Motion appointing Mia "Tu Mutch" Satya, Maria Waters, Anwar Mojammel, Alyson Lee-Suzuki (residency requirement waived), and Rob Gitin, terms yet to be determined, to the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee.

MOVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby appoint the hereinafter designated persons to serve as members of the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee, pursuant to the provisions of Administrative Code, Sections 2A.233-2A.234, and Charter, Section 16.108-1, for the terms specified:

Mia "Tu Mutch" Satya, seat 7, new appointment, shall be a person who is a disconnected transitional-aged youth, as that term is used in Charter, Section 16.108, 18 through 24 years of age at the time of appointment, and who is familiar with the issues and challenges faced by disconnected transitional-aged youth and with services, programs, and systems for them, for a two-year term yet to be determined.

Maria Waters, seat 8, new appointment, shall be a parent or guardian of a child, which child is enrolled in kindergarten through 8th grade at the time of the member's appointment for the term. This member shall be from a low-income community or have expertise or substantial experience working to promote the interests of communities of color and shall have demonstrated a commitment to improving access and quality of services for children, youth and families, for a two-year term yet to be determined.

Anwar Mojammel, seat 9, new appointment, shall be a parent or guardian of a child, which child, at the time of the member's appointment for the term, is under the age of 5 years and enrolled in a publicly-subsidized or City-funded program. This member shall have

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demonstrated a commitment to improving access and quality of services for children, youth and families, for a three-year term yet to be determined.

Alyson Lee-Suzuki (residency requirement waived), seat 10, new appointment, shall be a person with expertise or substantial experience working in the field of children and youth services in communities that are low-income or underserved, for a two-year term yet to be determined.

Rob Gitin, seat 11, new appointment, shall be a person who has demonstrated commitment to improving access to and quality of services for children, youth and families, for a three-year term yet to be determined.

FURTHER MOVED, That the Board of Supervisors makes the following findings:

- The membership of the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee has a goal to be representative of the diversity of the City and County of San Francisco.
- Applicant Alyson Lee-Suzuki, who is not a resident of San Francisco, is a person with experience that uniquely qualifies her to serve on the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee.
- 3. The Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee has attempted to fill the position, for which Alyson Lee-Suzuki was nominated, with an individual who is a City resident and who has the specific experience, skills, and qualifications, but has been unable to do so at this time. The Rules Committee has certified that Alyson Lee-Suzuki is qualified to serve on the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee.
- 4. After exercising due diligence, the Board of Supervisors concludes that there is no other possible representative, who is a resident of San Francisco, and who has the specific experience, skills, or qualifications possessed by this applicant, and who is

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willing to serve on the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee at this time; and, be it

FURTHER MOVED, That the Board of Supervisors waives the residency requirement for Alyson Lee-Suzuki, as allowed in cases where no qualified City resident, willing to serve, can be found, pursuant to Charter, Section 4.101(a)(2), that requires person(s) appointed to boards, commissions, and advisory bodies established by legislative act of the Board of Supervisors to be resident(s) of the City and County of San Francisco.

RE: Youth Commission Recommendations for Seat 7 on the Children, Youth, and Families Oversight and Advisory Committee

Pursuant to Administrative Code Sec. 2A.233, seat 7 on the Children, Youth, and Families Oversight and Advisory Committee (OAC) is reserved for "[a] person who is a Disconnected Transitional-Aged Youth, as that term is used in Charter Section 16.108, 18 through 24 years of age at the time of appointment, and who is familiar with the issues and challenges faced by Disconnected Transitional-Aged Youth and with services, programs, and systems for them."

In order to fulfill their duties outlined in the administrative code concerning recommendations for seats 1 and 2, youth commissioners conducted an outreach and application process in which they reached out to youth-serving community organizations across San Francisco to help identify youth interested in serving on the OAC. In the process, they also identified several eligible candidates for the transitional age youth seat, seat 7. Youth commissioners invited OAC youth applicants to an in-person interview, and considered applications at their Wednesday, May 27, 2015 Executive committee and Monday, June 1, 2015 full commission meeting. Youth commissioners reviewed the OAC legislation (BOS File No. 141215) in detail, working carefully first to reach out to, and later select, youth who they believe can provide valuable insight on the diverse experiences and challenges of young people in San Francisco, as well as bring a systems-informed and solution-oriented lens to the work of the OAC.

Youth commissioners are pleased to share their <u>recommendation for Mia Tu Mutch Satya for</u> <u>appointment to seat 7 on the OAC</u>. Youth commissioners found that Ms. Satya is well positioned to bring unique and important insights to the work of the OAC through her own experiences and challenges as a young San Franciscan, as well as her involvement in and dedication toward community programs that serve young people in our City. Her full application is attached for your review.

Ms. Satya, 24, is a student at Mills College, having previously transferred from City College of San Francisco. Mia has worked with several youth-serving community programs, including the Lavender Youth Recreation and Information Center and the LGBT Center Youth Program. She previously served as a youth commissioner for two years where she led work to improve LGBTQ cultural competency in youth-serving city services, Mia served on the Citywide TAY Advisory Board where she led the youth engagement strategy for the reauthorization of the Children's Fund and is a 2014-15 TAY Advocate Fellow. She was previously appointed by Mayor Lee to serve on the DCYF Citizen's Advisory Committee. Mia is a recent graduate of Urban Habitat's Boards and Commissions Leadership Institute. She has heavily invested in building her insight and analysis as a white-identified young person committed to racial justice as a participant in the Anne Braden Anti-Racist Training Program for White Social Justice Advocates, which she completed in 2011. Mia has identified her own experiences as a working class-raised, queer, transgender woman who is formerly homeless and a survivor of violence as experiences that condition her commitment to ensuring equitable access in public services and programs for all youth. It is youth commissioners pleasure to recommend Mia Tu Mutch Satya for appointment to the OAC.

Once again, youth commissioners would like to thank members of the Board for passing legislation providing for the inclusion of three youth seats on the OAC, and look forward to continuing to support the process of confirming youth appointments for the Oversight and Advisory Committee. We hope you will inform our office if commissioners can be of further assistance.

Dear Supervisors Avalos, Cohen and Tang,

As leaders of the nine-year old Community Partnership for LGBTQQ Youth (CPQY), we are honored to recommend Mia "Tu Mutch" Satya for the *Disconnected Transitional-Aged Youth (18-24 yrs old)*" Seat on the Children and Youth Fund Oversight and Accountability Committee.

Presently, Mia serves as a member of the Children and Youth Fund Community Coalition (CYFCC). Mia joined the CYFCC because of her commitment to ensure that the Children and Youth Fund serves the youth with the highest needs. During her tenure as a member of the CYFCC, Mia:

- Facilitated a series of focus groups of service providers, parents, and youth to discuss how best to improve the Children and Youth Fund to strengthen its positive impact on the lives of the children, youth and families of San Francisco most in need;
- Co-facilitated a Youth Focus Group for 25 youth and a Youth Town Hall for 100 youth, where youth gave their suggestions as to how to improve the Children and Youth Fund's impact. She and her co-facilitator, Youth Commissioner Eric Wu, then compiled a report based on the youths' suggestions, and presented it to the Mayor and the Our Children Our City Steering Committee; and
- Was a trainer and speaker for the CYFCC Speaker's Bureau, advising youth, parents, and service providers on how to speak at community centers, political clubs, and places of worship so as to increase the public's understanding of the importance of the Children and Youth Fund.

Further, as a former service provider for homeless youth, and formerly homeless herself, Mia championed the inclusion of services for Transitional-Aged Youth (TAY) in the Children and Youth Fund. She felt their inclusion was critical, as most of the funding streams for youth employment programs and case management only covered services for youth under the age of 18 – leaving out many of the youth most in need of employment and comprehensive wrap-around support – TAY.

In sum, Mia held a critical leadership role in the crafting, campaigning, and ultimate success in building a stronger and more inclusive Children and Youth Fund. She has proven herself to be a dedicated advocate who joined over 1,000 residents working tirelessly over a period of two years for a new and improved Children and Youth Fund.

In addition to her current role as a member of the CYFCC, Mia previously served two terms on the San Francisco Youth Commission. As chair of the Housing, LGBTQ and Transition Age Youth Committee, she researched the City's strategic plans and goals for housing, LGBTQQ youth, and TAY, and met with various city departments to assess their progress and to push for increased funding for the highest need populations. Mia highlighted that LGBTQ youth face intersecting forms of oppression that can result in higher school drop out rates, high unemployment, depression, and self-harm. Because Mia experienced firsthand that having the support of adults is central to save the lives of marginalized LGBTQ youth, she spearheaded the implementation of City Administrative Code 12N, the country's first City-mandated LGBTQ cultural competency training for public sector and nonprofit sector youth service providers. She worked with the Department of Public Health to create a web-based 12N training program that is currently planned for rollout to all City-funded youth serving agencies. Mia also advocated for an increase in services and housing assistance to TAY, and later joined TAYSF's Community TAY Advisory Board to continue this work, ultimately becoming one of two TAYSF Fellows.

Our organizations came to know Mia nearly five years ago when she moved to San Francisco as a runaway queer and transgender youth. Mia moved to San Francisco because she lacked the support from her family and community in Texas where she grew up. Although when Mia first moved to San Francisco she knew no one, she quickly created a community

for herself by getting involved with local organizing with One Struggle One Fight and the ANSWER Coalition. Having accessed housing, health, case management and community through the continuum of services offered by member organizations of the CPQY, Mia built her work and leadership skills through internships at the SF LGBT Center and LYRIC, after which she joined the staff at LYRIC as a Program Assistant. Presently, Mia is a full-time student at Mills College pursuing a degree in Public Policy.

Mia is adept at thinking of the big picture and working towards long-term change, while remaining grounded in the day-today realities faced by youth and the service provider community. This is precisely why we know she will make an excellent addition to the Children and Youth Fund Oversight and Accountability Committee. The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is the State mandated policy and planning body appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education to advise the City on early care and education issues. CPAC's members come from a diverse background and include representation from public agencies, providers, support and resource organizations that serve children and families with infant, toddler, preschool, and school age children.

The passage of Proposition C in November provided for the establishment of a new body, the Oversight and Advisory Committee for the Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families. This body will have a tremendous impact on the city's planning and investments in children and youth in San Francisco for years to come.

Thirty-eight percent of the child population (0-17) in San Francisco are under the age of 5. The tremendous unmet needs of this population was a strong rationale for the increase in the Children and Youth Fund approved by voters in November. For this reason, it is critical that an equitable number of members on the DCYF OAC have expertise, knowledge and experience of the needs and services required by our city's youngest children. Having at least 1/3 of the members on the OAC that represent 0-5 interests will be vital to informing DCYF planning of the Community Needs Assessment and the allocation process for the Children and Youth Fund, and for providing critical input for informing best practices and ensured transparency.

The following applicants for the OAC bring demonstrated experience, expertise and a perspective representing the early care and education community. CPAC recommends that their applications be strongly considered, along with others who are able to bring similar expertise and experience to the Committee.

In addition, I lead our 12 child development sites, serving 595 Early Head Start and Head Start children from prenatal to 5-years-old.

I am writing to you as a native San Franciscan and a family support services provider for the past 10 years in our City's Chinatown. When Ms. Alyson Suzuki informed me that she will be running for a position on the DCYF oversight committee, I thought that it was the most natural decision for her to make. Coming from an immigrant family herself and growing up in a low-income housing project in a big urban city, she exemplifies the struggles that social service providers see everyday in our work with families and children. Her trials and tribulations growing up with monolingual Chinese parents in a new and foreign place helped shaped her experiences and fuel her passion to dedicate her life to helping others thrive. If she were able to help a struggling family jump through fewer hoops, she would have accomplished her purpose in helping this family come closer to reaching their goals.

Ms. Suzuki's work in the community stems from a place that is deeply rooted in her, one, as a first generation Chinese American and two, as a mother of two young boys. Those that know her and have worked with her understands how the latter has helped influence her into becoming a premier advocate for quality early childhood education and care for low-income families with young children. There is no greater trust in the world than when a parent hands over their child to be in your care. At the same time, it is also the hardest decision a parent needs to make when it comes to finding quality care in order for them to secure and maintain employment or go back to school to increase their skills for a competitive job market. It is my honor and privilege to write a letter of support for Ms. Alyson Suzuki to be a part of the DCYF Citizen's Oversight Advisory Committee. I have known Ms. Suzuki through working together at Wu Yee Children's Services over the past six years. I can say that Ms. Suzuki is an inspiration to me and to many other people at Wu Yee and throughout the community.

Ms Suzuki currently holds the position of Chief Programs Officer of our organization. In this capacity she oversees all of the agencies' programs that support low income children and families in the city of San Francisco. Wu Yee is one of two resource and referral centers in San Francisco supporting families on referrals to subsidized care and how to gain access to quality child care. As well, she oversees our Provider's Services departments which support hundreds of family child care providers throughout San Francisco to give quality services to children and families who receive subsidized care from the city.

She took over leadership of the Child Development Department in February 2013. In October of 2013 when agencies throughout San Francisco had the opportunity to apply to be the grantee for Head Start Services, Ms. Suzuki saw that there was a great need in the city for infant and toddler care for low-income families. She guided Wu Yee Children's Services through the application for the Head Start grant to provide an additional 210 infant/toddler slots throughout San Francisco. Wu Yee was awarded this grant and became the largest provider of low income services to infants and toddlers due to Alyson's vision and passion to serve low income families. Wu Yee is now the largest provider of Early Head Start and Head start services in the city of San Francisco and serves over 600 of the city's children and families who fall below the poverty guideline.

Alyson not only supports low income families to access childcare services but all types of services. During her 9 years at Wu Yee Children's Services she has seen a need to support low income families to access other needs. Alyson has been instrumental in supporting the Joy Lok Family Resource Center to be able to serve many needs that the community has. She was the reason why Single Stop services were brought to the Joy Lok Family Resource Center. Joy Lok is one of two agencies in San Francisco that offer these coordinated services to connect people to the resources they need to attain higher education, obtain good jobs and achieve financial self-sufficiency in one stop. I am honored to recommend to you an outstanding member of the community Ms. Alyson Suzuki to participate in the DCYF Oversight Advisory Committee.

Alyson is the current Chief Program officer at Wu Yee Children's Services. When my daughter was accepted into one of Wu Yee's Child Development Centers, I participated in my child's center's Family Committee and served as Chairman of the Early Head Start Policy Council. I met Alyson in this capacity and I have known her for the past three years. During policy council, Alyson actively participated in discussions at each of our meetings, she answered parent's questions and she listened to the views and wishes of parents to improve the child development services.

Alyson understands the feelings of the families and was able to use her leadership and skills to support us to solve the problems related to childcare. For example, one of the largest concerns for families was that the cut-off date for preschool would keep children from receiving childcare services. This cut-off date meant that many children who had been receiving infant/toddler services may not be able to receive services if their 3rd birthday was after September first. Alyson led the effort throughout Wu Yee to have the least amount of transition possible for children enrolled at our centers and child care services remained uninterrupted for families.

Alyson is not only a strong CPO but she is also a mother of two young children. She has worked for the past 18 years working in San Francisco serving low income children and families. She knows how important the child's early education is for low-income families.

One of the things that are unique about Alyson is that she is bilingual in Chinese. She holds a high position at a non-profit and the city and she makes sure that families can have their concerns heard. She can directly communicate with Chinese speaking parents and it helps her to hear directly from parents about their needs.

Alyson is very approachable and everyone can feel her respect for the families that Wu Yee serves. Wu Yee not only provides child care services to San Francisco families but they provide widely comprehensive community services for low income families.

I can share my own journey. I have two children and my family emigrated to the United States in August 2008. After I was able to get child development services the agency also helped me with accessing other services. They helped me through the difficult process that new immigrants go through while helping to educate me about child development and providing me with resources for employment. All of the support that Wu Yee gave me helped me to have a stable family life.

Dear Committee members,

I am writing to support the application of Rob Gitin, Executive Director of At The Crossroads, to become a member of the Oversight and Advisory Committee.

I am a veteran nonprofit director who has worked in the field of youth development since the mid-1980s (my organization founded YO! Youth Outlook, The Beat Within, Roaddawgz, DeBug and co-founded Youth Radio, among other youth media projects). I have known Rob since the earliest days of At The Crossroads, when I helped raise some of the organization's earliest grants. He, in turn, has helped us connect to teens and young adults living on the streets, many of them dealing with drug addictions and mental illness. Over the years we have collaborated on communication projects that helped some of the most disconnected young people in the city find direction and meaning – including Freedom Journal, a journal of writing and art by homeless youth; #FeelBetterCa.org, a public forum and peer-to-peer messaging website to break the silence about youth depression, and Street Souls, a just completed eight week writing workshop with young people from ATC and Larkin.

Rob is unique in his intimate knowledge of what it takes to survive in this increasingly affluent high tech city as a young person transitioning to early

adulthood without a fixed home, without a stable family structure, without a career pathway. He has also mastered what it takes to found and run a nonprofit service organization managing the most unpredictable and hard to track youth population for almost 20 years. He is a front line service provider, connecting with youth of every race and ethnicity; gay or straight; those with serious mental health and substance issues and those dealing with violence and life in and out of jail and thus able to inform your discussions with their needs, ambitions and practical realities in mind.

Thank you for considering me for the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee. I'm very enthusiastic about helping to make sure that all young people in San Francisco have the opportunity to pursue the lives that they want.

17 years ago, I cofounded At The Crossroads, and have been running it ever since. ATC provides disconnected homeless youth in San Francisco with the unconditional support they need to move beyond the streets and to build outstanding lives. We focus on youth who get kicked out of other programs or never set foot in them, prioritizing the hardest to reach, those who have fallen through the cracks.

Our clients are the definition of underserved. 99% have been incarcerated. 60-80% have mental illnesses.

We also work to help make sure that youth from diverse communities stay and thrive in San Francisco: 60% of ATC's clients are African American, and 15% are Latino.

Homeless youth are my passion. Running ATC and working with our kids has been the biggest privilege of my life.

ATC has helped more than 7,000 homeless youth. We have a \$1,100,000 budget, 14 staff members, and are 100% privately funded, having made the choice to not take government support, including from DCYF.

The thing that I'm proudest of is that in 17 years of operation, ATC has never kicked out a single client. Zero. We never give up on anyone. I'm excited to join this committee and to help make sure that San Francisco never gives up on any of its youth, and fights to give every one of them the support they need to have lives of health, stability, and purpose.

I'll work hard on behalf of all youth, not just TAY. My nephew Micah and niece Nina are 10 and 7. They live in Glen Park and attend Miraloma Elementary. I love them more than words can express. I've seen the challenges my sister and brother-in-law face in trying to raise them in an expensive city. And I'm engaged, and my partner and I hope to raise our future children in San Francisco. While my work may focus on the most disconnected young people, I am an advocate for all of this city's youth.

I'm passionate about working with others to improve access to and quality of services for youth. I served on the TAY Task Force. I was then a member of the TAYSF steering committee. I am now the co-chair of the TAY Executive Director's Network. I love being part of a diverse group of individuals working together for a common cause.

I want to see this committee ensure that there is an inclusive, community-based process to inform and guide the priorities of DCYF. It's essential for this committee to strengthen accountability and transparency around how money is spent on our city's youth. I'll bring extensive experience in developing and analyzing budgets, facilitation, and strategic planning to this committee.

1) What communities do you feel connected to and why? How would you represent the diversity of youth in the City and County of San Francisco? (Examples: Queer, Disabled, Homeless, Teen Parent, Low-Income, Immigrant). You are not limited to these choices. Please add your own.)

As the daughter of immigrant parents, I am familiar w/challenges faced by 1st generation immigrants, especially as they struggle w/the language. We were unable to access homework help & parents, unable to communicate w/service providers. I ended up translating at adult appts, missing out on my own opportunities & obligations. I am low income but have been working w/diverse groups of teens for years. I was always exposed to youth from more diverse backgrounds than what I saw at school. SFPL, I work with youth from economic groups who have different perceptions of work. Yet, at the Exploratorium, the youth rely on this job & the money earned to meet basic needs.

2) What special skills, insight and experiences would you bring to this position?

YAC (DCYF) & my work advising the development of teen programs & teen-only space (SFPL), gave me experience collaborating, planning and providing input to city departments around youth programs. I developed my own voice while also advocating for the needs of other youth throughout the city. In Keystone, youth leadership program (BGCSF), I developed my conflict resolution skills. Our charter experienced significant turnover & inconsistent participation which resulted in difficulties establishing consistent priorities & meeting deadlines. I learned to step up & be consistent through transitions, keeping us moving towards our objectives. I am patient & interact well with diverse social groups. I have the ability to form relationships, respect ideas & experiences from Individuals from different economic & cultural backgrounds.

3) What are some of your past experiences as a participant or leader in youth-focused activities?

I have experienced strong communication at SFPL. Youth receive the agenda at least two days in advance, there are consistent reminders of upcoming events & staff encourage youth to communicate any changes in their schedules. Staff notify youth of all program changes. Unfortunately, with other youth organizations, communication has not been as effective or proactive. It is a drag when we have already started working toward our goal & the expectations are changed in the middle. We have to adapt, without necessarily being consulted. Consistency & access should be priorities. Youth respond more positively when there is constant programming & staff and when expectations are known to them in advance. Accessing programs can be another challenge. Children may have difficulties getting to programs independently, or the cost or safety of transportation exclude others. This is made worse when we stop talking about the supports that do exist. When the MUNI youth pllot program started, applications were available in schools who helped submit & youth knew how to access it. This has changed in the past two years and less youth knew where to start.

It is with great pleasure that I recommend Carmen Sosa as a representative on the Youth Commission. I met Carmen 10 years ago when I joined the staff at Boys & Girls Clubs of San Francisco – Columbia Park Clubhouse and have since become her mentor. In the past two years I have seen Carmen blossom and develop her personal voice and advocacy skills which would be a tremendous asset to the work of the San Francisco Youth Commission.

As a child, Carmen missed out on traditional childhood experiences to put family first and take care of her disabled mother. She translated at medical, legal and school meetings/appointments, and took the primary caretaking role of her younger siblings when mom's disability turned into addiction, and her eventual death three years ago. Carmen has never used her experiences as an excuse, and until just one year ago, she didn't realize how extraordinary her choices and behaviors were as she continued to take on personal responsibility at home and leadership roles within her school and community.

As Carmen's voice has developed, she uses it primarily to advocate for others. What started as feeling motivated by what wasn't fair or right has evolved into her ability to identify recommendations and make suggestions. Carmen has been a member of BGCSF for over 11 years, attended Camp Mendocino for 7 years and served as a Leader In Training (LIT) resulting in numerous awards for her leadership, including Best LIT, Most Professional LIT x3, Red C (2nd highest leadership award available at Camp), and BGCSF's 2015 Citywide Youth of the Year.

In addition to her awards, Carmen has been a member of the Board of Advising Youth at the San Francisco Public Library – guiding the development of teen programming and teen-specific space at the Library, filled multiple leadership roles including President and Vice-President with the Keystone Club – a youth advisory and community service program of BGCSF – and was a member of the Youth Advisory

Council with DCYF. In addition to all of this, Carmen also chose to become NERT certified in case of emergency and has completed CPR and 1st Aid Training. She is an extraordinary young woman who manages multiple commitments within her family, community and school.

Carmen's attention to detail, compassion for others, and ability to manage multiple commitments is advanced beyond peers her age. She is a tremendous asset to brainstorming and planning sessions specific to youth and has developed an amazing talent to tell her story and guide others to finding meaning and motivation within their experiences.

My roots are intertwined in these populations, and they have helped me to grow into the motivated, young woman I am today. Additionally, with these multiple intersectionalities, I am able to represent several aspects of City-wide youth. I would be sensitive to the needs of the under-served youth of San Francisco and better understand how to be a strong advocate for them.

I am a product of the SF public school system and currently attend CCSF. Because of this, I am able to give first-hand feedback and knowledge of issues that surround the youth of San Francisco. I have never really paid much attention or cared for budgets until the moment I was told that I was being let-go due to a budget deficit. It was also then that I realized that youth don't see the correlation between their pay or participation with the budget. It is all directly related and they are all impacted greatly when there is a budget problem.

After being let go, I became more interested in how budgets work and how the money is distributed for non-profits. As a past participant from a variety of programs across San Francisco, and committed to serving youth in the Bay Area as a non-profit youth service provider, I am elated with being considered for the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee. It is a grand opportunity to make a change and have my voice heard.

The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is the State mandated policy and planning body appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education to advise the City on early care and education issues. CPAC's members come from a diverse background and include representation from public agencies, providers, support and resource organizations that serve children and families with infant, toddler, preschool, and school age children.

The passage of Proposition C in November provided for the establishment of a new body, the Oversight and Advisory Committee for the Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families. This body will have a tremendous impact on the city's planning and investments in children and youth in San Francisco for years to come.

Thirty-eight percent of the child population (0-17) in San Francisco are under the age of 5. The tremendous unmet needs of this population was a strong rationale for the increase in the Children and Youth Fund approved by voters in November. For this reason, it is critical that an equitable number of members on the DCYF OAC have expertise, knowledge and experience of the needs and services required by our city's youngest children. Having at least 1/3 of the members on the OAC that represent 0-5 interests will be vital to informing DCYF planning of the Community Needs Assessment and the allocation process for the Children and Youth Fund, and for providing critical input for informing best practices and ensured transparency.

The following applicants for the OAC bring demonstrated experience, expertise and a perspective representing the early care and education community. CPAC recommends that their applications be strongly considered, along with others who are able to bring similar expertise and experience to the Committee.

The Children and Youth Fund Community Coalition (Coalition) represents a dedicated network of service providers and advocates that work daily to ensure that <u>all</u> children, <u>all</u> youth and <u>all</u> families get the supports they need to thrive in our great city. We are committed to:

- Ensuring equity, and giving priority to children and youth with the highest need;
- Empowering parents, youth and community stakeholders by giving us all a voice in the implementation of the Fund's vision; and
- Building public trust through advocating for transparency and accountability in meeting
- the needs of children, youth and families.

The Coalition began meeting in the summer of 2012 with the purpose of renewing and strengthening the Children's Amendment. Last November 2014, San Francisco voters approved an increase in the Children's Fund to address many unmet needs in the community including early childhood programs, and services for transition age youth.

An important addition to the Children's Amendment was the creation of a Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee to review the governance and policies of the Department of Children, Youth and Their Families, and to take steps to ensure that the Children and Youth Fund is administered in a manner accountable to the community.

Qualifications

I am pleased to submit my request to serve on the DCYF OAC, Seat 10 or Seat 11, and excited by the opportunity to serve San Francisco's children, youth, and their families in this capacity. Forty-four years ago I organized a group of parents from my Inner Sunset neighborhood and toddler Playgroup to advocate for traffic signals on Lincoln Way at the entrance to the Children's Playground and Fifth Avenue. We told Supervisor Dianne Feinstein and members of her Community Services Committee that trying to cross Lincoln Way with our toddlers, and without a stop signal, was perilous and unsafe. Our voices were heard, and within six months two signals were installed! That small victory was the beginning of my four decades of dedicated service and advocacy for San Francisco's children and families. My three adult children are proud products of the SFUSD, and my four grandchildren are the current beneficiaries of our public schools, pre-k program, and infant/toddler care at City Hall. Their experience as young learners and San Francisco citizens reminds me everyday of how central and critical our coveted DCYFfunds are for ensuring that all San Francisco children have access to the resources and programs that give them the opportunity to succeed.

I believe my professional experience and civic leadership at the city/county, state, and national level have prepared me well to serve in either Seat 10 or Seat 11. In 1971, I was the founding leader and director of the Childcare Switchboard/Children's Council, a grassroots parent led effort to help all San Francisco parents access child care services for their young children. Our emerging model of services to parents looking for child care, and training and support for their child care providers became the model for state legislation (AB 3059, Foran) establishing and funding Child Care Resource and Referral Services as a component of Governor Jerry Brown's Alternative Child Care Program, which was implemented in 1976.

As we listened to the diverse, often desperate, needs of parents from across San Francisco we recognized and documented the shortage of available licensed care in specific neighborhoods including Chinatown, the Mission, Hunter's Point, and the Western Addition. We worked hard to secure funding for outreach and training for home based family child care providers in those areas, especially those with limited English, and secured the partnership of San Francisco State's Department of Social Work Education in a successful application to the federal DHEW-Social Rehabilitation Services for a Child Welfare Training grant. Our grant which established

neighborhood based recruitment and training for family child care providers in English, Spanish, Mandarin, and Cantonese was the first ever use of these federal funds for training child care providers. As we launched our program we were shocked to learn that in 1974, if you didn't speak English you could not obtain a Family Child Care License from the SF Department of Social Services. We worked with the Employment Law Center(Doe vs Obledo) to challenge this unjust interpretation of state licensing standards, and in 1975 the English speaking requirement in San Francisco was removed, allowing more than 75 newly recruited providers to obtain their licenses. Proudly, some of those original recruits are still providing child care today.

The Childcare Switchboard/Children's Council caught the interest of the Ford Foundation, and in 1975 we were awarded one of two grants to develop a model of child care resource and referral services that could be replicated by other cities and states. I became increasingly active in national efforts to expand child care funding in the wake of Nixon's veto of the Mondale-Brademus bill to establish a national child care program in 1971, and was appointed to the National Advisory Panel for Project Connections. In 1976 I was appointed by Governor Jerry Brown to serve as a member of his Child Development Programs Advisory Committee, a newly created body to oversee child care programs and funding in California. I was elected Chair in 1983. Over my nine years on the Committee, I gained insight and skill in understanding the challenges and complexities of child care across California , and still take pride in the research, advocacy, and outcomes we achieved at the state level for children and families birth-twelve.

Here in San Francisco, we advocated for increased engagement on child care issues from the Board of Supervisors and Mayor's office. I served as an appointed member of the Board of Supervisors Child Care Task force from 1976-1977, and in 1978, shortly before he was assassinated Mayor George Moscone embraced our recommendation to establish a Mayor's Office of Child Care, one of the first in the country. Incoming Mayor Dianne Feinstein upheld his vision for the office, and appointed a volunteer coordinator to work on implementation. In 1981, I was appointed by my then District 11 Supervisor, Ron Pelosi, to serve on the newly formed San Francisco Mayor's Office of Child Care Advisory Committee. I was elected Chair, and served in that capacity until 1985. This civic work would be especially helpful if I am appointed to the DCYF OAC.

In 1980, I left my position as Executive Director of the Children's Council to explore the feasibility of establishing a statewide organization of the now 50 child care resource and referral organizations funded in communities across the state. With a travel-study fellowship from the Ford Foundation, I completed the work, and the California Child Care Resource and Referral Network, a statewide membership organization committed to improving the availability, affordability and quality of child care services throughout California, was established. I was selected as the founding Executive Director in October, 1980 and served in that capacity until 2012.

Throughout my years at the Network, I worked diligently to bring attention to California's growing unmet child care needs, and to develop programs, services, and legislative initiatives at the state and federal level to address the enormous gaps in the accessibility of affordable child care, especially for low-income families.

- With the BankAmerica Foundation, I developed an innovative public/private partnership, the California Child Care Initiative Project, focused on building and improving the supply of licensed family child care in communities across California. This partnership was anchored in state legislation in 1987, and became an important and ongoing part of the California Department of Education's quality improvement efforts. The Family Child Care Handbook, a compendium of resources for home based providers, has been reprinted six times and adapted to meet the needs of limited English providers. Training tools and resources have been developed in Spanish, Mandarin, and Vietnamese, helping to build and sustain a supply of quality care in diverse communities, with a special emphasis on infants and toddlers birth to three. What began as an innovative, time limited program is now in its 28th year.
- In 1985, following allegations of child abuse in day care centers in southern California and here in the Presidio, the state Department of Social Services, Community Care Licensing Division selected the Network to develop materials and training on child abuse prevention for all licensed home and center based child care providers in California. The magazine style handbook, <u>Making a Difference</u>, was printed in English, Chinese, and Spanish, and along with two training videos, Out of Harms Way, and Taking Care, were used to support and train more than 25,000 providers throughout the state.
- From 1984-1990, recognizing the need to greatly expand the minimal federal funds invested in child care, I became the Children's Defense Fund California State Child Care Leader for the Alliance for Better Care, an organizing effort that brought together state and national leaders and organizations to develop and support new federal child care legislation. During this effort, and following implementation, I was selected to testify numerous times before Congressional committees. The Child Care and Development Block Grant was finally passed by Congress, signed by President Bush, and implemented in 1990. It brought more than \$87 million new federal child care funds to California.
- In 1995 I was approached by staff at the Jenifer Altman Foundation housed at the Commonweal Retreat Center in Bolinas to discuss my assessment of what was missing from the child care arena, and how the foundation could best use the funds she left for child care. My presentation focused on the lack of parent participation and presence in child policy arenas at every level-local, state, and federal. The initial meeting led to a small retreat for local Network staff, and other child care leaders. The idea for a grassroots, parent led organization focused on recruiting and supporting low income parents to become informed, successful advocates for the child care needs of their children birth-twelve emerged; by the end of the year, the Jenifer Altman foundation made six grants to develop local chapters of *Parent Voices* and coordinated support through the Network. Twenty years later, the eighteen local Parent Voices chapters and their statewide network have become a respected, successful advocacy voice for low income working parents, and a model for other communities and states interested in helping ensure meaningful parent engagement in the policy and budget decisions which profoundly impact their families' economic security and children's futures.

- President Clinton's Welfare Reform program (Temporary Assistance to Needy families) became law in 1996 with profound child care implications for TANF recipients. I was named to Assemblywoman Dion Aroner's Welfare Reform /Child Care working group; we developed an ambitious child care plan which maintained the administration of most TANF child care funds with the local agencies currently serving other low-income families eligible for subsidized child care funds. Our recommendations were adopted and integrated into California's implementing legislation in 1997 which included continuing child care funding (Stage 3) for TANF recipients who had secured employment, were off cash-aid, but who still earning less than 75% of state median income.
- In October 1997, I was honored to be one of ten morning speakers invited to present at President Clinton and Mrs. Clinton's White House Conference on Child Care. I shared vignettes of parents' struggles to find accessible, affordable child care, and was publicly complimented by President Clinton at the end of my remarks.
- In 1998 I was appointed by Speaker Antonio Villaraigosa to serve on the inaugural California Children and Families First State Commission, pursuant to the passage of Proposition 10, the successful ballot initiative to recognize and promote the importance of early childhood education to a young child's success. The State Commission was responsible for allocating 20% of the overall funds, and carrying out specific responsibilities spelled out in the Initiative. I was reappointed by Speaker Robert Hertzberg in 2000. My experience as a State Commissioner during the sometimes tumultuous start up of First Five at the state and county level helped inform me about the intricacies and challenges facing Commissions/committees charged with oversight of programs and responsibility for making funding recommendations.
- In 1999, the Network launched an ambitious research project, <u>The California Child Care</u> <u>Portfolio</u>, a compilation of data about child care supply and demand in California, county by county. This widely disseminated annual publication has brought clarity, focus, and broad attention to our continuing unmet needs for child care for children birth to twelve. It remains a respected, reliable source of information for state, local and national policymakers, business leaders, and philanthropic organizations.
- In 2006, the Network received funding from the Marguerite Casey foundation in Seattle to support the expansion of Parent Voices. Subsequent funding from the Women's Foundation of California, the San Francisco Foundation, and the Peppercorn foundation have helped sustain the growth and effectiveness of Parent Voices. This has been especially important since the dramatic funding reductions to child care in 2008. In 2007, I was named to the Marguerite Casey Foundation's Movement Building Study Group, a leadership council of 20 regional parent/family advocates from five regions in the country including the West.
- One of my last initiatives before retiring in 2012 was the Growing, Learning, Caring Project-a training and support program for Licensed Exempt child care providers. It was funded for nearly four years by the California Department of Education and helped bring training and support to thousands of caregivers previously unrecognized.

Throughout my career I have been dedicated to improving the access, affordability, and quality of child care for all families, especially those with the fewest resources. My work has combined innovative program development, effective fundraising, skilled administration, and tenacious, persistent advocacy. I would be honored to bring these skills to the DCYF OAC, and continue my commitment to San Francisco's children, youth, and families.

To Mayor Edwin Lee Board of Supervisors

The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is the State mandated policy and planning body appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education to advise the City on early care and education issues. CPAC's members come from a diverse background and include representation from public agencies, providers, support and resource organizations that serve children and families with infant, toddler, preschool, and school age children.

The passage of Proposition C in November provided for the establishment of a new body, the Oversight and Advisory Committee for the Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families. This body will have a tremendous impact on the city's planning and investments in children and youth in San Francisco for years to come.

Thirty-eight percent of the child population (0-17) in San Francisco are under the age of 5. The tremendous unmet needs of this population was a strong rationale for the increase in the Children and Youth Fund approved by voters in November. For this reason, it is critical that an equitable number of members on the DCYF OAC have expertise, knowledge and experience of the needs and services required by our city's youngest children. The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is the State mandated policy and planning body appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education to advise the City on early care and education issues. CPAC's members come from a diverse background and include representation from public agencies, providers, support and resource organizations that serve children and families with infant, toddler, preschool, and school age children.

The passage of Proposition C in November provided for the establishment of a new body, the Oversight and Advisory Committee for the Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families. This body will have a tremendous impact on the city's planning and investments in children and youth in San Francisco for years to come.

Thirty-eight percent of the child population (0-17) in San Francisco are under the age of 5. The tremendous unmet needs of this population was a strong rationale for the increase in the Children and Youth Fund approved by voters in November. For this reason, it is critical that an equitable number of members on the DCYF OAC have expertise, knowledge and experience of the needs and services required by our city's youngest children. Having at least 1/3 of the members on the OAC that represent 0-5 interests will be vital to informing DCYF planning of the Community Needs Assessment and the allocation process for the Children and Youth Fund, and for providing critical input for informing best practices and ensured transparency.

The following applicants for the OAC bring demonstrated experience, expertise and a perspective representing the early care and education community. CPAC recommends that their applications be strongly considered, along with others who are able to bring similar expertise and experience to the Committee.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing this letter as a native San Francisco resident. My name is Tracy Brown and if asked to come in and testify to my statements I will be available. You can also call me on my cell phone at 415-509-7266. I am currently employed at the SFUSD.

About six years ago I worked with Vicente Cruz. I was visiting my mother who resides on 24<sup>th</sup> and York on March 31, 2015 when I spotted Vicente. I was on York St. and we made eye contact. I waved I was excited to see him and hear how he was doing. I had not seen him for a few years. The last time I saw him I was the director of a youth service agency and he was enrolled in one of my programs.

He walked over to me with a group of friends and a white unmarked car stopped and told him to go ahead and cross. Then all of a sudden the driver and passenger jumped out of the car and grabbed Vicente. It was 2 police officers. This was on York St. It is a small residential street and many people walk from their cars to their homes. In fact my car was double-parked. As the police officers grabbed him I could not believe that they were grabbing him and telling everyone to back away as if he did something wrong. When I got closer his friend who also crossed the street towards me said that he was being arrested for "jay walking". I was shocked and I actually feel really bad because he was coming over to say hi to me at my request.

I called the Mission station and sent them the photos and videos that I took of the incident. They told me that he was let go. I told them that this looked like racial profiling. I decided to trust that the police would be true to their word. A few days ago Vicente came to ask me for the videos along with the photos of the incident. I did not have time to look for it but decided instead to write this letter to urge you to dismiss the ticket. Most people do this in residential neighborhoods. It is a residential block and not a traffic block. During the time of me watching the incident I witnessed 12 people cross the street in front of the police officers. The police officers then took Vicente as if he was being arrested. As a homeowner in the mission many of us watching outside were shocked that this incident occurred.

In all of the years working with youth and living in the mission I have never seen anything like this with the police. I hope that you will read my letter and dismiss this ticket. While I understand the changing demographics of the Mission I believe that what is fair is fair. Vicente was singled out. I have never seen anyone issued a ticket in this manner.

## From gang member to team player

Luis Aroche's rough youth prepared him for an unusual career: The 'alternative sentencing planner' helps the San Francisco D.A. decide who needs lockup and who deserves another chance.

SAN FRANCISCO - Luis Aroche learned about violence at Leonard R. Flynn Elementary School, across from the projects where his friend Carl lived.

He remembers sitting down at his desk and seeing his teacher, Mrs. Foster, in tears. His class had just finished the Pledge of Allegiance.

"Carl was playing on the swings and got shot," Aroche said. "And died. Kindergarten. He got found laying in a pool of blood in the park," Aroche paused. Swallowed. Started up again. "He was my desk buddy. He would go with me to the bathroom. And now, Carl wasn't there.

"That was my first experience of loss. And I didn't understand it. To this day, I don't understand it."

Aroche since has become something of an expert on violence — as victim, perpetrator and now as part of a hoped-for solution. Last year, San Francisco Dist. Atty. George Gascon hired the former gang member to be his office's first "alternative sentencing planner," part of an effort to keep offenders from ending up back behind bars.

The position, criminal justice experts say, has no equivalent in any prosecutor's office in the country.

And Aroche is as singular as his job. An Aztec skull tattoo stretches down his right forearm to his hand, its grimace partly wiped away by laser removal. The day his juvenile record was sealed, he says, was the happiest of his life.

Today, he helps prosecutors figure out who among San Francisco's low-level offenders deserves a jail cell and who deserves a second chance.

If you were Aroche, 12 years old and living in the Mission District in 1990 — when gangs and crack cocaine meant funerals were as commonplace as *quinceañeras* — you got a tattoo, cut school and drank beer. You thought a stint in Pelican Bay State Prison was like going off to "Stanford or Yale." You practiced how to sit and talk and smoke like the toughest prisoners.

"We would learn how to iron our clothes using a comb, 'cause that's how you iron your pants in prison," Aroche said. "You iron it with the teeth of the comb .. and then you put it underneath the mattress."

Aroche's first tattoo was a small cross on his left hand, in the soft web between thumb and forefinger. He got it in an alleyway not far from the studio apartment where he slept on the floor with his five brothers, three sisters, the occasional niece or nephew. His parents got the bed in the corner.

His Salvadoran mother was a chambermaid at a Fisherman's Wharf motel, his Puerto Rican father a security guard in the Navy shipyards.

And his older brothers? They would disappear for years. Aroche didn't know why until his father took him to visit San Quentin State Prison. They were "main men" in a notorious Northern California prison gang. When they were out, they were "the mayors of the Mission."

By the time Aroche was 15, he was drinking so much and incarcerated so often that he gave himself a test every night before he went to sleep. If he put out his hand and felt warm, smooth drywall, he knew he was home. If he felt cold, slick concrete, he was in custody.

One night he ended up in the hospital. He'd been drunk, hanging out in Lucky Alley, when a car drove up and the doors flew open. Aroche saw his friend get sliced with a machete. Gunshots rang out.

"And I remember some guy grabbing me and hitting me with a crowbar and stabbing me in my stomach," he said. "And I could feel the pierce of my stomach, just ripping me open.... And I thought, this is it. This is my life."

---- the computer in his spartan office at the Hall of Justice, Aroche is poring over the official tale of another life in the balance: a 28-year-old woman on a downward spiral.

The alcoholic, meth-addicted prostitute had lost custody of her toddler son, habitually robbed her aging parents, been in and out of rehab. She also suffered from postpartum depression.

The first time she accosted her father, her parents decided not to press charges. When she was arrested after breaking into their home last year, they refused a

second time. Then in August, high on meth, she in again.

"The mom was just, I'm tired of this.... I'm going to prosecute. I want my daughter to get the help, and I think she needs a stern hand," Aroche said.

The young woman was charged with two counts of felony first-degree residential burglary, with enhancements including elder abuse.

"The prosecution is like, 'This woman can easily see prison time,'" Aroche said as he scrolled through her case. "She burglarizes, is verbally abusive with her parents when she's under the influence. And she's always under the influence. But the prosecution also wondered, 'Will state prison rehabilitate her?'"

That a district attorney's office would even consider the question is "just amazing," said Daniel Macallair, executive director of the Center on Juvenile and Criminal Justice. And what Aroche does on a daily basis is "just so far outside the box of California district attorneys. You'd have a hard time finding it in a public defender's office."

Gascon, the D.A., views Aroche's position — along with a new local sentencing commission — as "a work in progress" and says he hopes his department will become a national model "in how to be smart in dealing with the criminal justice system."

For the woman whose fate Aroche was weighing, not just any rehab would do. Between 2009 and 2011, she'd dropped out of voluntary programs half a dozen times.

His prescription? Let the woman stay in jail and detox. Then, as a condition of her probation, she should be placed into a strict, 24-hour-a-day residential facility called Grace Center for two years. In addition, she should receive case management services from a program called SAGE, for women who have been sexually exploited.

And if she backslides? State prison is still a possibility.

Even Aroche finds himself asking: "You wonder, can probation really save this woman?"

::

It saved Aroche.

At age 16, tanked on a fruity "bum wine," Aroche was hanging out near the Army Street projects around 26th Street and Folsom when he decided to steal a bike.

But the owner was still on it.

"He turned out to be the wrong guy to mess with," Aroche said. "He started whupping on me.... The cops came."

The Juvenile Court judge sentenced him to 18 months at a facility for young offenders called Log Cabin Ranch, south of San Francisco. Bad behavior kept him there for two years.

But at Log Cabin, he read the two things that began to change his life. One was the first book he'd ever finished, "Down These Mean Streets," the memoir of a Puerto Rican street fighter in New York City who went to prison for shooting a cop and, somehow, turned his life around.

The other was a letter from one of his older brothers.

Two years before Aroche landed at Log Cabin, this brother had taken part in an ordered hit on a fellow gang member named Frederico Arevalo. A second man was killed in the attack. Aroche's brother was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

"Hey, Bro," the letter began. "How you doing? Everything's good. How you behaving inside? Don't catch more time. Hey, you wanted to know that my case was over. I'm not coming out."

After reading that, Aroche said, "I sat in my bunk, tripping. Oh, my God. So that means 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, if God allows him, 80, 90 years, he's gonna sit in that cell. And that woke me up."

Aroche was set to be released from Log Cabin in 1996, when he was 18. His prosecutor and probation officer told him they could give him a job or one day lock him up again. They asked him, "What'll it be?"

"They saw something in me that was different and wanted to give me a second chance," Aroche recalled, still sounding a little mystified 16 years later, sitting in a coffee shop across the street from the Hall of Justice. "I said, 'I want a job."

He cleaned pools at Garfield Park. He scooped ice cream at Mitchell's. He got a warehouse stint at MacFrugal's discount outlet. The CalWorks program that taught him to be an ironworker didn't work out (he caught his overalls on fire). But the job counseling at-risk kids at Paul Revere Elementary School did.

He enrolled in City College, then went on to San Francisco State, where he ended up on the honor roll and graduated with a degree in social work. He started working with Project Rebound, a program for ex-offenders. And he got some therapy.

"I had to accept who I was, an ex-offender," Aroche said. "I had to admit that I had PTSD ... that it wasn't normal seeing my friends being shot.

There is still a tinge of "pinch me; am I really here?" in Aroche's demeanor, even though he has worn a badge from the D.A.'s office for nearly a year. A photograph of that laminated ID hangs on the wall of his mother's apartment **D.B.** and **D.** and **D.**

# Student Fights to Reduce Prison Overcrowding



Graduate student Luis Aroche MPA '15 is on the frontlines of the fight to reduce California's overcrowded prisons, now at more than 140 percent of capacity.

In just two years, he's reduced recidivism 19 percent among San Francisco offenders in the volatile 18- to 25-year-old age group, and kept about 90 offenders out of jail or state prison, according to the San Francisco District Attorney's Office. Aroche explains how he's changing the California prison system—all while in grad school »

Aroche, 35, is in a unique position—he directs the city's Alternative Sentencing Program (ASP), the only position of its kind in the country.

He identifies low-level offenders that he believes are the most likely to be successfully rehabilitated and, through in-depth interviews and background checks, tries to gauge how ready they are to reform.

Aroche then works with prosecutors and defense attorneys to create a probationary sentence that avoids jail time but includes at least one mandatory program to help address the root cause of the problem, such as drug rehabilitation, personal and family counseling, or tutoring.

San Francisco District Attorney George Gascón created ASP in 2012 as an alternative to the one-size-fits-all approach to prosecution and sentencing that he says helped create California's over- crowded prisons in the first place.

One success story is a 19-year-old pot smoker who went on a robbery spree with a BB gun in the city's Mission District in 2012. He faced three to five years in prison, but on Aroche's recommendation the young father and high school dropout was ordered to begin drug rehab and take classes in anger management and parenting.

Two years later, he's earned a GED, received custody of his daughter, and works full time.

"Incarcerating him wasn't necessarily going to stop him from smoking or getting a job or schooling," Gascón said.

"I call it smart sentencing," said Aroche, who is an example of successful reform. By age 16, he had been arrested for assault and attempted robbery and spent three years in juvenile detention facilities. While there,

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

br swere incarcerated.

He decided that a life in prison wasn't the road he wanted to take and promised a prosecutor he would change. The prosecutor then helped him land his first job, cleaning swituming pools. Aroche went on to earn a GED and a degree in counseling psychology from the California Institute of Integral Studies.

"I represent the marginalized side of the Latino community. I came from the bottom and know how to go up, and the offenders I see recognize that," said Aroche, who counseled troubled youth before enrolling at USF. "I'm a true believer in the power of a second chance."

Aroche said he applied to USF after learning about its emphasis on ethics, helping others, and community building. "I love every minute of my time at USF. I wouldn't be doing what I'm doing without it," he said.





## In San Francisco, former gang member helps give young offenders a second chance

In the world of criminal justice, Luis Aroche is something of an anomaly. Even though he works for the San Francisco district attorney's office, Aroche fights to keep felons out of prison.

Take, for example, the case of a teenage felon in 2011: an intoxicated 19-year-old Mexican-American, brandishing a BB gun that resembled a semi-automatic weapon, leaped out of a car and set off on a midnight robbing spree in the Mission District of San Francisco.

Few prosecutors would have considered anything less than three years of state prison time for such a crime. But Aroche's responsibility as an alternative sentencing planner-one of only a handful in the nation- is to look past the second-degree robbery charge and delve into the defendant's back story. Aroche recommended anger management sessions and parenting classes, because the 19-year-old perpetrator, whose name he declined to disclose, had no prior crimes, and was about to become a new father.

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"You have your murderers, your rapists, they belong in prison," says Aroche. "We're sending a kid there who is 19 and stole a couple of cars and credit cards. Now he's meeting murderers, gang leaders. What do you think he's going to come back with?"

### RELATED: Immigrants are big business for prison companies

Aroche is charting out a unique precedent for district attorney's offices in the United States. Traditionally, defense teams conduct the research and ask that a defendant pursue substance abuse treatment or a G.E.D. instead of prison time. But with over 150,000 inmates packed into the state's 33 prisons, Californians on all sides of the court are pushing for more options.

"Incarcerating people is very expensive economically and socially," <u>says San Francisco District</u> <u>Attorney George Gascón (http://nbclatino.tumblr.com/post/16838163456/sfs-first-hispanicdistrict-attorney-says-to-pay</u>). A high-school-dropout who later became the chief of the San Francisco Police Department, Gascón spearheaded the city's alternative sentencing initiative. "If we can reduce the likelihood of re-offending, it's a win-win for everybody."

But critics say such initiatives could be detrimental. Victims of the serious offenses that come to Aroche's desk may not be pacified by the perception that the defendant has been let off easy.

"San Francisco is breaking new ground if they're saying to victims of robbery, 'He was young. He was drunk. What we really need to do is try and help him,'" says Scott Burns, president of the National District Attorneys Association. "If you think that type of behavior is going to change, that's naive.'"

Alternative sentencing has a long tradition in prosecution circles, but has gained prevalence in the wake of California Governor Edmund Brown's 2011 Realignment legislation. <u>After federal courts demanded the state shed thousands of inmates</u>. Brown proposed funding to reduce the number of low-level inmates cycling through the state prison system.

(http://www.mcclatchydc.com/2013/01/08/179372/calif-gov-brown-says-job-ofreforming.html) State prison officials say they gladly welcomed alternative sentencing as a way to address offenses without jail time.

"People are different and so are their motives for committing crimes," says Bill Sessa, spokesman for the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. "Alternative sentences shows there's no one-size-fits-all solution."

Aroche intimately understands what the youth he helps keep out of prison go through. The youngest in a family of ten, he envied his older brothers for making money in the local gang while his father, a security guard from <u>Puerto</u> <u>Rico (http://nbclatino.com/tag/puerto-rico)</u>, and his mother, a maid from El Salvador, stressed over the family's finances.

Aroche joined a Latino gang and drank, took drugs and clashed with rival gang members. As he was a skilled boxer who had competed in Golden Gloves, he was often designated to fight for the gang's turf. Once, while drinking in an alleyway with his friends, he was ambushed by a rival gang. "One guy gets out of the car and

strikes my friend with a machete and slices him," he says. "I got cornered and beat up with a crowbar and stabbed in the stomach."

The violence shook Aroche up, but also helped him realize the hopelessness of his situation. "You see so much death you become numb to it," he says.



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After several run-ins with the police, Aroche was sent to a juvenile detention center where he read his first book: "Down These Mean Streets," a memoir by Puerto Rican and Cuban author Piri Thomas about life in El Barrio in Harlem: (http://www.amazon.com/Down-These-Mean-Streets-Thomas/dp/0679781420) The book, as well as the news that his older brother would be spending his life in prison, changed Aroche's outlook. When he was let out, at 18, he told his probation officer he was ready for a job. He went on to attend San Francisco State University and soon found his calling in social work, assisting high-risk juvenile youth.

He says his work immerses him in a part of the Latino community that is largely neglected."I represent the other side of the Latino community. Not the middle class or those fortunate enough to get a better education, but a Latino who came from the bottom and knows how to go up," he says. "I represent the power of the second chance."

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
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

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### To whom it may concern,

This letter serves to support the appointment of Luis M. Aroche to the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee Vacant seat #10. I have known Luis M. Aroche for over two years as he serves on the Advisory Board for City College of San Francisco's Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) Program.

EOPS is a state funded program that serves low-income and educationally disadvantaged students to attain a college education; there are 112 programs throughout California Community Colleges. CCSF EOPS serves formerly incarcerated students (FIS) through its Second Chance program. Mr. Aroche serves this population through the District Attorney's Alternative Sentencing program. As a result, I invited Mr. Aroche to serve on EOPS' Advisory Board as his knowledge base will help to bridge individuals to seek a higher education as an alternative to incarceration.

CCSF EOPS has been serving formerly incarcerated student population since 1976 through its Project Scorpio program; Project Scorpio was revamped and revitalized in the 1990s, and is known today as Second Chance. In Spring 2015, EOPS served 68 students who self-identified through our application intake-process as formerly incarcerated and/or in-recovery from drugs and alcohol; these students opted to participate in EOPS' Second Chance program. EOPS provides to all its student participants the following services: case management, academic counseling services, book voucher services, priority registration, access to computer lab and printing services, graduation regalia, summer bridge, and peer mentor support. Through EOPS' Second Chance program, FIS received additional services: enrollment in Second Chance Psychology Courses (Psych 26, Psych 15), one-time school supply grant, several workshops, community luncheon, peer mentors, and a graduation ceremony dinner.

In his role as an advisory board member, Mr. Aroche has been instrumental in providing feedback and advice to CCSF EOPS on how to better serve the community and students. As a native of San Francisco, he is well versed in the needs of the community especially the needs of children, youth and their families. He will provide a perspective on how to improve the lives of San Franciscans with this point of reference.

In conclusion, I fully support the appointment of Luis M. Aroche to the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee Vacant seat #10.

Using my public policy training and my background in education policy and community engagement, I look to contribute to the OAC's objective of addressing the needs of all young San Franciscans, especially those from low-income and underserved communities.

Dear Honorable Members of the Board of Supervisors Rules Committee:

It is my distinct pleasure to provide a recommendation for <u>Paul Monge-Rodriguez</u>. I have worked closely with Paul since I joined the staff at the San Francisco Youth Commission in January 2013, during his term serving as a youth commissioner appointed by Mayor Edwin Lee.

During the course of his service on the commission, Paul distinguished himself as a highly dedicated, purposeful, and astute policy advocate, public servant, and community organizer. Upon his appointment to the commission in 2012, Paul was elected by his colleagues to serve as the Legislative Affairs Officer. In his role, Paul stewarded the commission's legislative affairs, including reviewing all local legislation for its impacts on youth; preparing his colleagues to offer formal comment and recommendation on referred legislation; and maintaining close relationships with members of the Board of Supervisors.

Paul also served as the vice chair of the Youth Justice committee. The commission's juvenile justice priorities are among our most fast-paced and controversial work. Paul built and maintained strong relationships with police department command staff, the Police Commission, and the Chief of Juvenile Probation. He gracefully navigated the often competing demands of his role as policy advisor to the City alongside his role as a youth- and community-advocate. Because of his capabilities, Paul is widely respected as a grounded and compassionate policy leader by constituencies across our City's political spectrum. Perhaps most notably, he is highly regarded by community organizations and youth service providers both because of his demonstrated commitment to social justice and to building the leadership of directly-impacted and underserved communities, and because of his strategic and judicious approach to policy advocacy.

During his time on the commission, Paul carried forward the commission's work on youth-police relations, including successfully advocating against the arming of SFPD officers with tasers and negotiating the content of a MOU between the police department and our local school district now one of the strongest such documents in the nation. He advocated for recreation-yard access for juvenile detainees and against the arming of juvenile probation officers, earning both local press and New York Times coverage. Paul worked to ensure access to legal representation and streamline the application process for DACA-eligible students in San Francisco. He also authored a resolution calling for the scheduling of Board of Supervisors hearings on youth-related legislation at after school hours, which was subsequently approved as a Board rule. Finally, Paul helped carry forward the commission's transit priorities, including working to cohere the Free MUNI for youth coalition which oversaw the pilot of a free transit program for low- and moderate-income youth. The program has since become permanent and is serving over 32,000 young people in San Francisco.

Paul's dedication to building the leadership of other young policy advocates, especially among immigrant youth and youth of color, is evident in his ongoing mentorship of current youth commissioners. Since leaving his official post as youth commissioner in late 2013 to pursue graduate studies, Paul has stayed in close touch with our office by working with current youth commissioners to address the needs of unaccompanied immigrant youth. He has also volunteered to consult on our training curriculum and led community organizing and policy research training sessions for incoming commissioners.

A struggle I often face in my role as Director is reconciling the passion and urgency youth bring to their advocacy with the actual pace of policy change. However, these apparent contradictions have never seemed to give Paul pause. Paul is simultaneously passionate *and* sensible—highly driven *and* possessed of a remarkably calm and patient countenance. With respect to his vision for civic engagement and community work, Paul is simply one of the most compelling and sophisticated people I have had the privilege of knowing. Moreover, his policy and intellectual acumen are outstanding. Over and on top of these skills, however, Paul has been successful as a public official and in the community because of his deep commitment to public service and his palpable integrity – both of which are borne from Paul's powerful personal story as a first generation immigrant of Salvadoran parents who fled civil war.

Personally, it has been a privilege to work with Paul often. In fact, it is difficult to imagine our work over the last years having gone so well without Paul. I look forward to his continued leadership in San Francisco, and have no doubt that he would go above and beyond the call of duty in his efforts to ensure equitable access and quality services for the youth and children of San Francisco. Without hesitation, I offer my highest recommendation of Paul for appointment to a seat on the Oversight Advisory committee. Please do not hesitate to contact me to further discuss his merits.

#### **Board Qualifications:**

The Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee (Oversight and Advisory Committee) was established pursuant to Charter, Section 16.108-1 (adopted by the voters as part of Proposition C at the November 2014 election), to review the governance and policies of the Department of Children, Youth and Their Families (DCYF), to monitor and participate in the administration of the Children and Youth Fund, and to take steps to ensure the Fund is administered in a manner accountable to the community.

The Oversight and Advisory Committee shall consist of eleven (11) members, as follows:

Appointed by the Mayor (effective 30 days after transmittal of the "Notice of Appointment" to the Board of Supervisors, who may hold a public hearing but cannot reject the appointment) > Seat 1: A youth 19 years old or younger at the time of appointment for the term, recommended to the Mayor by the Youth Commission (this member is not subject to the elector requirement since they may be younger than 18 years old).

> Seat 2: A youth 19 years old or younger at the time of appointment for the term, recommended to the Mayor by the Youth Commission (this member is not subject to the elector requirement since they may be younger than 18 years old).

> Seat 3: A parent or guardian of a youth, which youth, at the time of the member's appointment for the term, is under the age of 18 years and enrolled in the San Francisco Unified

School District. This member shall have demonstrated commitment to improving access to the quality of services for children, youth and families.

> Seat 4: A person with expertise or substantial experience working in services and programs for children ages 5 and younger.

> Seat 5: A person with expertise or substantial experience working in the field of children and youth services in communities that are low-income or underserved.

> Seat 6: A person who has demonstrated commitment to improving access and quality of services for children, youth and families in communities that are low-income or underserved.

Appointed by the Board of Supervisors

> Seat 7: A person who is a disconnected transitional-aged youth, as that term is used in Charter, Section 16.108, 18 through 24 years of age at the time of appointment, and who is familiar with the issues and challenges faced by disconnected transitional-aged youth and with services, programs, and systems for them.

> Seat 8: A parent or guardian of a child, which child is enrolled in kindergarten through 8th grade at the time of the member's appointment for the term. This member shall be from a low-income community or have expertise or substantial experience working to promote the interests of communities of color and shall have demonstrated a commitment to improving access and quality of services for children, youth and families.

> Seat 9: A parent or guardian of a child, which child, at the time of the member's appointment for the term, is under the age of 5 years and enrolled in a publicly-subsidized or City-funded program. This member shall have demonstrated a commitment to improving access and quality of services for children, youth and families.

> Seat 10: A person with expertise or substantial experience working in the field of children and youth services in communities that are low-income or underserved.

> Seat 11: A person who has demonstrated commitment to improving access to and quality of services for children, youth and families.

Exclusions: Current City employees who are at the department head or deputy department head level of authority, San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) employees who are at the Director or Assistant Superintendent level of authority or higher, and current employees or members of the board of directors for organizations where DCYF is the decision-maker for funding may not serve as members of the Oversight and Advisory Committee. A part-time intern with a DCYF-funded organization who is 24 years old or younger shall not be considered an employee of that organization.

The Mayor and Board of Supervisors shall appoint the initial members by July 1, 2015. The terms of the initial appointees shall commence on the first date of the meeting and no later than July 1, 2015. Members may not serve more than two consecutive two-year terms, except that the members initially appointed to seats 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11 shall serve for a first term of three

years. Serving more than half of a term shall count as serving a full term.

The Department of Children, Youth and Their Families shall provide staffing for the Oversight and Advisory Committee and the Youth Commission shall provide support to the members in seats 1, 2 and 7.
