13	Section 1. The San Fr	ancisco Health Code is hereby amended by amending Section		
14	1608, to read as follows:			
15	SEC. 1608. LEAD HA	ZARD REDUCTION CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE.		
16	(a) There is hereby es	ablished a Lead Hazard Reduction Citizens Advisory Committee		
17	(hereafter, the "Advisory Com	mittee") of the City and County of San Francisco. The Advisory		
18	Committee shall (i) recommend to the Board of Supervisors a range of options for a lead			
19	hazard reduction program for	residential dwelling units, and (ii) provide consultation and		
20	assistance to the Director upon the Director's request with respect to the implementation of			
21	those provisions when they b	ecome effective. The Advisory Committee shall submit a report		
22	to the Board of Supervisors w	to the Board of Supervisors within one year of the effective date of this ordinance and		
23	annually thereafter. The repo	rt shall at a minimum include recommendations on the following		
24	matters:			

Acceptable levels of exposure to various sources of lead;

1	(c)	Members of the Committee shall serve without compensation or reimbursement
2	for expenses	s. In the event a vacancy occurs, the Board of Supervisors shall appoint a
3	successor fr	om the same category.
4	(d)	At the initial meeting of the Advisory Committee, and yearly, thereafter, the
5	Advisory Co	mmittee members shall select such officers deemed necessary by the Advisory

The Advisory Committee shall establish rules and regulations for its own organization and procedure and shall meet when necessary as determined by the Advisory Committee. All meetings shall, except as provided by general law, be open to the public.
- (e) The establishment of the Lead Hazard Reduction Committee is not intended to limit the efforts currently engaged in by City departments to reduce the risks of exposure to lead.
- (f) The Director shall provide clerical assistance to the Lead Hazard ReductionCitizens Advisory Committee and its subcommittees.
- (g) The Director and the Advisory Committee shall take the following actions to address lead hazards in dwelling units subject to inspection under Section 1626.
- (1) The Director shall draft Proposed Interim Lead Hazard Reduction Guidelines designed to assist the Advisory Committee in its presentation under Section 1608(g)(2), and present them to the Advisory Committee at its first meeting.
- (2) Within six months after the effective date of this Section, the Advisory Committee shall present Final Interim Lead Hazard Reduction Guidelines ("Interim Guidelines"), including any changes recommended by the Advisory Committee, to the Board of Supervisors in the form of a draft ordinance. The Interim Guidelines shall be designed to be effective pending enactment of any ordinance based on the Advisory Committee's recommendations under Section 1608(a).

19		(F)	Procedures requiring notice of the risks of lead paint hazards to
20	tenants, purchaser	s of rea	al estate, and purchasers of home improvement products. The
21	committee shall co	nsider,	among other matters it deems appropriate, how to define tenants,
22	whether tenants in	certair	buildings (such as those newly constructed) need not receive
23	notice; how and wh	en the	notice can be disseminated effectively and economically; whether
24	the notice shall be	posted	in stores selling building materials and hardware; whether the

notice shall be required in real estate transactions; and the content of the notice.

1	(4) Within six months after the effective date of this Section, the Advisory
2	Committee shall propose legislation to the Board of Supervisors amending Chapter 37 of the
3	San Francisco Administrative Code, the Residential Rent Stabilization and Arbitration
4	Ordinance, to provide whether and under what circumstances the costs of lead hazard
5	reduction may be passed on to tenants, and further to provide protection against permanent
6	displacement of tenants due to lead hazard reduction.
7	(h) Members of the Lead Hazard Reduction Citizens Advisory Committee shall be
8	appointed for a term of four years; provided, however, that the 23 members first appointed
9	shall, by lot at the first meeting, classify their terms so that seven shall serve for a term of two
10	years, eight shall serve for a term of three years, and eight shall serve for a term of four years.
