Section 3. In accordance with the Department of Public Works' Order No. 179,498, a copy of which is in the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors File No. 111285 and incorporated herein by reference, Board of Supervisors Ordinance No.1061, entitled "Regulating the Width of Sidewalks," a copy of which is in the Clerk of the Board of

Supervisors Book of General Ordinances, in effect May 11, 1910, is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

Section 1590. The official sidewalk width of Mason Street starting at the south west corner of the intersection Mason Street and Washington Street and continuing South for 29.52 feet shall be as shown on Department of Public Works drawing Q-20-696, of which is in the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors File No. 111285

Section 4. The City and County of San Francisco, as is necessary as a result of this Ordinance, shall make arrangements with public utility companies and City Departments for the relocation, and/or modification of any affected public facilities. Any necessary relocation, modification, or both of such facilities shall be at the cost of the owner of the utility.

#### LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Changing the Official Sidewalk Width - Portion of Mason Street]

Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 1061 entitled "Regulating the Width of Sidewalks" by adding thereto Section 1590 to change the official sidewalk width of Mason Street starting at the southwest corner of the intersection of Mason Street and Washington Street and continuing south 29.52 feet; making environmental findings and findings pursuant to the General Plan and Planning Code Section 101.1; requiring relocation, modification, or both of facilities affected by the sidewalk width change.

#### Existing Law

Board of Supervisors' Ordinance No. 1061 established the official sidewalk widths throughout San Francisco.

#### Amendments to Current Law

This legislation would amend Ordinance No. 1061 to change the official sidewalk width on south side of Harrison Street between Fremont and Beale Streets. The Ordinance would make environmental findings and findings of conformity with the General Plan and Planning Code Section 101.1. This legislation also requires that any necessary relocation, modification, or both of utility facilities shall be at the cost of the owner of the utility.





#### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project is limited to constructing a corner sidewalk bulb on Mason Street at Washington Street (the southwest corner of the Mason Street/Washington Street intersection, in the City's Chinatown neighborhood. The demolition of the existing Chinese Recreation Center and construction of a new Recreation Facility was reviewed in Case 2004.0703R and Case 2009.1041E. Plans showing the existing condition and proposed sidewalk bulb are provided in Attachment 1a. and 1b.

#### SITE DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT USE

The project is limited to official change to official width of the Mason Street sidewalk at Washington Street to establish a sidewalk bulb. The Washington Street sidewalk is 10'-5" wide; Mason Street sidewalk is 15' wide at this location.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**

On 5/19/2011, the Environmental Planning section of the San Francisco Planning Department determined that the Project (sidewalk corner bulb) would be categorically exempt from Environmental Review under Section 15301 of CEQA Guidelines - as a Class - Existing Facilities Categorical Exemption.

### GENERAL PLAN COMPLIANCE AND BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Project is consistent with the Eight Priority Policies of Planning Code Section 101.1 as described in the body of this letter and is, on balance, in-conformity with the following Objectives and Policies of the General Plan:

Note: General Plan Objectives and Policies are in BOLD Font; General Plan text is in regular font, Staff comments are in *italic* font.

Comment: The project limited to establishing a corner sidewalk bulb on Mason Street at Washington Street, fronting reconstructed Chinese Recreation Center on the adjacent parcel. The sidewalk bulb is proposed in order to accommodate construction of ADA accessible sidewalk ramps at the intersection to improve access to the new public facility (reviewed separately).

#### TRANSPORTATION ELEMENT

#### **OBJECTIVE 23**

IMPROVE THE CITY'S PEDESTRIAN CIRCULATION SYSTEM TO PROVIDE FOR EFFICIENT, PLEASANT, AND SAFE MOVEMENT.

#### POLICY 23.1

Provide sufficient pedestrian movement space with a minimum of pedestrian congestion in accordance with a pedestrian street classification system.

Sidewalks should be sufficiently wide to comfortably carry existing and expected levels of pedestrians, and to provide for necessary pedestrian amenities and buffering from adjacent roadways. The need for these elements varies by the street context – sidewalk width should be based on the overall context and role of the street.

#### POLICY 23.2

Widen sidewalks where intensive commercial, recreational, or institutional activity is present, sidewalks are congested, where sidewalks are less than adequately wide to provide appropriate pedestrian amenities, or where residential densities are high.

Wider sidewalks provide more pedestrian space and also permit more pedestrian amenities. In high-density residential and recreational areas, sidewalks are often utilized as open space, and should be designed and built to accommodate such a use....

Comment: The proposed sidewalk bulb on Mason Street at Washington Street would provide additional space for pedestrian queuing and provide space to accommodate ADA curb access ramps. Chinatown is arguably the City's densest neighborhood. In addition, the proposed sidewalk corner bulb is adjacent to Chinese Recreation Center,

which attracts large numbers of neighborhood residents partaking in recreational activities and programs offered at the Recreation Center. Establishing a sidewalk bulb at this location is consistent with these policies

CONSIDER THE SIDEWALK AREA AS AN IMPORTANT ELEMENT IN THE CITYWIDE OPEN SPACE SYSTEM.

POLICY 26.3

Encourage pedestrian serving uses on the sidewalk.

Expand open space opportunities.

Comment: Chinatown is one of the City's densest neighborhoods, and is also one with limited open space resources. The proposed sidewalk bulb would improve access to the adjacent recreation facility. While it would improve access to all, the wider sidewalk also accommodate ADA curb access ramps

#### PLANNING CODE SECTION 101.1 EIGHT PRIORITY POLICY FINDINGS

Planning Code Section 101.1 establishes Eight Priority Policies and requires review of discretionary approvals and permits for consistency with said policies. The Project is found to be consistent with the Eight Priority Policies as set forth in Planning Code Section 101.1 for the following reasons:
