[Urging San Francisco Employers and Businesses to Observe Juneteenth]
Resolution urging employers and businesses located in the City and County of San
Francisco to recognize Juneteenth as an official federal holiday and to allow
employees to observe June 19 with paid time off annually.
WHEREAS, Juneteenth, also known as "Juneteenth Independence Day,"
"Emancipation Day," "Emancipation Celebration," and "Freedom Day," is the oldest African
American holiday observance in the United States; and
WHEREAS, Juneteenth, also known as Emancipation Day, Jubilee Day, Freedom Day,
and Black Independence Day, commemorates June 19, 1865, when Union soldiers arrived in
Galveston, Texas, and announced the end of the Civil War and the abolition of slavery in the
United States to enslaved Black people and began to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation,
which had been issued by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863, more than two
years prior; and
WHEREAS, Juneteenth has been celebrated annually on June 19th in various parts of
the United States since 1865, becoming a time for reflection, rejoicing, and empowerment
within African American communities, acknowledging their history, heritage, and resilience;
and
WHEREAS, On June 17, 2021, Juneteenth was officially recognized as a federal
holiday by President Joe Biden, following the passage of the Juneteenth National
Independence Day Act by the United States Congress, acknowledging its profound
significance in American history; and

1	WHEREAS, Following President Joe Biden's resolution declaring Juneteenth a federal
2	holiday, Mayor London Breed signed an order declaring June 19 an official holiday in San
3	Francisco and encouraged residents to participate in Juneteenth events; and
4	WHEREAS, Although Juneteenth became a national holiday in 2021, San Francisco
5	has long held events and celebrations for Juneteenth annually since 1950 with a festival and
6	parade along Fillmore Street and celebrations have since expanded to many neighborhoods;
7	and
8	WHEREAS, Although the City and County of San Francisco annually observe
9	Juneteenth, not all employers or businesses in San Francisco have adopted this federal
10	holiday as an official day of recognition; now, be it
11	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges all employers and businesses in the
12	City and County of San Francisco to recognize Juneteenth as an official federal holiday and to
13	allow employees to observe June 19; and, be it
14	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors encourages all employers and
15	businesses in the City and County of San Francisco, to either close on June 19th, pay
16	workers overtime pay that they would typically get on a paid holiday, and/or allow the many
17	workers in the City who want to attend Juneteenth events to honor and celebrate Juneteenth
18	celebrations and commemorations that take place to take the day off or leave work with no
19	employment consequence.
