[State Legislation on Aging and the Elderly] URGING THE CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE AND GOVERNOR DAVIS TO APPROVE STATE ASSEMBLY BILL 59, SENATE BILL 26, AND SENATE BILL 70,

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Commission on Aging has endorsed Assembly Bill 59, Senate Bill 26 and Senate Bill 70 to protect the rights of aging and elderly individuals; and,

PROTECTING THE RIGHTS OF AGING AND ELDERLY INDIVIDUALS.

WHEREAS, Two hundred and twenty five thousand (225,000) reported cases of abuse, neglect or financial exploitation of the elderly or disabled occur each year in California; and,

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 59, introduced by Assembly Member Cedillo, sets forth procedures under which an elder or dependent adult who has suffered abuse may seek protective orders; and,

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 59 makes it a misdemeanor to violate a protective order issued to protect an elder or dependent adult from abuse; and,

WHEREAS, Like race and sex discrimination, age discrimination attacks an individual's sense of self-worth and violates the basic principle that each person should be judged on the basis of individual merit, rather than by reference to group stereotypes; and,

WHEREAS, Because average life expectancy has risen to more than 80 years, most California residents either are now or will become over-40 employees, thus creating an extraordinarily broad class of potential victims of age discrimination in employment; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 26, introduced by Senators Escutia, Alpert, Perata and Vasconcellos, would declare it the intent of the Legislature that the use of salary as the basis for differentiating between employees when terminating employment may be found to constitute age discrimination if use of this criterion disproportionately affects older workers as a group;

WHEREAS, SB 26 would declare it the intent of the Legislature that the courts interpret the state's statutes prohibiting age discrimination in employment broadly and vigorously, in a manner comparable to prohibitions against sex and race discrimination; and,

WHEREAS, Under existing law, agencies that are paid to refer persons to residential care facilities for the elderly are not adequately regulated; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 70, introduced by Senator Murray, would require any person, association, or corporation that establishes, conducts, or maintains a referral agency, to obtain certification from the State Department of Social Services before referring any person for remuneration to any residential care facility for the elderly; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 70 would require the State Department of Social Services to develop certification methods and procedures, including a code of conduct and standards of practice, for referral agencies in order to protect the interests of the elderly who are placed through such agencies; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That, on the recommendation of the San Francisco
Commission on Aging, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors endorses
Assembly bill 59, Senate Bill 26 and Senate bill 70 and urges the
Legislature and governor to approve the bills; and be it;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to his Honor, the Mayor, with a request that he transmit copies to the delegation from San Francisco in the State Legislature, as well as Governor Davis, with a request that they take all action necessary to pass Assembly Bill 59, Senate Bill 26, and Senate Bill 70.
