





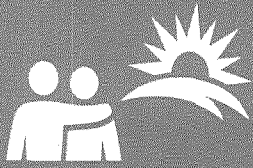

- 4,113 acres managed by RPD
- 3,400 acres within San Francisco
- 671 marina slips
- 222 neighborhood parks
- 181 playgrounds and play areas
- 151 tennis and 72 basketball courts
- 82 recreation centers and clubhouses
- 59 soccer/playfields
- 37 community gardens
- 34 off-leash dog play areas
- 9 swimming pools
- 6 golf courses
- 2 stadiums
- 77,000 hours of rec programming annually
- 475 summer camps each year
- \$1.3 million in scholarships to families each year
- 252,000 hours of volunteer time each year

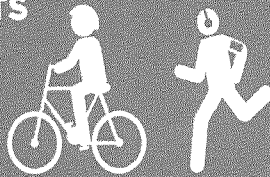

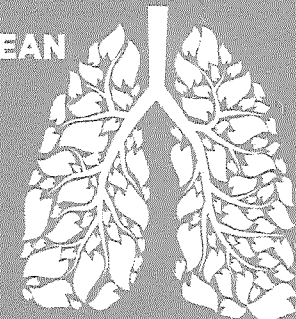

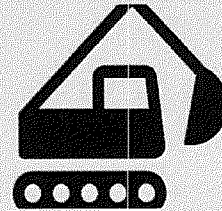
In developing the FY2019-20 and FY2020-21 budget, the department was guided by the following:

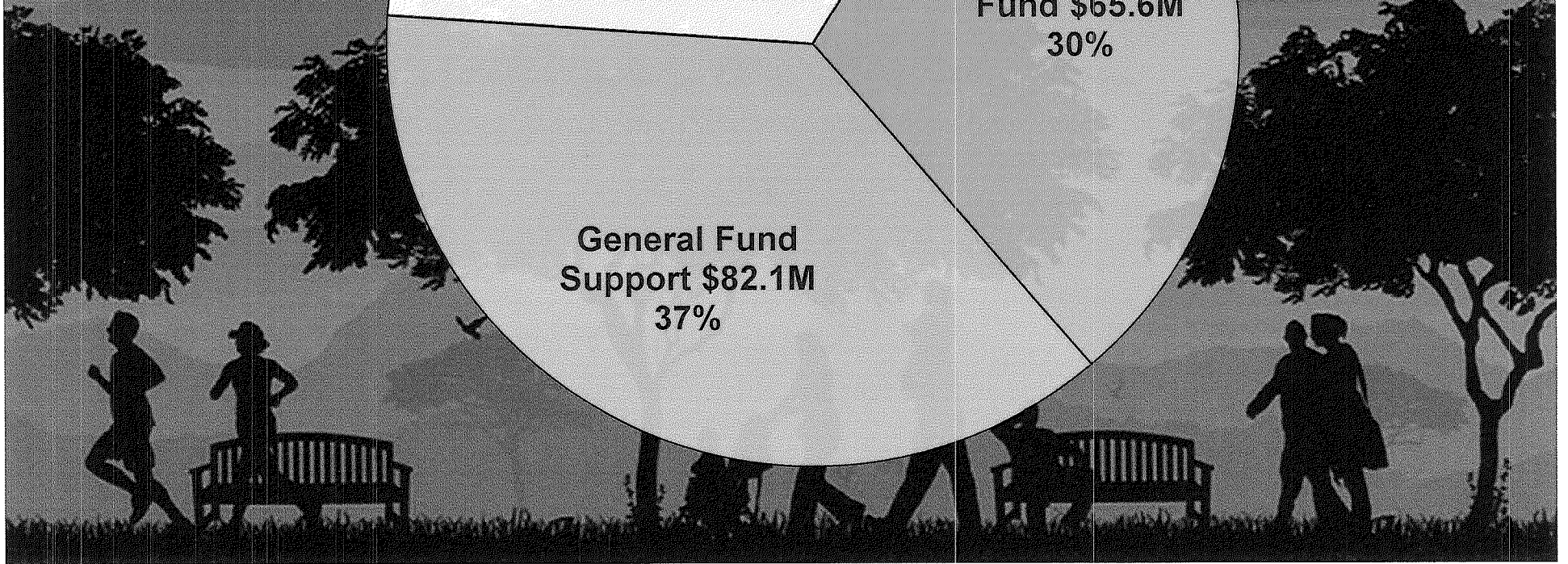

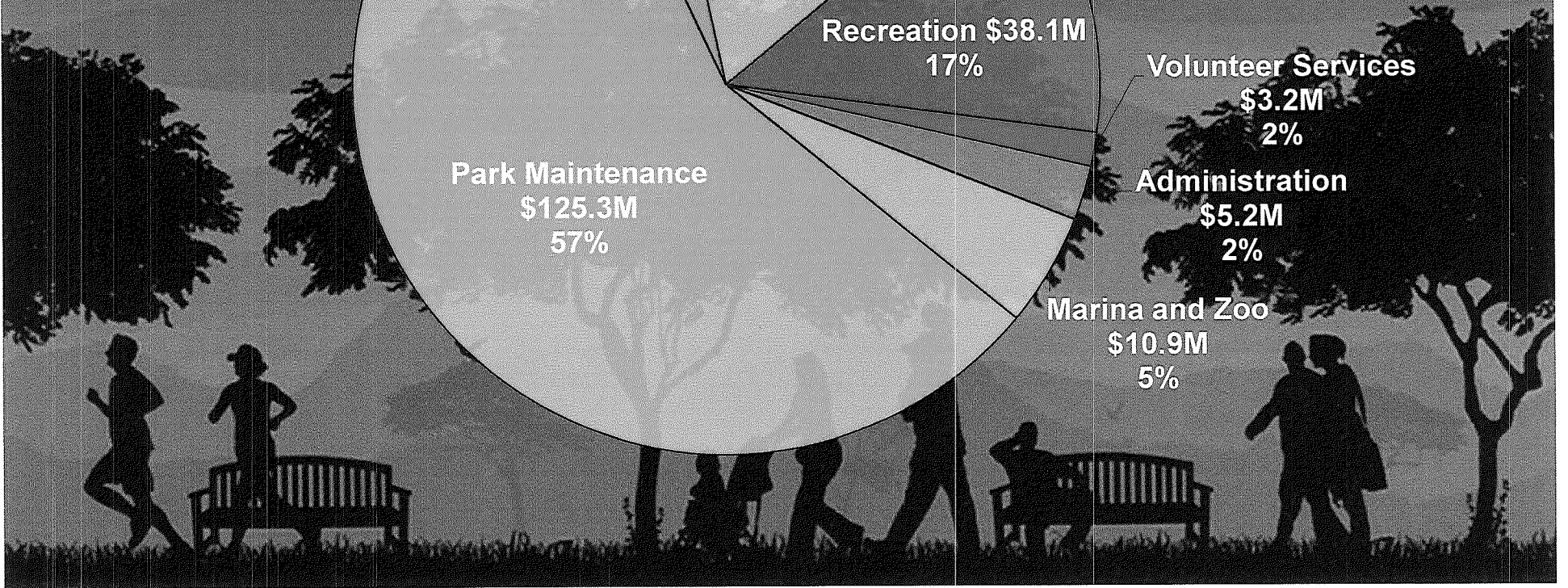

Park Stop

Through a partnership with HSA, added 7 park sites and expanded hours at existing pilot site at Victoria Manalo Draves Park. Coverage is typically from 8 am to 4 pm.



Scholarship, Outreach, and Equity

Existing Efforts

- Scholarships to 2,206 SF residents in FY 17/18, valued at \$1.3M
- RPD offers free programming, including Jr. Giants baseball teams, Mobile Recreation, open gym, afterschool time drop-in activities, special events, and all seniors programs.
- Equity zones and metrics, Diversity and Inclusion Committee on Equity (DICE), staff training, equity driven programming, and more!

New initiative to increase registered participation among **children living in family shelters, foster care, public housing, and housing developments assisted by MOHCD.**
