3	Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 2882, the Community
4	Corrections Accountability Act, authored by Assembly Member Kevin McCarty, which
5	aims to enhance transparency, accountability, and stakeholder engagement in county
6	public safety spending to reduce recidivism and improve outcomes for justice-involved
7	individuals.
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9	WHEREAS, California has significantly reduced its reliance on incarceration, with the
10	combined jail and prison population decreasing by 41% since 2007; and
11	WHEREAS, In 2011, then-Governor Jerry Brown signed Assembly Bill 109, the Public
12	Safety Realignment Act, into law, AB 109 shifted responsibility for lower-level felony
13	convictions from California state prison and parole to county jail and probation, and tasked
14	counties with reducing recidivism through evidence-based programs, including behavioral
15	health treatment; and
16	WHEREAS, Counties have received State funds, including \$2 billion in Fiscal Year
17	2022-23, to support their efforts to manage certain categories of offenders previously held in
18	the state prison system; and
19	WHEREAS, Counties determine how annual public safety realignment funds are spent
20	through a stakeholder process that runs through a local advisory body in each county known
21	as the Community Corrections Partnership (or CCP); and
22	WHEREAS, Since passage of AB 109, the behavioral health needs of California's jail
23	population have sharply risen; and
24	WHEREAS, The share of California's jail population with behavioral health needs has
25	increased from approximately 20% in 2010 to 53% in 2023; and

1	WHEREAS; As of October 2023, over 75% of people in jail in San Francisco have
2	serious mental illness or a history of substance use; and
3	WHEREAS, Research has demonstrated that addressing the behavioral health needs
4	of the justice-involved population reduces recidivism; and
5	WHEREAS, The State has undertaken major behavioral health reforms including the
6	California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM) initiative enacted by the California
7	Department of Health Care Services and Proposition 1, approved by voters on the March
8	2024 ballot, both of which direct behavioral health funding to the incarcerated population and
9	make improvements to how behavioral health data is reported; and
10	WHEREAS, California county budgets have not yet adjusted to meet the needs of the
11	current jail population, with 46 counties spending less than 15% of public safety realignment
12	funding on behavioral health and 36 counties spending less than 10% of funding on
13	behavioral health; and
14	WHEREAS, On February 15, 2024, Assemblymember Kevin McCarty introduced
15	Assembly Bill 2882 (AB 2882), which aims to improve transparency and accountability in
16	county public safety spending, to ultimately reduce recidivism and improve the life outcomes
17	of the justice-involved population; and
18	WHEREAS, AB 2882 would require counties to set goals for reductions in recidivism,
19	daily jail population, jail bookings, length of stay, and increasing connections to behavioral
20	health care services, as well as identify additional funding sources that can be leveraged with
21	dollars allocated through the Public Safety Realignment Act to meet these goals; and
22	WHEREAS, AB 2882 would add to each county CCP a representative of a community
23	based organization with experience in successfully providing behavioral health treatment
24	services to persons who have been convicted of a criminal offense, and a representative of a

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1	Medi-Cal managed care plan that provides the Enhanced Care Management benefit, a new
2	statewide Medi-Cal benefit available to eligible members with complex needs; and
3	WHEREAS, AB 2882 would develop a public dashboard showcasing how counties
4	spend their public safety dollars and outcomes for their incarcerated populations, including
5	recidivism rates and outcomes, and aligns the Public Safety Realignment spending data with
6	Proposition 1 county behavioral health spending data to compare county outcomes to the
7	goal's set in the county's CCP plan; now, therefore, be it
8	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors supports AB 2882, which
9	aims to enhance transparency, accountability, and stakeholder engagement in county public
10	safety spending to reduce recidivism and improve outcomes for justice-involved individuals;
11	and, be it
12	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the City and
13	County of San Francisco distribute this resolution to San Francisco's State Legislative
14	Delegation and California Governor Gavin Newsom.
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
