1 [Supporting California State Senate Bill No. 925 (Wiener) - Combating Street Fencing of
2 Stolen Goods]

3 **Resolution supporting California State Senate Bill No. 925 introduced by California**
4 **State Senator Scott Wiener to combat the fencing of stolen merchandise on San**
5 **Francisco streets.**

6
7 WHEREAS, San Francisco neighborhoods like the Mission have long celebrated a rich
8 street vending culture that has contributed to the vibrancy of the city; and

9 WHEREAS, The City's sidewalk vending program and the economic opportunities it
10 brings for permitted street vendors has been threatened by the proliferation of fencing, the
11 sale of stolen goods on our streets; and

12 WHEREAS, Individuals fencing stolen goods have threatened, extorted and/or
13 physically assaulted frontline SF Public Works employees, community members and
14 permitted sidewalk vendors; and

15 WHEREAS, Fencers have also blocked sidewalks, making passage to public transit,
16 small businesses, and neighborhoods for pedestrians unsafe and inaccessible; and

17 WHEREAS, Prior to 2018, the San Francisco Police Department issued peddler
18 permits for authorized street vendors and enforced street vending regulations; and

19 WHEREAS, In 2018, California decriminalized sidewalk vending with the passage of
20 Senate Bill No. 946, the "Safe Sidewalk Vending Act," effectively barring law enforcement
21 from enforcing violations related to street vending, but never imagined that criminal operations
22 would take advantage of this law to sell stolen goods on the sidewalk; and

23 WHEREAS, This legal change required San Francisco to move away from police
24 enforcement of street vending to exclusively rely on administrative enforcement - even of
25

1 fencing - by SF Public Works which became untenable as conditions on the streets
2 deteriorated under the influx of criminal activity; and

3 WHEREAS, Public Works Order No. 208803 stated that Mission Police Station had
4 “experienced elevated numbers of calls for service associated with the Mission Street Corridor
5 that can be attributed in part to illegal purchasing and vending (or “fencing”) of stolen property,
6 particularly around the intersections of 24th and Mission Streets and 16th and Mission
7 Streets;” and

8 WHEREAS, “...on nearly a daily basis, police officers have observed the fencing of
9 suspected stolen property on or about the Mission Street Corridor;” and

10 WHEREAS, Overwhelming fencing activity led the City to issue a moratorium on
11 sidewalk sales along Mission Street between 14th and Cesar Chavez Streets, including sales
12 by permitted street vendors, undermining the intent of SB 946; and

13 WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. 925, would allow San Francisco to create permitting
14 requirements to regulate the sale of items commonly obtained through retail theft and impose
15 criminal penalties for those that engage in this practice; and

16 WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. 925, would allow law enforcement officers to address
17 fencing activities without the presence of SF Public Works employees; and

18 WHEREAS, SF Public Works, which took over issuing street vendor permits in 2022,
19 would continue to administer a low-cost, accessible sidewalk vending program that preserves
20 economic opportunities for authorized sidewalk vendors; and

21 WHEREAS, The passage of Senate Bill No. 925 would bring greater safety, order and
22 opportunities for commercial corridors to flourish; now, therefore, be it

23 RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco
24 hereby expresses its strong support for Senate Bill No. 925 and urges the California State
25 Legislature and Governor to support Senate Bill No. 925; and, be it

1 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby directs the Clerk of the
2 Board to transmit a copy of this Resolution to Governor Gavin Newsom, President pro
3 Tempore Mike McGuire, Speaker of the State Assembly Robert Rivas, State Senator Scott
4 Wiener, Assembly Member Matt Haney, Assembly Member Phil Ting to signify the Board's
5 endorsement and encouragement for the swift passage and implementation of this critical
6 legislation.

SENATE BILL

No. 925

Introduced by Senator Wiener

January 11, 2024

An act to amend ~~Section 9146 of the Government Code, relating to the Legislature. Section 51037 of the Government Code, and to add Section 496f to the Penal Code, relating to crimes.~~

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 925, as amended, Wiener. ~~Legislative review of state agency action.~~ *City and County of San Francisco: merchandising sales.*

Under existing law, knowingly buying or receiving stolen property or property that has been obtained in any manner constituting theft or extortion, as specified, is punishable as either a misdemeanor or a felony if the value of the property exceeds \$950. Existing law authorizes a local authority to, by ordinance or resolution, adopt requirements regulating the time, place, and manner of sidewalk vending if the requirements are directly related to objective health, safety, or welfare concerns. Existing law prohibits a local authority from regulating sidewalk vendors, except in accordance with certain provisions.

This bill would authorize the City and County of San Francisco to adopt an ordinance prohibiting the sale of specified merchandise on public property without a permit, if the ordinance includes specified written findings, including, among other things, that there has been a significant pattern of merchandise being the subject of retail theft and then appearing for sale on public property within the City and County of San Francisco. The bill would require an ordinance adopted by the City and County of San Francisco to, among other things, identify a

local permitting agency that is responsible for administering a permit system. The bill would authorize the ordinance to provide that selling merchandise without a permit is punishable as an infraction, and that subsequent violations after 2 prior convictions is an infraction or a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding 6 months. By creating a new crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

This bill would make legislative findings and declarations as to the necessity of a special statute for the City and County of San Francisco.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

~~Existing law requires a state agency, as specified, to notify the Joint Legislative Budget Committee not less than 60 days prior to the effective date on which the state agency will establish or change a federal aid allocation formula to a local agency. If the chairperson of the committee informs committee members of the chairperson's intention to waive the 60-day notification period, existing law permits the chairperson to grant a waiver of that notification period after receipt of the notification if an objection is not received within 10 days. Existing law requires, upon the request of the chairperson or any member of the committee, the committee to schedule a hearing on the proposed allocation formula to be established or changed.~~

~~This bill would reduce the objection period before granting a waiver to 9 days.~~

1 SECTION 1. Section 51037 of the Government Code is

3 51037. (a) A local authority shall not regulate sidewalk vendors

16 *of retail theft. If the city and county passes such an ordinance, the*
17 *ordinance shall include all of the following written findings:*

18 (1) *That there has been a significant pattern of merchandise*
19 *being the subject of retail theft and then appearing for sale on*
20 *public property within the City and County of San Francisco.*

21 (2) *That requiring a permit to sell will further the objective of*

24 *the lawful sale of merchandise and to safeguard civil rights.*

11 *Francisco.*

PROHIBITING VENDING WITHIN A 300-FOOT RADIUS OF THE MISSION STREET CORRIDOR (MISSION STREET BETWEEN 14TH AND CESAR CHAVEZ STREETS), BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 8 AM AND 5 AM, SUNDAY THROUGH SATURDAY, FOR NINETY (90) DAYS FROM THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDER, DUE TO OBJECTIVE HEALTH, SAFETY, AND WELFARE CONCERNS.

WHEREAS, In accordance with Article 5.9 of the Public Works Code, the Department of Public Works ("Department") previously adopted the Guidelines for the Issuance of Permits, and for Inspection and Enforcement of Street Vendors Operating Within the Public Rights-of-Way ("Regulations"), and the Regulations took effect on July 1, 2022; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Government Code Section 51083(c), Public Works Code Section 5.9-8(a)(2), and Section II.A.6 of the Regulations, the Department is authorized to restrict locations on which Vending is allowed on the basis of objective public health, safety, and welfare concerns; and

WHEREAS, Public Works Code Section 5.9-2 defines to "Vend" as "[t]o sell, offer for sale, expose or display for sale, solicit offers to purchase, or barter Food or Merchandise" and including "[to] offer[] free samples of Food or Merchandise that are also for sale, or [to] negotiat[e] fees for Food or Merchandise;" and

WHEREAS, The Regulations require Vendors to operate in accordance with "Good Neighbor Policies" that require Vendors to be "individually responsible for any garbage, detritus, or debris that directly results from their Vending activity," to "contain noise and odors within the immediate area of the Vendor so as not to cause a nuisance to neighbors," to "urge patrons to not litter and to maintain the safety, cleanliness, quiet, peace, and orderliness of the area," and to provide for "proper and adequate storage and disposal of garbage, detritus, and debris;" and

WHEREAS, Unless otherwise defined herein, the defined terms used in this Order have the meanings set forth in the Public Works Code; and

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco ("City") strives to ensure that public transit facilities and City sidewalks remain safe and accessible for pedestrians and transit users as may be required by the Americans with Disabilities Act and state and local disability rights and accessibility laws, regulations, and codes, as well as the Public Works Code; and

WHEREAS, The Mission Police Station routinely receives community complaints about illegal Vending, including Vending without proper permits and Vending stolen goods, and other associated criminal and nuisance activities along Mission Street between 14th and Cesar Chavez Streets (the "Mission Street Corridor"), which pose objective health, safety, and welfare concerns to residents and visitors within the Mission District; and

WHEREAS, Between October 10, 2022 through October 10, 2023, the Police Department received 580 calls for service or on-viewed incidents for the addresses on Mission Street ranging from 1800 Mission Street (at 14th Street) to 2999 Mission Street (at 26th Street), and the three most numerous types of calls pertained to assault and battery, petty theft, and vandalism; and

WHEREAS, Illegal Vending, and concerns that illegal Vending has caused the street conditions of the Mission Street Corridor to be worse than ever, are common topics of discussion at community meetings, and the community members who attend these meetings routinely call for and support greater police action to make the Mission Street Corridor safer and more accessible for pedestrians; and

WHEREAS, Mission Police Station has experienced elevated numbers of calls for service associated with the Mission Street Corridor that can be attributed in part to illegal purchasing and Vending (or “fencing”) of stolen property, particularly around the intersections of 24th and Mission Streets and 16th and Mission Streets, near the BART plazas; and

WHEREAS, Illegal vending activity along the Mission Street Corridor, particularly the BART plazas on Mission Street at 24th and 16th Streets, is associated with the fencing of suspected stolen property, and on nearly a daily basis, Police officers have observed the fencing of suspected stolen property on or about the Mission Street Corridor; and

WHEREAS, There have been arrests along the Mission Street Corridor for stolen property offenses where the property stolen from businesses such as Walgreens, CVS, REI, Lululemon, and Victoria’s Secret in other parts of the City have been brought to the Mission Street Corridor for fencing as part of organized retail theft operations; and

WHEREAS, The Police Department’s investigatory units have conducted numerous anti-fencing operations that have resulted in the recovery and seizure of large amounts of stolen property, often valued in the tens of thousands of dollars per seizure; and

WHEREAS, A high concentration of pedestrians and Vendors on sidewalks fronting BART plazas presents potential threats to public health, safety, and welfare by obstructing pedestrian and wheelchair ingress and egress, particularly for individuals with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, The 24th Street BART Station and the 16th Street BART Station rank consistently among the ten most utilized stations in the BART system based on rider entries and exits, and as evidenced by numerous 311 complaints between November 2022 and July 2023 (on file with the Department), members of the public have voiced concerns about Vending activities on sidewalks surrounding and adjacent to the 24th Street BART plazas and the 16th Street BART plazas; and

WHEREAS, Based on these complaints, the City has documented numerous incidents where such activities have obstructed or caused the obstruction of sidewalks, and have caused potential safety hazards, due to the

congregation of many persons and/or the placement of merchandise and Vending paraphernalia, hindering the passage of pedestrians, including persons in wheelchairs and persons with strollers; and

WHEREAS, The vending activities have exacerbated the high usage of sidewalks, causing impassable and obstructed sidewalks, and have forced pedestrians to walk in the roadway, blocked access to and from buses, obstructed entrances to stores and restaurants, generated loud noises, facilitated the sale of allegedly stolen merchandise, damaged street trees, generated litter, and facilitated abandonment of merchandise on sidewalks; and

WHEREAS, Within the Mission Police Station service area, the intersection of 24th and Mission Street and the intersection of 16th Street and Mission Street rank as the sites with the highest and second highest number of calls for service, respectively, apart from the Mission Police Station itself; and

WHEREAS, As evidenced by Police incident reports on file with the Department, the sidewalks surrounding and adjacent to the two 24th Street BART plazas have been impacted by illegal activities, such as assault, battery, petty theft, vandalism, drug sales and use, overdoses, alcohol consumption, and theft; and overcrowded sidewalks impede police officers' ability to effectively respond to these safety threats; and

WHEREAS, These illegal activities threaten and negatively affect the health, safety, and welfare of pedestrians, Vendors, BART riders, and City staff, including Public Works staff who have consistently and repeatedly encountered vandalism of City vehicles, threats of physical violence and bodily harm, actual physical violence and bodily harm, verbal insults, and intimidation, and one such incident resulted in the arrest of an unpermitted Vendor who had threatened to kill a City employee who was discharging his duties as a street vending inspector, and the issuance of a protective order from the San Francisco Superior Court, which requires the unpermitted Vendor to stay away from the City employee whom the unpermitted Vendor had threatened; and

WHEREAS, As evidenced by Police incident reports on file with the Department, the sidewalks surrounding and adjacent to the two 16th Street BART plazas have been impacted by illegal activities, such as assault, battery, drug sales and use, overdoses, alcohol consumption, and theft; and overcrowded sidewalks impede police officers' ability to effectively respond to these safety threats; and

WHEREAS, These illegal activities threaten and negatively affect the health, safety, and welfare of pedestrians, scooter riders, Vendors, BART riders, and City staff, including Public Works staff who have consistently and repeatedly encountered vandalism of City vehicles, threats of physical violence and bodily harm, actual physical violence and bodily harm, verbal insults, and intimidation; and

WHEREAS, The high concentration of Vending activities and illegal activities in the areas around the BART plazas has led to unsanitary sidewalk conditions and sidewalk obstructions in violation of the Regulations and the Good Neighbor Policies and the extensive noncompliance with the Vending ordinance, Regulations, and policies has rendered enforcement of such laws, Regulations, and policies infeasible despite the Department's yearlong effort to send street inspectors to such areas on a weekly basis, which efforts have been hindered by the limited

number of inspectors available to perform street inspections due in part to inspectors' belief that their health, safety, and welfare may be threatened by Vendors; and

WHEREAS, For more than 12 months, the Department has routinely encountered unpermitted Vendors occupying sidewalks and BART property on or about the Mission Street Corridor, and during this time, the Department has pursued vigorous and sustained enforcement of Article 5.9 of the Public Works Code, the Regulations, and the Good Neighbor Policies, but sidewalk conditions have not improved significantly; and

WHEREAS, Efforts of Vendors to Vend from within or around a transit shelter, or at an uncovered transit stop, objectively diminish the public health, safety, and welfare by reducing the availability of covered seating for transit users within a transit shelter and by obstructing pedestrian ingress and egress from a transit shelter or an uncovered transit stop to a transit vehicle via the sidewalk, thereby forcing pedestrians onto the roadway; and

WHEREAS, The aforementioned conditions that occur contemporaneously with and in proximity to Vending activities pose numerous objective health, safety, and welfare concerns and threaten the health, safety, and welfare of Vendors, pedestrians, wheelchair users, and City staff who are using sidewalks on or about the Mission Street Corridor, and such conditions have required significant law enforcement and civilian staff resources to mitigate and address nuisance and criminal activities that occur alongside of Vending activities, diverting these staff resources from other law enforcement and Public Works functions; and

WHEREAS, The aforementioned Vending, criminal, and nuisance activities have been associated with and have exacerbated the severity of unsanitary sidewalk conditions resulting from the accumulation of food waste, drug paraphernalia, Vendors' discarded boxes and receptacles, and other miscellaneous debris, all in violation of the Regulations and the Good Neighbor Policies; and

WHEREAS, Based on prior experience with and observations of sidewalk Vending activities, the Department believes that it is likely that prohibiting Vending on certain sidewalks may cause the sidewalk Vending activities and the associated nuisance and criminal activities to shift to surrounding sidewalks; now, therefore be it:

DETERMINED that, for the foregoing reasons, Vending, as defined in Public Works Code Section 5.9-2, shall be prohibited within a 300-foot radius of the exterior boundaries of the Mission Street Corridor, which correspond approximately to the area bounded by the southeast corner of the lot at 1798 Mission Street (Assessor's Block 3532, Lot No. 012), the southwest corner of the lot at 1799 Mission Street (Assessor's Block 3531, Lot No. 022), the northeast corner of the lot at 3401 Cesar Chavez Street (Assessor's Block 6574, Lot No. 039) and the northwest corner of the lot at 3101 Mission Street (Assessor's Block 5501, Lot No. 079) ("Prohibition Area"), between the hours of 8 am and 5 am, Sunday through Saturday, subject to the following conditions:

1. Boundaries of Prohibition Area. The Prohibition Area is depicted in Exhibit A to this Order.
2. Effective Date. Following its execution by the Director, this Order shall take effect at 7:00 AM on November 27th, 2023.

3. Expiration. This Order shall expire on midnight on the date that is ninety (90) days of from the Effective Date. This Order may be extended by a subsequent Order on the basis of objective health, safety, and welfare concerns.


Exhibit A – Boundaries of Prohibition Area




