| 14 | African Americans, including the right to testify in court and the right to be educated; and, |

| 17 | WHEREAS, Mary Ellen Pleasant was an important entrepreneur and institution builder |
| 18 | in San Francisco for nearly fifty years and helped make the city what it is today; now, |
