1	[Urging HSH to Fill	Vacant Permanent	Supportive Housing	Units]

Resolution urging the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) to fill at least half of the vacant Permanent Supportive Housing units within 90 days and to maintain a vacancy rate no greater than 5% thereafter.

WHEREAS, Permanent Supportive Housing ("PSH") is a proven model to provide stable housing for people experiencing homelessness, where vulnerable people can tend to their physical and mental health in a stable environment with support services, which benefits the whole community; and

WHEREAS, According to the 2022 Point-in-Time Count, there were 7,754 people experiencing homelessness in San Francisco, consisting of 3,357 people in temporary shelters and 4,397 people unsheltered, all of whom could benefit from stable, supportive housing; and

WHEREAS, According to the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing's ("HSH") Vacancies in Permanent Supportive Housing ("PSH") dashboard, in August 2023, there were 1,002 vacancies in PSH, over 10% of the City's total number of PSH units, with 714 available for referral and 288 "offline" for maintenance, inspection, or other reasons and not available for referrals; and

WHEREAS, Vacancies in Supportive Housing rose sharply in or about 2021 and have remained high since then, averaging 10% monthly over the last two years; and

WHEREAS, HSH states on its website that it has a goal to reduce the vacancy rate to 7%, and that it has implemented a series of policies designed to help reach this goal, including lowered requirements for documentation for clients to move into housing, adding new Access Points to increase services to support clients to navigate the housing process,

1	outlining the length of time units can be offline for repairs, and improving the quality of PSH
2	buildings; and
3	WHEREAS, Despite the addition of new policies, San Francisco has continued to
4	average a 10% vacancy rate for PSH units over the last year; and
5	WHEREAS, There is widespread agreement that vacant PSH units need to be filled
6	with urgency and that it is unacceptable that the City should continue to have 10% of our
7	supportive housing portfolio vacant while people continue to experience homelessness, our
8	shelters continue to be filled to capacity, and PSH providers continue to lose necessary
9	revenue, yet despite this agreement in principle, vacancy numbers remain high; now,
10	therefore, be it
11	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors finds it unacceptable that our City
12	continues to have such a high vacancy rate in supportive housing at a time when so many
13	people are experiencing homelessness and our shelters are filled to capacity; and, be it
14	FURTHER RESOLVED, That Board of Supervisors urges HSH to act with urgency to
15	fill vacant PSH units and reduce the number of vacant PSH units by 50% within 90 days; and
16	be it
17	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges HSH to ensure that the
18	vacancy rate in PSH does not average more than 5% going forward; and, be it
19	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges HSH to report to the
20	Board of Supervisors on its progress filling vacant PSH units and reducing the vacancy rate
21	as described herein no later than 120 days after the date of this Resolution.
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
