

Ordinance Amending the San Francisco Public Works Code

Article 5.9 "Permit Regulations for Vendors" Following the Passage of California Senate Bill 276 (SAFE Streets Act)

To Enable Enhanced Enforcement for Vending Targeted Merchandise on City Property Without a Permit







BILL HISTORY AND BACKGROUND

SB 946 Safe Sidewalk Vending Act 2018

- This state law decriminalized street vending in California and removed police departments' authority to enforce vending permit requirements apart from criminal activity
- Unintentionally, SB946 —combined with COVID and other factors—created the conditions that led to increased sales of stolen goods (fencing) and unsafe sidewalk conditions in some San Francisco neighborhoods

Concerns over objective health, safety, and welfare concerns such as oversaturation fencing and other illegal activities led to advocacy from:

- Mission District Community
- Merchants
- Mission Street Vendors Association
- Tenderloin Community
- Chinatown Community

City Implemented Mission Street Corridor Vending Restrictions While Supporting Amendments to State Law

- Vending restrictions on Mission St. from Cesar Chavez St. to 14th St. (Vending pilot program on three blocks)
- Multi-departmental effort

WHAT IS <u>CA SB 276?</u>

Purpose

- To authorize San Francisco to more effectively address the sale of stolen and other goods on City property without a permit by allowing police to enforce certain violations
- To promote permitted vending and support vendors and healthy street conditions

Legislative Sponsors and Partners

- Bill introduced by Senator Wiener
- Ordinance implementing SB 276 -sponsored by Mayor Lurie
- Bill and ordinance supported by street vendors and community stakeholders

List of Merchandise Commonly Targeted for Retail Theft:

- Vendors who sell merchandise that is commonly targeted for retail theft face a written warning for the first violation followed by escalating enforcement by the Police Department
- List of "Targeted Merchandise" excludes foods prepared on-site and any prepackaged items sold together with onsite prepared food
- Vendors who have a valid vending permit issued by Public Works will not be subject to enforcement by the Police Department
- Targeted Merchandise list will need to be submitted annually to the Board of Supervisors



LOCAL ORDINANCE

The Board of Supervisors is Considering Amendments to DPW Article 5.9 Code to Implement SB 276

Definitions

"Targeted Merchandise" refers to merchandise commonly targeted for retail theft

Permit and Identification

- Vendors must demonstrate proof of Ownership in Lawful Manner (e.g., receipts of purchase etc.)
- Vendor Identification (name, phone number, mailing address)
 - To safeguard civil rights and due process, prohibits inquiring or collecting information regarding immigration, citizenship, place of birth, criminal history, fingerprints or background checks as part of permit application process.
- Limits cost of vending permit for low-income applicants

Reporting

Annual report to the SF Board of Supervisors and relevant committees of the CA legislature related to enforcement activities related to SB 276

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ENFORCEMENT

Actions and Consequences
Vendors Will Face for Selling
Targeted Merchandise on
Public Property Without a Vending
Permit



First Violation

A written warning;

 For the first violation, the City shall issue a written warning identifying the Targeted Merchandise subject to the unpermitted vending and indicating the date, time, and location of the violation.

Second and Third Violations

An infraction within 18 months of the first violation;

Fourth Violation and Beyond

Infractions or misdemeanors punishable by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed 6 months and/or a fine not to exceed \$1,000, within 18 months of the first violation

CITY'S COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND PUBLIC OUTREACH

City's meetings leading up to this point

- Ongoing proactive program interventions to enroll and support permitted vendors in the Mission District
- From January 2024 to June 2025, conducted three surveys of small business in the Mission District about their experiences and perceptions of public health and safety related to vending and fencing.
- Routine Mission stakeholder meetings to discuss street vending programing/initiatives: SB 276, Compact Mobile Food Operations, Mission Street Vending Pilot, etc.
- Monthly attendance of Mission Street Vendor Association meetings beginning in January 2025, to update on vending initiatives and programs

Sacramento visits and testimony

 Over the last two years, Street vendors and City traveled to Sacramento six times to lobby for the state vending bill Small Business Commission

Small Business Commission

On Sept 22, 2025, the Small Business Commission held an Informational Session on SB 276

Formal workshops

 The City held five formal workshops about SB 276 and the proposed implementing ordinance with stakeholder groups with the Chinatown Community, TL-Mid-Market stakeholders, Mission Stakeholders and the Mission Street Vendors Association, and the San Francisco Benefit District Alliance
