As part of the store concept, I want to have a wine tasting area as allowed under San Francisco Planning Code 790.22 (Subject: Wine Tasting in Liquor Store). Attached is the subsection along with the approved affidavit from city planning.

In order to put in the wine tasting area, I need to obtain a **TYPE 42 LICENSE** as specified in Section 790.22. This will not be for a bar, only to taste wine occasionally (there will not be any seats). This is pretty common around the city. To obtain the 42, I need to apply for a "public convenience and necessity" resolution from the San Francisco Board of Supervisors.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 23958.4 of the California Business and Professions Code, this letter is provided to support a finding that public convenience and

necessity would be served by the issuance of a 42 Liquor License for the above referenced promises.

This is a fine wine store (with a little bit of high end spirits) serving the surrounding community and visiting public patrons Sunday through Saturday. While the wine tasting area will generate a small percentage of our sales, the investment in a 42 License is required as a service and convenience to the customers and as an integral part of the retail experience.

The retail store will prove to be extremely desirable to the public by providing area residents, visitors and walkers with fine wine at a reasonable price. The inclusion of this license (for wine tasting) will allow patrons the same service that they would experience at many other local wine shops. Interpretation:

This Section allows auto sales or rental only on the ground floor as a conditional use in the NC-3 District. The question was whether an auto broker could have an office on the second floor and be considered an office (NC use category .53). The applicant said that the Department of Motor Vehicles would issue a permit only if at least two vehicles for sale would be located on the site. The presence of display cars would make the use an auto sales or rental use rather than an office use and therefore, would not be allowed on the second floor of the NC-3 District.

Interpretation:

Section 790.4 of the Planning Code defines an Amusement Game Arcade (Mechanical Amusement Devices) as a retail use, which provides eleven or more amusement game devices such as video games, pinball machines, or other such similar mechanical and electronic amusement devices. This definition was created when the majority of game arcades used large bulky game machines. With advances in technology, the personal computer replaced most of these old arcade

machines and allows users a variety of functions, including game playing. With relative ease computers have been connected or networked in retail or commercial spaces for the sole purpose of game playing. This Interpretation adds personal computers to Section 790.4 as an electronic amusement device when the majority purpose of the computers are for game playing. Additionally, money does not need to be deposited directly into the amusement devices for the use to be considered as an Amusement Game Arcade.

Furthermore, Section 790.4 discusses the threshold of eleven or more amusement game devices. This threshold is a combination of all amusement game devices, including personal computers and commercially produced game consoles, among other devices.

In terms of the zoning districts where this use is allowed, Section 790.4 is not listed as one of the permitted or conditional uses in the Neighborhood Commercial District chart, nor is it listed as a permitted or conditional use in Section 703.2. Therefore, when there are eleven or more amusement game devices the use will be defined by Amusement Game Arcade and is NOT permitted in the Neighborhood Commercial Districts. If the use has ten or less amusement game devices, the entertainment use is categorized by Section 790.38 Other Entertainment and in most Neighborhood Commercial Districts will require a Conditional Use.

This Section states that within NC Districts, establishments that serve liquor with ABC License Types 42, 47, 49, 61, or 78 are considered "bar" uses. An interpretation rendered in November 1986 had asserted that "a wine tasting room

as part of the retail sales of wine is treated as a bar in the Neighborhood Commercial Districts." It was noted that an exception to this interpretation involves cases in which intermittent and/or occasional wine tasting is offered. This minor and related activity is analogous to the dispensation of sample-sized portions of food items by many grocers. Much as those grocers are not considered to be restaurant uses. liquor stores which provide incidental wine tastings are not considered to be bar uses. Any such tasting would (1) occur entirely during regular operating hours only, (2) take place no more than twice each week for no more than four hours each occurrence and on a further occasional appointment-only basis, (3) not occur on a premises on which any type of permit from the Entertainment Commission is held, (4) not occur in an area physically separated from the main liquor store retail area by full-height partitions or partitions that otherwise prevent clear visual access to and from the main retail area and (5) be limited to one ounce servings and three servings per individual customer per day. Should the liquor store not adhere to each of these five conditions it would be considered a "bar." It was also noted that, pursuant to Ordinance 260-00 which became effective in May of 2000, "retail sales of wine" is now considered to be a liquor store. It was also noted that conditions 4 and 5. above, reflect ABC and Police Department policies at the time of this interpretation, and may be modified should those regulations change. 

- •A conditional use permit (CUP) (Item 11) is a special zoning permit granted after an individual review of proposed land-use has been made. CUP's are used in situations where the proposed use may create hardships or hazards to neighbors and other community members who are likely to be affected by the proposed use. The ABC district office will not make a final recommendation on your license application until after the local CUP review process has been completed. If the local government denies the CUP, ABC must deny your license application.

- (b) The licensed premises are operated continuously without substantial change in mode or character of operation. For purposes of this subdivision, a break in continuous operation does not include:
- (1) A closure for not more than 30 days for purposes of repair, if that repair does not change the nature of the licensed premises and does not increase the square footage of the business used for the sale of alcoholic beverages.
- (2) The closure for restoration of premises rendered totally or partially inaccessible by an act of God or a toxic accident, if the restoration does not increase the square footage of the business used for the sale of alcoholic beverages.
