1 [Supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 2017 (Haney) - State Holidays: Eid]

2  
3 **Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 2017, introduced by**  
4 **Assembly Member Matt Haney, which would recognize Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha in**  
5 **California law and ensure students, educators, and state employees have the**  
6 **opportunity to observe these significant religious holidays.**  
7

8 WHEREAS, On February 17, 2026, Assembly Member Matt Haney introduced  
9 Assembly Bill No. 2017 (AB 2017), which would add Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha to the list of  
10 recognized state holidays in California; and

11 WHEREAS, AB 2017 is sponsored by the Commission on Asian and Pacific Islander  
12 American Affairs (CAPIAA), the Muslim Impact Council, and the Council on American-Islamic  
13 Relations California, organizations that advocate for the recognition, equity, and inclusion of  
14 Muslim and Asian American and Pacific Islander communities across California; and

15 WHEREAS, Eid al-Fitr marks the end of the holy month of Ramadan, and Eid al-Adha  
16 commemorates the conclusion of the annual Hajj pilgrimage, and both holidays are among the  
17 most significant religious observances for Muslims around the world; and

18 WHEREAS, California is home to one of the largest and most diverse Muslim  
19 populations in the United States, including many residents, students, workers, and families  
20 who observe Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha each; and

21 WHEREAS, AB 2017 would guarantee students are able to receive excused absences  
22 for the observance of Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha, helping ensure that students are not  
23 penalized for participating in important religious and cultural traditions; and

24 WHEREAS, The bill would also authorize state employees to elect to use leave or  
25 holiday credit to observe these holidays and allow public schools and community colleges to

1 close or recognize the holidays through collective bargaining agreements, as specified in state  
2 law; and

3 WHEREAS, Recognizing Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha promotes religious inclusion,  
4 cultural understanding, and respect for the diverse traditions that contribute to the social fabric  
5 of California and the City and County of San Francisco; and

6 WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco has long been committed to  
7 advancing equity, supporting religious freedom, and ensuring that public institutions reflect the  
8 diversity and values of the communities they serve; and

9 WHEREAS, AB 2017 would continue California's leadership in recognizing and  
10 respecting the cultural and religious diversity of its residents while ensuring fairness for  
11 students and workers observing their faith traditions; now, therefore, be it

12 RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco  
13 hereby supports Assembly Bill No. 2017 as an important measure to recognize the religious  
14 observances of Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha and promote inclusivity and equity in California  
15 law; and, be it

16 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the California State  
17 Legislature and the Governor to enact AB 2017 to ensure that students, educators, and state  
18 employees can observe these important religious holidays without penalty; and, be it

19 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall transmit a  
20 copy of this Resolution to the Governor of California, the President pro Tempore of the  
21 California State Senate, the Speaker of the California State Assembly, and Assembly Member  
22 Matt Haney to express the City and County of San Francisco's strong support for this  
23 legislation.

**ASSEMBLY BILL**

**No. 2017**

**Introduced by Assembly Member Haney**  
(Principal coauthor: Senator Wahab)

February 17, 2026

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An act to amend Section 135 of the Code of Civil Procedure, to amend Sections 37220.7, 45203, 48205, 79020, and 88203 of the Education Code, and to amend Sections 6700, 19853, and 19853.1 of the Government Code, relating to state holidays.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

AB 2017, as introduced, Haney. State holidays: Eid.

Existing law designates specific days as holidays in this state. Existing law adopts state holidays as judicial holidays, with certain exceptions, including Admission Day and Columbus Day. Existing law designates holidays on which community colleges and public schools are authorized to close pursuant to a memorandum of understanding between the governing board and represented employees, including “Native American Day” on the 4th Friday in September.

This bill would add “Eid al-Fitr” and “Eid al-Adha” to the list of state holidays. The bill would exclude “Eid al-Fitr” and “Eid al-Adha” from designation as judicial holidays. The bill would authorize community colleges and public schools to close on “Eid al-Fitr” and “Eid al-Adha,” as specified.

Existing law, notwithstanding the requirement that each person between 6 and 18 years of age who is not otherwise exempted is subject to compulsory full-time education, requires a pupil to be excused from school for specified types of absences, including, among others, an absence for justifiable personal reasons including, but not limited to,

observance of a holiday or ceremony of the pupil's religion, if the pupil's absence is requested in writing by the parent or guardian and approved by the principal or a designated representative, as specified.

This bill would add an absence for purposes of observing "Eid al-Fitr" or "Eid al-Adha" to the list of required excused absences. To the extent the bill would impose additional duties on school officials, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Existing law entitles state employees, with specified exceptions, to be given time off with pay for specified holidays. Existing law, in addition, authorizes state employees to elect to use 8 hours of vacation, annual leave, compensating time off, or personal holiday credit corresponding with specified dates.

This bill would, similarly, authorize state employees to elect to use 8 hours of vacation, annual leave, compensating time off, or personal holiday credit corresponding with "Eid al-Fitr" or "Eid al-Adha," as specified.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to the statutory provisions noted above.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes.  
State-mandated local program: yes.

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

1     SECTION 1. Section 135 of the Code of Civil Procedure is  
2     amended to read:  
3     135. Every full day designated as a holiday by Section 6700  
4     of the Government Code, including that Thursday of November  
5     declared by the President to be Thanksgiving Day, is a judicial  
6     holiday, except the date corresponding with the second new moon  
7     following the winter solstice, or the third new moon following the  
8     winter solstice should an intercalary month intervene, known as  
9     "Lunar New Year," *the first day of the month of Shawwal in the*  
10    *Islamic lunar calendar, known as "Eid al-Fitr," the 15th day of*  
11    the month of Kartik in the Hindu lunar calendar of each year,  
12    known as "Diwali," April 24, known as "Genocide Remembrance

Day,” *the 10th day of the month of Dhu al-Hijjah in the Islamic lunar calendar, known as “Eid al-Adha,”* September 9, known as “Admission Day,” the second Monday in October, known as “Columbus Day,” and any other day appointed by the President, but not by the Governor, for a public fast, thanksgiving, or holiday. If a judicial holiday falls on a Saturday or a Sunday, the Judicial Council may designate an alternative day for observance of the holiday. Every Saturday and the day after Thanksgiving Day are judicial holidays. Officers and employees of the courts shall observe only the judicial holidays established pursuant to this section.

SEC. 2. Section 37220.7 of the Education Code is amended to read:

37220.7. (a) In addition to the holidays prescribed in Section 37220, public schools may be closed on *the first day of the month of Shawwal in the Islamic lunar calendar, known as “Eid al-Fitr,”* April 24, known as “Genocide Remembrance Day,” the 15th day of the month of Kartik in the Hindu lunar calendar of each year, known as “Diwali,” *the 10th day of the month of Dhu al-Hijjah in the Islamic lunar calendar, known as “Eid al-Adha,”* and the fourth Friday in September, known as “Native American Day,” if the governing board, pursuant to a memorandum of understanding reached pursuant to Chapter 10.7 (commencing with Section 3540) of Division 4 of Title 1 of the Government Code, agrees to close schools for that purpose.

(b) On the fourth Friday in September, or if schools are closed on that date as specified in subdivision (a), on an alternate day determined by the governing board, public schools and educational institutions throughout this state may include exercises, funded through existing resources, commemorating and directing attention to the many contributions that Native Americans have made to this country. The State Board of Education may adopt a model curriculum guide to be available for use by public schools for exercises related to Native American Day.

(c) On April 24, or if schools are closed on that date as specified in subdivision (a), on an alternate day determined by the governing board, public schools and educational institutions throughout this state may include exercises, funded through existing resources, remembering and honoring the many contributions that survivors of genocide have made to this country. The State Board of

1 Education may adopt a model curriculum guide to be available for  
2 use by public schools for exercises related to Genocide  
3 Remembrance Day.

4 (d) On the 15th day of the month of Kartik in the Hindu lunar  
5 calendar of each year, or if schools are closed on that date as  
6 specified in subdivision (a), on an alternate day determined by the  
7 governing board, public schools and educational institutions  
8 throughout this state may include exercises, funded through  
9 existing resources, acknowledging and celebrating the meaning  
10 and importance of Diwali. The State Board of Education may adopt  
11 a model curriculum guide to be available for use by public schools  
12 for exercises related to Diwali.

13 (e) *On the first day of the month of Shawwal and the 10th day*  
14 *of the month of Dhu al-Hijjah in the Islamic lunar calendar, known*  
15 *as “Eid al-Fitr” and “Eid al-Adha” respectively, or if schools are*  
16 *closed on those dates as specified in subdivision (a), on alternate*  
17 *dates determined by the governing board, public schools and*  
18 *educational institutions throughout this state may include exercises,*  
19 *funded through existing resources, acknowledging and celebrating*  
20 *the meaning and importance of Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha. The*  
21 *State Board of Education may adopt a model curriculum guide to*  
22 *be available for use by public schools for exercises related to Eid*  
23 *al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha.*

24 SEC. 3. Section 45203 of the Education Code is amended to  
25 read:

26 45203. All probationary or permanent employees that are a  
27 part of the classified service shall be entitled to the following paid  
28 holidays provided they are in a paid status during any portion of  
29 the working day immediately preceding or succeeding the holiday:  
30 January 1, February 12 known as “Lincoln Day,” the third Monday  
31 in February known as “Washington Day,” the last Monday in May  
32 known as “Memorial Day,” July 4, the first Monday in September  
33 known as “Labor Day,” November 11 known as “Veterans Day,”  
34 that Thursday in November proclaimed by the President as  
35 “Thanksgiving Day,” December 25, every day appointed by the  
36 President, or the Governor of this state, as provided for in  
37 paragraphs (11) and (12) of subdivision (a) of Section 37220 for  
38 a public fast, thanksgiving, or holiday, or any day declared a  
39 holiday under Section 1318 or 37222 for classified or certificated  
40 employees. School recesses during the Christmas, Easter, and

1 mid-February periods shall not be considered holidays for classified  
2 employees who are normally required to work during that period.  
3 However, this shall not be construed as affecting vacation rights  
4 specified in this section. For purposes of this section, “appointed  
5 by the President” includes the President signing into law legislation  
6 that creates a nationwide federal holiday, including the legal public  
7 holidays listed in subsection (a) of Section 6103 of Title 5 of the  
8 United States Code, but does not include Columbus Day. This  
9 definition is declaratory of existing law.

10 Regular employees of the district who are not normally assigned  
11 to duty during the school holidays of December 25 and January 1  
12 shall be paid for those two holidays provided that they were in a  
13 paid status during any portion of the working day of their normal  
14 assignment immediately preceding or succeeding the holiday  
15 period.

16 When a holiday listed in this section falls on a Sunday, the  
17 following Monday shall be deemed to be the holiday in lieu of the  
18 day observed. When a holiday listed in this section falls on a  
19 Saturday, the preceding Friday shall be deemed to be the holiday  
20 in lieu of the day observed. When a classified employee is required  
21 to work on any of these holidays, they shall be paid compensation,  
22 or given compensating time off, for such work, in addition to the  
23 regular pay received for the holiday, at the rate of time and one-half  
24 the employee’s regular rate of pay.

25 The provisions of Article 3 (commencing with Section 37220)  
26 of Chapter 2 of Part 22 shall not be construed to in any way limit  
27 the provisions of this section, nor shall anything in this section be  
28 construed to prohibit the governing board from adopting separate  
29 work schedules for the certificated and the classified services, or  
30 from providing holiday pay for employees who have not been in  
31 paid status on the days specified herein. Notwithstanding the  
32 adoption of separate work schedules for the certificated and the  
33 classified services, on any schoolday during which pupils would  
34 otherwise have been in attendance but are not and for which  
35 certificated personnel receive regular pay, classified personnel  
36 shall also receive regular pay whether or not they are required to  
37 report for duty that day.

38 In addition to the other paid holidays specified in this section,  
39 the classified service may be entitled to a paid holiday on *the first*  
40 *day of the month of Shawwal in the Islamic lunar calendar, known*

1 as “*Eid al-Fitr*,” a paid holiday on March 31 known as “Cesar  
2 Chavez Day,” a paid holiday on April 24 known as “Genocide  
3 Remembrance Day,” a paid holiday on the 15th day of the month  
4 of Kartik in the Hindu lunar calendar of each year, known as  
5 “*Diwali*,” a paid holiday on the 10th day of the month of *Dhu*  
6 *al-Hijjah* in the Islamic lunar calendar, known as “*Eid al-Adha*,”  
7 and a paid holiday on the fourth Friday in September known as  
8 “Native American Day,” provided they are in a paid status during  
9 any portion of the working day immediately preceding or  
10 succeeding the holiday, if the governing board, pursuant to a  
11 memorandum of understanding reached pursuant to Chapter 10.7  
12 (commencing with Section 3540) of Division 4 of Title 1 of the  
13 Government Code, agrees to the paid holiday.

14 This section shall apply to districts that have adopted the merit  
15 system in the same manner and effect as if it were a part of Article  
16 6 (commencing with Section 45240).

17 SEC. 4. Section 48205 of the Education Code is amended to  
18 read:

19 48205. (a) Notwithstanding Section 48200, a pupil shall be  
20 excused from school when the absence is:

21 (1) Due to the pupil’s illness, including an absence for the  
22 benefit of the pupil’s mental or behavioral health.

23 (2) Due to quarantine under the direction of a county or city  
24 health officer.

25 (3) For purposes of having medical, dental, optometrical, or  
26 chiropractic services rendered.

27 (4) For purposes of attending the funeral services or grieving  
28 the death of either a member of the pupil’s immediate family, or  
29 of a person that is determined by the pupil’s parent or guardian to  
30 be in such close association with the pupil as to be considered the  
31 pupil’s immediate family, so long as the absence is not more than  
32 five days per incident.

33 (5) For purposes of jury duty in the manner provided for by law.

34 (6) Due to the illness or medical appointment during school  
35 hours of a child of whom the pupil is the custodial parent, including  
36 absences to care for a sick child, for which the school shall not  
37 require a note from a doctor.

38 (7) For justifiable personal reasons, including, but not limited  
39 to, an attendance or appearance in court, attendance at a funeral  
40 service, observance of a holiday or ceremony of the pupil’s

1 religion, attendance at a religious retreat, attendance at an  
2 employment conference, or attendance at an educational conference  
3 on the legislative or judicial process offered by a nonprofit  
4 organization, when the pupil's absence is requested in writing by  
5 the parent or guardian and approved by the principal or a designated  
6 representative pursuant to uniform standards established by the  
7 governing board of the school district.

8 *(8) For purposes of observing the first day of the month of*  
9 *Shawwal in the Islamic lunar calendar, known as "Eid al-Fitr,"*  
10 *or the 10th day of the month of Dhu al-Hijjah in the Islamic lunar*  
11 *calendar, known as "Eid al-Adha."*

13 (9) For purposes of serving as a member of a precinct board for  
14 an election pursuant to Section 12302 of the Elections Code.

16 (10) For purposes of spending time with a member of the pupil's  
17 immediate family who is an active duty member of the uniformed  
18 services, as defined in Section 49701, and has been called to duty  
19 for, is on leave from, or has immediately returned from,

21 granted for a period of time to be determined at the discretion of

18 as “Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day,” February 12 known as  
19 “Lincoln Day,” the third Monday in February known as  
20 “Washington Day,” the last Monday in May known as “Memorial  
21 Day,” July 4, the first Monday in September known as “Labor  
22 Day,” November 11 known as “Veterans Day,” that Thursday in  
23 November proclaimed by the President as “Thanksgiving Day,”  
24 and December 25.

25 (b) Any contractual provision between any community college  
26 district and its employees in effect on the effective date of the act  
27 that adds this subdivision shall prevail over any conflict regarding  
28 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day until the termination date of the  
29 contract or upon termination by mutual agreement of the parties,  
30 whichever occurs first.

31 (c) The Governor in appointing any other day for a public fast,  
32 thanksgiving, or holiday may provide whether the community  
33 colleges shall close on the day. If the Governor does not provide

6 definition is declaratory of existing law.

7 (e) The community colleges shall continue in session on all  
8 legal holidays other than those designated by or pursuant to this  
9 section, and shall hold proper exercises commemorating the day.

10 (f) When any of the holidays on which the schools would be  
11 closed fall on Sunday, the community colleges shall close on the  
12 Monday following, except that (1) if Lincoln Day falls on a  
13 Sunday, the community colleges may observe this holiday on the  
14 preceding or following Friday, the following Monday, or the  
15 following Tuesday, and maintain classes on the date specified in  
16 subdivision (a) where applicable, or (2) if Lincoln Day falls on a  
17 Monday, the community colleges may observe this holiday on the  
18 preceding or following Friday, that Monday, or the following  
19 Tuesday, and maintain classes on the date specified in subdivision  
20 (a) where applicable.

21 (g) When any of the holidays on which the schools would be  
22 closed, except Lincoln Day, fall on Saturday, the community  
23 colleges shall close on the preceding Friday, and that Friday shall  
24 be declared a state holiday.

25 (h) If any holiday on which the community colleges are required  
26 to close pursuant to subdivision (a) occurs under federal law on a  
27 date different than the date specified in subdivision (a), the  
28 governing board of any community college district may close the  
29 community colleges of the district on the date recognized by federal  
30 law and maintain classes on the date specified in subdivision (a).

31 (i) When Veterans Day would fall on Tuesday, the governing  
32 board of a community college district may close the colleges on  
33 the preceding Monday, and maintain classes on the date specified  
34 in subdivision (a). When Veterans Day would fall on Wednesday,  
35 the governing board of a community college district may close the  
36 colleges on either the preceding Monday or the following Friday,  
37 and maintain classes on the date specified in subdivision (a). When  
38 Veterans Day would fall on Thursday, the governing board of a  
39 community college district may close the colleges on the following

3 (j) When Lincoln Day would fall on Tuesday, the governing

8 Wednesday, the governing board of a community college district
