[Police Code - Non-Legal Immigration Services]

Ordinance amending the Police Code to require that individuals who notarize or assist people in completing immigration documents offer a document prepared by the City that identifies free or low-cost immigration legal services providers and consulates; and to authorize the Human Rights Commission to provide assistance to members of the public who wish to file a complaint with a state licensing or enforcement entity against a notary or immigration consultant who allegedly violated legal requirements applicable to their activities.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. General Findings.

(a) Due to the federal government's recent increase in immigration enforcement actions, it is more important than ever for immigrants to be aware of the legal services available to them. The City and others fund immigration legal service providers so they can offer services to low-income members of the community at low or no cost.

(b) Immigrants sometimes seek non-legal immigration services at offices of notaries and immigration consultants. Under state law, notaries are authorized to witness the signing of documents, and immigration consultants may assist clients with completing certain immigration forms and submitting required documents. State law prohibits notaries and

1 immigration consultants from providing legal advice, including in immigration proceedings.
2 Nonetheless, there have been instances of notaries and immigration consultants unlawfully
3 holding themselves out as attorneys authorized to provide representation in immigration
4 matters. This unlawful conduct can have a serious adverse impact on the immigration
5 proceedings of individuals who believed they were receiving legitimate legal advice and
6 representation.

7 (c) Notaries and immigration consultants must post notice at their place of business
8 indicating they are not licensed to practice law. And state law prohibits notaries from using
9 the Spanish term "notario" or "notario público" when advertising their services in Spanish,
10 because this term in some Spanish-speaking countries indicates that the person is an
11 attorney.

12 (d) Because immigrants in the City seek assistance with immigration matters from
13 notaries and immigration consultants, it is important that they receive accurate information
14 concerning the availability of legal service providers who can provide advice and
15 representation in immigration proceedings. The purpose of this ordinance is to create a link
16 between individuals seeking legal advice and legal service providers by requiring notaries and
17 immigration consultants to provide clients with a City-created list of pro bono or low-cost legal
18 service providers. People involved in immigration proceedings may also benefit from
19 assistance that the consulate of the country from which they immigrated, and this ordinance
20 also requires the distribution of contact information for such consulates.

21 (e) This ordinance also authorizes the Human Rights Commission to assist individuals
22 who believe that a notary or immigration consultant has engaged in conduct that violates the
23 legal requirements governing their activities to file complaints with the relevant state licensing
24 or enforcement entities.

1 Section 2. The Police Code is hereby amended by adding Article 13.5, consisting of
2 Sections 978.1, 978.2, and 978.3, to read as follows:

4 **ARTICLE 13.5: NON-LEGAL IMMIGRATION SERVICES**

5
6 **SEC. 978.1. DEFINITIONS.**

7 *For purposes of this Article 13.5, the following definitions apply:*

8 *“Non-Legal Immigration Service” means 1) the notarization of documents for a person’s use in*
9 *immigration applications or proceedings by a notary public who holds a commission issued by the*
10 *Secretary of State under Sections 8200, et seq. of the California Government Code , as may be*
11 *amended from time to time, or 2) assistance to a person in completing immigration applications or*
12 *other immigration-related documents provided by an immigration consultant authorized to act as such*
13 *under Sections 224040 through 22449 of the California Business and Professions Code, as may be*
14 *amended from time to time.*

15 *“Non-Legal Immigration Service Provider” means a person who provides Non-Legal*
16 *Immigration Services.*

17 *“Referral Documents” means documents prepared by the Office of Civic Engagement and*
18 *Immigrant Affairs (“OCEIA”) that include both of the following: 1) a list of pro bono and low-cost*
19 *immigration legal service providers, and 2) contact information for local consulates.*

20
21 **SEC. 978.2. INFORMATION TO BE PROVIDED BY NON-LEGAL IMMIGRATION**
22 **SERVICE PROVIDERS.**

23 *(a) A Non-Legal Immigration Service Provider shall offer Referral Documents to each person*
24 *for whom the provider provides Non-Legal Immigration Services.*

1 **(b) OCEIA shall create the Referral Documents. OCEIA shall post the Referral Documents to**
2 **its website for downloading and printing by Non-Legal Immigration Service Providers. OCEIA shall**
3 **also provide the Referral Documents by e-mail upon request and shall make hard copies of the Referral**
4 **Documents available at its offices upon request at no cost. OCEIA shall indicate in the Referral**
5 **Documents that OCEIA prepared the documents and that this Section 978.2 requires Non-Legal**
6 **Immigration Service Providers to distribute such documents.**

7 **(c) Enforcement. The Human Rights Commission (“HRC”) shall have authority to enforce the**
8 **requirement of subsection (a) pursuant to the process established in Chapter 100 of the Administrative**
9 **Code, except that HRC shall first issue a warning to any Non-Legal Immigration Service Provider who**
10 **violates subsection (a) before issuing a citation under Chapter 100 of the Administrative Code for a**
11 **second and any subsequent violation by the same Non-Legal Immigration Service Provider. HRC shall**
12 **consider in exercising its enforcement discretion whether the Non-Legal Immigration Service Provider**
13 **provides services to low-income clients who would benefit from receiving the Referral Documents.**

14 **(d) Outreach and Information Education. Upon the effective date of the ordinance in Board**
15 **File No. 251252, the Director of the Office of Economic and Workforce Development or their**
16 **designee shall work with City departments to identify and implement of OCEIA and the**
17 **Director of the Office of Small Business or their designees shall commence an outreach and**
18 **education program to inform Non-Legal Immigration Service Providers who serve as notaries and**
19 **the public of the requirements of this Article 13.5. Such efforts may include through a series of**
20 **public service announcements and/or other direct outreach methods of the requirements of this**
21 **Section 978.2.**

22 **(e) Rules and Regulations. The Executive Director of OCEIA of HRC or the Director’s**
23 **designee shall have authority to promulgate any rules and regulations the Director deems necessary to**
24 **implement this Section 978.2.**

1 (f) Preemption. Nothing in this Section 978.2 shall be interpreted or applied so as to create
2 any requirement, power, or duty in conflict with any federal or state law.

3
4 **SEC. 978.3. ASSISTANCE WITH LODGING COMPLAINTS.**

5 The Executive Director of HRC or the Director's designee shall have authority to provide
6 technical assistance referrals to any person who wishes to lodge a complaint with a state licensing
7 agency or other appropriate authority against a Non-Legal Immigration Service Provider who the
8 person believes has violated any law or regulation governing the services the Non-Legal Immigration
9 Service Provider is authorized to provide the public.

10
11 Section 3. Undertaking for the General Welfare. In enacting and implementing this
12 ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not
13 assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it
14 is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused
15 injury.

16
17 Section 4. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of
18 this ordinance, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid
19 or unconstitutional by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not
20 affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of the ordinance. The Board of
21 Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each and every
22 section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, and word not declared invalid or
23 unconstitutional without regard to whether any other portion of this ordinance or application
24 thereof would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

1 Section 5. ~~Effective Date~~ and Operative Dates. This ordinance shall become effective
2 at 12:00 a.m. on the 31st days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs
3 the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance
4 within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the
5 ordinance. This ordinance shall become operative six months after the effective date of the
6 ordinance in Board File No. 251252.

REVISED LEGISLATIVE DIGEST
(Amended in Committee, 3/5/2026)

[Police Code - Non-Legal Immigration Services]

Ordinance amending the Police Code to require that individuals who notarize or assist people in completing immigration documents offer a document prepared by the City that identifies free or low-cost immigration legal services providers and consulates; and to authorize the Human Rights Commission to provide assistance to members of the public who wish to file a complaint with a state licensing or enforcement entity against a notary or immigration consultant who allegedly violated legal requirements applicable to their activities.

Existing Law

City law does not require state licensed notaries or immigration consultants to distribute to clients a City-created list of pro bono or low-cost immigration legal service providers and local consulates.

Amendments to Current Law

The proposed ordinance would require notaries public who notarize documents for use in immigration proceedings and immigration consultants to offer clients for whom they provide these services a document created by the Office of Civic Engagement and Immigration Affairs that identifies pro bono or low-cost immigration legal service providers and local consulates. The Human Rights Commission would be authorized to enforce this requirement by issuing a warning for a first violation and citations for subsequent violations up to a maximum penalty of \$1,000 per violation. The proposed ordinance would also authorize the Human Rights Commission to assist members of the public who believe a notary or immigration consultant has violated the laws or regulations governing their activities file a complaint with the appropriate authorities.

Dear Government Audit and Oversight Committee Members,

We are writing to express our support for FILE NO. 251252 Notaries ordinance [Police Code - Non-Legal Immigration Services]. Many immigrants are eager to secure legal counsel to protect against threats from federal immigration authorities and may easily fall victim to fraudulent practices, such as those by unscrupulous notaries.

Our own organization has witnessed such cases, for example: CARECEN SF met a 20-year-old young woman from Central America who is in the United States with no family. The woman had hired a man to file an application for employment authorization based on her pending asylum case. She sent the man \$650 over Zelle, supposedly to cover the cost of the filing fee. He then texted her a receipt notice for the application. This man created an online account with the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS) and in the young woman's name, purportedly to be able to file the application, and then refused to provide her with the login information. He told the young woman that her employment authorization card would arrive at his home and that if she did not pay him an additional \$200, that he would not send her the card. When she asked the man for updates as many months had passed with no resolution, he became increasingly angry and abusive in his responses, insulting her and threatening to call immigration if she did not leave him alone. The young woman came to CARECEN SF to ask for help. When a CARECEN SF lawyer checked the application receipt number with the USCIS online case status page, the receipt number was not recognized as valid. The lawyer helped the young woman call the USCIS customer service number, and a USCIS representative confirmed that the application did not exist. When the CARECEN SF lawyer and the young woman called the *notario* over the phone to ask about this situation, he was angry and said that he was "helping the community" and doing it for free or very low cost, that he had helped hundreds of people already.

In another recent example, a woman from South America, who is in removal proceedings before the San Francisco immigration court, received a call from a man who identified himself as an immigration attorney and offered to represent her in an application for citizenship. He told her that he would do the work for free but that she had to pay for the forms. He filled out fake forms for her and appeared with her over zoom in fake immigration interviews where she had to answer a series of questions. After she had paid him \$7,000 for multiple forms and interviews, she became suspicious and consulted with a licensed immigration attorney. That is when she learned that she had been scammed and had lost all of her savings in the process. Worse yet, this scam caused her to miss the one year filing deadline for her asylum claim.

This legislation establishes an important mechanism to support immigrant communities in San Francisco against notary fraud and will provide further safeguards against notaries who charge clients for fraudulent legal counsel. We strongly urge you to support this ordinance.

While most licensed notaries provide legitimate services to the public, unfortunately there are some who engage in fraud and take advantage of immigrants. This is especially prevalent for immigrants from

In San Francisco there have been many reports of such activity, including the very high-profile lawsuit filed by the City Attorney against notary Leonard Lacayo resulting in the courts requiring him to pay \$600K due to his predatory behavior against hundreds of immigrants. This unlawful conduct has dangerous consequences for immigrant families.

Please approve this important piece of legislation that will provide additional protections and support for immigrants in San Francisco.

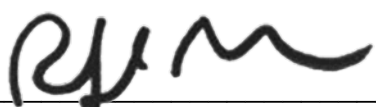
