URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILIES TO CARRY OUT

[Lead Poisoning Prevention - Department of Children, Youth and

WHEREAS, Childhood lead poisoning caused by exposure to lead is the number one environmental health hazard facing young children today; and,

WHEREAS, Exposure to even small amounts of lead can increase children's risks of developing permanent learning disabilities and a variety of physical and behavioral problems; and,

WHEREAS, Lead poisoning is an entirely preventable disease for which there is no medical cure; and,

WHEREAS, There are significant numbers of young children who have been and who are being exposed to lead hazards in San Francisco; and,

WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors enacted the Comprehensive Environmental Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (Program) in 1992 to prevent needless suffering from this disease; and,

WHEREAS, The goals of the Program are to educate all parents and other child care givers about how to protect children from lead hazards, to provide universal screening and testing of children up to

six years of age, to develop a case management system for those found to be suffering from lead poisoning, and to make all public and private facilities in this City lead-safe for children; and,

WHEREAS, The Program set specific tasks and goals for City departments providing family and children services and operating public facilities in a coordinated effort to protect the public health and welfare; and,

WHEREAS, The Department of Children, Youth and Families staff
has many opportunities to provide lead poisoning prevention
information to the parents and other child care givers which they
serve, particularly information regarding the importance of regular
testing for lead poisoning; and,

WHEREAS, The Department of Public Health is required by the 1992 legislation to describe annually to the Board of Supervisors the efforts of all local agencies to comply with the Program and the additional actions needed to implement the Program effectively; and,

WHEREAS, The Department of Public Health has made its annual report to the Board of Supervisors, and that report contains a number of recommendations for the Department of Children, Youth and Families to implement in order to more effectively carry out the Program; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Director of the Department of Children, Youth and Families to implement the Department of Public Health's recommendations set forth in its Annual Report to the Board dated November 12, 1998; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director provide the Board with a written report regarding the Department's progress in implementing the recommendations within 180 days from the effective date of this resolution.
