OPPOSING THE PUBLIC WORKS INITIATIVE PROPOSED FOR THE STATEWIDE BALLOT IN MARCH, 2000.

[Opposing the "Public Works Initiative"]

WHEREAS, Current law permits cities to contract for private architectural and engineering services based on demonstrated competence and qualification for the services to be performed and at fair and reasonable prices, and contracts for these services do not need to be competitively bid; and,

WHEREAS, State agencies have the same right except that services which have historically or customarily been performed by state civil service employees may not be contracted out; and,

WHEREAS, The measure known as the "Public Works Initiative" has been proposed by the Consulting Engineers and Land Surveyors of California (CELSOC), and this initiative addresses the contracting out by state and local agencies for private, professional architectural, landscape architectural, environmental, engineering, land surveying and construction project management services; and,

WHEREAS, The Public Works Initiative would eliminate all local government contracting practices and require the development, approval and imposition of new statewide contracting procedures on local governments and districts; and,

WHEREAS, By imposing new state regulations on local governments - including cities, counties, school districts and special districts

- the Initiative will cause delay in vital infrastructure projects and the loss of local control and autonomy; and,

WHEREAS, While the Initiative would continue cities' ability to contract for private architectural and engineering services, it would require that those services be procured through "a fair and competitive selection process," a term which is undefined, ambiguous and open to many legal interpretations, thus subjecting the regulations to legal challenges which will further delay projects; and,

WHEREAS, The Public Works Initiative is unnecessary because local governments currently have complete authority to contract out architectural and engineering services without state government interference or restrictions; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco opposes the Public Works Initiative proposed for the statewide ballot in March, 2000.
