[Supporting SB 315, SCA 3 and SR 8] SUPPORTING SENATE BILL 315, SENATE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 3 AND SENATE RESOLUTION 8, WHICH COMPRISE A LEGISLATIVE PACKAGE DESIGNED TO EVALUATE AND ALLEVIATE TRANSPORTATION NEEDS IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA.

WHEREAS, Bay Area traffic is the fourth most congested in the United States; and,

WHEREAS, The Bay Area Council estimates that the Bay Area loses approximately \$900,000 per day in time and resources due to traffic congestion; and,

WHEREAS, A poll conducted in December, 1998 by the Bay Area Council found that transportation is the number one concern of Bay Area residents, far surpassing concerns for education, crime and the economy; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 315 proposes \$4 billion in General Obligation bonds over four election cycles with funds allocated in unspecified amounts for highway rehabilitation, local streets and roads rehabilitation and storm damage repair, transit rehabilitation and capital improvements, and completion of high priority capital projects which are not yet designated; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Constitutional Amendment 3 will change the two/thirds vote to a majority vote for locally imposed sales tax measures for transportation projects only; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Resolution 8 requests the California

Transportation Commission to work with CalTrans and the Regional

Transportation Planning Agencies to produce a ten year needs study of
the state's transportation system by May 1, 1999; and,

WHEREAS, This needs assessment will identify unfunded rehabilitation needs for the state highway system, local streets and roads, and transit systems; high priority projects that should be forwarded for completion over the next ten years; and a workload projection and estimate of staff increase necessary for CalTrans to complete this work in a timely and cost-efficient manner; and,

WHEREAS, The Bay Area transportation system is comprised of a variety of transit modes, including highways, trains, light rail, and ferries, which should be evaluated in relation to each other for rehabilitation and long-range planning; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco supports Senate Bill 315, Senate Constitutional Amendment 3 and Senate Resolution 8, which comprise a legislative package designed to evaluate and alleviate transportation needs in the state of California.
