For the past two decades, I have been assisting formerly incarcerated individuals, specifically those with issues of mental illness, homelessness, substance abuse, and violence. Currently, my employment at the Center on Juvenile and Criminal Justice allows me to implement and provide direct service programs to formerly incarcerated adults in the San Francisco Bay Area. As a frontline service provider, I maintain current knowledge of the daily challenges faced by those

returning from institutional custody. My experience as a direct service provider is a strong asset when my assistance is request for developing new model programs. Additionally, during my fifteen years with Delancey Street Foundation, I was an integral team member in the developing of various programs and initiatives such as the Bay Area Services Network (BASN), San Francisco Juvenile Justice Action Plan, and the Institute for Social Renewal. My involvement in all of these activities demonstrates my ability develop innovated solutions to social problems.

5. What was your experience transitioning back to San Francisco after having been incarcerated? What helped you? What were the barriers?

Upon release from the then California Department of Corrections (CDC), my personal barriers consisted of drug addiction, lack of housing and financial stability, being under educated, and unemployable, as well as a well-established pattern of anti-social behavior and criminal activity. In 1991, I was released from the CDC for the third time and entered the Delancey Street Foundation. During my fifteen year tenure with Delancey Street Foundation, this organization provided with me with educational, employment, and life skills opportunities. Through my journey at Delancey Street Foundation I was able to give back to a community that I had only taken from, which assisted me in cultivating a sense of self-esteem.

How can we help other people transition from prisons and jails more successfully? How can we help people permanently exit the criminal justice system? Successful reentry of formerly incarcerated individuals requires a well-establish system for pre-release planning that cultivates an individualized service plans for each individual returning to their community. These plans should tailor to the individuals strengthens and weaknesses. Further, communities must commit to establishing a continuum of services that includes, but is not limited to housing, employment, and mental health services. In order for individuals to permanently exit the criminal justice system, they must be re-educated and re-socialized. This can not be done without a creating a support system and linkages to community based services. Further, individuals must be supported in their search for gainful employment and stable housing as they are the two most important factors that contribute to a successful reentry.

Treatment facilities. We need more beds and this is better than a shelter bed which most Parolees would not use anyways. If we can convince them that they need this step in order to be successful then we have it made. But we cant do this without beds and services.

I feel that the Re-entry council could be instrumental in being a voice that speaks about how expensive it is to send people to prison without a thought about exit planning. The Prison system is not working anymore but is getting bigger and bigger.

Reentry Council of the City & County of San Francisco – February 2011

Purpose

The purpose of the Reentry Council of the City and County of San Francisco is to coordinate local efforts to support adults exiting San Francisco County Jail, San Francisco juvenile justice out-of-home placements, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facilities, and the United States Federal Bureau of Prison facilities. The Council coordinates information sharing, planning, and engagement among all interested private and public stakeholders to the extent permissible under federal and state law.

History

From 2005 until 2008, two ad hoc reentry councils focused on different aspects of the reentry of people from prisons and jails to San Francisco communities: the Safe Communities Reentry Council (SCRC), co-chaired by Supervisor Ross Mirkarimi and Public Defender Jeff Adachi, and the San Francisco Reentry Council (SFRC), co-chaired by District Attorney Kamala D. Harris and Sheriff Michael Hennessey. The two councils coordinated their efforts, and jointly developed *Getting Out & Staying Out: A Guide to San Francisco Resources for People Leaving Jails and Prison* in September 2007. In September of 2008, these ad hoc councils were unified and strengthened through the creation of the Reentry Council of the City and County of San Francisco (see San Francisco Administrative Code 5.1).

Powers and Duties

The powers and duties of the Reentry Council include identifying funding at the local, state, and federal level that is earmarked or available for services or programs designed to serve individuals exiting the criminal justice system. The Council identifies programs serving individuals exiting the criminal justice system who reside in San Francisco or who will be released to San Francisco, including program capacity. The Council identifies any unmet needs of this population, and proposes ways to meet those needs based on existing research and best practices. The Council also identifies barriers to safe and successful reentry presented by local, state, and federal law, and proposes ways to reduce the impact of these barriers.

Membership

The Reentry Council is composed of 23 members. Sixteen of the members are representatives of the following agencies or offices: Office of the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, Public Defender's Office, District Attorney's Office, Sheriff's Department, Police Department, Adult Probation Department, Juvenile Probation Department, Department of Economic and Workforce Development, Department of Children Youth and Families, Human Services Agency, Department of Public Health, Department of Child Support Services, San Francisco Superior Court, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Division of Adult Parole Operations, and United States Probation and Pretrial Services System. Three Mayoral appointees and four individuals appointed by the Board of Supervisors comprise the remaining seven seats on the Council. Those appointees must be former inmates of the San Francisco County Jail, a California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facility, and/or a United States Bureau of Prison facility. Among these seven members, at least two must have expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system; at least one has been released from custody within two years of his or her appointment; at least one has served multiple terms; and at least one is between the ages of 18 to 24 at the time of appointment.

Annual Reporting and Subcommittees

At the July 2009 Reentry Council meeting, the Council established five subcommittees, which were comprised of 95 people who met approximately every two months between November 2009 and October 2010. The five subcommittees were focused on a subject area of reentry, and worked to develop a common knowledge base, as well as the background and recommendations contained in the first Annual Report on Reentry (available online). In December 2010, the Council established three new subcommittees focused on implementation to replace the previous five. These subcommittees will begin meeting in spring 2011.

Second Chance Act Initiatives in San Francisco – February 2011

With Open Arms: A San Francisco Initiative for Women Adult Demonstration Grant (FY09)

The San Francisco Department of Public Health leads this initiative, which provides wraparound services and intensive case management for women sentenced to state prison or on parole in San Francisco. Case management begins in county jail upon sentencing; case managers continue to work with women throughout their incarceration in state prison and upon their release. Case managers arrange transportation from state prison to San Francisco, which is at least a three hour drive. Services offered in the community include connections to permanent housing, substance abuse and mental health treatment, job training and placement, HIV treatment, childcare, parenting classes, transportation vouchers, and a range of other services. Partners have successfully attracted additional funding for With Open Arms which will provide mentoring and enrichment activities to expose participants to new opportunities and community networks.

Juvenile Collaborative Reentry Team Juvenile Demonstration Grant (FY09)

The Juvenile Collaborative Reentry Team (JCRT) is a collaboration of the San Francisco Juvenile Probation Department, the San Francisco Public Defender's Office and the Center on Juvenile and Criminal Justice. JCRT provides coordinated and comprehensive reentry case planning and aftercare services for youth returning to the community from out-of-home placement. The team consists of a juvenile probation officer, public defender, youth advocate, and case management coordinator and a dedicated judge. JCRT works with the youth upon the Court's commitment to out-of-home placement. Ninety days prior to exiting placement, the JCRT develops an individualized case plan that is presented to the court. JCRT continues to work with the youth and their families throughout their time in the program and upon their reentry into the community. Services offered to JCRT youth include linkages to housing, substance abuse treatment, mental health treatment, case management, education/vocational support, and community activities.

Probation Alternatives Court Reentry Court Grant (FY10)

The San Francisco Probation Alternatives Court includes coordination with the Collaborative Courts Division of the San Francisco Superior Court, the Public Defender, District Attorney and the Department of Public Health. The goal is to reduce recidivism through the use of early validated risk/needs assessments, evidence based sentencing, evidence based treatment and close judicial and community monitoring using the collaborative approach. All program participants will be linked to wraparound services to help them avoid returning to jail, including services to help with employment, education, family services, health and mental health, and housing. The team has identified all agency representatives, including a treatment specialist. Partners successfully referred two participants into community drug treatment programs. Performance measures have been determined, a client contract has been drafted, and the process model has been finalized. Courts, attorneys and probation officers are now referring candidates for eligibility assessment.

The Keystone Program Offender Reentry Substance Abuse Collaboration (FY10)

The San Francisco Sheriff's Department administers this grant program. The target population is 145 adult male and female detainees housed in the San Francisco Jail who have significant co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders, and who are not already identified to receive case management services upon release through other resources in the system of care. The San Francisco Sheriff's Department will provide in-custody assessment, engagement and treatment motivation enhancement, and re-entry case planning, followed by six months of community-based re-entry case management, linkage and referral services, and additional supportive services to 145 adults within the San Francisco criminal justice system who are diagnosed with co-occurring disorders and who do not participate in existing case management.

NoVA/OFRI Parenting Inside Out Family-Based Substance Abuse Treatment (FY10)

Led by the San Francisco Sheriff's Department, NoVA/OFRI will provide a coordinated, comprehensive response to parents of minors who will be released from the San Francisco jail back to the City and County of San Francisco including resources to address the myriad needs of offenders, their children and other family members and caregivers. NoVA/OFRI is model of family-based treatment and wraparound case management services that acknowledges the challenges to the family presented by substance abuse and criminal behavior, while promoting new insights about family strengths, productive behaviors and healthy coping mechanisms. NoVA/OFRI will enhance recovery and family supportive services, both in jail and post release, providing a holistic, family-centered approach to treatment and reintegration, creating opportunities for family healing, and emphasizing family potential.

2. Do you have experience or expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system?

While incarcerated in California State Prisons, I worked hard to organize support groups for women to prepare for their eventual release. Collectively, these groups identified potential roadblocks and barriers that women would face on the outside: lack of jobs, lack of housing and healthcare, a felony record, family reunification and societal rejection among them. Together, we developed concrete strategies for women to prepare to deal with these problems in an empowering way. In addition, I tutored women preparing for their high school equivalency test. I also helped to develop a prisoner-run program to assist women in filling out job applications, drafting resumes, and practice job interviews. In addition, I regularly assisted women in advocating for basic parole rights and family re-unification prior to release as well as for fair and appropriate parole conditions.

Since my release from prison, I have worked as a volunteer and staff member at the Women's Community Clinic in San Francisco, which provides free gynecological, reproductive and prenatal care to uninsured women in San Francisco. Some of the clients of the Clinic and its outreach program are formerly incarcerated.

5. What was your experience transitioning back to San Francisco after having been incarcerated? What helped you? What were the barriers?

Like most released prisoners, my experience transitioning back to San Francisco has been difficult. The principal barriers for me have been surviving financially while trying to secure housing and employment. In addition, I have struggled with dealing with the stigma of my incarceration and felony record in my community.

A long-time San Francisco resident, I found no available housing options for me in San Francisco. I therefore had to decide to change my parole to a county outside of San Francisco in order to stay with family. Unfortunately, the burden of frequent parole department visits to the home became upsetting to my family. Not wanting to burden them further, in 2009 and 2010 I sought housing in a shelter in San Francisco where I stayed for a period. Since that time, I have again moved back in with family, and am very fortunate because of that. But seeking shelter in San Francisco was a very hard experience. It gave me valuable insight into the acute dearth of housing for the formerly incarcerated in San Francisco.

After my release from prison, I struggled for almost two years to find steady full-time employment but was unable to, due to my felony record and the state of the economy. Recently, I finally secured full-time employment as an AmeriCorps member for the Women's Community Clinic in San Francisco, a clinic where I have volunteered since my release from prison. Many of the women we serve have been incarcerated and I feel very fortunate to be of service in a public health capacity to a community that I definitely consider myself part of.

6. How can we help other people transition from prisons and jails more successfully? How can we help people permanently exit the criminal justice system?

To help people transition more successfully, we need to have well-developed reentry programs that begin in prison and jails, and which link prisoners to community services, job prospects, and housing possibilities very early on and far prior to release. Currently, although some prisons have some pre-release planning, many other facilities have little or none.

Upon release into the community, prisoners should be met with community-initiated assistance that addresses the healthcare, substance abuse treatment, housing, and employment needs of former prisoners in a well-coordinated and sustained way. It is critical to contemplate the families of prisoners in this process and address their needs and the dynamic of family reunification. This is particularly true for women prisoners reentering San Francisco, as over 2/3 of women prisoners are caregivers of their children immediately upon release.

The lack of jobs for ex-cons and the difficulty of re-adjusting to normal society are two key areas that prevent people from permanently exiting the criminal justice system. We can help former prisoners stay out of prison by coordinating an aggressive community-wide jobs strategy for former prisoners, that includes significant incentives for employers to hire ex-cons, skills training for ex-cons, public education about the employability of former prisoners, and local legislation to ban the box from local job applications in the private sector.

In addition to a community-wide jobs strategy for ex-cons, we should support education and training of service providers who assist former prisoners. In particular, I think many reentry programs fail to contemplate or adequately address the traumatization of incarceration and the effects of that traumatization on re-adjusting to a normal, free life. I believe we need to improve the knowledge base of local service providers in regards to the residual effects – both physical and mental – of living in a coercive environment over time.

7. What do you hope that the Reentry Council will achieve?

I hope the Reentry Council will continue its efforts to engage victims, former prisoners, service-providers, local residents, and correctional and law-enforcement authorities in a consistent, constructive and productive collaboration to support former prisoners in rebuilding their lives – and staying out of the system permanently.

I also hope the Council will calibrate its approach to reentry to particularly focus on those prisoner populations who have been most maligned and slighted in reentry programs heretofore: women, transgendered people, juveniles, people of color, and those most vulnerable in reentry due to their crimes or conditions of incarceration including sex-offenders and those who have been detained in isolation. I hope the Council will continually strive to include these populations in the decision-making process.

Finally, I hope that the Reentry Council will continue to spearhead a community-wide strategy that effectively addresses the lack of jobs for former prisoners, and become a model on this issue for other communities around the country.


To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing to express my interest in the vacant seat on the San Francisco Reentry Council. As a former inmate of the San Francisco county jails and current Directing Attorney of Prisoner Legal Services, a recovering addict with 24 years sobriety, an educator and father, I believe I have the qualifications and experience to make valuable contributions to the council.

In 1984, due to years of addiction and criminal behavior, I was sentenced to serve a term in the San Francisco County Jail in San Bruno. Upon release, I had trouble finding resources to help me deal with my addiction and lack of education. As a result, I spent the next few years engaging in the same destructive behaviors as before. Finally, in 1987, with the help of Twelve Step groups and various community-based programs, I was able to overcome a 16-plus year substance abuse problem which culminated in a decade of heroin addiction and started on the road to recovery.

I eventually enrolled in college, obtained a teaching credential, and taught elementary school in the San Francisco Unified School District for five years. In 1996, I entered law school hoping to learn how to advocate for people struggling as I had. I have been working with prisoners and parolees ever since, and am proud to have had a hand in helping some of them along their own roads to reentry.


While surely the most formidable hurdle to my successful reentry was overcoming my drug addiction, I faced other obstacles simply because of my status as an ex-offender. I had a year-long battle with the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing over my fitness to be a teacher. I had to undergo a heightened review process to become a member of the California State Bar. And as recently as 2009, I finally prevailed after a two-year struggle with the California Secretary of State in order to receive a notary commission. I understand and have experienced the barriers facing someone with a criminal history.

Growing up, I was told that doing drugs and getting arrested would ruin one's life. While I see the veracity in that statement, it was the path I had to take to get to where I am today. I was initially hired at Prisoner Legal Service by the late Nate Harrington -- an ex-offender himself -- due, in part, to my history as an ex-offender and recovering addict. My struggles with incarceration and addiction have made me a better advocate and will make me a valuable member of the Council.

Over the past 10 years I have dedicated my life to representing indigent criminal defendants and parolees at the revocation hearings. I have handled family law, dependency and other civil matters for indigent ex-offenders and find satisfaction in watching and being part of ex-offenders transforming into a respectable law-abiding citizens. I am committed to continuing and expanding my role in effecting this type of change and believe that I am qualified to help the reentry council effect long-term, meaningful and systemic change in how San Francisco helps ex-offenders reenter our community as contributing law-abiding citizens.

The number one barrier I faced was a 16 plus year substance abuse problem, culminating in a 10 year heroin addiction which I was able to overcome though participating in self help groups as well as other community based programs. I was also in serious debt, had a suspended driver's license, and no education. The help of the 12 Step groups was essential to just get me to a place where I was willing to reach out for other available assistance such as community counseling centers and educational opportunities, financial aid, and free legal assistance.

Board Qualifications:

Ordinance No. 44-11 designated one of the members of the Board of Supervisors to serve as a member of the Council and changed the qualifications of the 4 Board of Supervisors' appointees.

Ordinance No. 26-09 added a fourth seat that the Board of Supervisors can appoint and to exempt all members of the Reentry Council from the requirement that they be electors of the City and County.

The Reentry Council is created to coordinate local efforts to support adults exiting San Francisco County Jail, San Francisco Juvenile Justice System out-of-home placements, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Facilities, and the United States Federal Bureau of Prison facilities.

The Council shall provide the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, the public, and any other appropriate agency with accurate and comprehensive information about programs that serve this population, barriers faced by this population, best practices to meet the needs of this population, and funding sources for programs and practices that address the needs of this population.

The Council shall coordinate information sharing, planning, and engagement among all interested private and public stakeholders to the extent permissible under federal and state law.

The council shall consist of 23 members, seven of whom shall be former inmates in the San Francisco County Jail, a California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facility and/or a United States Bureau of Prison facility.

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The Mayor, or his designee, shall serve as a member, and shall also appoint three of the members.

The Board of Supervisors shall designate one of its members to serve as a member of the Council, and shall appoint the four of the seven members who are former inmates. Of these four members, at least one shall have expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system, at least one must have been released from custody within two years of his or her appointment at least one must have served multiple terms of incarceration. All members of the Council shall be exempt from the Charter requirement that they be electors of the City and County of San Francisco.

The following City departments or agencies shall appoint one member each to the Council: Public Defender's Office; District Attorney's Office, Sheriff's Department; Police Department; Adult Probation Department; Juvenile Probation Department; Department of Economic and Workforce Development; Human Services Agency, the Department of Children, Youth and Families and the Department of Public Health.

In addition, co-chairs shall invite the San Francisco Superior Court; Department of Child Support Services, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Division of Adult Parole Operations; and the United States Probation and Pretrial Services System to appoint one member each to the Council. If any of these four agencies does not appoint a representative, the Council co-chairs shall appoint an additional member.

Members shall serve two-year terms and shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority. Members may serve multiple terms. If any Council member misses two regularly scheduled meetings in a twelve-month period without prior notice, the Council shall certify that fact in writing to appointing authority and the member shall be deemed to have resigned.

Eleven members of the Council shall constitute a quorum and the Council shall have the authority to act on the vote of the majority of the quorum.

The four members appointed by the Adult Probation Department, District Attorney's Office, Public Defender's Office and the Sheriff's Department, respectively, as well as the Mayor or the Mayor's representative, shall co-chair the Council.

The Council may establish subcommittees. The Council shall meet in full at least three times per year.

Reports: At least once a year, the Council shall prepare and submit a report that shall include but not be limited to information identifying funding streams; programs serving individuals exiting the criminal justice system; needs of reentry population; and barriers to safe and successful reentry. City departments shall respond within 30 days, if mentioned in report.

Reports shall be provided to the Mayor; Board of Supervisors; City departments in report and the public.

The Council shall be staffed, subject to fiscal and budgetary provisions of the Charter, by the Public Defender's Office, District Attorney's and the Mayor's Office designating one staff member each.

Sunset: June 1, 2014, unless the Board of Supervisors adopts an ordinance continuing its

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existence.
