

For over 50 years, Reproductive Freedom for All has fought to protect and advance reproductive freedom at the federal and state levels—including access to abortion care, birth control, and pregnancy and postpartum care—for everybody. The acquisition of Saint Francis Memorial Hospital and St. Mary's Medical Center by UCSF will guarantee that all patients receiving care at these facilities are able to access comprehensive reproductive and LGBTQ-inclusive health care.

UCSF is a national leader in reproductive health care and provides critical services such as the Pregnancy Options Centers that serve patients traveling from within California and from other states, the EMBRACE program that aims to advance equitable outcomes for Black pregnant people, and Team Lily which cares for pregnant people affected by substance abuse, homelessness, and mental illness. UCSF also has a history of excellent reproductive health research, including through its programs Advancing New Standards in Reproductive Health (ANSIRH), the Bixby Center for Global Reproductive Health, and more.

In 2019, Reproductive Freedom for All California opposed the expanded partnership between UCSF and Dignity Health due to the highly restrictive policies at Dignity Health facilities, namely, the requirement to follow either the Ethical and Religious Directives for Health Care Services (ERDs) or the organizational "Statement of Common Values." Both the ERDs and Statement of Common Values are nonmedical documents that forbid many reproductive health services. In its acquisition of Saint Francis and St. Mary's, UCSF has made clear that moving forward, both hospitals "...will not be subject to ethical religious directives, statements of common value, or any policy-based restrictions on care. All UCSF Health clinical policies will apply at UCSF Health Saint Francis Hospital and UCSF Health St. Mary's Hospital, including our commitments to comprehensive reproductive care." Access to comprehensive reproductive and LGBTQ-inclusive health care is essential, and with the assurance that UCSF Health clinical policies will apply at both hospitals, we are pleased to support this acquisition.

We are grateful to UCSF's commitment to ensuring high quality health care for all San Franciscans and all patients who come to San Francisco to receive exceptional, equitable, and inclusive health care. I urge your support of this agreement.
