We the undersigned are San Francisco residents, members of various environmental organizations. We, and other climate activists among your constituents, were relieved when the full Board of Supervisors passed a resolution recognizing the climate crisis, requesting a report from the Department of the Environment (SFE) within 100 days, and vowing to take action. We have met with representatives of the SFE and SF Supervisors.

We had hoped to review SFE's report, "Focus 2030," carefully before writing. But the report was not made public until July 16, with written public comment due the next day. The climate emergency requires mobilization of all city residents; it is unfortunate that the crucial first hearing occurs when most working people cannot attend. However, we look forward to future hearings that are both transparent and accessible to the broader population, as well as targeted at those San Franciscans most impacted.

Our comment today is perforce general and conditional. We know the plan must:

- make our buildings carbon neutral.
- make all forms of transportation carbon neutral.
- power the city with fully clean electricity not partially clean as it is now.
- fully invest in climate adaptation and resilience.
- ensure that instead of displacement it brings underserved neighborhoods more transportation choices, more living-wage jobs involved in adaptation and resilience work, and the health benefits of cleaner air that will result from attention to clean construction and transportation.

To achieve this plan, these goals must be City priorities of the highest urgency, and the whole City must work as a unified team.

First, the pace of activity on this plan must be commensurate with the climate emergency as recognized in the city's Climate Emergency Resolution. The city has moved too slowly in the past. Will you commit to work to mitigate the climate emergency at the urgent speed dictated by the language in "Focus 2030"?

Second, the city response to the climate emergency must maximize positive impacts on health, safety and livelihoods, with particular emphasis on impacts in historically disadvantaged communities. It would be hypocritical and unjust if we claimed to achieve "net zero" greenhouse gas emissions by displacing less-affluent residents, thereby increasing area-wide congestion and emissions as many former residents become commuters. Will you commit to assessing the equitableness not only of benefits from programs, but also of the costs relative to income they impose on residents?

Third, the plan must actively enable all city departments to cooperate fully in synergistic, coordinated emergency action, rather than compete for resources. Climate is an environmental issue as well as an issue of public safety, health and equity. We note and applaud the fact that the city has at last begun to move toward the needed flexibility and determination to attack the homelessness crisis. We now know how to work holistically across the city rather than agency by agency, mobilizing all and emphasizing community involvement. Will you commit to this collaborative mobilization to effectively face the historic challenges of climate change?

Fourth, there is no way to obscure the fact that the climate emergency response will require significant funding. At a minimum, climate strategies must become an integral piece of both the operating budgets of each department and of the Citys' 10-year Capital Plan beginning in 2020.

The Mayor and Supervisors must work cooperatively to ensure that initial and long-term funding needs and sources are identified. The Supervisors have a key role to play in ensuring that the activities and plans of each department are publicly vetted and that the Mayor's budget proposal includes the level of funding needed to jump-start this urgent effort. Will you commit to regular hearings on this issue?

The Supervisors, with the Mayor, also have a key role to play in ensuring that your response to the climate emergency is implemented at a regional level. Will you commit to active participation in regional efforts to address the climate emergency?

Finally, we know this is a tall order, and we expect regular open sessions that really invite public participation as the plan is hammered out at emergency speed. These sessions must be held at times when the public can attend, and plan documents must be available in time for working people to read and comment on them. Will you commit to giving a week for public comment, and to holding public meetings on Focus 2030 progress outside of regular working hours?

We, the other city residents we represent, and our neighbors look forward to hearing soon what has been done, and planning the next step together. San Francisco can be a leader and a model to cities around the world in shaping and implementing a viable response to climate change, the existential threat of our time.

Hi Erica,

I'm reaching out to supply some testimony for the 7/22 hearing on the resolution declaring a Climate Emergency:

It is my understanding that the resolution calls for a technical report, which is expected to show where the city is, and outline broad paths to, carbon neutrality.

We, as a city, have a unique opportunity to set the example of how a community can reach a carbon neutral state. We have a unique opportunity to influence our broader communities: state, nation, and globe.

Getting our city to a carbon neutral state will be unprecedented, and this could seem challenging, however I am confident that our city can do just this. I would urge the authors of the technical report to address three aspects in their plan, that can get us to carbon neutral:

- 1. Enable the reduction or elimination of future carbon emissions (carbon fee and divident policies or other regulation)
- 2. Enable the reduction of the existing carbon in our atmosphere (Invest in strategic reforestation or habitat restoration efforts to pull carbon out of the atmosphere)
- 3. Enable the city to thrive in a carbon-free city (invest in solutions to our carbon-intensive buildings and the transportation methods used by residents)
