

Earlier this month I announced measures to provide financial relief to San Francisco businesses and their employees, including the new San Francisco **Workers and Families First Paid Sick Leave Program**. The program includes \$10 million in funding to support businesses and nonprofits to provide additional paid sick leave to employees, over and above their existing policies. The goal of the program is to reduce short and long-term economic impacts on San Francisco businesses and their employees caused by COVID-19.

Within 24 hours of the application being published late last Thursday, more than 100 San Francisco businesses had submitted pre-approval applications amounting to \$1.6M, and by the close of business on Monday, the number had more than doubled to over 260 applications requesting more than \$3.5M in support.

All San Francisco businesses are eligible, with up to 20% of funds reserved for small businesses with 50 or fewer employees. The Controller's Office is updating its policy guidance to City departments and nonprofit service providers regarding continuity of payment in light of disruptions related to COVID-19. This guidance issued on April 4, 2020 supersedes prior guidance on this topic. This policy may be updated periodically as the response to COVID-19 changes.

Nonprofit suppliers deliver essential services to San Francisco residents on behalf of and funded by the City and County of San Francisco. The public health emergency related to COVID-19 creates a variety of disruptions to provider operations. It is still the City's intent to support the sustainability of nonprofit suppliers by continuing to provide full or partial payment in the event of programmatic closures that are in accordance with official public health recommendations. The new policy also clarifies expectations for the continued operation of essential services and the potential re-designation of essential services. Finally, the policy encourages flexibility in budgeting to allow nonprofits to adjust current contract budgets to address changing needs.

Policy [April 4, 2020 Update]:

Continuity of Payment for Nonprofit Suppliers in the Event of COVID-19 Related Disruptions

General Policy

Nonprofit suppliers deliver essential services to San Francisco residents on behalf of and funded by the City and County of San Francisco. As of March 17, 2020, the San Francisco County Health Officer issued a "Shelter in Place" order which required non-essential services to be delivered remotely or to close if remote delivery is not possible. The order also indicated that service essential to life, health and safety should continue, though should be offered remotely if possible or with social distancing in place if face to face service is required.

Disruptions related to the COVID-19 public health emergency will have implications for cash flow, as the City typically only pays for actual services rendered. This policy is intended to clarify guidance regarding allowability of City payments to nonprofit suppliers in the event of closures of non-essential services related to COVID-19. Additionally, the policy clarifies that essential services may be required to stay open (either fully or via remote work), and may incur extra costs associated with staying open.

Closure of Non-Essential Services

It is the City's intent to support the sustainability of nonprofit suppliers by continuing to provide full or partial payment in the event of programmatic closures that are in accordance with recommendations from the San Francisco County Health Officer. City departments funding nonprofit suppliers delivering non-essential services should continue to pay for services through May 3, 2020 the current duration of the Shelter in Place order in San Francisco. This includes programs that closed entirely and those being delivered remotely, according to the following procedures and guidance.

Re-Designation of Services and/or Workers from Non-Essential to Essential

The City may change its determination of which services are deemed essential services based on the needs of the public health emergency and the City's response plans. Suppliers may have been initially informed their services are non-essential and should close if remote work is impossible, and later be asked to reopen to deliver essential services. In these cases, it is the City's expectation that suppliers deliver essential contracted services when requested, and failure to do so will result in the City discontinuing payment.

As the City assesses its operational and workforce needs in responding to the public health emergency, it may require nonprofit staff to serve in new functions in essential City services. The City may require non-essential nonprofit workers to perform new essential functions on behalf of the City, such as supporting emergency shelter operations. If required to perform such services, the City will revisit contract budgets as needed to ensure workforce needs are met.

Continued Operation of Essential Services

Departments have designated certain services performed by nonprofit suppliers as essential to continue during the Shelter in Place order, either in person or remotely depending on the service. These services

are essential to the life, health and safety of residents, and it is the City's expectation that these services continue, and continuity of payment is contingent upon ongoing service delivery.

- In some cases, departments may request the existing service expand (e.g., increasing food deliveries), be offered to a new population (e.g., providing childcare to first responders) or be offered in a different way (e.g. congregate meal sites provide meals to go). In these cases, departments will adjust contracts to accommodate any approved increase in costs associated with the change to the essential service.
- In some cases, continuing such services while accommodating the social distancing requirements may incur new costs (such as IT expenditures associated with remote work). If approved by departments, these costs may be funded directly or via enhanced budget flexibility (see below).

Location-Specific Closure

If a specific instance of COVID-19 is found at an essential program site remaining open during the Shelter in Place order, that location may need to temporarily close. City departments funding the program should continue to pay for services during this temporary closure according to "Procedures for Continuity of Payment for Closed or Reduced Services" specified below.

Service Level Impacts

Some essential service providers with fee-for-service contracts may remain open during the Shelter in Place order but will likely experience lower-than-expected services levels due to social distancing requirements. This may lead to reductions in the funding that provider typically receives based on the fee-for-service model. These contracts are typically with the Department of Public Health (DPH).

Budget Flexibility

As the City and its nonprofit contractors adjust operations to respond to the public health emergency, City departments should allow nonprofit suppliers the flexibility to adjust contract budgets to accommodate new needs and adaptions to service models. This includes funding new items not previously budgeted (e.g., IT expenditures related to remote work) or increasing funding to existing items (e.g., salaries) within the current contract budget. Departments should develop minimally burdensome procedures for review and approval of such budget adjustments, including allowing an extended timeline for submissions when needed.

Procedures for Continuity of Payment for Closed or Reduced Services

- A. Suppliers should notify all funding departments of a closure or impacted program, including whether a closure is location-specific or due to the City's Shelter in Place order, and/or why the service level may be impacted. If the closure is location-specific, suppliers should indicate the specific rationale for the closure, which should be reasonable and associated with City policy guidance.
- B. Suppliers should identify and thoroughly document all expenditures associated with the closed program(s). Documentation (i.e., payroll records, receipts) must be retained to justify expenses, and to support claiming for City funding:
 - Fixed and regular costs (such as rent, utilities, salaries): these costs will continue to be incurred and should be paid normally.
 - o Hourly employees (including those that would not otherwise be paid when a program is not operating) should be paid the anticipated wage during the closure.
 - o If there are any expenses that will not be incurred due to the programs closure (e.g., avoided food or travel costs for canceled programs), these should be identified and

- excluded from invoicing. If these costs have been incurred prior to the closure, they should be paid by the contracting department.
- While these expenditures may be billed using a regular monthly invoice template, the
 expenses related to a closure should be able to be isolated and available upon request
 to allow the City to seek reimbursement for these specific costs.
- C. Suppliers with Cost Reimbursement contracts should invoice for the month, but should be flexible and responsive to departmental requests for additional documentation about expenditures during closure, which may include (per departmental needs) documentation of specific services that were expected but unable to be delivered, and costs associated with those services.
- D. Suppliers with Fee-for-Service contracts (i.e., primarily DPH suppliers with contracts with services billed based on units actually provided) should invoice for the month by calculating 1/12th of the contracted units of service, and should be prepared to offer documentation of specific services that were expected but unable to be delivered. For Medi-Cal covered services, DPH will ensure that the cost report settlement process appropriately accounts for the actual cost of services, and DPH expects all units of service to continue to be entered into AVATAR unless notified separately by DPH.
- E. Departments will need to ensure funding is available to pay for canceled services, closed programs or reduced service levels. In particular, departments should ensure federal or state grants are not used to pay for canceled services. If a contract receives federal, state or other grant funding that will not cover the cost of the closure, departments should work with the Controller's Office to ensure General Fund sources are available to pay these costs as feasible and appropriate, and, if not, to determine whether to request additional appropriations to support them. While it is the City's intent to support the sustainability of essential services by backfilling federal and state grants with General Fund, this may not be feasible or appropriate for all contracts, and departments may exercise discretion in determining how to fund services.

Questions and Current Guidance

1. What services are essential and should continue operating during the Shelter in Place order?

City departments are in the process of determining which programs and services are essential during the public health emergency, and designations may change as the City adjusts its response. Some essential and non-essential services may also be delivered remotely when possible. Non-essential services that cannot be delivered remotely may need to close or adjust operations. Closures may occur at the program level, meaning some nonprofit suppliers may need to close some programs but continue other essential services. Specific guidance will be issued by each department to its suppliers, and department staff may follow up directly with nonprofit suppliers to further clarify expectations.

Essential programs that remain open should adjust operations to accommodate social distancing protocols per the order. Depending on the program, this may include limiting the number of staff and/or clients on site, closing non-essential components of programs that cannot be operated remotely, and/or requesting staff telework or otherwise use virtual tools to support continued operations.

Closed programs should follow procedures regarding "minimum basic operations" per the Shelter in Place order.

2. Will the City reimburse the cost of event-specific cleaning of program sites in the event of an actual case of COVID-19? If so, what is the process? Will the City fund the cost of cleaning and other emergency preventative expenses that would not be typically incurred?

Should a provider of an essential service believe that an employee or client at a program site has been diagnosed with COVID-19, they should contact all funding departments to notify them of the need for closure and cleaning. The City will work with the provider on cleaning and other protocols during the closure, and will reimburse the provider for costs incurred provided it is consistent with public health advice.

The City may issue separate policy guidance on this issue more broadly, and if that occurs, this guidance will be updated. The City is currently exploring how to deliver augmented cleaning services and other supplies at service sites with large vulnerable populations, with funding which would be separate from current funding to nonprofit suppliers.

However, while other City-funded programs may also request such services, some essential supplies may be limited and should be prioritized for specific vulnerable populations in congregate settings. The Department of Public Health has issued guidance regarding appropriate routine cleaning practices for non-healthcare settings, available here: https://www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/files/COVID19-Cleaning-Environmental-Businesses-Agencies-24Feb2020.pdf. If a nonprofit serves vulnerable populations in congregate settings and believes augmented cleaning services and supplies are necessary, these requests will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Contact your funding department to request this support. Departments receiving such requests should contact your Department Operations Center (DOC) or Emergency Operations Center (EOC) representative to identify the need.

3. Some essential service providers may remain open but experience lower-than-expected service levels, e.g., if a provider typically receives referrals from a school site that has closed while the provider remains open. If these services are funded via a fee-for-service contract, will the City fund the full cost of these services when actual units of service decrease below a sustainable level?

Nonprofit providers of essential services should continue delivering services and documenting them as required by departments. Most fee-for-service contracts are within DPH. If a DPH nonprofit provider is seeing lower-than-expected units of service related to COVID-19, please contact your DPH Contract Development and Technical Assistance (CDTA) program manager to report your concerns. If increased support is necessary as it relates to the COVID-19 response, suppliers will be instructed to follow Procedure D above to receive funding in light of decreased service levels. The City's general policy goal is to support service providers experiencing disruptions due to the declared public health emergency.

4. Will nonprofit service providers be required to attend department-mandated meetings in person?

To comply with the Shelter in Place order, City departments should cancel or postpone any nonessential meetings, and should ensure essential meetings can be held by conference call or online, as feasible.

To Whom It May Concern:

We hope this message finds you well during this unprecedented global crisis. We are a group of concerned City and County of San

Francisco (CCSF) employees. We commend the City for quickly responding to the COVID-19 pandemic by enacting Health Orders No. C19-07 & C19-

07b. However, the requirements of these Health Orders have not and continue to not be applied to many CCSF employees. San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) and San Francisco Department of Public Health- Environmental Health (SFDPH-EH) employees are facing an additional crisis of inequity and lack of safety- thereby further compounding the devastating effects of Covid-19. Since the implementation of the first health order, insufficient action was taken by upper management to protect the health of their staff. As it stands, there is a disproportionate burden of exposure placed on City employees.

Health Order No. C19-07b states, "Essential Businesses are directed to maximize the number of employees who work from home. Essential Businesses may only assign those employees who cannot perform their job duties from home to work outside the home." As of April 3, 2020, SFMTA and SFDPH-EH have **not yet complied** with this requirement of the Health Order.

Even after the Shelter in Place Health Order went into effect on March 16, 2020, SFMTA and EH employees continued to be forced to work in conditions that could adversely affect their health and perpetuate the spread of this deadly virus. As

we approach the end of the third week of the Health Order, Directors Jeffrey Tumlin and Stephanie Cushing have been dismissing and minimizing concerns of their staff. After the second health order was implemented that departments have actually only begun to take some formal action, however it simply is not enough.

SFMTA Transit Operators are not afforded the same protections as neighboring counties. STFMA Transit Operators are risking their lives every day while working without PPE and in buses that do not adhere to social distancing requirements, while their colleagues in San Mateo are afforded these essential public health rights.

Furthermore, it has come to our attention that all of the seven counties in the Bay Area have required their EH staff to adhere to the Health Order since it's implementation, with the exception of the City and County of San Francisco. In fact, some Bay Area counties have even *mandated* their staff to work from home. EH staff in other Bay Area counties are exclusively working from home and are on standby to perform critical field work when necessary. This discrepancy is contradictory to basic public health principles and hypocritical of the mandates set forth by our Mayor, Governor, CDPH, and CDC.

One week after the Health Order went into effect, San Francisco EH staff were granted the opportunity to work from home every other two days beginning March 23, 2020. When they must report to the office and/or conduct field visits, they are provided with insufficient personal protective equipment (PPE). For example, field visits are conducted by EH staff without masks in Single Room Occupancy dwellings, in close proximity to COVID-19 positive individuals. The Department is requesting that EH employees have direct face to face interactions with the public.

It is important to note that there are a number of employees who are or live with vulnerable populations. This includes individuals over 60, with underlying health issues, and those with young children. These are people who are at greatest risk of infection from this virus and could therefore become gravely ill. This is compounded further because if infected, they become carriers who can spread the virus to others in the community. As such, we are potentially contributing to community spread that is already occurring exponentially, rather than mitigation and prevention. This is exactly what the Department of Public Health is working tirelessly to prevent.

We are committed to the health and safety of our community. We understand the severity of this virus and are justifiably concerned. While there is still much to be learned about this virus, leading public health professionals, including CDC Director Dr. Robert Redfield, have cited new data that shows high rates of transmission from people who are infected but show no symptoms, up to

25% of all infected cases. Dr. Redfield has stated, "That's important, because now you have individuals that may not have any symptoms who can contribute to transmission, and we have learned that in fact they do contribute to transmission." Researchers have even suggested that this virus may be transmitted by talking and breathing. Performing our job duties under the current circumstances and without the necessary PPE and social distancing requirements puts ourselves, our coworkers, and the public we serve at risk of contracting this virus. These face to face interactions promote the spread of the virus within our communities, further exacerbating this public health crisis. Everyday thousands of people in the US are confirmed positive with Covid-19. Every day more and more lives are lost to this insidious, indiscriminate pathogen.

A City Employee Alert emailed on March 16, 2020 stated that "employees performing essential services must still **report to work** and those that can perform their work remotely must continue to do so." Director Stephanie Cushing forwarded this email to EH staff adding, "As you can see, all Department of Public Health employees are expected to **come** to work." We believe that "report to work" can mean performing duties from a remote location or designated workplace. We believe we can continue to serve the city while working remotely and while standing by to deal with critical situations in the field under certain conditions.

As per the San Francisco Department of Human Resources webpage, "Employees performing essential services must still report to work and those that can perform their work remotely must continue to do so." We appreciate our roles as Disaster Service Workers and are committed to serving the City and community either working from home or from the Department Operations Center, in the event we are activated to the Emergency Operations Center.

The novel coronavirus, COVID-19, is a new virus and the situation is rapidly evolving every moment. Leading scientists and public health professionals have reaffirmed that when there is so much uncertainty and when the risks are so high, **every possible precaution should be taken.** In alignment with neighboring Bay Area counties, EH staff are prepared to exclusively work remotely from home and are prepared to report to the office and conduct *essential* field work when necessary and *only* if adequate PPE is provided. We urge that this be implemented for the duration of the Health Order, just as other Disaster Service Workers, including our colleagues within the City and in the neighboring Bay Area counties. SFMTA transit drivers **must** be given adequate protection. We must be able to perform our job duties while protected and **in adherence** to CDC guidelines and both Health Orders.

We understand that this health crisis is unprecedented, challenging, and unlike

anything the City had to address in the past, however it is concerning that the City and County of San Francisco is not taking the same protective measures for their employees as other neighboring counties. The City and County of San Francisco banded with other Bay Area county health officials to institute a Shelter In Place Order because a perilous virus with exponential transmission rates requires immediate and extreme protective measures. These efforts and sacrifices would be futile if City employees are not held to the same standard that is necessary to curb the spread and minimize the devastation caused by this virus.

The "Shelter in Place" Order was astutely extended to May 3, 2020 to prevent further spread of COVID-19. According to leading public health experts, the next 30 days are crucial. In this pandemic, every moment is critical. Every quick action to protect public health and prevent illness of our community can have significant impact, while lack of necessary action would have devastating adverse effects on our community at large. Please investigate this matter and extend us the same consideration as our colleagues. Please help us ensure that our City is in compliance with the Health Order and in alignment with neighboring Bay Area counties. Please respond as quickly as possible to help protect our health and help curb the spread of this vicious illness. We simply are requesting that the lives of all City and County of San Francisco employees are valued as much as much as the public that we serve. We appreciate your timely attention to this matter.

Our family business, Outerlands, has proudly served the Outer Sunset for 11 years. Upon notice of the SF Shelter in Place Mandate on March 16th, our full service restaurant of 50+ employees was downsized overnight to a tiny to-go operation, leaving 90% of our staff unemployed. Revenues were by far insufficient to cover remaining staff or other operating costs. On March 30th, out of concern for staff amid the continuing rise of COVID 19 cases in SF, we fully closed our doors. We are at risk of losing our business and our home, and our staff may permanently lose their jobs.

The effect of closures on the restaurant industry has been particularly hard-hitting, since cash reserves are typically minimal for small restaurants like ours. Our industry simply does not operate with the kind of capital needed to survive this crisis, and aid programs such as the PPP have not addressed the unique challenges restaurants face. Those restaurants that do manage to reopen their doors once the pandemic crisis has ceased will be up against serious long term effects: debt loads that exceed income resources, narrowing of an already slim workforce, and gaps in the supply chain due to the effects of closures on industry vendors and services.

As you are well aware, COVID-19 presents an unprecedented threat to us all. However, even though we are all at risk of contracting this disease, people living outdoors and in shelters are poised to suffer far more- and spread the disease faster- than those of us who are lucky enough to be housed.

I urge you to do everything in your power to get people off of the streets, out of the shelters and into clean, private, safe hotel rooms IMMEDIATELY. The sooner this happens, the fewer new cases our citizens will have; it is as simple as that.

The City has thus far been bold and decisive in taking action to mitigate the impacts of this ruthless disease- and our efforts are paying off. You must now be willing to act boldly again, and do whatever it takes to get people inside and out of harm's way.

There is no justification for anyone sleeping on the street when there are an estimated 40,000 hotel rooms sitting empty in our city right now. Using these rooms as temporary shelters is the only morally acceptable solution; it is also the only epidemiologically responsible one. This cannot wait.

Thank you for your leadership in these harrowing times. I look forward to supporting your efforts to immediately house our homeless neighbors in any way I can.

My organization, Community Housing Partnership, represents formerly homeless SRO residents who are currently being impacted by the COVID-19 crisis. I am writing to you to urge you to take the following actions to ensure incarcerated people are protected in this health crisis, and to clarify the following questions.

- 1. Unhoused people being released from jail, who may have been exposed to COVID-19 while inside the jail, should be a priority population included in the next round of hotel rooms coming online, including the 1200 currently secured.
- 2. Additionally, since there are known sheriff's deputies and inmates who have tested positive for COVID-19, we urge all those released to be tested as more tests become available.
- 3. We support the thousands of hotel beds coming online and know there is great need-- more options for beds should be explored including college dormitories, school facilities, public parking lots for ad hoc facilities, etc. to ensure the most vulnerable and high risk residents have this support.
- 4. While there are no current public statement or reports by Police or Sheriff verifying that persons released from jail on electronic monitoring (EM) have been arrested or fined, we request that both Police and Sheriff publicly verify that no person on EM will be arrested or fined unless in the process of committing a violent crime.
- 5. Are essential services run through nonprofits (like Pretrial services, supportive housing sites, etc) being given support from city in terms of health & safety training and protective gear?
- 6. Data sharing between service providers. As non-profit service providers, we request, as it is possible, to make transparent specific data related to numbers of incarcerated who are being released (housed and unhoused) on a daily basis. This will make it easier to collaborate amongst providers (city agencies as well as community based providers) to know who is being housed coming out of the jail system.
- 7. Make information public. We request that the City commit to weekly public updates about the of hotel rooms online and how many are being set aside for what purpose and population. The Sheriff should also make public his daily count in the jail and the number of people released each day, including how many are unhoused.

Dear elected officials and department staff,

My organization, San Francisco Rising, represents low-income communities of color which are currently being impacted hardest by the COVID19 crisis. We know that the majority of people who are incarcerated in San Francisco are Black and Latinx, as well as unhoused people. I am writing to you to urge you to take the following actions to ensure incarcerated people are protected in this health crisis, and to clarify the following questions.

- 1. Unhoused people being released from jail, who may have been exposed to COVID19 while inside the jail, should be a priority population included in the next round of hotel rooms coming online, including the 1200 currently secured.
- 2. Additionally, since there are known sheriff's deputies and inmates who have tested positive for COVID19, we urge all those released to be tested as more tests become available.
- 3. We support the thousands of hotel beds coming online and know there is great need-- more options for beds should be explored including college dormitories, school facilities, public parking lots for ad hoc facilities, etc. to ensure the most vulnerable and high risk residents have this support.
- 4. While there are no current public statement or reports by Police or Sheriff verifying that persons released from jail on electronic monitoring (EM) have been arrested or fined, we request that both Police and Sheriff publicly verify that no person on EM will be arrested or fined unless in the process of committing a violent crime.
- 5. Are essential services run through nonprofits (like Pretrial services, supportive housing sites, etc) being given support from city in terms of health & safety training and protective gear?
- 6. Data sharing between service providers. As non-profit service providers, we request, as it is possible, to make transparent specific data related to numbers of incarcerated who are being released (housed and unhoused) on a daily basis. This will make it easier to collaborate amongst providers (city agencies as well as

- community based providers) to know who is being housed coming out of the jail system.
- 7. Make information public. We request that the City commit to weekly public updates about the of hotel rooms online and how many are being set aside for what purpose and population. The Sheriff should also make public his daily count in the jail and the number of people released each day, including how many are unhoused.

I am an undocumented resident of SF. I depend on certain businesses to be open to support myself financially. We are now in the fourth week of the shelter in place order from the city of SF and the State of CA and it is literally killing me. I have used up all my savings. I no longer have money for the basics like food and laundry. Worse, I am about to lose everything I need to be able to support myself.

I can't pay my phone bill or my po box and without it I will be completely isolated and unable to get news updates regarding covid-19.

My vehicle registration is due this month and I received a notice from the dmv that they intend to suspend my registration because I can't pay for my car insurance.

Even if I survive the remainder of the shelter in place order by some miracle (who knows when that will be) without my car, phone and po box I wont be able to earn any money.

Obviously I am not the only undocumented resident of SF who is in this position and while other residents can file for unemployment or money from the 2 trillion dollar stimulus package undocumented resident of SF can not!!!

Undocumented residents are an important part of the daily life in SF and we contribute to the econemy on a daily basis but we are being overlooked when it comes to the city trying to help its most vulnurable residents.

State and ferderal government is not going to help us so sanctuary cities like SF need to step up. Lets not forget a lot of undocumented residents do pay income tax and local tax (purchasing goods, pay parking tickets, pay for permits, etc..).

You need to send up a fund (city money, donations, etc) to provide financial aid to residents like me who can no longer support themselves due to the shelter in place orders which is killing us only a little bit slower than covid-19 could.

New Concept for SF Real Estate Management Department:

Two programs for developing affordable housing that could be enacted now with no delay and at possibly less cost to the city. This would only be applied to property owners who want to participate in the program.

- 1. Mortgages: The city could purchase mortgages at risk of being foreclosed on from homeowners and small property owners and resell them after applying deed restrictions. Property values will not be gong up for a while and may dip lower during this crisis.
- 2. Empty units for sale: the city could pick up some empty units dung this crisis situation, as we discover where they are and apply the same deed restrictions before reselling these units.

Instead of relying on entitled property owners to some day develop affordable housing by entitling more units throughout the city, while jacking up the land values, the city could take control of the units that are available now, and house a lot of people by keeping them housed and establishing a deed restricted affordable housing program. Details on who gets the housing and how large a program this becomes can be worked out later.

Honorable Mayor London Breed,

Please arrange for the City to house the homeless in vacant hotel and motel rooms during the pandemic. This is the humane action to take at this time.

Here are some reasons for using hotels and also answers to objections that I have been reading about online:

- The state/fed is not yet testing everyone. In fact, we are far from this goal. It has now been shown that people can be without symptoms and still infect other people. We need to put people in hotel rooms, so that they can be separated from each other.
- In hotel rooms, people will have somewhere to store their belongings. This will help people to retain their sense of identity.
- A hotel room is cheaper than the ICU unit anywhere, and especially at SF General, as has recently been described in the press.
- I used to work in the hotel business. We tried to sell every room every night. An unsold room-night is income lost forever. Hotels are desperate right now. Any income will be welcome to them.
- Hotels regularly do laundry in industrial-style machines. Hot water, hot dryers very effective for sterilizing bedding and towels.
- It is insulting to say that all folks who are homeless will not take care of a hotel room. Furthermore, hotels regularly clean, paint, and replace furnishings -- even at the small hotel for which I worked, we painted all the rooms every year. This is an expense that should already be in every hotel's budget.
- Housing people in hotels gives jobs to hotel staff.
- Hotels have kitchens and people who know how to use them. Hotels have supply lines and know where to purchase food for a good price. The kitchen staff can prepare simple, hearty meals every day for the residents. Hotel dish-washing equipment gets the dishes very clean -- and they are reused, not tossed. The meals should be vegetarian this is a chance to make a difference for the environment.
- Getting people off the streets lessens the chance of disease spreading through street contact for everyone.
- Getting people off the streets even for a short time gives DPW a chance to clean and sanitize the streets thoroughly.
- Even those homeless who do not trust large-scale shelters might be amenable to a hotel

room. Get them off the streets and into a safe place!

• San Francisco spends a lot of money on things that are not necessary. TRIM THE BUDGET in other ways.

The real test for all of our feelings towards housing the homeless in giant arenas at this time is -- would you want to spend the night there? Would you want your children to spend the night there? I would expect the answer to be "no" to both questions.

Please arrange for the City to house the homeless in the vacant hotel and motel rooms. This is the humane action to take at this time.



The attached quarterly report has been prepared for the Board of Supervisors in accordance with Resolution No. 227-18, approved by the Board on July 10, 2018 (File No. 180693) and enacted on July 20, 2018.

Pursuant to the terms of Resolution No. 227-18, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) shall "provide the Board a quarterly report for the next two years that identifies the following: status of all City projects with applications to SFPUC for electric service, including project schedules and financing and other deadlines; project sponsor and SFPUC concerns in securing temporary and permanent power, including obstacles that could increase costs or delay service to City customers; and the status of disputes with PG&E before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) or in other forums."

REPORT SUMMARY:

For the reporting period of November through March 2020, the SFPUC has identified 77 projects that have experienced interconnection delays, arbitrary requests or increased project costs, as listed in **Attachment A**. Since the last quarterly report, 14 projects have been added and 2 projects have been energized.

Any updates and changes to projects since the previous quarterly report are detailed in Column P of Attachment A. **Attachment B** contains a map providing the location of each project.

Attachment C contains a detailed report of each category of additional incurred costs and impacts to the City per project, such as redesign costs, construction and equipment costs, and additional staff time (also included in the 'Impacts' column of Attachment

OUR MISSION: To provide our customers with high-quality, efficient and reliable water, power and sewer services in a manner that values environmental and community interests and sustains the resources entrusted to our care.

A). The total cost impacts to the City are now estimated to be more than \$12 million. Total costs do not include estimated costs for projects that are at a standstill as those costs are still to be determined.

ONGOING INTERCONNECTION ISSUES:

City projects continue to be impacted by PG&E's actions which cause significant delays and increase costs. Since the first of these reports were submitted in October 2018, the City has submitted an additional 50 applications for service under PG&E's Wholesale Distribution Tariff (WDT). Out of these 50 applications, 30 have resulted in interconnection disputes with PG&E, of which 17 are moving forward after extensive delays or compromises by the City to avoid further delays. Only 4 projects have been energized and the City has agreed to withdraw another 5 projects.

The five categories below summarize the ongoing interconnection disputes between the City and PG&E.

- 1. *Delay tactics and cancellations stall City projects*: PG&E continues to ignore the timelines and terms set forth in their WDT. Out of the 77 projects listed in Attachment A, 31 projects have faced PG&E-caused delays of over 6 months, with 7 projects facing delays of over a year. PG&E has also started cancelling some City applications for service claiming that the City did not provide PG&E with the required information within the timeframes set forth in the WDT. PG&E's insistence on cancelling applications is troubling as City staff actively engages with PG&E on these projects on a weekly basis.
- 2. Denial of City's requested load impacts essential City services: PG&E continues to reduce the reserved capacity, or load service size, requested in the City's applications for service. PG&E's refusal to accommodate the City's requested load jeopardizes the SFPUC's ability to serve critical loads, such as new affordable housing developments. The HOPE housing redevelopment projects are being held up by this issue. The City also recently filed a protest with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) over PG&E's arbitrary reduction of the reserved capacity for a service transfer customer.
- 3. Arbitrary primary service requirements for small projects increase costs for the City: PG&E still requires primary service for projects with smaller load sizes that are normally served by secondary service. While PG&E has agreed to provide low-side metering for a limited number of projects, there are still projects being held up by PG&E's arbitrary requirement. In addition to delays, PG&E's requirement that the City use low-side metering or primary metering

for loads that could receive secondary services increases the City's costs. This dispute is presently before FERC.

- 4. *Demands for costly and unnecessary upgrades to City projects:* Several projects are stalled or facing increased costs due to PG&E either requiring extra equipment or payment for upgrades to PG&E's own distribution system. PG&E has yet to provide adequate explanations or cost justifications for its requirements. In January, FERC held a hearing on the City's pending complaint regarding this issue.
- 5. Refusal to acknowledge the City's control of its own facilities prohibits the City's growth: In addition to violating the terms of the Tariff, PG&E is restricting the City's ability to grow its customer base by denying the City's requests to serve existing PG&E customers who want to receive service from the City. PG&E initially approved two of these transfers, but now refuses to do so, even though the City meets all the requirements set forth in the WDT and owns or controls the facilities. The City plans to submit a protest to FERC regarding this issue.

STATUS OF DISPUTES WITH PG&E BEFORE FERC:

On November 21, 2019, FERC issued an order in the City's 2014 complaint and related cases. In the Order, FERC rejected the City's claim that all of its load was eligible for service under the Federal Power Act without adding new facilities because the City had been serving the same customers for decades. FERC agreed with PG&E's approach, finding that only a limited number of loads were eligible for service without additional facilities. FERC found that it was reasonable for PG&E to treat any City load that was relocating as a new delivery point requiring new facilities.

On December 20, 2019, the City filed a request for rehearing with FERC. Under the Federal Power Act, the filing of a request for rehearing is required before seeking review from a federal Court of Appeals. On January 20, 2019, FERC issued an Order Granting Rehearing for Further Consideration. This order allows FERC additional time to consider the matters the City raised on rehearing.

The City and PG&E filed a partial settlement with the FERC on December 14, 2018 to resolve certain procedural and technical disputes the City raised in ten protests the City filed with FERC in 2017 and 2018. On June 20, 2019, the Commission approved the settlement. Some issues in the protest that were not completely resolved by the settlement were assigned to a FERC trial judge for additional review. A hearing in that matter was held trial in January 2020. One of the issues in that proceeding is whether PG&E is wrongfully charging the City for upgrades to its system. The Administrative Law Judge assigned to the matter is expected to issue an Initial Decision in July. The Initial Decision will have to be approved by FERC.

The City filed a second complaint against PG&E with FERC on January 28, 2019 to address PG&E's demand for primary service for small facilities. PG&E asserted that any action on the complaint was stayed by the bankruptcy. On April 18, 2019, the City filed a motion in the PG&E bankruptcy case asking the court to grant relief from the stay and allow the City's complaint to proceed. The court granted the City's motion on May 9, 2019.

On May 29, 2019, PG&E filed a response to the City's complaint and asked FERC to dismiss the City's complaint. On June 14, 2019, the City filed reply to PG&E's motion. On July 18, 2019, the City filed a supplement to the complaint in which the City noted that recently PG&E has refused to discuss any alternative arrangements that would allow projects to move forward. On February 25, 2020, the City filed a second supplemental reply to the complaint to clarify the record concerning some statements PG&E had made to FERC concerning the availability of certain metering equipment. We are awaiting an order from FERC on next steps.



It is unclear at this time how long the temporary suspension of work will last. Additional notice of closure was not practicable due to the sudden and unforeseen cancelations and closures. Employees at the facility are represented by labor unions. Bumping rights and seniority scheduling will be utilized for unionized employees employed by Bon Appetit. The job titles of the affected positions and the number of affected employees in each job classification are shown on the attached enclosure. Consistent with Executive Order N-31-20, we have notified employees of the following: *If you have lost your job or been laid off temporarily, you may be eligible for Unemployment Insurance (UI). More information on UI and other resources available for workers is available at labor.ca.gov/coronavirus2019.*

Notice of Mass Layoff Caused By COVID-19 at Sessions II / Sessions at the Presidio.

To Whom It May Concern:

As a result of the unforeseeable, dramatic changes caused by COVID-19 and the resulting state of emergency in California, we are writing to inform you that there will be a mass layoff at the Sessions II/ Sessions at the Presidio Restaurant facility located at 1 Letterman Drive, San Francisco, CA on April 6, 2020. This mass layoff is expected to be temporary. The expected date of the first furlough will be April 6, 2020.

Although Sessions II/Sessions at the Presidio is located in a federal enclave, and we expressly preserve and do not waive this position, in an abundance of caution, the Company is providing you with this notice and to the extent this is considered a "termination" for purposes of California's Worker Adjustment and Retraining Act, found at Labor Code sections 1400-1408. Assuming that business conditions improve and that government officials permit the business to reopen, however, the Company is hopeful that the actions it is taking are temporary and that some or all of these employees will be able to return to work in the future.

We decided to furlough these employees as a result of COVID-19, which has rapidly spread throughout California, necessitating updated and more stringent public health measures. This includes Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-33-20 issued on March 19, 2020, which instructs all Californians to stay at home or at their place of residence unless they work within certain limited sectors of the economy. Because of Executive Order N-33-20 and any applicable orders issued by local authorities, the Company's ability to operate has been impeded. This impact includes significantly decreased revenues. These circumstances were not reasonably foreseeable until March 29, 2020 when the full impact of COVID-19 became clear. For that reason, we were unable to provide the full 60 days' notice that we would otherwise provide regarding these separations, and we are providing as much notice as is practicable given the rapid pace at which this situation has developed.

All affected employees have been notified of their furlough dates and that this action will be temporary. Those employees are expected to be furloughed beginning on April 6, 2020 with all accomplished by April 6, 2020. Those employees have also been informed in writing that they may be eligible for Unemployment Insurance, per Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-31-20 (dated March 17, 2020).

The following is a list of the job positions and number of individuals who will be affected by the mass layoff along with the anticipated schedule:

There will not be any bumping rights for affected employees—that is, employees will not be able to displace more junior employees out of their job positions as a result of this mass layoff.
