| 3 | Resolution urging the Mayor's Office of Homelessness, the Department of Building |
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| 5 | Inspection, and the Planning Department to investigate the viability of using Jim Reid's |
| 6 | Shelter-One (the smallest house in San Francisco) as a potential homeless shelter in a |
| 7 | test pilot project. |
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| 9 | WHEREAS, San Francisco is currently looking for innovative solutions to housing the |
| 10 | homeless; and |
| 11 | WHEREAS, A study conducted by SPUR (San Francisco Planning and Research |
| 12 | Association) concluded that San Francisco spends hundreds of millions of dollars on |
| 13 | homeless programs that concentrate on the symptoms of homelessness rather than the |
| 14 | problem – housing; and |
| 15 | WHEREAS, Jim Reid's Shelter-One is a housing solution; and |
| 16 | WHEREAS, Shelter-One is designed to house a single individual in 100 square feet of |
| | space (less than the size of a parking space) that includes a ceramic tiled bathroom, toilet, |
| 17 | wall sink and bathtub/shower; a small kitchen with sink, refrigerator and microwave; a single |
| 18 | bunk bed raised 5 feet above the floor with a desk/office below and a chair; space for a TV or |
| 19 | computer; additional storage space, a washer/dryer; and |
| 20 | WHEREAS Jim Reid's Shelter-One housed 10 homeless people successfully over the |
| 21 | course of a year, 7 of whom were able to move on to better placements, jobs or permanent |
| 22 | housing simply by virtue of having a stable home and an address; and |
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| 1 | WHEREAS, Shelter-One was embraced by the community, supported by neighbors |
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| 2 | and was able to successfully house homeless people in a residential neighborhood for over a |
| 3 | year at the address of 116 Franconia Street; and |
| 4 | WHEREAS, Jim Reid was evicted from his home because Shelter-One was sited on |
| 5 | said property and was deemed non-compliant with city codes and zoning regulations; and |
| 6 | WHEREAS, Shelter-One houses are small, handsome, easily moved, stackable, |
| 7 | fireproof, earthquake safe, sound proof, capable of being prefabricated and can be affixed |
| 8 | with wheels and attached to the back of a truck for purposes of transport; and |
| 9 | WHEREAS, During the 1906 earthquake over 10,000 homeless people were housed |
| 10 | in similar units to Shelter-One, allowing them to successfully recover from personal loss and |
| 11 | injury; and |
| 12 | WHEREAS, Such shelters if proven successful could be used to prevent |
| 13 | homelessness by providing an immediate safety net in the form of a ready stock of pre-fab |
| 14 | housing for those who face imminent homelessness and need an urgent remedy before they |
| 15 | end up on the street; therefore be it |
| 16 | RESOLVED, The San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges the Mayor's Office of |
| 17 | Homelessness to visit Shelter-One and explore the possibility of creating a pilot program that |
| 18 | could verify Jim Reid's success; and be it |
| 19 | FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Department of Building Inspections and the Planning |
| 20 | Department should visit Shelter-One and report to the Board on any amendments to the code |
| 21 | that would be necessary so that Shelter-One could be sited as part of a pilot program. |
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
