[Urging Implementation of Drug Market Intervention (DMI) Strategy in San Francisco]

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Resolution urging the implementation of a comprehensive drug market intervention (DMI) strategy to address San Francisco's Fentanyl Crisis

WHEREAS, Drug Market Intervention (DMI) is a proven strategy for dismantling openair drug markets, with successful applications in cities such as High Point, North Carolina, where it significantly reduced violent crime and drug trafficking; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Democratic County Central Committee (DCCC), including Speaker Emerita Nancy Pelosi, has unanimously supported DMI, recognizing its effectiveness in addressing open-air drug markets; and

WHEREAS, DMI focuses the criminal legal system on disrupting public drug markets by: acknowledging that enforcement alone cannot eliminate the market and should be minimized whenever possible; prioritizing interagency collaboration between law enforcement, public health, and social service agencies; replacing enforcement with direct communication and deterrence whenever feasible; and providing nonviolent dealers and users with pathways to employment, education, and rehabilitation; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco remains in the midst of a deadly fentanyl crisis, with 633 fatal overdoses reported in 2024—down from 810 in 2023 but still far above pre-pandemic levels; and

WHEREAS, Fentanyl is responsible for approximately 80% of overdose deaths in recent years, with even trace amounts proving fatal, exacerbating public health and safety concerns; and

WHEREAS, The Tenderloin and South of Market neighborhoods account for over 40% of the city's overdose deaths, many occurring outdoors in open-air drug markets; and

WHEREAS, The Tenderloin is home to approximately 3,500 children—the densest population of children in San Francisco—who must navigate these streets daily, witnessing the devastating effects of open-air drug markets; and

WHEREAS, These open-air drug markets have decimated small businesses in the Tenderloin and South of Market neighborhoods, contributing to economic decline and shaping a global perception of San Francisco as a city in crisis; and

WHEREAS, The Drug Market Agency Coordination Center (DMACC), launched in 2023 to enhance coordination among the San Francisco Police Department, San Francisco District Attorney's Office, San Francisco Sheriff's Department, Department of Public Works, and the Department of Emergency Management, has made significant progress, including the seizure of over 300 pounds of fentanyl and more than 2,000 felony drug arrests; and

WHEREAS, Despite DMACC's efforts, enforcement is currently limited to 3-5 days per week, underscoring the need for a sustained and comprehensive strategy to disrupt drug markets and illegal vending markets, and reduce overdoses; and

WHEREAS, The National Network for Safe Communities (NNSC) at John Jay College, led by Professor David Kennedy, has successfully implemented DMI strategies nationwide to curb violent crime and drug trafficking; and

WHEREAS, Adapting this model to San Francisco's fentanyl crisis through a formal engagement with Professor Kennedy and the City University of New York (CUNY) would make San Francisco the first city to implement a fentanyl-focused DMI strategy; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges Mayor Daniel Lurie to make use of the emergency powers recently granted him in Ordinance No. 010-25 (File #: 250040) to engage NNSC to develop and implement a comprehensive DMI strategy as a key

element of the ongoing fentanyl emergency initiative that the legislation made possible; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the full cooperation of city, state, and federal agencies in implementing a comprehensive DMI strategy, coordinated by NNSC and tailored to San Francisco, over a two-year period to systematically dismantle open-air drug markets and expand pathways to treatment and rehabilitation; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That this strategy should involve collaboration among law enforcement, behavioral health professionals, housing specialists, social service providers, and community leaders to reduce overdose deaths, support addiction recovery, and restore public safety in affected neighborhoods; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors recommends allocating necessary resources to fully implement a DMI strategy, including increasing support for workforce and youth development programs, and strengthening community-based drug market disruption initiatives.
