3 **Resolution urging the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) to develop and**
4 **implement a comprehensive enforcement and intervention plan to address drug use or**
5 **suspected drug activity especially within 250 feet of parks, playgrounds, and schools,**
6 **including issuing citations, conducting assessments, and removing individuals for**
7 **processing or detoxification services.**

9 WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco has a responsibility to protect the
10 health, safety, and welfare of all residents - especially children, families, and vulnerable
11 populations who frequent parks, playgrounds, and schools; and

12 WHEREAS, The ongoing public health crisis involving the open use and trafficking of
13 illicit drugs in public spaces has raised significant concern among residents, educators,
14 parents, and community leaders; and

15 WHEREAS, San Francisco Police Department officers are dedicated to keeping San
16 Francisco residents and visitors safe; and

17 WHEREAS, San Francisco residents and visitors regularly express frustration and
18 confusion about which City service to contact in response to illegal or unsafe activity in their
19 neighborhoods, often receiving conflicting or inconsistent guidance about whether to call 3-1-
20 1, San Francisco Police Department's non-emergency number, or 9-1-1, particularly in
21 situations involving public drug use, open-air dealing, or other ongoing street-level offenses;
22 and

23 WHEREAS, This lack of clarity undermines residents' confidence in the City's public
24 safety response, delays timely reporting, and places both community members and
25

1 emergency dispatchers in difficult positions when they are forced to guess which number to
2 call in situations that are urgent but not always life-threatening; and

3 WHEREAS, Parks, playgrounds, and schools are essential public spaces that provide
4 opportunities for recreation, education, and healthy development, and must be protected as
5 safe and drug-free zones; and

6 WHEREAS, Numerous incidents of drug use and drug-related activity have been
7 reported near playgrounds and schools, in some cases resulting in life-threatening situations
8 involving children; and

9 WHEREAS, Exposure to drug use or paraphernalia poses serious risks to the physical
10 and emotional health of children and undermines the safety and integrity of surrounding
11 neighborhoods; and

12 WHEREAS, Repeated drug activity in close proximity to these sensitive community
13 sites threatens public safety and the livability of neighborhoods throughout San Francisco;
14 and

15 WHEREAS, A coordinated public safety and public health response is necessary to
16 ensure that drug activity near parks, playgrounds, and schools is addressed promptly and
17 appropriately, balancing the need for enforcement with compassion and access to treatment;
18 and

19 WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco and the Board of Supervisors
20 support police officers enforcing the laws of the City and County of San Francisco and the
21 State of California regarding the sale and public consumption of illicit drugs; now, therefore,
22 be it

23 RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco
24 urges the San Francisco Police Department to develop and implement a comprehensive plan
25 to respond to drug use, visible narcotics activity, or suspected drug trafficking occurring within

1 250 feet of any park, playground, or school, which shall include but not be limited to: Issuing
2 citations to individuals engaged in unlawful drug activity in these areas, conducting on-site
3 assessments to evaluate individuals' health and needs and removing individuals from the
4 vicinity for processing or referral to detoxification or treatment services, as appropriate; and,
5 be it

6 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San
7 Francisco urges the SFPD to adopt technology tools to reduce the time and increase the
8 accuracy of citation writing and incident reporting in all forms; and, be it

9 FURTHER RESOLVED, That this comprehensive plan be in pursuit of an immediate
10 future where San Francisco's sidewalks and public spaces are free of the sale and use of illicit
11 drugs; and, be it

12 FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Resolution does not change existing laws or criminal
13 justice policies, but reaffirms the City's duty to ensure the safety of public spaces and to
14 provide coordinated interventions for individuals struggling with substance use; and, be it

15 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors requests the San Francisco
16 Police Department to report back within 60 days of the passage of this Resolution with a
17 detailed plan for implementation, including timelines, resource needs, coordination with health
18 and emergency departments, and any anticipated challenges; and, be it

19 FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall transmit
20 copies of this resolution to the San Francisco Police Department, the Department of
21 Emergency Management, and the Department of Public Health for their review, collaboration,
22 and immediate consideration.

At its in-person meeting on Monday, October 20, 2025 the Youth Commission discussed BOS File No. 950991:

1. The Youth Commission recognizes the importance of prioritizing public safety in areas near parks, playgrounds, and schools.
2. The Youth Commission affirms that parks, playgrounds, and schools are outlets of public spaces that families and youth rely on.
3. The Youth Commission acknowledges several concerns regarding the implementation of the proposed resolution, particularly regarding the role of the SFPD, potential over-policing, and the impact on youth.
4. The Youth Commission put together the following questions and considerations for the hearing on the proposed resolution:
 - How will the SFPD decide which parks, playgrounds, or schools to prioritize, and what criteria will be used?
 - How are officers being trained to engage with youth, especially those experiencing substance use challenges?
 - Could increased police presence push drug activity into other neighborhoods, and what measures will prevent this displacement?
 - Are there alternative programs, such as 311 or mental health-focused interventions, that could complement or replace law enforcement involvement?

- How can the plan include long-term sustainability and avoid being a temporary solution?
 - How will the SFPD collaborate with the Youth Commission to ensure youth-centered approaches are incorporated in plan development?
 - What preventative measures will be taken to restrict youth access to drugs near public spaces?
 - How will the plan balance public safety with avoiding disproportionate impacts on certain neighborhoods?
 - How will the City and SFPD conduct outreach to ensure youth and families are informed about the new policy and resources available?
5. The Youth Commission notes support from the community, with 23 letters submitted in favor of the legislation, and urges the SFPD to submit new standards and collaborate closely with youth-focused organizations during plan development.

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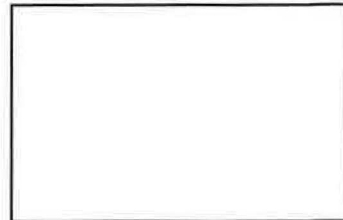
