3 **Motion authorizing preparation of written Proponent and Opponent ballot arguments**
4 **and rebuttal ballot arguments for submittal to the voters for the November 5, 2024,**
5 **General Election.**

7 WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors wishes to authorize the listed Board Member(s)
8 or sponsor, supporting the following ballot measure(s), to prepare and submit a written
9 proponent ballot argument(s) and proponent rebuttal argument(s) for submittal to the Director
10 of Elections:

- 11 ▪ (Charter Amendment) Charter Amendment (First Draft) to amend the Charter of the
12 City and County of San Francisco to provide for the election of the Director of the
13 Department of Police Accountability; at an election to be held on November 5, 2024.
14 (Board File No. 240495) (Supervisors Walton; Safai, Ronen, Preston)
- 15 ▪ (Charter Amendment) Charter Amendment (Second Draft) to amend the Charter of
16 the City and County of San Francisco to define the term “Full-Duty Sworn Officer”;
17 modify the criteria for establishing recommended staffing levels for sworn officers;
18 change the requirement for the Chief of Police to submit a staffing report from every
19 two years to every three years; and establish a new voluntary Deferred Retirement
20 Option Program (“DROP”) for the period from July 2025 - July 2030, for eligible
21 members of the Police Department (in the rank of officer, sergeant, or inspector)
22 that allows those members to earn additional deferred compensation in the
23 Retirement System for up to 60 months in exchange for agreeing to perform
24 neighborhood patrol or investigative work; at an election to be held on November 5,

2024. (Board File No. 240544) (Supervisors Dorsey; Peskin, Stefani, Melgar, Mandelman, Safai, Chan)

- (Charter Amendment) Charter Amendment (Second Draft) to amend the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to 1) create an Our Children, Our Families Initiative (“Initiative”) to coordinate efforts by City departments and the San Francisco Unified School District (“School District”) to deliver outcomes-based services for children, youth, and families; 2) require the Initiative to use an objective and measurable outcomes framework (“Outcomes Framework”) to evaluate the budget and spending of each City department with expenditures that are eligible to be included in the Children and Youth Fund baseline, the Public Education Enrichment Fund (“PEEF”), the PEEF baseline, or any discretionary funding allocated from the General Fund for children, youth, and families; 3) require the Mayor and Board of Supervisors to consider the Initiative’s findings during their consideration of the City budget each year, including by the Board of Supervisors holding a public hearing and adopting findings about the expenditures; 4) require the School District to submit a proposal once every five years describing how it will spend the City’s general fund contribution to the PEEF consistent with the San Francisco Children and Families Plan and the Outcomes Framework, and prohibit the City from providing PEEF funding to the School District until the Board of Supervisors and Mayor have approved the School District’s proposal; 5) require the School District to submit annual reports describing how it has spent the City’s general fund contribution and the PEEF funding for arts, music, sports, and library programs; 6) authorize the Board of Supervisors and Mayor to place PEEF funding to the School District on reserve if the School District’s expenditures are inconsistent with the Charter, the Outcomes Framework, or the School District’s

1 spending plan or its internal guidelines regarding student educational outcomes; 7)
2 provide that money set aside for the School District in the Student Success Fund
3 cannot replace, supplant, count as, or substitute for other City funding for the
4 School District or children and youth required under the Children and Youth Fund,
5 the PEEF, or other provisions in the Charter; and 8) prohibit the City from providing
6 discretionary funds to the School District unless it has entered into a data-sharing
7 agreement with the City; at an election to be held on November 5, 2024. (Board File
8 No. 240545) (Supervisors Melgar; Ronen, Walton, Stefani, Safai, Dorsey, Engardio,
9 Preston, Mandelman)

- 10 ■ (Charter Amendment) Charter Amendment (Second Draft) to amend the Charter of
11 the City and County of San Francisco to establish the Commission Streamlining
12 Task Force charged with making recommendations to the Mayor and the Board of
13 Supervisors about ways to modify, eliminate, or combine the City's appointive
14 boards and commissions to improve the administration of City government; require
15 the City Attorney to prepare a Charter Amendment to implement the Task Force's
16 recommendations relating to Charter commissions, for consideration by the Board
17 of Supervisors; and authorize the Task Force to introduce an ordinance to
18 effectuate its recommendations relating to appointive boards and commissions
19 codified in the Municipal Code, which ordinance shall go into effect within 90 days

2 authorize the Inspector General to initiate and lead investigations regarding
3 potential violations of laws or policies involving fraud, waste, or abuse; to expand
4 the authority of the Controller's Office to issue subpoenas; and to authorize the
5 Controller's Office to execute search warrants to the extent permitted by State law;
6 at an election to be held on November 5, 2024. (Board File No. 240549)
7 (Supervisors Peskin; Safai, Ronen, Preston)

- 8 ▪ (Charter Amendment) Charter Amendment (Second Draft) to amend the Charter of
9 the City and County of San Francisco to establish the Affordable Housing
10 Opportunity Fund for Seniors, Families, and People with Disabilities to fund project-
11 based rental subsidies for extremely low-income households consisting of seniors,
12 families, and persons with disabilities, and to require the City to appropriate at least
13 \$8.25 million to the Fund annually starting in Fiscal Year 2026-2027; at an election
14 to be held on November 5, 2024. (Board File No. 240550) (Supervisors Peskin;
15 Safai, Ronen, Walton, Preston, Chan, Dorsey, Mandelman, Melgar, Engardio)
- 16 ▪ (Charter Amendment) Charter Amendment (Second Draft) to amend the Charter of

18 become members of the San Francisco Employees' Retirement System and have

21 and to move public safety communications personnel (911 dispatchers, supervisors,
22 and coordinators) from the miscellaneous retirement plans to the miscellaneous
23 safety retirement plan, for compensation earned on and after January 4, 2025; at an
24 election to be held on November 5, 2024. (Board File No. 240551) (Supervisors
25 Safai; Melgar, Preston, Walton, Chan)

- 1 ▪ (Charter Amendment) Charter Amendment (Third Draft) to amend the Charter of the
