14 Section 1. Article 5 of Chapter 16 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by
15 removing Sections 16.93-1, 16.93-2, 16.93-3, 16.93-4, and 16.93-5, to read as follows:

20 ~~payroll system.~~

21 ~~—(e) Payroll deduction privileges shall be reviewed annually to determine if all agencies~~

24 ~~fee of six cents per employee who had an Annual Drive deduction in the payroll period to reimburse the~~

5 Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
6 enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
7 ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
8 of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Administrative Code - Eliminating Annual Joint Fundraising Drive]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to eliminate the City's annual joint fundraising drive.

Existing Law

The Administrative Code requires the City to hold an annual joint fundraising drive, with accompany schedules and responsibilities and criteria for charities.

Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance is eliminating the requirement to hold a drive and accompanying administrative scheme.

Background Information

In the digital age, access to nonprofits and charitable giving has increased. With the plethora of available options, and reduced barriers to donations, the existing program will be excised in toto.

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Sunday, July 16, 2023

Dear Board Member,

I am writing to provide you, a Member of the City and County of San Francisco (“City”) Board of Supervisors (“Board”) a synopsis of the City’s Annual Giving Campaign as outlined in the San Francisco Administrative Code §16.93-1: Charitable Deductions and the Annual Joint Fundraising Drive. This is commonly referred to as the Combined Charities Campaign (CCC) (“Campaign”). This year marks 35th anniversary of the approval of §16.93-1.

San Francisco is THE City that is accepting of all people regardless of their background. San Francisco is THE City that helps those that need it. San Francisco is THE City that stands above others because of our love and support of others. These traits are exhibited by the over 3000 City and County employees who have, over the past five years¹, donated over \$1 million to more than 1000 charities, with over \$400,000 going to local charities every year.

I do not know why the proposal to terminate this extremely beneficial Campaign is in front of the Board; however, I do know that terminating the Campaign will be detrimental to over 1000 charities whose recipients benefit from City employees’ open hearts.

In 2022, the Office of the City Administrator paused the 2022 Campaign when concerns were raised about a couple of the charities listed in the Donor Resources Guide. Prior to the Campaign resuming, the Rules Committee (if I remember correctly), met and raised the following concerns:

1. Personnel costs to administer the Campaign
2. Ease and availability of donating online
3. The Campaign is not important to City employees

Regarding personnel costs, the Combined Charities Campaign is important to City employees and extremely important to the charities that receive our donations. Sometimes you have to spend a little to help many.

The Campaign simplifies the donation process with the online portal. It is a fast process, eliminates the need for paper forms, and has reduced the need for personnel to administer the Campaign and audit records. Use of the online portal has increased drastically since its launch in 2018, averaging more than 75% the past three years.

¹ The 2022 Campaign was paused for nearly eight weeks - more than half the Campaign run time - yet raised nearly \$700,000 from nearly 1800 employees. All other metrics came in at a 50% rate or higher, predicting the Campaign likely would have reached its goal of \$1.2 million and attained the annual averages of the previous four years.

City employees donate to the Campaign via payroll deduction so that they do not have to think about donating monthly or bi-weekly through automatic payments from a bank account or credit card. Payroll deduction is a much better and easier option for many donors as many are not able to charge donations to a credit card. People manage debt differently, with many carrying balances month to month, so even a small donation, say \$50/paycheck (\$1300/year), can turn into a far higher “donation” with interest charges. With payroll deductions, charities learn in advance how much they will be receiving each quarter from the generous City employees and can forecast their budgets to align with these donations.

As for donations made by check, a bulk of those are from retirees as they no longer have a Disaster Service Worker number (DSW#), further confirming the traits of helping others after separation from City service.

Approximately 10% of City employees (3000+) donate over \$1 million every year to more than 1000 charities. This number by itself proves how important the Campaign is to City employees.

The City and County of San Francisco’s Combined Charities Campaign is one of the largest in the nation both in terms of total dollars raised (more than \$1 million/year) and number of donors (more than 3000/year). Numbers did NOT drop in the 2020 Campaign, the year the COVID-19 pandemic devastated the economy and hurt our wallets. The City’s Campaign is larger than a Southern California county that has over 100,000 employees yet raises less than \$1 million.

**Donors Leadership: These Donors are referred to as Leadership Givers. Leadership Givers donate \$500 or more and are recognized with a pin and an event, both sponsored by the Federations within the Campaign.*

The Office of the City Administrator manages [Give2SF](#), a collection of 10 funds that support causes ranging from supporting children to go to college, neighborhood beautification, the arts, animals, and disaster and recovery, such as after an earthquake, a highly probable disaster in our future. In 2022, employees and retirees donated more than \$15,000 to the City’s Give2SF funds. Retiree donations accounted for a significant amount of those donations.

I do not know what the future of the Campaign will look like. Will it remain the same, administered by the Office of the City Administrator and rotated among City agencies every three years for management? Will a group within a City agency take on the task permanently? Will the City establish a committee to administer and manage the Campaign annually? If so, what needs to be considered (work order funds to those agencies to account the work being done by committee members)? Will the City establish a line item in the budget to account for the administration and management of the Combined Charities Campaign?

My recommendation to move forward as is with the Campaign and come back to this issue in January 2024 so that a fully informed decision on the future of this extremely beneficial Combined Charities Campaign can be addressed.

Thank you for taking the time to review this information. Please let me know if you have any questions. I hope to be able to attend the meeting on Tuesday, July 18th either virtually or in person; however, I am on vacation and not sure what my schedule will be on Tuesday.

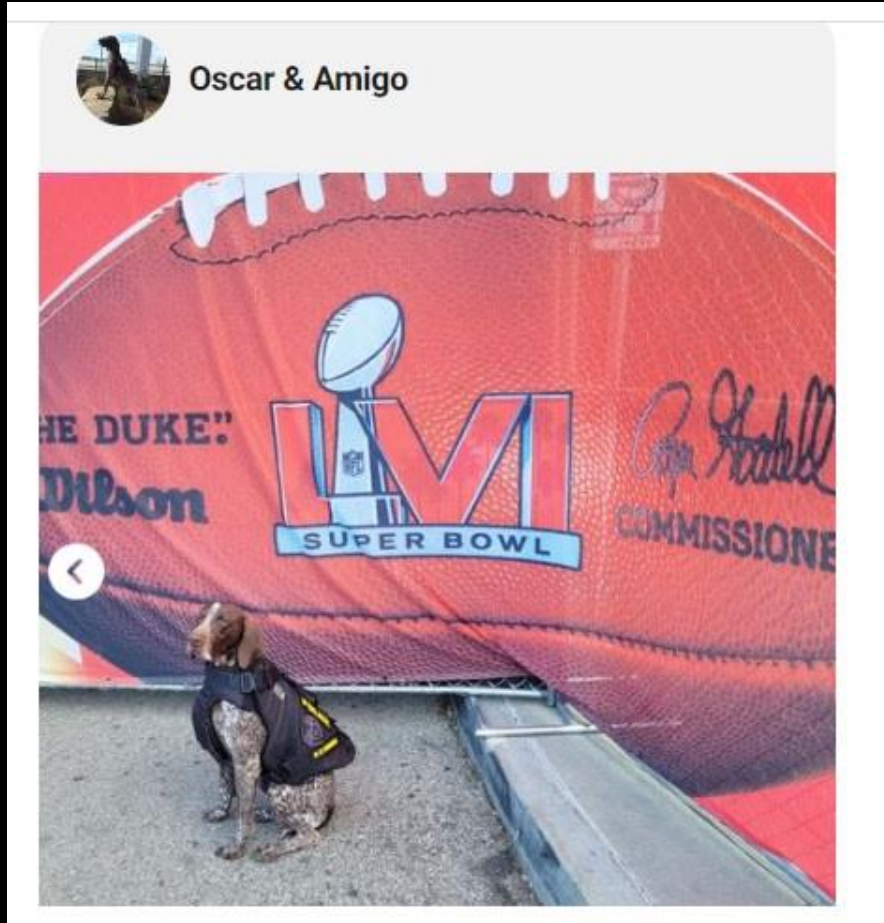

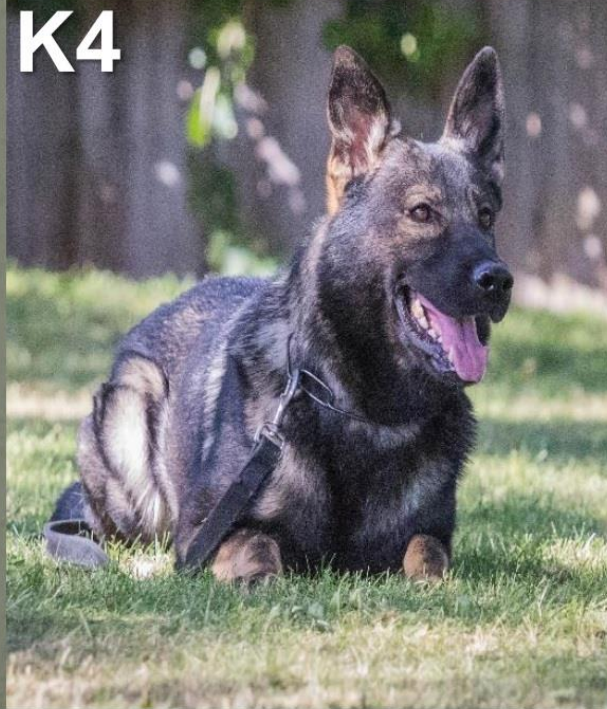

On behalf of the San Francisco-Marin Food Bank, I am writing to express our opposition to the proposed Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to eliminate the Annual Joint Fundraising Drive (File # 230648).

Our organization has been a beneficiary of this critical fundraising effort for many years. Last year, we received over \$10,000 in donations from City employees through the Fundraising Drive, the equivalent of over **20,000 meals** for our neighbors in need in San Francisco. The rationale listed in the ordinance, that reduced barriers and increased access to direct donations have eliminated the need for this city-run drive, does not align with the reality of what we know about charitable giving. The more friction a donor faces in making a donation, the less likely they are to consistently donate. The City's Fundraising Drive eliminated that friction by offering a direct monthly donation option for employees, which most are unlikely to set up independently without this valuable administrative nudge.

Terminating this program will have the impact of eliminating a valuable monthly donation stream for the Food Bank and further reduce the City's direct and indirect support for its food insecure residents. We rely on consistent monthly donations like those provided via the Annual Joint Fundraising Drive to continue to provide an essential service to tens of thousands of San Franciscans via our range of food security programs, which operate in every single district in the City. We implore you to oppose this proposed Ordinance and continue to support City employees in donating to the Food Bank and our fellow non-profit organizations.

On behalf of Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Bay Area, the youth, families and volunteer mentors who we serve and support, we are writing comments to implore you to not terminate the Annual Joint Fundraising Drive (AKA Combined Charities Drive).

With charitable donations from individual donors on the decline, dwindling opportunities for government funds and limited foundation grants, small to mid sized organizations like ours are struggling to identify the revenue needed to meet the significant demand for services in San Francisco.

We currently have 30 San Francisco youth and families waiting to be matched with a Mentor through our agency. With an evidence-based program model recommended by OJJDP and the World Bank and with significant demand from families, it is essential to keep 1:1 mentorship free and accessible for San Francisco youth and families.

Last year, we received \$6,554 through this program, which for an organization our size is a meaningful amount of revenue toward our program operations and will be a loss we feel if the program is eliminated.

Please reconsider eliminating yet another reliable source of funding for the nonprofit community in San Francisco.


