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




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
Climate Health Summary



Climate change is making extreme heat events and wildfire smoke events more frequent and more extreme. **These events have significant, cascading, compounding, and inequitable impacts on public health**



2017



- 48% increase in EMS medical calls for service
- 17% increase in emergency department visits


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Heat and Air Quality Resilience Project



Co-managed by the Climate and Health Program and the Office of Resilience and Capital Planning, HAQR is an interdepartmental and cross-sectoral project to supplement emergency preparedness and response actions with the medium-to-long-term strategies to make sure the City is more resilient to these events year to year to year.

The goal of HAQR is to create landing space for high-level extreme heat and air quality resilience discussions, to design, prioritize, and communicate resilience strategies, connect those strategies to resources.
