established by the Controller's Office and

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 appropriated by the Board of Supervisors at the direction of the Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee to cover the costs of such Committee.

Section 25. General Authority. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, the City Treasurer, the Director of Public Finance, the City Attorney and the Controller are each hereby authorized and directed in the name and on behalf of the City to take any and all steps and to issue, deliver or enter into any and all certificates, requisitions, agreements, notices, consents, and other documents as may be necessary to give effect to the provisions of this Resolution, including but not limited to letters of representations to any depository or depositories which they or any of them might deem necessary or appropriate in order to consummate the lawful issuance, sale and delivery of the Series 2012B Bonds.

City on February 5, 2008 and is issued and sold by the City pursuant to and in strict conformity with the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of California, and Charter of the City, and of resolutions adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the City (the "Board of Supervisors") on August 5, 2008, and ______, 2012 (collectively, the "Resolutions").

The bonds are issuable as fully registered bonds without coupons in the denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof, provided that no bond shall have principal maturing on more than one principal maturity date. Subject to the limitations and conditions and upon payment of the charges, if any, as provided in the Resolutions, the bonds may be exchanged for a like aggregate principal amount of bonds or other authorized denominations of the same series, interest rate and maturity.

This bond is transferable by the registered owner hereof, in person or by attorney duly authorized in writing, at said office of the City Treasurer, but only in the manner, subject to the limitations and upon payment of the charges provided in the Resolutions, and upon surrender and cancellation of this bond. Upon such transfer, a new bond or bonds of authorized denomination or denominations for the same interest rate and same aggregate principal amount will be issued to the transferee in exchange herefor.

The bonds maturing on or before June 15, 20___ are not subject to redemption prior to maturity. The bonds maturing on or after June 15, 20___ are subject to optional redemption prior to their respective maturities, at the option of the City, from any source of available funds, as a whole or in part on any date (with the maturities to be redeemed to be determined by the City and by lot within a maturity), on and after June 15, 20___, at redemption prices equal to 100% of the principal amount redeemed), together with accrued interest to the redemption date, without premium.

The bonds maturing on June 15, 20__, shall be subject to redemption prior to their respective maturity dates, in part, by lot, from mandatory sinking fund payments, on each June 15, as shown in the table below, at a redemption price equal to the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest thereon to the redemption date, without premium.

Notice of redemption shall be given by mail not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date fixed for redemption to the registered owner thereof, but neither failure to receive any such notice or any defect in the notice so mailed shall affect the sufficiency of the proceedings for redemption. Such notice may be conditional.

The City may rescind any optional redemption by written notice to the owner of any bond previously called for redemption prior to the date fixed for redemption. Any notice of optional redemption shall be rescinded if for any reason funds are not or will not be available on the date fixed for redemption or the payment in full of the bonds then called for redemption. Notice of rescission of redemption shall be given in the same manner notice of redemption was originally provided. The actual receipt by the owner of any bond of notice of such rescission shall not be a condition precedent to rescission, and failure to receive such notice or any defect in such notice so mailed shall not affect the validity of the rescission.

If this bond is called for redemption and payment is duly provided therefor, interest shall cease to accrue hereon from and after the date fixed for redemption.

The City and the City Treasurer may treat the registered owner of the bonds as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, and the City and the City Treasurer shall not be affected by any notice to the contrary.

The City Treasurer may appoint agents to serve as bond registrar or paying agent, as provided in the Resolutions.

The Board of Supervisors hereby certifies and declares that the total amount of indebtedness of said City, including the amount of this bond, is within the limit provided by law, that all acts, conditions and things required by the law to be done or performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have been done and performed in strict conformity with the laws authorizing the issuance of this bond, that this bond is in the form prescribed by order of the Board of Supervisors duly made and entered on its minutes, and the money for the payment of principal of this bond, and the payment of interest thereon, shall be raised by taxation upon the taxable property of said City as provided in the Resolutions.

Under the Resolutions, the City covenants and agrees that it is obligated to levy ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount upon all property within the City subject to taxation by the City (except certain property which is taxable at limited rates) in an amount sufficient for the payment of the bonds and the interest thereon when due.

This bond shall not be entitled to any benefit under the Resolutions, or become valid or obligatory for any purpose, until the certificate of authentication and registration hereon endorsed shall have been signed by the City Treasurer.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Note: This item was continued from the January 11, 2012 Budget and Finance Committee Meeting

Legislative Objectives

- File 11-1345: Resolution authorizing and directing the sale of not-to-exceed \$76,000,000 aggregate principal amount of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks General Obligation Bonds, Series 2012B.
- <u>File 11-1334</u>: Ordinance appropriating \$76,000,000 of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond sale proceeds to fund improvement and construction of recreation and park facilities, including \$62,176,132 in the Recreation and Park Department and \$10,394,975 in the Port Commission.

Key Points

- San Francisco voters approved the \$185 million Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds in February 2008 to pay for capital improvements to Recreation and Park Department parks, recreation facilities, playgrounds, and restrooms, and Port parks. The City has previously sold \$102,950,000 in two prior bond sales. The proposed resolution (File 11-1345) would authorize the third sale of not-to-exceed \$76,000,000, resulting in total sale of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds of \$178,950,000, and an unsold balance of \$6,050,000.
- Recreation and Park Department programs and Port programs funded by the 2008 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Park Bonds will be fully funded if the Board of Supervisors approves the proposed appropriation ordinance (File 11-1334), with the exception of the Port's Crane Cove project. According to the November 28, 2011 Bond Accountability Report, submitted by the Port to the Board of Supervisors, the Crane Cove Park project has not yet received environmental clearance consistent with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), which is estimated to be completed in 2013.
- The reserves of \$130,463 (File 11-1364) and the proposed supplemental appropriation of \$27,800 (File 11-1334) would fully fund the Port's Pier 43 Bay Trail Link project to provide open space and a public promenade in the Fisherman's Wharf area.

Fiscal Impact

• The proposed resolution authorizing the sale of up to \$76,000,000 in Clean and Safe Neighborhood Park Bonds and will have a projected annual interest rate of 6.0 percent over approximately 20 years, with estimated total debt service payments of \$125,750,823, including \$52,480,823 in interest and \$73,270,000 in principal, with estimated average annual debt service payments of \$6,287,541. Debt service would be paid from increased Property Taxes, such that an owner of a single family residence with an assessed value of \$500,000 would pay additional Property Taxes of approximately \$14.30 per year

Policy Issues

- The proposed resolution authorizing the sale of the Series 2012B Bonds would allow the Recreation and Park Department to waive the deadline for submitting the Bond Accountability Report. The Re creation and Park Department submitted the Bond Accountability Report to the Clerk of the Board on January 10, 2012.
- The Recreation and Park Department's total prior and requested Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond authorization of \$150,005,861 is \$990,861 more than the budget of \$149,015. This increase of \$990,861 results from an increase in the Recreation and Park Department's Neighborhood Park Contingency Fund, offset by decreases in other Neighborhood Parks projects. The Budget and Legislative Analyst recommends reducing the requested appropriation for the Neighborhood Parks Contingency Fund by \$990,861 to conform to the Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks budget.
- The proposed appropriation includes a \$2,730,000 reserve pending bond sale to account for changes in bond market conditions at the time of the bond sale. If the \$2,730,000 reserve pending bond sale is fully expended, the remaining Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond authorization of \$6,050,000 will be \$2,136,000 less than the remaining Crane Cove project budget to be funded by the Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds of \$8,186,000. According to Ms. Nadia Sesay, Director of Public Finance, it is unlikely that the \$2,730,000 will be fully expended under this authorization. The \$2,730,000 reserve allows for adjustment to changes in market conditions. If a portion of the \$2,730,000 is expended for any other use, such as project expenditure, it would require BOS approval.

Recommendations

- Amend File 11-1334 to reduce the proposed appropriation for the Neighborhood Park Contingency Fund by \$990,861, from \$4,609,432 to \$3,618,561. The total appropriation for the Recreation and Park Department will be reduced from \$62,176,132 to \$61,185,271. The total not-to-exceed amount for the Clean and Safe Park Bond appropriation will be reduced from \$76,000,000 to \$75,009,139.
- Amend File 11-1345 to authorize the sale of not-to-exceed \$75,009,139 aggregate principal amount of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks General Obligation Bonds, consistent with the recommendation above, and approve as amended.
- Approve File 11-1334, appropriating not-to-exceed \$75,009,139 of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, as amended.

MANDATE STATEMENT / BACKGROUND

Mandate Statement

Charter Section 9.105 provides that the Board of Supervisors is authorized to approve the issuance and sale of General Obligation bonds in accordance with State law or local procedures adopted by ordinance. Charter Section 9.105 also provides that (a) amendments to the appropriation ordinance, as finally adopted, are to be adopted in the same manner as other ordinances¹ and (b) no amendment to the appropriation ordinance may be adopted unless the Controller certifies the availability of funds.

Background

San Francisco voters approved the \$185 million Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds in February 2008. The bond program was intended to:

1. Fix and improve park restrooms Citywide;

- 2. Eliminate serious earthquake safety risks in neighborhood and waterfront park facilities;
- 3. Renovate parks and playgrounds in poor physical condition;

4. Replace dilapidated playfields;

- 5. Repair nature trail systems in the City's parks; and
- 6. Attract matching community and philanthropic support.

Bond proceeds were allocated to Recreation and Parks Department and Port parks and trails, as shown in Table 1.

The City has sold \$102.9 million in 2008 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Park Bonds to date and proposes to sell \$73.3 million in February 2012, resulting in sale of \$176.2 million of the \$185 million in authorized bonds and an unsold balance of \$8.8 million, as shown in Table 2 below.

The Controller's Office makes technical adjustments based on the sale results. If the \$2,730,000 is not used at the time of the bond sale, the unused balance is available for sale and appropriation at the subsequent bond sale, subject to Board of Supervisors' approval.

Attachment I, prepared by the Budget and Legislative Analyst, shows the allocation of bond proceeds, expenditures, and encumbrances to date. As shown in Attachment I, as of September 30, 2011, the Recreation and Park Department has spent or encumbered 52 percent of the \$87.8 million in bond proceeds and the Port has spent or encumbered 68 percent of the \$14.3 million in bond proceeds.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

File 11-1345: The proposed resolution would authorize the sale of not-to-exceed \$76,000,000 aggregate principal amount of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks General Obligation Bonds.

The proposed resolution:

- Authorizes the Director of Public Finance to determine the sale date, interest rates, principal amount of the bonds, maturity and redemption dates, with the provision that interest rates cannot exceed 12 percent and the maturity date cannot extend after June 15, 2037;
- Provides for the execution, authentication and registration of the 2008 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks, Series 2012B Bonds;
- Sets the terms for transferring or redeeming the bonds;
- Provides for defeasance of the bonds;

- Requires a special Series 2012B Bond subaccount for payment of principal and interest; and a special Series 2012B project subaccount for acquisition, renovation, and construction of bond-funded projects;
- Approves the appointment of the Depository Trust Company as the securities depository, and authorizes the Treasurer to appoint fiscal and other agents;
- Approves the (a) Office Notice of Sale, which announces the date, time and terms of the competitive bond sale; (b) Notice of Intention to Sell Bonds;
- Approves the Official Statement, describing the sources and uses of funds, security for the Bonds, risk factors, and tax and other legal matters, among other information; and authorizes the Controller or Director of Public Finance to revise the Official Statement to conform to the City's Comprehensive Annual Fiscal Report (CAFR);
- Restricts use of the bond proceeds to the public purpose for which the bonds were intended;
- Approves the Continuing Disclosure Certificate, which provides certain financial information
 and operating data relating to the City (the "Annual Report") not later than 270 days after the end of
 the fiscal year and to provide notices of the occurrence of certain enumerated events, if material;
- Authorizes City officials who have responsibility for executing documents related to the Series 2012 B Bonds, including the Controller, Director of Public Finance, and Treasurer, to modify the documents as necessary, except that the Series 2012B Bond amount cannot exceed \$76,000,000; and
- Subjects the Series 2012B Bonds to the reporting requirements of the Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee.

File 11-1334: The proposed ordinance (File 11-1334) would appropriate \$76,000,000 of the bond sale proceeds, as shown in Table 3 below.

Attachment II, prepared by the Budget and Legislative Analyst, provides details of the proposed appropriation of \$76,000,000 by program, including program budget, program appropriation to date, and proposed new appropriation.

Recreation and Park Department programs and Port programs funded by the 2008 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Park Bonds will be fully funded if the Board of Supervisors approves the proposed appropriation ordinance, with the exception of the Port's Crane Cove project. According to the November 28, 2011 Bond Accountability Report, submitted by the Port to the Board of Supervisors, the Crane Cove Park project has not yet received environmental clearance consistent with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), which is estimated to be completed in 2013.

FISCAL IMPACTS

According to the December 12, 2011 memorandum to the Board of Supervisors from Ms. Nadia Sesay, Director of Public Finance, the not-to-exceed \$76,000,000 of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds are projected to have an annual interest rate of 6.0 percent over approximately 20 years. These bonds will result in estimated total debt service payments of \$125,750,823, including \$52,480,823 in interest and \$73,270,000 in principal, with estimated average annual debt service payments of \$6,287,541.

Repayment of such annual debt service will be recovered through increases to the annual Property Tax rate, which, according to the Controller's Office, averages \$0.029 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation over the anticipated 20-year term of the bonds. A single family residence with an assessed value of \$500,000, assuming a homeowner's exemption of \$7,000, would pay average annual additional Property Taxes to the City of \$14.30 per year (\$500,000-\$7,000/\$1,000 x \$0.029) if the proposed \$76,000,000 of Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds are sold.

POLICY ISSUES

The proposed resolution authorizing the sale of the Series 2012B Bonds would allow the Recreation and Park Department to waive the deadline for submitting the Bond Accountability Report

Administrative Code Section 2.71(b) requires the Recreation and Park Department to submit a Bond Accountability Report to the Board of Supervisors 60 days prior to approval by the Board of Supervisors of the sale of any subsequent series of bonds for the same project.² The Bond

² The Bond Accountability Report includes: (a) certification from an authorized representative of the Recreation and Park Department that the information in the report is correct; (b) cumulative amount of bond proceeds available and expended on the project; brief description of each project line item for which bond proceeds have been expended; (c) the amount of bond proceeds expended on each project line item; (d) identification of completed and uncompleted project line items; (e) identification of any project line item not included in a proposed expenditure report; (h) identification of any project line item included in a proposed expenditure report for which bond proceeds will not be used; (i) certification that each project identified is in conformity with the voter authorization; and (j) an explanation of uncompleted projects or projects not included in the proposed expenditure report.

The Recreation and Park Department submitted the Bond Accountability Report to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors on January 10, 2012.

The proposed appropriation of Series 2012B Bonds for Recreation and Park Department projects exceeds the budget by \$990,861

As shown in Table 2 above, the Recreation and Park Department's total prior and requested Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond authorization of \$150,005,861 is \$990,861 more than the budget of \$149,015,000. This increase of \$990,861 results from an increase in the Recreation and Park Department's Neighborhood Park Contingency Fund, offset by decreases in other Neighborhood Parks projects. The Budget and Legislative Analyst recommends reducing the requested appropriation for the Neighborhood Parks Contingency Fund by \$990,861 to conform to the Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks budget.

If the proposed Series 2012B Bond sale fully expends the \$2,730,000 reserve, the remaining Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond authorization will be insufficient to fund the Port's Crane Cove project

As shown below, prior Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond proceeds' appropriations of \$102.95 million, the proposed supplemental appropriation of \$73.27 million, and the proposed reserve pending bond sale of \$2.73 million, result in \$6.05 million remaining bond authorization:

The Port's Crane Cove project is the remaining project to be funded by the Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds. Of the total Crane Cove budget of \$9,999,250 funded by the Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds, \$1,813,250 has been previously appropriated or will be appropriated as part this supplemental appropriation (File 11-1334) and \$8,186,000 will be appropriated through the fourth and final sale of the Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds.

If the \$2,730,000 reserve pending bond sale is fully expended, the remaining Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond authorization of \$6,050,000 will be \$2,136,000 less than the remaining Crane Cove project budget to be funded by the Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bonds of \$8,186,000. According to Ms. Sesay, it is unlikely that the \$2,730,000 will be fully expended under this authorization. Adjustment of Principal Payments. The principal amounts set forth in this Official Notice of Sale reflect certain estimates of the City with respect to the likely interest rates of the winning bid and the premium contained in the winning bid. The City reserves the right to change the

principal payment schedule set forth above after the determination of the winning bidder, by adjusting one or more of the principal payments of the Bonds in increments of \$5,000, as determined in the sole discretion of the City. Any such adjustment of principal payments on the Bonds shall be based on the schedule of principal payments provided by the City to be used as the basis of bids for the Bonds. Any such adjustment will not change the average per Bond dollar amount of underwriter's discount. In the further opinion of Co-Bond Counsel, interest on the Bonds is not a specific preference item for purposes of federal individual or corporate alternative minimum taxes, although Co-Bond Counsel observe that such interest is included in adjusted current earnings in calculating federal corporate alternative minimum taxable income. Basis of Award. Unless all bids are rejected, the Bonds will be awarded to the responsible bidder who submits a conforming bid that represents the lowest true interest cost ("TIC") to the City. The TIC will be that nominal interest rate that, when compounded semiannually and applied to discount all payments of principal and interest payable on the Bonds to the dated date of the Bonds, results in an amount equal to the principal amount of such Bonds plus the amount of any net premium. For the purpose of calculating the TIC, mandatory sinking fund payments for any term Bonds specified by each bidder will be treated as Bonds maturing on the dates of such mandatory sinking fund payments. In the event that two or more bidders offer bids for the Bonds at the same lowest TIC, the City will determine by lot which bidder will be awarded the Bonds. Multiple Bids. In the event multiple bids are received from a single bidder by any means or combination thereof, the City shall accept the bid representing the lowest TIC to the City, and each bidder agrees by submitting any bid to be bound by the bid representing the lowest TIC to the City.

Good Faith Deposit. Except as otherwise provided below, a good faith deposit (the "Good Faith Deposit") in the form of a certified, treasurer's or cashier's check drawn on a solvent commercial bank or trust company in the United States of America or a financial surety bond (the "Financial Surety Bond") issued by an insurance company licensed to issue such surety bond in the State of California, in the amount of [\$3,420,000] and made payable to the order of the City and County of San Francisco, to secure the City from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of its bid, is required for any bid to be accepted. Good Faith Deposits accompanying bids other than the bid which is accepted will be returned promptly upon the determination of the best bidder.

The issuance of the 2012A Bonds has been authorized by Resolution No. 516-10 and Resolution No. ____, adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the City on November 2, 2010 and _____, 2012, respectively, and duly approved by the Mayor of the City on November 5, 2010 and _____, 2012, respectively. The issuance of the 2012B Bonds has been authorized by Resolution No. 343-08 and Resolution No. ____, adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the City on July 29, 2008 and _____, 2012, respectively, and duly approved by the Mayor of the City on August 5, 2008 and _____, 2012, respectively. The issuance of the 2012C Bonds has been authorized by Resolution No. ____, adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the City on _____, 2012, and duly approved by the , 2012. See "THE BONDS - Authority for Issuance; Purposes." The proceeds of the 2012A Bonds will be used to finance the improvement, retrofitting, rehabilitation and completion of earthquake safety and emergency responsiveness facilities and infrastructure as described herein, and to pay certain costs related to the issuance of the 2012A Bonds. The proceeds of the 2012B Bonds will be used to finance the construction, reconstruction, and improvement of park and recreation facilities as described herein, and to pay certain costs related to the issuance of the 2012B Bonds. The proceeds of the 2012C Bonds will be used to repair potholes and repave deteriorating streets in neighborhoods throughout the City, repair and strengthen deteriorating stairways, bridges and overpasses, improve safety for pedestrians and bicyclists, improve disabled access to sidewalks, and construct and renovate traffic infrastructure to improve the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency transit reliability and traffic flow on local streets as described herein,] and to pay certain costs related to the issuance of the 2012C Bonds. The Bonds will be issued only in fully registered form without coupons, and when issued will be registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"). Individual purchases of the Bonds will be made in book-entry form only, in denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. Payments of principal of and interest on the Bonds will be made by the City Treasurer, as paying agent, to DTC, which in turn is required to remit such principal and interest to the DTC Participants for subsequent disbursement to the beneficial owners of the Bonds. See "THE BONDS - Form and Registration." The Bonds will be dated and bear interest from their date of delivery until paid in full at the rates shown in the maturity schedule on the inside cover hereof. Interest on the Bonds will be payable on June 15 and December 15 of each year, commencing [June 15, 2012]. Principal will be paid at maturity as shown on the inside cover. See "THE BONDS -Payment of Interest and Principal."

The Bonds will be subject to redemption prior to their respective stated maturities as described herein. See "THE BONDS - Redemption."







Program Summary

- In February of 2008 the citizens of San Francisco passed Proposition A, a \$185 Million General Obligation Bond, known as the 2008 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond.
- The \$185M in bond funding is divided into two allocations based on the jurisdiction of the parks and facilities scheduled to receive funding, with \$151.3 committed to the Recreation and Parks Department and \$33.5M dedicated to the San Francisco Port. \$185,000 is set aside in a Citizen's Oversight Audit fund.
- The objectives of this bond program are as follows: 1) Fix and improve park restrooms citywide; 2) Eliminate serious earthquake safety risks in neighborhood and

- waterfront park facilities; 3) Renovate parks and playgrounds in poor physical condition; 4) Replace dilapidated playfields; 5) Repair nature trail systems in the city's parks; and 6) Attract matching community and philanthropic support.
- The Recreation and Parks Department's 2008 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond Program is divided into six subprograms. The bulk of funding (80%) is dedicated to funding Major Capital Renovations at 12 Neighborhood Parks. The remaining funds (20%) are divided between five Citywide programs.
 - Major capital renovation of Neighborhood Parks. The bond program allocates the majority of its funds to capital improvements at Neighborhood Parks across the city. These parks were selected based on the extent to which they are unsafe in an earthquake, in poor physical condition, as well as their ability to provide basic, recreational uses to many San Franciscans.
 - Restroom Repair and Replacement
 Program. Many of the city's park
 restrooms are in a state of severe
 dilapidation; some bathrooms require
 replacement, others require repairs,
 and some parks need restrooms. The
 \$11.4 million will fund a restroom
 replacement, repair, and installation
 program. Sites will be chosen in
 coordination with the community,
 through an open process guided by
 the Recreation and Parks Department
 Commission

- Park Playfield Repairs and Reconstruction. The City's playfields have been "loved to death"- overused due to a citywide shortage of soccer, baseball and multi-use fields. With the growing demand of field athletics, it is difficult to meet demand while keeping the fields at an acceptable condition. Over the past four years, a successful public/private partnership between the Recreation and Parks Department and the City Fields Foundation has resulted in the renovation of playfields at 5 park facilities. Each field has become some of the most requested play fields by park users. These renovated fields are improved by the installation of synthetic turf and night lighting which increases time to play while, reducing maintenance needs and water demand. This \$8.5 million will continue that partnership.
- Park Forestry Needs. Over 100,000 trees populate the city's parks and open spaces. These funds will provide for an assessment of the health and condition of this urban forest, as well as provide resources to enact the recommendations of the assessment and plant new trees.
- Park Trail Reconstruction. The 2004 Recreation Assessment identified walking and biking trails as the #1 most needed recreational amenity; residents also cited hiking and visiting nature as the two activities in which they would like to participate in more often. The Park Trail Reconstruction program will restore trails and make capital improvements that allow residents to enjoy and experience nature in the parks.
- Community Opportunity Grants. The
 Community Opportunity Grants Program is
 a small capital grants program that allows
 residents, neighborhood groups and park
 advocates to initiate repairs and
 improvements in their parks by matching
 smaller public grants with other private
 gifts and grants.

The Port of San Francisco's Waterfront Parks program includes community planning efforts for the Blue Greenway and constituent parks, and new open space projects in the northern, central and southern waterfronts. The program will add or improve seven open spaces and total \$33.5M.

Funding

Based on the adopted project budgets and schedules, a plan has been developed to break funding into three sales. Originally sales would be spaced approximately 14 months apart but, due to an unfavorable bidding climate in fall 2009, the second bond sale was postponed. The revised strategy for sales is as follows:

- Sale 1 was completed in August 2008 to fund planning and design for the first 7 of 12 Major Capital projects (Phase I)¹, Citywide Programs, and Waterfront Parks.
- Sale 2 was completed in March 2010 to fund construction of 4 projects under Phase I, Waterfront Parks, and Citywide Programs; and planning and design of the remaining five Major Capital projects (group 2) ¹, Citywide Programs, and Waterfront Parks.
- Sale 3 will fund all remaining Recreation and Parks Department projects, including: one project under Phase I, five projects under Phase 2, and Citywide Programs.
- Sale 4 will be the final sale and will fund construction of Crane Cove Waterfront Park, the final Port project.

- Annual review before the Park, Recreation and Open Space Advisory Committee (PROSAC), Recreation and Park and Port Commissions, Capital Planning Committee (CPC), and Board of Supervisors as part of the 10-year capital plan and annual capital budget processes. The Recreation and Park Commission will hold at least one meeting per year to solely discuss and review implementation of the general obligation bond. In addition, an item will be scheduled to review implementation of the bond once a month at regularly scheduled Commission meetings.
- The Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee (CGOBOC) reviews, audits, and reports on the expenditure of bond proceeds in accordance with the will of the voters. CGOBOC will submit audits and reports to PROSAC, Recreation and Park and Port Commissions, Board of Supervisors and the Mayor's Office.
- 60 days prior to the issuance of any portion of the bond authority, the Recreation and Park Department and Port of San Francisco must submit a bond accountability report to the Clerk of the Board, the Controller, the Treasurer, the Director of Public Finance, and the Budget Analyst describing the current status and description of each proposed project and whether it conforms to the express will of the voters. This report before you is intended to satisfy the reporting requirement of this provision.



Project Descriptions

Major Neighborhood Park Phase I Projects

Fulton Playground

The San Francisco Planning Department -Preservation Office has determined that the 71 year old clubhouse is a historical resource. Thus, RPD will be renovating the Fulton Clubhouse per the standards required by the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties. Other work included in the scope are renovation of the two children's play areas and courts; restoration of existing roads and pathways; upgrades to the infrastructure including lighting, modifications to the site to remove barriers and improve accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape. The design construction documents are complete and project is scheduled for construction to commence in the summer of 2011.



Proposed Option

Palega Playground

Construction at the Palega Playground will include repair and/or renovation of the recreation center, fields, courts, and children's play area, restoration of existing roads and pathways; upgrades to the irrigation and lighting systems; modifications to the site to remove barriers and improve accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape.

Contract drawings are substantially complete and will be bidding shortly. Construction is anticipated to commence in late summer.




Major Neighborhood Park Phase Il Projects

<u>Mission Dolores Park – Helen Diller</u> Playground

The Recreation and Parks Department is collaborating with the Friends of Dolores Park Playground, and the Urban Resource Systems, Inc. in the total renovation of the play area. Additionally, RPD is partnering with the Mercer Foundation and Friends of Dolores Park Playground, for a generous donation of \$1.5million to fund the project. Construction is scheduled to commence on this park in June 2011.

Mission Dolores Park Renovation

The project scope will include the repair and/or renovation of the clubhouse, picnic area and courts; restoration of paving and pathways; upgrades to the infrastructure including lighting, modifications to the site to remove barriers and improve accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape. The project has experienced a slight delay in order to assemble a design team that includes a proviate consultant for planning and outreach and DPW executing design development and contract documents. Community meetings are scheduled to commence starting May 2011 thru September 2011. Project will be breaking ground in Fall of 2012.





Cabrillo Playground



Glen Canyon Park


The Recreation and Parks Department, with the assistance of Trust for Public Land, is in the planning and outreach phase to develop a park improvement plan for Glen Canyon Park. At the conclusion of the planning effort, a Phase 1 project scope shall be established and funded with the funds secured for the site from this bond.

The work may include repair and/or renovation of the recreation center, the children's play area, day camp, courts and field; restoration of roads and pathways; upgrades to the infrastructure including lighting and irrigation, modifications to the site to remove barriers and improve accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape.



Lafayette Park

The project scope will include the repair and/or renovation of the restroom facility, the children's play area, picnic area and courts; restoration of roads and pathways; upgrades to the infrastructure including lighting and irrigation, modifications to the site to remove barriers and improve accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape. Design documentation has commenced.



Raymond Kimbell Playground



Citywide Programs

Restroom Repair And Replacement Program


The Restroom Repair and Replacement program funds the construction, repair, and renovation of restroom facilities. Many of the city park's restrooms are old, need repair and are poorly designed for maintenance and proper supervision. As per the Bond Report, the Recreation & Parks Commission has appointed a Restroom Taskforce to work with staff and the community to develop recommendations for which restrooms should be renovated, replaced or added. The Restroom Taskforce has met seven times thus far and developed a proposal available on the department's website. Park Forestry Program

The Recreation & Parks Department's forest, estimated to contain roughly 100,000 trees, has not received major physical attention since planting. Though one of the most important elements of our urban parks is the trees, a through assessment or plan for their care, repair and the planting of new trees has not been identified.

Under this program, the Recreation and Parks Department completed a Request of Proposal process which engaged forestry professionals to identify those sites within Recreation and Park's properties that were most in need of major tree work and in need of new trees. The selected arborist is required to use accepted urban forestry management techniques such as the hazard rating system and make specific recommendations for the work that will be funded through this Bond. The recommendations will be reviewed by the Recreation and Parks Commission for their approval.




Park Trail Reconstruction Program

Nature trails in San Francisco's parks are in poor shape – frequently in need of erosion control and other improvements to the condition of the surrounding landscape. 2008 Clean and Safe NP Bond funds will improve access and opportunities to walk and hike, allowing residents to better enjoy and experience nature in San Francisco parks.

In order to prioritize projects, staff worked with Recreation and Parks Department Commission, PROSAC, and other stakeholders to develop objective criteria to develop a prioritized list of parks for improvement. Criteria developed focused on three areas equally 1) Access, 2) Conservation and 3) Safety. The prioritization developed focuses on improvements at 10 sites to receive capital work through this bond. The list of sites for the Bond's Trails Program was presented to and approved by the RPD Commission on June 4th, 2009. With this approval, project staff can focus on the specific design and community process for site.



The Community Opportunity Fund Program provides a place for neighborhoods, community groups and people who love and care for their parks to receive improvements to a Recreation & Parks Department park they nominate. The Community Opportunity Fund will promote increased stewardship of parks by



encouraging volunteer and fundraising partnerships with the department, leveraging community resources against the bond. The Community Opportunity Fund Task Force will continue to meet through early September to develop guidelines for the distribution of these funds.

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Neighborhood Park Program

Fulton Playground Renovation Project (Block 1670, Lot 009)

Site Description

Fulton Playground is a 40,586 square foot park located at 855 27th Avenue in the Outer Richmond Neighborhood part of the Supervisorial District 1 of the City and County of San Francisco. The park is located in a lot that spans between 27th and 28th Avenue, midway between Cabrillo and Fulton Avenues. This urban park is surrounded by single family homes and it is a block away from Golden Gate Park. The entire site is paved with the exception of the 2 children's play area that have sand as ground surface and the 2 narrow landscaped strips adjacent to the sidewalks at 27th and 28th Avenues. A planter area with turf runs along the site frontage at 28th Avenue. This planter area is hidden by the bushes of the landscape adjacent to the sidewalk. The playground consist of a clubhouse, 2 children's play area, 3 paved multi-use paved areas, 1 small paved picnic area, 2 basketball courts and 1 tennis court.

The park site was built in 1945 and was last renovated in 1983. The kitchen area of the clubhouse was reportedly built in the 1980's. The children's play structures were installed in 1960.

Project Scope

The project scope will include the repair and/or renovation of the clubhouse, the two children's play areas, and courts; restoration of existing roads and pathways; upgrades to the infrastructure including lighting; modifications to the site to remove barriers and improve accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape.

Palega Playground Renovation Project (Blocks 5929 & 5930, Lots 001 & 001A)

Site Description

Palega Playground is located on a 5.78 acres parcel in the Portola District in southeastern San Francisco. The playground is bounded by Hamilton, Silliman, Somerset and Felton Streets. Palega Recreation Center fronts on Felton Street. Cabrillo Playground (Block 1681, Lot 013)

Glen Canyon Park (Block 7560, Lot 002)
