11	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
12	
13	Section 1. Article XIII of Chapter 10 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by
14	adding Section 10.100-66, to read as follows:
15	SEC. 10.100-66. E-BIKE INCENTIVE FUND.
16	(a) Establishment of Fund. The E-Bike Incentive Fund ("Fund") is hereby established as a
17	category eight fund to support an electric bicycle ("e-bike") incentive program aimed at promoting
18	sustainable transportation, reducing traffic congestion, improving air quality, and supporting equity in
19	transportation access across San Francisco.
20	(b) Sources of Funds. The Fund shall receive monies appropriated, donated, or granted for
21	the purposes of supporting the e-bike incentive program.
22	(c) Use and Administration of Fund.
23	(1) Responsible Agency. The Department of the Environment ("Department") shall
24	administer the Fund. The Department may, in its discretion, adopt rules, regulations, and/or guidelines
25	for the distribution of monies in the Fund, consistent with the criteria set forth in subsection (c)(2).

1	(2) Allowable Uses of Fund. Subject to the budgetary and fiscal provisions of the
2	Charter, monies in the Fund may only be expended for the following purposes:
3	(A) Providing financial incentives and/or point-of-sale rebates to City
4	residents for the purchase and/or maintenance of e-bikes that meet the definition of Safety-Certified
5	Powered Mobility Devices in Section 325 of the Fire Code, as it may be amended from time to time,
6	and related bike safety and/or security accessories, subject to the following restrictions:
7	(i) The Department shall make best efforts to ensure that 40% or
8	more of funds disbursed over a fiscal year are disbursed to people who either are low-income, reside in
9	City neighborhoods that are disproportionately burdened by pollution, or reside in City neighborhoods
10	that are disproportionately lacking in public transportation. Individuals that meet these criteria
11	include but are not limited to individuals from neighborhoods that are 1) identified on the California
12	Air Resources Board's Priority Populations Map as being a disadvantaged community and/or low-
13	income community; and/or 2) identified on the San Francisco County Transportation Authority's
14	Equity Priority Communities Map as an Equity Priority Community.
15	(ii) Financial incentives and/or rebates shall only be available for
16	purchases or services from retailers located within the City, except for adaptive e-bikes, for which
17	purchases or services outside the City may qualify for incentives and/or rebates, in the Department's
18	discretion.
19	(iii) The Department shall prioritize distribution of funds to
20	individuals with greater financial need.
21	(B) Outreach and educational programs to promote the proper use of e-bikes,
22	including education on safe charging and disposal.
23	(C) Data collection, evaluation, and reporting on the impact and
24	effectiveness of the e-bike incentive program and/or feedback from participants to inform other City
25	policies, programs, and/or infrastructure projects.

1	(D) Administrative (e.g., labor and overhead) and contracting costs incurred
2	by the Department or other City departments associated with the management and implementation of
3	the e-bike incentive program, associated outreach and education programs, and associated data
4	collection, evaluation, and reporting.
5	(d) Outreach and Coordination. The Department shall conduct outreach with the goal of
6	ensuring equitable access to e-bike incentives. The Department shall conduct outreach aimed at
7	reaching individuals who either are low-income, reside in City neighborhoods that are
8	disproportionately burdened by pollution, or reside in City neighborhoods that are disproportionately
9	lacking in public transportation, as described in subsection (c)(2)(A)(i). The Department shall conduct
10	this outreach in coordination with the Mayor's Office on Disability, community-based organizations,
11	bike retailers, and/or other community partners.
12	(e) Reporting. The Department shall maintain a record of Fund revenues and expenditures.
13	The Department shall provide reports to the Board of Supervisors on the program's operations on the
14	following schedule: the first report shall cover the e-bike incentive program's first fiscal year of
15	operation, and shall be submitted no later than October 31 following the first fiscal year throughout
16	which the Department has operated an e-bike incentive program continuously; the second report shall
17	be due no later than October 31 of year following submission of the first report, and shall cover the
18	operation of the program during the fiscal year preceding the report submission; and subsequent
19	reports shall be submitted as requested by the Board of Supervisors.
20	
21	Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
22	enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
23	ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
24	of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

1	Section 3. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors
2	intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles,
3	numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal
4	Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment
5	additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under
6	the official title of the ordinance.

### **LEGISLATIVE DIGEST**

[Administrative Code - E-Bike Incentive Fund]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to establish the E-Bike Incentive Fund to support implementation of an electric bicycle (or "e-bike") incentive program administered by the Department of the Environment.

### Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance would create a category eight fund, administered by the Department of the Environment ("Department), to support an e-bike incentive program. Monies in the fund could be used to provide incentives and/or rebates to City residents for the purchase and/or maintenance of e-bikes and related safety and security accessories from City retailers, and for outreach and education, data collection, evaluation and reporting, and administration of the program.

The Department would be directed to prioritize distribution of any monies in the fund to individuals from neighborhoods that are disproportionately burdened by pollution and/or disproportionately lacking in public transportation, and individuals with greater financial need.

The Department would be required to report to the Board on the operation of an e-bike incentive program by October 31 following the end of the first fiscal year during which the Department operated such a program continuously throughout the fiscal year, to report a second time by October 31 of the following year, and to provide further reports as requested by the Board.

At its in-person meeting on Monday, October 21, 2024 the Youth Commission took the following action:

- 1. Motion to Support BOS File #240967 Administrative Code E-Bike Incentive Fund.
- 2. The San Francisco Youth Commission acknowledges the importance and need to expand transportation access to youth in underserved neighborhoods and communities.
- 3. Many youth in San Francisco live in communities that lack sufficient public transit access and experience excessive pollution levels.
- 4. The Youth Commission has historically supported expanding transportation access for underserved youth, such as through the Free MUNI For All Youth Program.
- 5. The Youth Commission recognizes that e-bikes are often unaffordable to youth and families, and an e-bike incentive fund will expand access to e-bikes for people who currently cannot afford them. This will allow more youth and families to access this sustainable form of transportation.
- 6. The Youth Commission has advocated for climate resilience in its FY24-25 Budget Policies and Priorities, and an e-bike incentive fund will reduce emissions—benefiting our climate for youth and all San Franciscans.
