**SIXTH SUPPLEMENT TO MAYORAL PROCLAMATION DECLARING THE
EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY DATED FEBRUARY 25, 2020**

WHEREAS, California Government Code Sections 8550 et seq., San Francisco Charter Section 3.100(14) and Chapter 7 of the San Francisco Administrative Code empower the Mayor to proclaim the existence of a local emergency, subject to concurrence by the Board of Supervisors as provided in the Charter, in the case of an emergency threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County or its citizens; and

WHEREAS, On February 25, 2020, the Mayor issued a Proclamation (the “Proclamation”) declaring a local emergency to exist in connection with the imminent spread within the City of a novel (new) coronavirus (“COVID-19”); and

WHEREAS, On March 3, 2020, the Board of Supervisors concurred in the Proclamation and in the actions taken by the Mayor to meet the emergency; and

WHEREAS, On March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency to exist within the State due to the threat posed by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, On March 6, 2020, the Local Health Officer declared a local health emergency under Section 101080 of the California Health and Safety Code, and the Board of Supervisors concurred in that declaration on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, On March 6, 2020, the City issued public health guidance to encourage social distancing to disrupt the spread of COVID-19 and protect community health; and

WHEREAS, On March 7, 2020, the Local Health Officer ordered certain City facilities not to hold non-essential group events of more than 50 people for the two weeks from the date of the order and prohibited visitors from Laguna Honda Hospital; and

WHEREAS, On March 7, 2020, the Department of Human Resources issued guidance to minimize COVID-19 exposure risk for City employees who provide essential services to the local community, in particular during the current local emergency; and

WHEREAS, On March 11, 2020, March 13, 2020, March 17, 2020, March 18, 2020, and March 23, 2020, the Mayor issued supplements to the Proclamation, ordering additional measures to respond to the emergency; and



WHEREAS, On March 16, 2020, the City’s Health Officer issued a stay safe at home order, Health Officer Order No. C19-07 (the “Stay Safe At Home Order”), requiring most people to remain in their homes subject to certain exceptions including obtaining essential goods such as food and necessary supplies, and requiring the closure of non-essential businesses, through April 7, 2020, as that order may be extended or modified; and

WHEREAS, On March 19, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-33-20 and the California Public Health Officer issued a corresponding order requiring people to stay home except as needed subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, There are currently 279 confirmed cases of COVID-19 within the City and there have been 3 COVID-19-related deaths in the City; there are more than 4,600 confirmed cases in California, and there have been 92 COVID-19-related deaths in California; and

WHEREAS, This order and the previous orders issued during this emergency have all been issued because of the propensity of the virus to spread person to person and also because the virus physically is causing property loss or damage due to its proclivity to attach to surfaces for prolonged periods of time; and

WHEREAS, The use of hotel rooms to house healthcare workers, first responders, people affected by COVID-19, and people who live in congregate settings or are homeless is an essential part of the City’s response to the pandemic, and waiving the City’s hotel tax for these purposes will reduce the financial burden on healthcare workers and first responders who need to stay in the City to be closer to work and on individuals who need to rent a hotel room to self-isolate; and

WHEREAS, Due to the stay at home orders and the closure of many City offices, including the offices of the Tax Collector and the Assessor-Recorder, it may be difficult or impossible to meet certain legal deadlines, including deadlines associated with filing claims with the City, and it is in the public interest to extend such deadlines; and

WHEREAS, Despite the Health Officer’s Stay Safe At Home Order prohibiting public gatherings and requiring social distancing when outside the home and engaged in essential activities, large gatherings of individuals have been observed outside



convenience stores and small grocery stores that sell alcohol in the nighttime hours; these large gatherings pose a threat to the public health due to the ease by which COVID-19 spreads from person to person; closing stores where these gatherings occur during the nighttime hours will reduce this risk and protect the public health; and

WHEREAS, It may be necessary for food banks and other service providers to distribute food in connection with COVID-19 response efforts on sidewalks and streets; it is in the public interest to suspend City permit and fee requirements in connection with these activities; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor proclaims that the conditions of extreme peril exist and continue to warrant and necessitate the existence of a local emergency,

NOW, THEREFORE,

I, London N. Breed, Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco, proclaim that there continues to exist an emergency within the City and County threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County and its citizens;

In addition to the measures outlined in the Proclamation and in the Supplements to the Proclamation dated March 11, March 13, March 17, March 18, and March 23, 2020, it is further ordered that:

(1) No tax shall be imposed under Article 7 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code on the rent for occupancy of a guest room in a hotel that is paid: (a) to house public or private healthcare workers involved in the response to the COVID-19 pandemic; (b) to house first responders, including but not limited to police officers, firefighters, and members of the Sheriff's Department, involved in the response to the COVID-19 pandemic; (c) to house individuals under self-isolation or quarantine as a result of COVID-19 illness, suspected COVID-19 illness, or exposure to someone with COVID-19 illness; and (d) for the City to house for medical reasons homeless individuals or individuals from congregate settings or shelters. This order shall remain in effect until the termination of the emergency, unless the Mayor earlier provides notice to the Board of Supervisors that this order is no longer necessary and rescinds the order. Nothing in this order shall exempt from assessment any gross revenues collected from the occupancy of a room in a hotel under either the San Francisco Tourism Improvement District



established by Resolution 504-08 or the Moscone Expansion District established by Resolution 26-13.

(2) If a taxpayer's one-year deadline to file a claim for tax refund with the City under Sections 6.15-1(a) or 1113(a) of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code or a claimant's deadline to file any other claim with the City under Section 911.2 of the California Government Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and May 18, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days. For any claimant whose deadline is extended under the preceding sentence, the time to file a request for late claim relief under Section 911.4 of the California Government Code shall be extended by 90 days. For any claimant whose deadline to file a request for late claim relief under Section 911.4 of the California Government Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and May 18, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days. If a taxpayer or claimant's deadline to file suit against the City after the City's denial or failure to act on a claim would expire between March 17, 2020, and May 18, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days. The 90-day extensions contemplated by this paragraph shall be coextensive with, and not in addition to, the 60-day extension provided in Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-35-20 and any other extensions provided to the taxpayers or claimants.

(3) Specific deadlines by which the Tax Collector, Recorder, and taxpayers must act are extended as follows:

(a) If the Tax Collector's deadline to collect any tax from a third party under Section 6.10-2 of Article 6 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code or the Tax Collector's deadline to pursue any collections actions governed by Section 6.10-3 of Article 6 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and June 30, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days.

(b) If the Tax Collector's deadline to issue a determination under 6.11-2 of Article 6 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and June 30, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days.

(c) If the 30-day period within which a taxpayer may petition a determination issued by the Tax Collector under Section 6.13-1 of Article 6 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code, or the 15-day period within which a taxpayer may petition a jeopardy determination issued by the Tax Collector under Section 6.12-5 of



Article 6 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and June 30, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days.

(d) If the 15-day period within which a person may protest a citation under Section 6.19-8 of Article 6 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and June 30, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days.

(e) If the Recorder's 3-year deadline to issue a deficiency determination under Section 1115 of Article 12-C of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and June 30, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days.

(f) If the Recorder's 1-year deadline to report a delinquency to the Board of Supervisors and request lien proceedings under Section 1115.1 of Article 12-C of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and June 30, 2020, such deadline is extended by 90 days.

(g) If the Tax Collector's 3-year deadline to pursue collection remedies governed by Section 1115.4(b)(3) of Article 12-C of the Business and Tax Regulations Code or the Tax Collector's 3-year deadline to collect unpaid transfer tax from a third party under Section 1115.6 of Article 12-C of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code would expire between March 17, 2020, and June 30, 2020, such deadlines are extended by 90 days.

(4) The following essential businesses permitted to operate under the City's Stay Safe At Home Order (Health Officer Order No. C19-07), or any continuation or extension of that order, must be closed to the public every day between 8:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.: any store that has less than 5,000 gross square feet of retail space and sells alcohol under a Type 20-Off Sale Beer & Wine license or a Type 21-Off Sale General license from the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control. This order shall not include pharmacies and drug stores. This order shall remain in place until the termination of the emergency, unless the Mayor provides notice to the Board of Supervisors that this order is no longer necessary and rescinds the order. If the restrictions that apply to operations of Essential Businesses in the Stay Safe At Home Order or any other order of the Mayor or Health Officer are modified to be more restrictive than this order, then businesses covered by this order must follow the most restrictive provisions.



(5) Temporary use of City streets and sidewalks for the provision or distribution of food as necessary to support the City's COVID-19 response efforts shall be permitted during the local emergency, as authorized by the Mayor or the Mayor's designee in consultation with the Director of Public Works or the Director's designee or the City Traffic Engineer or the Traffic Engineer's designee, as appropriate; any provision in City law that limits or restricts such provision or distribution of food is hereby waived, and any applicable local requirements for public notice, the filing or approval of a permit application, or payment of fees are hereby waived.

**SEVENTH SUPPLEMENT TO MAYORAL PROCLAMATION DECLARING
THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY DATED FEBRUARY 25, 2020**

WHEREAS, California Government Code Sections 8550 et seq., San Francisco Charter Section 3.100(14) and Chapter 7 of the San Francisco Administrative Code empower the Mayor to proclaim the existence of a local emergency, subject to concurrence by the Board of Supervisors as provided in the Charter, in the case of an emergency threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County or its citizens; and

WHEREAS, On March 7, 2020, the Local Health Officer ordered certain City facilities not to hold non-essential group events of more than 50 people for the two weeks from the date of the order and prohibited visitors from Laguna Honda Hospital; and

WHEREAS, On March 7, 2020, the Department of Human Resources issued guidance to minimize COVID-19 exposure risk for City employees who provide essential services to the local community, in particular during the current local emergency; and

WHEREAS, On March 11, 2020, March 13, 2020, March 17, 2020, March 18, 2020, and March 23, 2020, the Mayor issued supplements to the Proclamation, ordering additional measures to respond to the emergency; and



WHEREAS, On March 16, 2020, the City's Health Officer issued a stay safe at home order, Health Officer Order No. C19-07 (the "Stay Safe At Home Order"), requiring most people to remain in their homes subject to certain exceptions including obtaining essential goods such as food and necessary supplies, and requiring the closure of non-essential businesses, through April 7, 2020, as that order may be extended or modified; and

WHEREAS, On March 19, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-33-20 and the California Public Health Officer issued a corresponding order requiring people to stay home except as needed subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, There are currently 397 confirmed cases of COVID-19 within the City and there have been 6 COVID-19-related deaths in the City; there are more than 8,100 confirmed cases in California, and there have been 170 COVID-19-related deaths in California; and

WHEREAS, This order and the previous orders issued during this emergency have all been issued because of the propensity of the virus to spread person to person and also because the virus physically is causing property loss or damage due to its proclivity to attach to surfaces for prolonged periods of time; and

WHEREAS, It is in the public interest to support City employees through this public health emergency by ensuring they have sufficient paid time off balances to remain out of the workplace if they or their family members are sick, quarantined, or otherwise impacted by the COVID-19 virus or by actions taken in response to public health guidance or orders related to COVID-19; this action allows employees to return to work as soon as possible and function at full capacity in the service of the City and its residents and also mitigates the financial impacts of the emergency on City employees; and

WHEREAS, In the Third Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation dated March 17, 2020, the Mayor recognized that many City employees affected by the Stay Safe At Home Order cannot perform their duties remotely and must stay home and that it is in the public interest to support such employees with paid leave; to address those effects of the emergency, the Mayor authorized a paid leave program through April 17, 2020, to mitigate financial impacts of the emergency on City employees; and



WHEREAS, As part of the City's response to the COVID-19 public health emergency, certain City employees providing essential services must remain working in the workplace or in the field, including interacting with members of the public; additional programs and benefits are appropriate to recognize the service of these employees providing essential services during this emergency; and

WHEREAS, The local emergency relating to COVID-19 will have a substantial impact on the City's finances, both by reducing tax revenue and increasing expenditures necessary to address the emergency; and

WHEREAS, Local law establishes a process by which the City prepares and adopts a budget, and deadlines for each significant step in that process; consistent with local law, the Mayor must present a balanced budget proposal for certain departments by May 1 and for all other City departments by June 1, and the Board of Supervisors must hold public hearings on the budget and approve the full budget by August 1st; and

WHEREAS, In light of the ongoing and unprecedented nature of the emergency, the City will not be able to prepare accurate, reliable projections of the financial impact of the emergency in time to complete the budget cycle before August 1st; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor proclaims that the conditions of extreme peril exist and continue to warrant and necessitate the existence of a local emergency,

NOW, THEREFORE,

I, London N. Breed, Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco, proclaim that there continues to exist an emergency within the City and County threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County and its citizens;

In addition to the measures outlined in the Proclamation and in the Supplements to the Proclamation dated March 11, March 13, March 17, March 18, March 23, and March 27, 2020, it is further ordered that:

(1) The Human Resources Director is authorized, with the concurrence of the Controller, to extend the existing paid leave program for City employees, first authorized by the March 17, 2020 Supplemental Proclamation, through May 1, 2020, to mitigate the financial impacts of the emergency on these City employees. The Director of



Transportation is authorized, with the concurrence of the Controller, to extend the existing paid leave program for service critical employees of the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency ("SFMTA"), first authorized by the March 17, 2020 Supplemental Proclamation, through May 1, 2020. This paid leave program is for employees who are available to work, but not working, including working from home, due to the stay safe at home orders.

(2) In addition to the paid sick leave under the federal Families First Coronavirus Response Act, the City shall provide all regularly-scheduled employees an additional 80 hours of new paid sick leave that employees can use for any sick leave related purpose and for school closures. Part-time employees shall receive a prorated number of new paid sick leave hours. This additional sick leave shall expire on December 31, 2020. Any provisions of the Charter, the Municipal Code, and City rules or regulations that would limit or prevent this additional sick leave benefit are waived. The Human Resources Director and Controller, or their designees, are authorized to implement this program and issue any necessary rules and guidance.

(3) The maximum accrual limits for City employee vacation leave and floating holiday leave are waived through the duration of the declared emergency, as specified herein. Employees may accrue up to an additional 80 hours over the vacation maximum accrual limit over the duration of the emergency. Upon termination of the emergency, employees must use vacation and reduce their balance below the maximum accrual by December 31, 2021. In addition, employees may roll over an additional 80 hours of floating holiday time above the normal rollover limit for Fiscal Year 2020-21 and Fiscal Year 2021-22. Any provisions of the Charter, the Municipal Code, and City rules or regulations that would limit or prevent these additional accruals are waived, including but not limited to Charter Section A8.440 and Administrative Code Section 16.12. The Human Resources Director and Controller, or their designees, are authorized to implement this program and issue any necessary rules and guidance.

(4) The Director of Transportation for SFMTA service critical employees and the Human Resources Director for all other employees are authorized to implement the following programs, to recognize and support the work of salaried employees (designated "Z" symbol employees) who are not eligible for overtime but who are working additional hours to support the City's emergency response:



(a) The City will waive compensatory time caps for salaried employees so that those employees can earn up to an additional 80 hours above the current compensatory caps for the extra work they perform during the public health emergency. Compensatory time is not subject to cash out for salaried employees.

(b) For miscellaneous employees represented by the Municipal Executives Association, and other City employees who are not eligible to earn overtime, the City will allow those employees to earn up to 80 hours of compensatory time on an hour for hour basis for work during the emergency. Compensatory time is not subject to cash out for salaried employees.

(c) Any provisions of the Charter, the Municipal Code, and City rules or regulations that would limit or prevent this compensatory time off benefit are waived. The Director of Transportation, Human Resources Director and Controller, or their designees, are authorized to implement this program and issue any necessary rules and guidance.

(5) The Director of Transportation for SFMTA service critical employees and the Human Resources Director for all other employees are authorized to implement the following programs, to recognize the work of City employees who are performing essential service and must remain working in the workplace or in the field, including interacting with members of the public, the City will provide the following benefits:

(a) For employees performing essential services who must remain in the workplace, the City will provide paid administrative leave if those employees are diagnosed with COVID-19, have symptoms consistent with COVID-19 infection, or must isolate/quarantine pursuant to direction of a healthcare provider or order from a federal, state or local official. For purposes of eligibility for paid administrative leave only, the City will presume these employees became exposed or sick in the workplace.

(b) For employees performing essential services who must remain in the workplace, the City will provide 8 hours of floating holidays for every 40 hours of regularly scheduled hours worked in the workplace, up to a maximum of 80 hours of floating holiday over the duration of the emergency. The City will credit these floating holiday hours in the first full pay period after the end of the emergency. As with other floating holidays, these hours are not subject to cash out upon separation.



(c) Any provisions of the Charter, the Municipal Code, and City rules or regulations that would limit or prevent these paid administrative leave and floating holiday benefits are waived. The Director of Transportation, Human Resources Director and Controller, or their designees, are authorized to implement this program and issue any necessary rules and guidance.

(6) The deadlines by which the Mayor, the Controller, the Board of Supervisors, the Board's Budget Analyst, and City departments are required to take action relating to the development and approval of the City's budget, are modified as follows:

(a) By no later than March 31, 2020, the Mayor, the Board's Budget Analyst, and the Controller shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a joint report with an updated estimated summary budget for future fiscal years, and shall subsequently amend this estimated summary budget as deemed necessary. By July 1, 2020, the Board of Supervisors may review, amend, and adopt by resolution any revisions to the financial plan for the remaining four years, as provided in Administrative Code Section 3.6(b).

(b) By no later than June 1, 2020, the Mayor shall submit an interim budget, including interim appropriation and salary ordinances, to the Board of Supervisors. By no later than June 30, 2020, the Board of Supervisors shall finally pass the interim appropriation and salary ordinances, as required by Charter Section 9.100(b) and Administrative Code Section 3.3(k). Upon enactment, the interim budget shall be operative from July 1, 2020 until the enactment of the biennial budget, which shall occur no later than October 1, 2020.

(c) By no later than June 1, 2020, the SFMTA shall submit to the Board of Supervisors an interim budget for the agency. The Board of Supervisors shall review and may reject the SFMTA's interim budget under Charter Section 8A.106 within 30 days of receipt. The interim budget shall be operative from July 1, 2020 until October 1, 2020. By no later than August 1, 2020, the SFMTA shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a biennial budget, which shall be operative from October 1, 2020 to June 30, 2022. The Board of Supervisors shall review and may reject the SFMTA's budget under Charter Section 8A.106 by no later than September 30, 2020.

(d) By no later than July 1, 2020, the Mayor shall transmit to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors a detailed description of the Mayor's budget priorities, as required by Administrative Code Section 3.3(g).



(e) The requirement under Administrative Code Section 3.3(l) that the Budget and Appropriations Committee, or whichever other committee the Board designates to review the proposed budget, return the Annual Appropriation Ordinance (“AAO”) and the Annual Salary Ordinance (“ASO”), along with any accompanying legislation, to the full Board of Supervisors by no later than July 15, shall be waived.

(f) By no later than August 1, 2020:

(i) The Mayor shall submit to the Board of Supervisors the biennial City budget, which shall be operative from the date of its enactment, but no later than October 1, 2020, to June 30, 2022, including the proposed AAO, estimates of bond interest and fixed charges, the proposed ASO, and the Mayor’s budget message, as required by Administrative Code Section 3.3(h);

(ii) The Mayor shall transmit to the Board of Supervisors any legislation that would enact fee or revenue increases anticipated in the proposed budget or revenue increases anticipated in the proposed budget, as required by Administrative Code Section 3.10(a); and

(iii) The Department of Human Resources shall submit to the Board of Supervisors the administrative provisions of the ASO, as required by Administrative Code Section 3.9.

(g) By no later than October 1, 2020, the Board of Supervisors shall adopt the biennial budget under Charter section 9.100(b) and Administrative Code Section 3.3.(l). Notwithstanding Resolution No. 049-20, and except for the SFMTA budget described in paragraph (c) above, the biennial budget shall not include a fixed two-year budget for any City department under which the department’s budget will remain in effect for two fiscal years.

(7) The duty of the Mayor’s office to hold at least one public meeting relating to the Mayor’s budget priorities, as set forth in Administrative Code Section 3.3(d), shall be waived.

(8) The Controller, in consultation with the Mayor’s Office, the Clerk of the Board, and the Chair of the Board’s Budget and Appropriation Committee, is delegated the authority to modify any deadlines established under the Municipal Code relating to the preparation,



consideration, or final passage of the City's budget, other than the deadlines listed in this Order, where the City is unable to comply with such deadlines because of the declared emergency.

(9) All fees and charges authorized by the Board of Supervisors for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 shall remain in effect until the Board's adoption of the AAO.

(10) The time for the Board of Supervisors to adopt a resolution (commonly known as the "Proposition J Resolution") approving positions determined by the Controller to be positions where the work or services can be practically performed under private contract at a lesser cost than similar work performed by employees of the City and County, as set forth in Charter Section 10.104(15), is extended to October 1, 2020.

(11) The time for the Board of Supervisors to designate official and outreach newspapers or periodicals, as set forth in Administrative Code Section 2.80, et seq., is extended to October 1, 2020.

**EIGHTH SUPPLEMENT TO MAYORAL PROCLAMATION DECLARING THE
EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY DATED FEBRUARY 25, 2020**

WHEREAS, California Government Code Sections 8550 et seq., San Francisco Charter Section 3.100(14) and Chapter 7 of the San Francisco Administrative Code empower the Mayor to proclaim the existence of a local emergency, subject to concurrence by the Board of Supervisors as provided in the Charter, in the case of an emergency threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County or its citizens; and

WHEREAS, On February 25, 2020, the Mayor issued a Proclamation (the “Proclamation”) declaring a local emergency to exist in connection with the imminent spread within the City of a novel (new) coronavirus (“COVID-19”); and

WHEREAS, On March 3, 2020, the Board of Supervisors concurred in the Proclamation and in the actions taken by the Mayor to meet the emergency; and

WHEREAS, On March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency to exist within the State due to the threat posed by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, On March 6, 2020, the Local Health Officer declared a local health emergency under Section 101080 of the California Health and Safety Code, and the Board of Supervisors concurred in that declaration on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, On March 6, 2020, the City issued public health guidance to encourage social distancing to disrupt the spread of COVID-19 and protect community health; and

WHEREAS, On March 7, 2020, the Local Health Officer ordered certain City facilities not to hold non-essential group events of more than 50 people for the two weeks from the date of the order and prohibited visitors from Laguna Honda Hospital; and

WHEREAS, On March 7, 2020, the Department of Human Resources issued guidance to minimize COVID-19 exposure risk for City employees who provide essential services to the local community, in particular during the current local emergency; and

WHEREAS, On March 11, 2020, March 13, 2020, March 17, 2020, March 18, 2020, and March 23, 2020, the Mayor issued supplements to the Proclamation, ordering additional measures to respond to the emergency; and



WHEREAS, On March 16, 2020, the City’s Health Officer issued a stay safe at home order, Health Officer Order No. C19-07 (the “Stay Safe At Home Order”), requiring most people to remain in their homes subject to certain exceptions including obtaining essential goods such as food and necessary supplies, and requiring the closure of non-essential businesses, through April 7, 2020, and on March 31, 2020, the Health Officer extended the Stay Safe At Home Order through May 3, 2020; and

WHEREAS, On March 19, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-33-20 and the California Public Health Officer issued a corresponding order requiring people to stay home except as needed subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, There are currently 434 confirmed cases of COVID-19 within the City and there have been 7 COVID-19-related deaths in the City; there are more than 9,500 confirmed cases in California, and there have been 204 COVID-19-related deaths in California; and

WHEREAS, This order and the previous orders issued during this emergency have all been issued because of the propensity of the virus to spread person to person and also because the virus physically is causing property loss or damage due to its proclivity to attach to surfaces for prolonged periods of time; and

WHEREAS, On March 17, 2020, the Mayor issued the Third Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation, which contained an order prohibiting meetings of City boards, commissions, and advisory bodies, other than the Board of Supervisors, through April 7, 2020, unless authorized by the Mayor or the Board of Supervisors; given the extension of the Stay Safe At Home Order through May 3, 2020, it is necessary to continue the restrictions on meetings of these bodies through May 3, 2020; and

WHEREAS, On March 18, 2020, the Mayor issued the Fourth Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation, imposing a temporary moratorium on eviction for non-payment of rent by commercial tenants directly impacted by the COVID-19 crisis, and it is necessary to clarify how the moratorium is intended to apply; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor proclaims that the conditions of extreme peril exist and continue to warrant and necessitate the existence of a local emergency,



NOW, THEREFORE,

I, London N. Breed, Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco, proclaim that there continues to exist an emergency within the City and County threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County and its citizens;

In addition to the measures outlined in the Proclamation and in the Supplements to the Proclamation dated March 11, March 13, March 17, March 18, March 23, March 27, and March 31, 2020, it is further ordered that:

(1) Section 5 of the Third Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation dated March 17, 2020, is revised and replaced as follows: From March 18, 2020 through May 3, 2020, City policy and advisory bodies shall not hold public meetings, unless the Board of Supervisors, acting by written motion, or the Mayor or the Mayor's designee directs otherwise, based on a determination that a policy body has an urgent need to take action to ensure public health, safety, or essential government operations. This order applies to all City commissions, boards, and advisory bodies other than the Board of Supervisors and its committees.

(2) The Fourth Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation dated March 18, 2020 (the "Fourth Supplement"), imposing a temporary moratorium on eviction for non-payment of rent by commercial tenants directly impacted by the COVID-19 crisis, is amended as follows:

(a) Notwithstanding the word "eviction" in subsection (d) of the Fourth Supplement, the moratorium applies to all attempts to recover possession of a unit due to non-payment, including situations where the tenant is occupying the unit on a month-to-month periodic tenancy, holdover basis, or similar arrangement, and including where the landlord has the right to terminate or not renew the agreement at the landlord's discretion. In such situations, if a tenant misses a payment due to COVID-19, the moratorium against recovering possession due to non-payment shall apply, unless the landlord can demonstrate an alternative, non-pretextual reason for recovering possession of the unit (e.g., turning the unit over to a new tenant under a previously executed agreement, planned renovations, or previous agreement to turn over the unit vacant to a new owner).

(b) The moratorium is also intended to cover security deposits. The moratorium does not prohibit a landlord from drawing from an existing security deposit, in the event



the tenant has missed a rent payment and the agreement allows the landlord to deduct rent from the security deposit. However, a landlord may not require a tenant described in subdivision (a) of the Fourth Supplement to increase the security deposit. If an existing agreement contains a provision requiring a tenant to replenish a security deposit that the landlord has drawn from, the landlord shall not attempt to recover possession of the unit due to the tenant's inability to replenish the security deposit, if the tenant was unable to do so because of the financial impacts of COVID-19. In such event, the landlord and tenant shall follow the notice and cure requirements set forth in subdivisions (c) and (d) of the Fourth Supplement with regard to replenishment of the security deposit. Any failure to replenish a security deposit as set forth in an existing agreement shall not be a basis to recover possession of the unit until six months after the moratorium expires. Notwithstanding the foregoing, landlords are discouraged from using tenants' security deposits to cover missed rent payments during the moratorium.

(c) The foregoing provisions are incorporated into the Fourth Supplement as though set forth directly therein, and shall expire at the same time that the Fourth Supplement expires. If the Fourth Supplement is renewed, the foregoing provisions shall also renew.

Tuesday, March 31, 2020

Dear City Department Heads:

San Francisco is experiencing an unprecedented public health emergency, which has changed the way we all live and work. Across our country and the world, this pandemic is not only wreaking havoc on public health, but it is undermining the economic vitality of our communities. This has been, and will continue to be a time of unprecedented challenges for us all.

What gives me hope in the middle of this crisis has been the incredible ability of this great City to respond. Our health care workers and first responders are providing care for those suffering in our hospitals. City workers who continue to serve our City and those who have shifted from their normal duties to staff our Emergency Operations Center, which is the heart of a massive citywide response to this pandemic. Across the entire City, San Franciscans have embraced their role in this emergency through collective action and social distancing to slow the spread of COVID-19.

We have come together as one City with a focus and resolve that we must maintain in the challenging days, months, and years ahead. This includes our efforts to address the devastating economic fallout from this pandemic.

Beyond the significant strain on our healthcare system and the health of our residents, COVID-19 is having alarming and wide-ranging financial impacts. From staggering financial losses for small businesses, debilitating income loss for workers, and declining hotel and transfer tax funds, we are witnessing devastating financial impacts for our residents and the City budget.

Today, the March Joint Report update issued by the Controller's Office, the Board of Supervisors' Budget and Legislative Analyst, and the Mayor's Budget Office projects revenue reductions for the final quarter of this fiscal year that are staggering – we are anticipating between \$167 million to \$288 million in General Fund losses. That is not for the entire year, but for just three months alone. The reductions are driven by significant changes in major taxes including hotel tax, transfer tax, and sales tax. The Report also projects that these significant revenue losses will continue into the next two fiscal years driving up the projected deficits to between \$525 million and \$776 million for FY 2020-21 and \$438 million and \$606 million for FY 2021-22. That's a combined shortfall between \$1.1 billion and \$1.7 billion compared to prior projections driven by health crisis related revenue loss.

San Francisco has adopted many prudent financial policies since the last recession that will strengthen our ability to respond to financial events like the one we are currently experiencing, including building healthy reserves, restricting the use of one-time revenues, long-term financial planning, and two-year budgeting. This puts us in a better position to address these economic impacts, but given the sheer size of the financial losses we are facing, we will have to implement meaningful solutions and make difficult choices.



Over the next month, my Budget Office will be developing a plan to bring costs in alignment with these lower revenues for the current year. We will be focused and deliberative to ensure our response to the significant shortfalls and ongoing economic contraction are considered with impacts to City departments, labor partners, and community organizations at the forefront.

In order to offset these significant financial losses, I am instructing departments to help identify cost reductions and curb spending immediately. We also need to focus staff time and resources on our essential workforce, programs, and efforts that help our City respond to the health crisis and support vulnerable residents. To meet these two goals my Budget Office is implementing the following measures over the next month:

- Only allow hiring of essential workers. There are many important staffing needs of Departments who are responding to the health crisis, and we must focus our hiring efforts to ensure that they have the support they need. Over the next month, all requests to fill positions will be approved by my Budget Office to ensure we are prioritizing the hiring of our essential workforce.
- Evaluating and pausing non-essential capital projects funded in the current year.
- Reviewing and pausing new programs funded in prior budgets that have not started.

These measures will allow us to develop a current year rebalancing plan that combines reduced spending and some appropriate use of reserves, as well as prioritize resources to support our COVID-19 response and recovery efforts. Further instructions will be issued to departments in May to help us address the budget year shortfalls.

If you have any questions, please reach out to my Budget Office.

Thank you for your partnership during this challenging time. Together, we will get through this time of crisis, take care of our residents, and reposition our City for recovery.

Pursuant to the Mayor's Third Supplement to the Mayoral Proclamation Declaring the Existence of a Local Emergency, dated February 25, 2020, and supplemented on March 17, 2020, as the Mayor's Designee, I am authorizing the Successor Agency Commission (commonly known as the Commission on Community Investment and Infrastructure or "Commission") to hold its regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, April 7, 2020 at 1:00pm.

At this meeting, the Commission will consider urgent action items pertaining to the construction of affordable housing including: 1) authorizing a construction loan and ground lease for approximately 141 affordable housing units for formerly homeless adults; 2) authorizing predevelopment agreements for approximately 140 affordable for-sale housing units; 3) authorizing predevelopment agreements for approximately 73 affordable family rental housing units; and 4) approving a mixed-use development containing at least 10% income-restricted units.

The matters upon which the Commission would act are critical steps in the production of affordable housing and thus are urgently needed to ensure the public health and safety.

**ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER
OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO DIRECTING ALL
INDIVIDUALS LIVING IN THE COUNTY TO CONTINUE SHELTERING
AT THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE EXCEPT FOR ESSENTIAL NEEDS;
CONTINUING TO EXEMPT HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS FROM THE
ORDER BUT URGING GOVERNMENT AGENCIES TO PROVIDE THEM
SHELTER AND HAND SANITATION FACILITIES; RESTRICTING
ACCESS TO RECREATION AREAS; REQUIRING ESSENTIAL
BUSINESSES TO IMPLEMENT SOCIAL DISTANCING PROTOCOLS;
CLARIFYING AND FURTHER LIMITING ESSENTIAL BUSINESS
ACTIVITIES, INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION; AND DIRECTING ALL
BUSINESSES AND GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS TO FURTHER
CEASE NON-ESSENTIAL OPERATIONS**

(SHELTER IN PLACE)

DATE OF ORDER: March 31, 2020

Please read this Order carefully. Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code § 120295, *et seq.*; California Penal Code §§ 69, 148(a)(1); and San Francisco Administrative Code § 7.17(b))

Summary: It is now well established that the virus that causes Novel Coronavirus 2019 Disease (“COVID-19”) is easily transmitted, especially in group settings, and that the disease can be extremely serious. It can require long hospital stays, and in some instances cause long-term health consequences or death. It can impact not only those known to be at high risk but also other people, regardless of age. This is a global pandemic causing untold societal, social, and economic harm. To mitigate the harm from the pandemic, on March, 16, 2020, the City and County of San Francisco, along with a group of five other Bay Area counties and the City of Berkeley, issued parallel health officer orders imposing shelter in place limitations across the Bay Area, requiring everyone to stay safe at home except for certain essential needs. Other jurisdictions in the Bay Area and ultimately the State have since joined in adopting stay safe at home orders. It appears that our collective effort has started to have a positive impact. But the infection rate has not yet leveled off and more needs to be done to flatten the curve.

There is no effective treatment or cure yet for the disease, testing ability while improving remains constrained, and San Francisco's health care system is at ongoing risk of being overwhelmed. For these reasons, it is imperative that San Francisco not only extend the duration of its stay at home order but also further limit essential activities and extend social distancing requirements outside the home.

This new Order replaces the earlier March 17, 2020 shelter in place order. Beginning at midnight on March 31, 2020, all people and businesses in San Francisco must strictly comply with this new Order. This new Order extends and tightens the stay safe at home restrictions for another 26 days, through May 3, 2020. But the Health Officer will continue to carefully monitor the evolving situation and could change that date.

Generally, under this Order gatherings of individuals with anyone outside of their household or living unit remain prohibited, with limited exceptions for essential activities or essential travel, or to perform work for essential businesses and government agencies. Bars, nightclubs, theaters and movie theaters, and other entertainment venues must remain closed for any gatherings. Restaurants, cafes, coffee shops, and other facilities that serve food—regardless of their seating capacity—must remain closed except solely for takeout and delivery service. All gyms and fitness studios must remain closed. All hair and nail salons must also remain closed. Facilities that sell food and that provide health care remain open as permitted by this Order and other Health Officer orders. Homeless individuals continue to be exempt from the shelter in place order, but government agencies remain urged to take steps needed to provide shelter for those individuals.

This Order makes a number of significant revisions to the earlier order, including these five sets of changes. (1) When people leave their residence as allowed by this Order, they are ordered in most situations to strictly comply with designated Social Distancing Requirements when interacting with anyone outside their household. (2) Outdoor recreation activities are further limited and additional recreation facilities must be closed. People cannot participate in outdoor activities that involve shared equipment, such as frisbee, soccer, or basketball, with any person outside of their own household or living unit, and areas with shared equipment and facilities like playgrounds, picnic areas, dog parks, golf courses, tennis courts, and pools must close. To prevent crowding, San Francisco may adopt further restrictions on use of parks and access to beaches, including possible closure. (3) What businesses constitute Essential Businesses is further clarified and limited. Essential businesses must maximize the number of employees who work from home and must generally scale down operations that are not considered essential. Businesses that sell food, groceries, or cleaning products combined with non-essential products may continue to operate only if the portion of essential products they sell is a significant part of their business. There is also a new requirement that each Essential Business, such as a bank, grocery store, pharmacy, or restaurant open for takeout or delivery, must prepare, post, and implement a written protocol, in a form attached to the Order, tailored for that business, to protect customers and employees through designated social distance requirements. And Businesses that supply products needed for

people to work from home are no longer Essential Businesses under the Order and must close stores open to the public in San Francisco. (4) In addition to continuing to urge government agencies to provide shelter for individuals experiencing homelessness, the Order urges government agencies and other service providers to take steps to protect that population, including requiring social distancing in shelters and other facilities, providing hand sanitation for individuals who remain unhoused and ensuring 12 feet x 12 feet distancing for tents in encampments. (5) The Order provides that only certain limited types of construction are permitted to continue, including healthcare projects directly related to addressing the COVID-19 pandemic, housing and mixed use projects that includes at least 10% affordable housing, projects that provide services to vulnerable populations, projects required to maintain safety, sanitation, and habitability of residences and commercial buildings; and construction necessary to secure an existing construction site that must shut down. The Health Officer may issue guidance requiring construction site-specific health and safety plans. The Order also provides for San Francisco to limit public works construction to essential public works projects as determined by the City Administrator in consultation with the Health Officer. All other construction is prohibited.

This Order clarifies the effect of the local order in relation to the statewide stay at home order. And this Order includes a number of other important clarifications and restrictions on activities, all as set forth below. The Health Officer may revise this Order as the situation evolves, and facilities must stay updated by checking the City Administrator's website (www.sfgsa.org) regularly.

In addition to extending and replacing Order Number C19-07 (shelter in place), issued March 16, 2020, this Order also extends Order Nos. C19-01b (prohibiting visitors at Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center and Unit 4A at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital), C19-03 (prohibiting visitors to specific residential facilities), C19-04 (imposing cleaning standards for residential hotels), C19-06 (prohibiting visitors to general acute care hospitals and acute psychiatric hospitals), C19-08 (prohibiting most routine appointments and elective surgeries and encouraging delivery of prescriptions and cannabis products), C19-09 (prohibiting visitors to residential care facilities for the elderly, adult residential facilities, and residential facilities for the chronically ill), C19-10 (requiring reporting by labs of COVID-19 testing information), and C19-11 (placing Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center under protective quarantine) through 11:59 p.m. on May 3, 2020, with those listed orders otherwise remaining in effect.

**UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE
SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND
COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO ("HEALTH OFFICER") ORDERS:**

- 1. This Order supersedes the March 16, 2020 Order of the Health Officer directing all individuals to shelter in place (the "Prior Shelter Order"). This Order clarifies,**

strengthens, and extends certain terms of the Prior Shelter Order to increase social distancing and reduce person-to-person contact to further slow transmission of Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 (“COVID-19”). As of the effective date and time of this Order set forth in Section 16 below, all individuals, businesses and government agencies in the City and County of San Francisco (“County”) are required to follow the provisions of this Order.

2. The intent of this Order is to ensure that the maximum number of people shelter in their places of residence to the maximum extent feasible to slow the spread of COVID-19 and mitigate the impact on delivery of critical healthcare services to those in need. All provisions of this Order must be interpreted to effectuate this intent. Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Order constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.
3. All individuals currently living within the County are ordered to shelter at their place of residence. They may leave their residence only for Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, including Essential Travel, to work for Essential Businesses, or to perform Minimum Basic Operations for non-essential businesses, all as defined in Section 13. Individuals experiencing homelessness are exempt from this Section, but are strongly urged to obtain shelter, and governmental and other entities are strongly urged to, as soon as possible, make such shelter available and provide handwashing or hand sanitation facilities to persons who continue experiencing homelessness.
4. When people need to leave their place of residence for the limited purposes allowed in this Order, they must strictly comply with Social Distancing Requirements as defined in Section 13.k, except as expressly provided in this Order.
5. All businesses with a facility in the County, except Essential Businesses, as defined in Section 13.f, are required to cease all activities at facilities located within the County except Minimum Basic Operations, as defined in Section 13.g. For clarity, all businesses may continue operations consisting exclusively of owners, employees, volunteers, or contractors performing activities at their own residences (i.e., working from home). All Essential Businesses are strongly encouraged to remain open. But Essential Businesses are directed to maximize the number of employees who work from home. Essential Businesses may only assign those employees who cannot perform their job duties from home to work outside the home. All Essential Businesses shall prepare, post, and implement a Social Distancing Protocol at each of their facilities at which they are maintaining operations, as specified in Section 13.h. Businesses that include an Essential Business component at their facilities alongside non-essential components must, to the extent feasible, scale down their operations to the Essential Business component only; provided, however, that mixed

retail businesses that are otherwise allowed to operate under this Order may continue to stock and sell non-essential products. Essential Businesses must follow industry-specific guidance issued by the Health Officer related to COVID-19.

6. All public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a single household or living unit are prohibited, except for the limited purposes expressly permitted in this Order. Nothing in this Order prohibits members of a single household or living unit from engaging in Essential Travel or Essential Activities together.
7. All travel, including, but not limited to, travel on foot, bicycle, scooter, motorcycle, automobile, or public transit, except Essential Travel, as defined below in Section 13.i, is prohibited. People may use public transit only for purposes of performing Essential Activities or to travel to and from work to operate Essential Businesses, maintain Essential Governmental Functions, or to perform Minimum Basic Operations at non-essential businesses. Transit agencies and people riding on public transit must comply with Social Distancing Requirements, as defined in Section 13.k, to the greatest extent feasible. This Order allows travel into or out of the County only to perform Essential Activities, operate Essential Businesses, maintain Essential Governmental Functions, or perform Minimum Basic Operations at non-essential businesses.
8. This Order is issued based on evidence of increasing occurrence of COVID-19 within the County and throughout the Bay Area, scientific evidence and best practices regarding the most effective approaches to slow the transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 specifically, and evidence that the age, condition, and health of a significant portion of the population of the County places it at risk for serious health complications, including death, from COVID-19. Due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 disease in the general public, which is now a pandemic according to the World Health Organization, there is a public health emergency throughout the County. Making the problem worse, some individuals who contract the virus causing the COVID-19 disease have no symptoms or have mild symptoms, which means they may not be aware they carry the virus and are transmitting it to others. Because even people without symptoms can transmit the infection, and because evidence shows the infection is easily spread, gatherings and other interpersonal interactions can result in preventable transmission of the virus. This public health emergency has substantially worsened since the County issued the Prior Shelter Order on March 16, 2020, with a significant escalation in the number of positive cases, hospitalizations, and deaths, and increasing strain on health care resources. At the same time, evidence suggests that the restrictions on mobility and social distancing requirements imposed by the Prior Shelter Order are slowing the rate of increase in community transmission and confirmed cases by limiting interactions among people, consistent with scientific evidence of the efficacy of similar measures in other parts of the country and world. The scientific evidence shows that at this stage of the emergency, it remains essential to continue to slow



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virus transmission as much as possible to protect the most vulnerable, to prevent the health care system from being overwhelmed, and to prevent deaths. Extension of the Prior Shelter Order and strengthening of its restrictions are necessary to further reduce the spread of the COVID-19 disease, preserving critical and limited healthcare capacity in the County and advancing toward a point in the public health emergency where transmission can be controlled.

9. This Order is also issued in light of the existence, as of March 29, 2020, of 848 cases of COVID-19 in the County, as well as at least 2,092 confirmed cases (up from 258 confirmed cases on March 15, 2020, just before the Prior Shelter Order) and at least 51 deaths (up from three deaths on March 15, 2020) in the seven Bay Area jurisdictions jointly issuing this Order, including a significant and increasing number of suspected cases of community transmission and likely further significant increases in transmission. This Order is necessary to slow the rate of spread, and the Health Officer will re-evaluate it as further data becomes available.
10. This Order is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the March 4, 2020 Proclamation of a State of Emergency issued by Governor Gavin Newsom, the March 12, 2020 Executive Order (Executive Order N-25-20) issued by Governor Gavin Newsom, the February 25, 2020 Proclamation by the Mayor Declaring the Existence of a Local Emergency issued by Mayor London Breed, as supplemented on March 11, 2020, the March 6, 2020 Declaration of Local Health Emergency Regarding Novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) issued by the Health Officer, and guidance issued by the California Department of Public Health, as each of them have been and may be supplemented.
11. This Order is issued in light of evidence that the Prior Shelter Order has been generally effective in increasing social distancing, but that at this time additional restrictions are necessary to further mitigate the rate of transmission of COVID-19, to prevent the health care system from being overwhelmed, and prevent death. This Order comes after the release of substantial guidance from the County Health Officer, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Department of Public Health, and other public health officials throughout the United States and around the world, including an increasing number of orders imposing similar social distancing requirements and mobility restrictions to combat the spread and harms of COVID-19. The Health Officer will continue to assess the quickly evolving situation and may modify or extend this Order, or issue additional Orders, related to COVID-19, as changing circumstances dictate.
12. This Order is also issued in light of the March 19, 2020 Order of the State Public Health Officer (the "State Shelter Order"), which set baseline statewide restrictions on non-residential business activities effective until further notice, as well as the Governor's March 19, 2020 Executive Order N-33-20 directing California residents to follow the State Shelter Order. The State Shelter Order was complementary to the Prior Shelter Order. This Order adopts in certain respects more stringent



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restrictions addressing the particular facts and circumstances in this County, which are necessary to control the public health emergency as it is evolving within the County and the Bay Area. Without this tailored set of restrictions that further reduces the number of interactions between persons, scientific evidence indicates that the public health crisis in the County will worsen to the point at which it may overtake available health care resources within the County and increase the death rate. Also, this Order enumerates additional restrictions on non-work-related travel not covered by the State Shelter Order, including limiting such travel to performance of Essential Travel or Essential Activities; sets forth mandatory Social Distancing Requirements for all individuals in the County when engaged in activities outside their residences; and adds a mechanism to ensure that Essential Businesses comply with the Social Distancing Requirements. Where a conflict exists between this Order and any state public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive provision controls. Consistent with California Health and Safety Code section 131080 and the Health Officer Practice Guide for Communicable Disease Control in California, except where the State Health Officer may issue an order expressly directed at this Order and based on a finding that a provision of this Order constitutes a menace to public health, any more restrictive measures in this Order continue to apply and control in this County.

13. Definitions and Exemptions.

- a. For the purposes of this Order, individuals may leave their residence only to perform the following “Essential Activities.” But people at high risk of severe illness from COVID-19 and people who are sick are strongly urged to stay in their residence to the extent possible, except as necessary to seek or provide medical care or Essential Governmental Functions. Essential Activities are:
 - i. To engage in activities or perform tasks important to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their family or household members (including pets), such as, by way of example only and without limitation, obtaining medical supplies or medication, or visiting a health care professional.
 - ii. To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves and their family or household members, or to deliver those services or supplies to others, such as, by way of example only and without limitation, canned food, dry goods, fresh fruits and vegetables, pet supply, fresh meats, fish, and poultry, and any other household consumer products, products needed to work from home, or products necessary to maintain the habitability, sanitation, and operation of residences.
 - iii. To engage in outdoor recreation activity, including, by way of example and without limitation, walking, hiking, bicycling, and



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running, in compliance with Social Distancing Requirements and with the following limitations:

- 1. Outdoor recreation activity at parks, beaches, and other open spaces must be in conformance with any restrictions on access and use established by the Health Officer, government, or other entity that manages such area to reduce crowding and risk of transmission of COVID-19. Such restrictions may include, but are not limited to, restricting the number of entrants, closing the area to vehicular access and parking, or closure to all public access;**
 - 2. Use of recreational areas with high-touch equipment or that encourage gathering, including, but not limited to, playgrounds, outdoor gym equipment, picnic areas, dog parks, and barbecue areas, is prohibited outside of residences, and all such areas shall be closed to public access including by signage and, as appropriate, by physical barriers;**
 - 3. Use of shared facilities for recreational activities outside of residences, including, but not limited to, golf courses, tennis and pickle ball courts, rock parks, climbing walls, pools, spas, shooting and archery ranges, gyms, disc golf, and basketball courts is prohibited and those areas must be closed for recreational purposes, including by signage and, as appropriate, by physical barriers. Such facilities may be repurposed during the emergency to provide essential services needed to address the COVID-19 pandemic; and**
 - 4. Sports or activities that include the use of shared equipment may only be engaged in by members of the same household or living unit.**
- iv. To perform work for an Essential Business or to otherwise carry out activities specifically permitted in this Order, including Minimum Basic Operations, as defined in this Section.**
 - v. To provide necessary care for a family member or pet in another household who has no other source of care.**
 - vi. To attend a funeral with no more than 10 individuals present.**
 - vii. To move residences, but only if it is not possible to defer an already planned move, if the move is necessitated by safety, sanitation, or habitability reasons, or if the move is necessary to preserve access to**



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shelter. When moving into or out of the Bay Area region, individuals are strongly urged to quarantine for 14 days. To quarantine, individuals should follow the guidance of the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

- b. For the purposes of this Order, individuals may leave their residence to work for, volunteer at, or obtain services at “Healthcare Operations,” including, without limitation, hospitals, clinics, COVID-19 testing locations, dentists, pharmacies, blood banks and blood drives, pharmaceutical and biotechnology companies, other healthcare facilities, healthcare suppliers, home healthcare services providers, mental health providers, or any related and/or ancillary healthcare services. “Healthcare Operations” also includes veterinary care and all healthcare services provided to animals. This exemption for Healthcare Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any interference with the delivery of healthcare, broadly defined. “Healthcare Operations” excludes fitness and exercise gyms and similar facilities.**
- c. For the purposes of this Order, individuals may leave their residence to provide any services or perform any work necessary to the operation and maintenance of “Essential Infrastructure,” including airports, utilities (including water, sewer, gas, and electrical), oil refining, roads and highways, public transportation, solid waste facilities (including collection, removal, disposal, and processing facilities), cemeteries, mortuaries, crematoriums, and telecommunications systems (including the provision of essential global, national, and local infrastructure for internet, computing services, business infrastructure, communications, and web-based services).**
- d. For the purposes of this Order, all first responders, emergency management personnel, emergency dispatchers, court personnel, and law enforcement personnel, and others working for or to support Essential Businesses are categorically exempt from this Order to the extent they are performing those essential services. Further, nothing in this Order shall prohibit any individual from performing or accessing “Essential Governmental Functions.” Essential Government Functions means all services needed to ensure the continuing operation of the government agencies and provide for the health, safety and welfare of the public. Each governmental entity shall identify and designate appropriate employees, volunteers, or contractors to continue providing and carrying out any Essential Governmental Functions, including the hiring or retention of new employees or contractors to perform such functions. Each governmental entity and its contractors must employ all necessary emergency protective measures to prevent, mitigate, respond to and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, and all Essential Governmental Functions shall be performed in compliance with Social Distancing Requirements to the greatest extent feasible.**



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- e. For the purposes of this Order, a “business” includes any for-profit, non-profit, or educational entity, whether a corporate entity, organization, partnership or sole proprietorship, and regardless of the nature of the service, the function it performs, or its corporate or entity structure.
- f. For the purposes of this Order, “Essential Businesses” are:
 - i. Healthcare Operations and businesses that operate, maintain, or repair Essential Infrastructure;
 - ii. Grocery stores, certified farmers’ markets, farm and produce stands, supermarkets, food banks, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of unprepared food, canned food, dry goods, non-alcoholic beverages, fresh fruits and vegetables, pet supply, fresh meats, fish, and poultry, as well as hygienic products and household consumer products necessary for personal hygiene or the habitability, sanitation, or operation of residences. The businesses included in this subparagraph (ii) include establishments that sell multiple categories of products provided that they sell a significant amount of essential products identified in this subparagraph, such as liquor stores that also sell a significant amount of food;
 - iii. Food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing;
 - iv. Businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals;
 - v. Construction, but only of the types listed in this subparagraph below:
 - 1. Projects immediately necessary to the maintenance, operation, or repair of Essential Infrastructure;
 - 2. Projects associated with Healthcare Operations, including creating or expanding Healthcare Operations, provided that such construction is directly related to the COVID-19 response;
 - 3. Affordable housing that is or will be income-restricted, including multi-unit or mixed-use developments containing at least 10% income-restricted units;



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- 4. Public works projects if specifically designated as an Essential Governmental Function by the City Administrator in consultation with the Health Officer;**
 - 5. Shelters and temporary housing, but not including hotels or motels;**
 - 6. Projects immediately necessary to provide critical non-commercial services to individuals experiencing homelessness, elderly persons, persons who are economically disadvantaged, and persons with special needs;**
 - 7. Construction necessary to ensure that existing construction sites that must be shut down under this Order are left in a safe and secure manner, but only to the extent necessary to do so; and**
 - 8. Construction or repair necessary to ensure that residences and buildings containing Essential Businesses are safe, sanitary, or habitable to the extent such construction or repair cannot reasonably be delayed;**
- vi. Newspapers, television, radio, and other media services;**
 - vii. Gas stations and auto-supply, auto-repair (including, but not limited to, for cars, trucks, motorcycles and motorized scooters), and automotive dealerships, but only for the purpose of providing auto-supply and auto-repair services (and not, by way of example, car sales or car washes). This subparagraph (vii) does not restrict the on-line purchase of automobiles if they are delivered to a residence or Essential Business;**
 - viii. Bicycle repair and supply shops;**
 - ix. Banks and related financial institutions;**
 - x. Service providers that enable residential transactions (including rentals, leases, and home sales), including, but not limited to, real estate agents, escrow agents, notaries, and title companies, provided that appointments and other residential viewings must only occur virtually or, if a virtual viewing is not feasible, by appointment with no more than two visitors at a time residing within the same household or living unit and one individual showing the unit (except that in person visits are not allowed when the occupant is still residing in the residence);**



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- xi. Hardware stores;**
- xii. Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the habitability, sanitation, and operation of residences and Essential Businesses, but not for cosmetic or other purposes;**
- xiii. Arborists, landscapers, gardeners, and similar service professionals, but only to the limited extent necessary to maintain the habitability, sanitation, operation of businesses or residences, or the safety of residents, employees, or the public (such as fire safety or tree trimming to prevent a dangerous condition), and not for cosmetic or other purposes (such as upkeep);**
- xiv. Businesses providing mailing and shipping services, including post office boxes;**
- xv. Educational institutions—including public and private K-12 schools, colleges, and universities—for purposes of facilitating distance learning or performing essential functions, provided that social distancing of six-feet per person is maintained to the greatest extent possible;**
- xvi. Laundromats, drycleaners, and laundry service providers;**
- xvii. Restaurants and other facilities that prepare and serve food, but only for delivery or carry out. Schools and other entities that typically provide free food services to students or members of the public may continue to do so under this Order on the condition that the food is provided to students or members of the public on a pick-up and take-away basis only. Schools and other entities that provide food services under this exemption shall not permit the food to be eaten at the site where it is provided, or at any other gathering site;**
- xviii. Funeral home providers, mortuaries, cemeteries, and crematoriums, to the extent necessary for the transport, preparation, or processing of bodies or remains;**
- xix. Businesses that supply other Essential Businesses with the support or supplies necessary to operate, but only to the extent that they support or supply these Essential Businesses. This exemption shall not be used as a basis for engaging in sales to the general public from retail storefronts;**



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- xx. Businesses that have the primary function of shipping or delivering groceries, food, or other goods directly to residences or businesses. This exemption shall not be used to allow for manufacturing or assembly of non-essential products or for other functions besides those necessary to the delivery operation;**
- xxi. Airlines, taxis, rental car companies, rideshare services (including shared bicycles and scooters), and other private transportation providers providing transportation services necessary for Essential Activities and other purposes expressly authorized in this Order;**
- xxii. Home-based care for seniors, adults, children, and pets;**
- xxiii. Residential facilities and shelters for seniors, adults, and children;**
- xxiv. Professional services, such as legal, notary, or accounting services, when necessary to assist in compliance with non-elective, legally required activities;**
- xxv. Services to assist individuals in finding employment with Essential Businesses;**
- xxvi. Moving services that facilitate residential or commercial moves that are allowed under this Order;**
- xxvii. Childcare facilities providing services that enable owners, employees, volunteers, and contractors for Essential Businesses or Essential Governmental Functions to work as permitted. Children of owners, employees, volunteers, and contractors who are not exempt under this Order may not attend childcare facilities. To the extent possible, childcare facilities must operate under the following conditions:**
 - 1. Childcare must be carried out in stable groups of 12 or fewer (“stable” means that the same 12 or fewer children are in the same group each day).**
 - 2. Children shall not change from one group to another.**
 - 3. If more than one group of children is cared for at one facility, each group shall be in a separate room. Groups shall not mix with each other.**
 - 4. Childcare providers shall remain solely with one group of children.**



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- g. For the purposes of this Order, “Minimum Basic Operations” means the following activities for businesses, provided that owners, employees, and contractors comply with Social Distancing Requirements as defined this Section, to the extent possible, while carrying out such operations:**
- i. The minimum necessary activities to maintain and protect the value of the business’s inventory and facilities; ensure security, safety, and sanitation; process payroll and employee benefits; provide for the delivery of existing inventory directly to residences or businesses; and related functions; and**
 - ii. The minimum necessary activities to facilitate owners, employees, and contractors of the business being able to continue to work remotely from their residences, and to ensure that the business can deliver its service remotely.**
- h. For the purposes of this Order, all Essential Businesses must prepare and post by no later than 11:59 p.m. on April 2, 2020 a “Social Distancing Protocol” for each of their facilities in the County frequented by the public or employees. The Social Distancing Protocol must be substantially in the form attached to this Order as Appendix A. The Social Distancing Protocol must be posted at or near the entrance of the relevant facility, and shall be easily viewable by the public and employees. A copy of the Social Distancing Protocol must also be provided to each employee performing work at the facility. All Essential Businesses shall implement the Social Distancing Protocol and provide evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand. The Social Distancing Protocol must explain how the business is achieving the following, as applicable:**
- i. Limiting the number of people who can enter into the facility at any one time to ensure that people in the facility can easily maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another at all times, except as required to complete the Essential Business activity;**
 - ii. Where lines may form at a facility, marking six-foot increments at a minimum, establishing where individuals should stand to maintain adequate social distancing;**
 - iii. Providing hand sanitizer, soap and water, or effective disinfectant at or near the entrance of the facility and in other appropriate areas for use by the public and employees, and in locations where there is high-frequency employee interaction with members of the public (e.g., cashiers);**



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- iv. **Providing for contactless payment systems or, if not feasible to do so, the providing for disinfecting all payment portals, pens, and styluses after each use;**
- v. **Regularly disinfecting other high-touch surfaces;**
- vi. **Posting a sign at the entrance of the facility informing all employees and customers that they should: avoid entering the facility if they have a cough or fever; maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another; sneeze and cough into one's elbow; and not shake hands or engage in any unnecessary physical contact; and**
- vii. **Any additional social distancing measures being implemented (see the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's guidance at: <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/guidance-business-response.html>).**
- i. **For the purposes of this Order, "Essential Travel" means travel for any of the following purposes:**
 - i. **Travel related to the provision of or access to Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, Essential Businesses, or Minimum Basic Operations;**
 - ii. **Travel to care for any elderly, minors, dependents, or persons with disabilities;**
 - iii. **Travel to or from educational institutions for purposes of receiving materials for distance learning, for receiving meals, and any other related services;**
 - iv. **Travel to return to a place of residence from outside the County;**
 - v. **Travel required by law enforcement or court order;**
 - vi. **Travel required for non-residents to return to their place of residence outside the County. Individuals are strongly encouraged to verify that their transportation out of the County remains available and functional prior to commencing such travel;**
 - vii. **Travel to manage after-death arrangements and burial;**
 - viii. **Travel to arrange for shelter or avoid homelessness;**



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- ix. **Travel to avoid domestic violence or child abuse;**
- x. **Travel for parental custody arrangements; and**
- xi. **Travel to a place to temporarily reside in a residence or other facility to avoid potentially exposing others to COVID-19, such as a hotel or other facility provided by a governmental authority for such purposes.**
- j. **For purposes of this Order, “residences” include hotels, motels, shared rental units and similar facilities. Residences also include living structures and outdoor spaces associated with those living structures, such as patios, porches, backyards, and front yards that are only accessible to a single family or household unit.**
- k. **For purposes of this Order, “Social Distancing Requirements” means:**
 - i. **Maintaining at least six-foot physical distancing from individuals who are not part of the same household or living unit;**
 - ii. **Frequently washing hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or using hand sanitizer that is recognized by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as effective in combatting COVID-19;**
 - iii. **Covering coughs and sneezes with a tissue or fabric or, if not possible, into the sleeve or elbow (but not into hands); and**
 - iv. **Avoiding all social interaction outside the household when sick with a fever or cough.**

All individuals must strictly comply with Social Distancing Requirements, except to the limited extent necessary to provide care (including childcare, adult or senior care, care to individuals with special needs, and patient care); as necessary to carry out the work of Essential Businesses, Essential Governmental Functions, or provide for Minimum Basic Operations; or as otherwise expressly provided in this Order.

- 14. Government agencies and other entities operating shelters and other facilities that house or provide meals or other necessities of life for individuals experiencing homelessness must take appropriate steps to help ensure compliance with Social Distancing Requirements, including adequate provision of hand sanitizer. Also, individuals experiencing homelessness who are unsheltered and living in encampments should, to the maximum extent feasible, abide by 12 foot by 12 foot distancing for the placement of tents, and government agencies should provide restroom and hand washing facilities for individuals in such encampments as set**



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forth in Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Interim Guidance Responding to Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) Among People Experiencing Unsheltered Homelessness (<https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/need-extra-precautions/unsheltered-homelessness.html>).

- 15. Pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029, the Health Officer requests that the Sheriff and the Chief of Police in the County ensure compliance with and enforce this Order. The violation of any provision of this Order constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.**
- 16. This Order shall become effective at 11:59 p.m. on March 31, 2020 and will continue to be in effect until 11:59 p.m. on May 3, 2020, or until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer.**
- 17. This Order revises and replaces Order Number C19-07, issued March 16, 2020, effective as of 11:59 p.m. on March 31, 2020. This Order also extends Order Nos. C19-01b (prohibiting visitors at Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center and Unit 4A at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital), C19-03 (prohibiting visitors to specific residential facilities), C19-04 (imposing cleaning standards for residential hotels), C19-06 (prohibiting visitors to general acute care hospitals and acute psychiatric hospitals), C19-08 (prohibiting most routine appointments and elective surgeries and encouraging delivery of prescriptions and cannabis products), C19-09 (prohibiting visitors to residential care facilities for the elderly, adult residential facilities, and residential facilities for the chronically ill), C19-10 (requiring reporting by labs of COVID-19 testing information), and C19-11 (placing Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center under protective quarantine) through 11:59 p.m. on May 3, 2020, without any further need to amend those orders, with those listed orders otherwise remaining in effect. This Order does not prohibit amendment of those orders separately.**
- 18. The County must promptly provide copies of this Order as follows: (1) by posting on the City Administrator's website (www.sfgsa.org) and the Department of Public Health website (www.sfdph.org); (2) by posting at City Hall, located at 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Pl., San Francisco, CA 94102; and (3) by providing to any member of the public requesting a copy. In addition, the owner, manager, or operator of any facility that is likely to be impacted by this Order is strongly encouraged to post a copy of this Order onsite and to provide a copy to any member of the public asking for a copy.**
- 19. If any provision of this Order or its application to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid, then the remainder of the Order, including the application of such**

***** PRESS STATEMENT *******SAN FRANCISCO SHELTER GUEST TESTS POSITIVE FOR COVID-19**

The Department of Public Health initiates protocols to prevent the spread of COVID-19 at congregate shelter.

San Francisco, CA – On Wednesday, April 1, 2020, the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing learned from the Department of Public Health that a guest at the Division Circle Navigation Center tested positive for COVID-19. The person is not currently at the Navigation Center, is in good condition, and is currently recovering in an isolation hotel.

It is unclear at this point where the virus was contracted but the Department of Public Health (DPH), in partnership with the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) and St. Vincent de Paul Society of San Francisco, will work together to minimize the spread of COVID-19 in this congregate shelter environment.

Immediately upon learning of the diagnosis, the shelter site was supplied with additional masks for all shelter guests and staff to wear at all times. DPH also initiated the contact tracing process to identify who the patient came into contact with both at the shelter and in the community.

In response to this positive test, DPH has deployed a physician and health workers to the shelter site to conduct symptoms and temperature screenings for all guests and staff. Any guest demonstrating symptoms consistent with COVID-19 will be tested for COVID-19 and relocated to a staffed quarantine hotel room immediately. Other guests may be moved to hotels based on their risk of exposure and risk of disease. Staff at the shelter will also be provided medical support and space to self-isolate or quarantine if needed.

Additionally, the City is deploying a professional cleaning crew on-site to thoroughly disinfect the shelter. DPH staff will be on-site to answer staff and guest questions. The site management will continue to guide social distancing protocols and implement shelter health screening protocols.

Expansion of congregate settings and hotel rooms are a key part of the City's strategy for reducing the spread of COVID-19 among high-risk populations. The new shelter at Moscone West will add approximately 390 new beds to the congregate shelter system allowing greater social distancing at all shelters. One of the top priorities for the use of hotel rooms is to provide both quarantine and isolation rooms for COVID positive people living in congregate settings as well as high-risk shelter guests.

As part of the City's commitment to prioritize vulnerable populations in the COVID-19 response, on March 5, 2020, Mayor Breed and Supervisor Peskin announced a \$5 million investment to protect vulnerable populations, including people living in congregate settings. This initiative included expanded cleaning in shelters, increased meal offerings at shelters, increased access to hygiene supplies, and expanded hours for the few shelters that were not already 24/7 to encourage homeless individuals to remain indoors.

"We have been preparing for this situation for weeks, and HSH and DPH are wrapping around the patient with health care and support. The wellbeing of our homeless neighbors is our top priority, and we will continue to work in partnership with our nonprofit service providers, DPH, and the entire City to aggressively contain the virus and protect our community," said Abigail Stewart-Kahn, Interim Director of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing. "To the Division Circle Navigation Center community, I am here for you, HSH and DPH are here for you as is the entire City."

Over the past several weeks, the City has been preparing for this eventuality and aggressively responding to localized outbreaks in other congregate residential communities. The City has learned from these experiences and will bring those insights to bear in its effort to contain the virus and protect the health of shelter guests, staff, and the San Francisco community.

RE: Updated Information on Facility Cleaning, Sanitization and Access

DATE: March 26, 2020

In light of the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19), certain City facilities will become lightly populated to ensure essential departmental functions continue to operate. On March 13, I issued a memorandum update regarding cleaning and sanitizing protocol for the Real Estate Division (“RED”) and other City departments and agencies. These protocols, which include two-hour cleaning and sanitizing, will continue at facilities that are still in use.

On March 19, I issued a memorandum on lightly populated and vacant buildings. This memorandum discusses how RED will prioritize cleaning and sanitization consistent with the Health Officer’s recent Shelter In Place Order C19-07.

Assignment of Real Estate Custodial Staff and Contractors at RED-Managed Facilities

Currently, custodial staff at buildings owned and operated by the City are first responders for the COVID-19 emergency. Therefore, it is essential that we prioritize their time and use their cleaning services in a strategic manner.

1. **Exposed Areas** → For any building or area that has a confirmed case of COVID-19 exposure, custodial staff and contractors will be assigned to clean and decontaminate the infected areas consistent with CDC guidelines¹.
2. **Buildings with Higher Occupancy** → In light of the Shelter in Place Order many of our buildings have reduced occupancy. The next highest priority is to increase the current cleaning of City buildings that still have essential public access and essential staff

working in the buildings. These facilities will be cleaned and sanitized consistent with the above-referenced March 13 memorandum on cleaning and sanitization.

3. **Lightly Populated and Vacant Buildings** → For facilities that are vacant or lightly populated, there would be deep cleaning as needed, followed by a reduction in routine cleaning and sanitization services.

For leased buildings managed by RED, the RED Building Manager will coordinate with the property manager to schedule additional cleaning provided through the ownership's custodial services consistent with the prioritization above.

Access to RED Operated Buildings

All RED Operated buildings are open to employees with City ID on essential business and are expected to remain open to employees unless and until directed otherwise. This means the following:

- Security guard or Sheriff is on duty in the lobby.
- Employees with City ID on essential business will be allowed into the building.
- Members of the public are only allowed into buildings open to provide essential services. City employees may not bring guests into buildings otherwise closed to the public.
- Doors to the building may be open or locked but a City Smart ID card, security guard or Sheriff can facilitate access for City employees.
- Employees and visitors may need to sign in so we can effectively respond in the event of an emergency.

If your department needs assistance on maintaining a lightly populated building, please contact your RED building manager.

Facilities Managed by City Departments other than RED

Some departments have custodians or contractors who provide cleaning services to their buildings and facilities. Please identify internal resources before contacting the EOC with resource requests on a Form 213RR. Please utilize these internal resources (custodial staff and/or contractors) when available. To increase capacity on existing contracts please contact the Office of Contract Administration.

If you determine that your Department needs additional custodial services beyond what your staff or contractors can provide, please send a Form 213RR to the EOC Logistics Section requesting extra cleaning services and providing detail on the nature of the request. Those requests will be reviewed consistent with the prioritization above.

SUBJECT: City Policy Regarding Enforcement of Certain Tenant Lease Obligations by City Departments From March 17, 2020 through April 30, 2020 (“Policy”)

DATE: March 27, 2020

Background

The policy described below (this “Policy”) is prompted by the remarkably rapid developments in the recognition of and reaction to the COVID-19 pandemic. Two of the most impactful developments for the City’s economy over the last two weeks include the March 16 Order by Mayor London Breed instituting shelter-in-place requirements to slow the spread of the disease and the March 17 Order by Mayor Breed declaring a 30-day moratorium on commercial evictions related to financial impacts caused by COVID-19 for small and medium-sized businesses that have less than \$25 million in annual gross receipts (the “Eviction Moratorium Order”).

Many City agencies lease space to private tenants for a variety of business and recreational uses. In keeping with the spirit of the broad moratorium under the Eviction Moratorium Order, the City now wishes to issue further guidance so that affected tenants can have confidence in being able to retain their leasehold while they use their financial reserves on immediately pressing operational needs to retain employees and remain viable to the maximum extent possible. This Policy is directive to all General Fund agencies with private tenants (each, a “City Landlord Agency”). Mayor Breed encourages City enterprise agencies with private tenants to pursue similar tenant relief actions as appropriate to their respective portfolios.

It is important to note that this Policy is a baseline for Citywide action regarding leases within the geographic boundaries of San Francisco. Individual agencies may target additional relief policies beyond these terms (including but not limited to extended payment dates and relief for those classes of tenant otherwise excepted below) based on each agency's mission and the financial situation of each agency in relation to their respective tenant portfolios. Every business saved will help the City's recovery when the spread of the disease is curbed enough to allow the economy to regain its footing.

Policy

1. Summary:

Under this Policy, to the extent not otherwise prevented by law or the City's own obligations to its lenders, trustees, bond holders and/or taxing agencies, City Landlord Agencies are directed to waive all late charges, default interest and associated penalties and fees for any delinquent rent payments that were or are due for use of City property for commercial purposes within San Francisco city limits during the period of March 17 through April 30, 2020 due to the impact of COVID-19. City Landlord Agency staff are also directed to follow the policies and timeframes set forth in the Eviction Moratorium Order with respect to the initiation of any default enforcement or eviction process due to the failure to pay rent owed under any commercial lease due to the impact of COVID-19 while the Eviction Moratorium Order is in effect.

2. Lease Obligations and Payment Provisions:

The relief offered by this Policy is contingent upon the tenant's continued compliance with all lease obligations other than the payment of rent (such as maintenance and repair obligations, percentage rent reporting obligations and obligations to pay taxes). Subject to any extension of these deadlines and/or additional relief targeted by individual City Landlord Agencies as noted in sections 3 and 4 below, this Policy requires tenant's resumption of normal timely rent payments on May 1, 2020 and payment of any rent arrearages (including for March and April 2020) in full no later than June 30, 2020. Any amounts not paid in full as of June 30, 2020 (or such later date as set forth under any subsequent relief program approved by the tenant's City Landlord Agency) would then be subject to interest and penalties from and after that date.

The forbearance program outlined in this Policy does not change the terms or conditions of any lease or other agreement. Further, this policy will not affect ongoing lease enforcement actions or lease enforcement actions for defaults not related to the current emergency. For any tenant claiming the benefit of force majeure or similar provisions in its lease, those provisions will control.

3. Agency Action:

The City has a range of agencies that lease property to private entities, and these agencies have differing authority for leasing property. City Landlord Agencies are directed to take all actions necessary to implement this Policy, to the extent further action is needed.

4. **Further Tenant Relief:**

This Policy is intended as a temporary emergency measure to provide clarity to the City's tenants. Each City Landlord Agency will monitor the performance of its tenants during this time and will determine whether in and in what form it should offer additional tenant relief in light of public health and safety developments.

5. **Other Sources of Relief:**

All departments are directed to work with the Risk Manager to document and seek recovery from any possible private or public insurance program or other assistance that is forthcoming in the ongoing response to this situation. Tenants have been and should continue to be encouraged to investigate any coverage available to them under any business interruption or similar policies or programs along with public assistance efforts.

6. **Eligibility:**

This Policy applies to all leases, licenses and other agreements to use City land located within the geographic boundaries of San Francisco under the jurisdiction of a City Landlord Agency. This Policy does not apply to MOUs among City departments, vessel berthing agreements and permits to enter where access to the property was not interrupted by the permittor. In any scenario where a tenant has subleased some or all of its space, including master tenants, such relief will only be available to the extent that the City's tenant has offered equivalent relief to the subtenant(s).

The deadline to file the Annual Statement of Economic Interests (Form 700) has been extended from April 1, 2020 to June 1, 2020. Due to the current COVID-19 pandemic, the California Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) has provided a 60-day extension until June 1, 2020 per its most recent [guidance](#) for those required to file an annual Form 700. Annual Form 700s that are normally due on April 1 will now be accepted as timely filed until June 1. **The deadline to complete the Ethics and Sunshine training requirements has also been extended from April 1, 2020 to June 1, 2020.**

Please review the attached notice for more details and share this notice with your Form 700 filers to ensure that they receive this revised Ethics Commission compliance guidance.

Ethics Commission Compliance Information: Revised Update About Annual Form 700 and Ethics and Sunshine Training Deadline - Now Extended to June 1, 2020

In light of the ongoing COVID-19 public health emergency, the information contained in this update has been developed to provide the most current information about this year's Annual Statement of Economic Interest (Form 700) filing process for City officials and employees who are required to file a Form 700 under the law and for the Departmental Filing Officers who assist in that process.



The April 1, 2020 filing deadline for Form 700s has been extended to June 1, 2020.

Due to the current COVID-19 pandemic, the California Fair Political Practices Commission ([FPPC](#)) [announced on March 26](#) a 60-day extension until June 1, 2020 for those required to file an annual Form 700. Annual Form 700s that are normally due on April 1 will now be accepted as timely filed until June 1.

If there is further guidance from the FPPC, the Ethics Commission will provide updated compliance guidance to City departments accordingly.



Elected Officials, Members of City Boards and Commissions, and Department Heads are required to [file a Form 700 electronically](#) using the Ethics Commission's [online filing system](#) (NetFile) which is accessible 24/7. These officials must also complete an online Ethics and Sunshine Training requirement and file their Ethics and Sunshine Ordinance Training Declaration Form at the end of the training process. **The Ethics Commission has now extended the deadline to complete the Ethics and Sunshine training requirements from April 1, 2020 to June 1, 2020.** Officials can access and complete these training requirements through the same [online filing portal](#) used to file their Form 700.



Employees who are [designated filers by their department per the City's Conflict of Interest Code](#) are required to file Statement of Economic Interests with original signatures with their Departmental Filing Officer. Electronic filing of Form 700

statements using the Ethics Commission's NetFile system is not available to designated filers.

The Ethics Commission recognizes restrictions imposed to fight the spread of COVID-19 may make the logistics of filing documents on paper with original signatures difficult or even impossible. Given that scenario, under the current public health emergency, the San Francisco Ethics Commission will consider a designated filer's Form 700 to be timely filed if:

- the completed form is sent by mail and postmarked by **June 1, 2020**, or
- a scanned version or digital image of that signed Form 700 is provided by the designated filer to the filer's Departmental Filing Officer by email by **June 1, 2020**, or
- where sending a digital copy of the signed Form 700 is technically not feasible, a fillable PDF version of the completed form is submitted without signature by the filer to the filer's Departmental Filing Officer by email by **June 1, 2020** and later a signed hard copy of the form is provided to the filer's Departmental Filing Officer.

Departmental Filing Officers are asked to provide their designated filers with the physical mailing address and email address to which their filers' Form 700s should be sent to ensure statements submitted by mail or email are directed to the correct address.

Please note that if there is further revised guidance from the FPPC, we will update our Commission's compliance guidance accordingly. We appreciate your patience and flexibility as we all work through the extraordinary circumstances facing filers during this year's filing process.

Filings by Designated Filers



Form 700 statements filed by a department's designated filers are required to be retained with the Departmental Filing Officer. As public documents these statements are required to be provided to the public upon request. During this emergency period Departmental Filing Officers are asked to ensure all Form 700 filings received digitally via email from their designated filers (e.g., scans, images, PDFs, etc.) are archived in a way that will allow for their retention for the public file. Whether received by mail in hard copy format, or digitally via email, Departmental Filing Officers must retain copies of the filings so that they are available upon public request.

For any further questions regarding public records response requirements during Shelter-in-Place Public Health Order, please consult the Deputy City Attorney assigned to your department.

For Filing Officers: Extension of Deadline for Filing Officer Report



Each year by April 10th the Departmental Filing officers must notify the Ethics Commission of any designated filer who failed to timely file the Form 700. This notice is called the [Filing Officer Report](#).

As the filing deadline for Form 700s has been extended to June 1, 2020, **the Ethics Commission will not enforce the April 10th deadline this year for the Filing Officer Report. The Commission will establish a later deadline for the Filing Officer Report and send a subsequent notice to inform the Filing Officers regarding the revised filing date.**

Are there consequences for filing late or failing to file a Form 700?

Under the law, Form 700 filings not submitted by their deadlines may be subject to late fees of \$10 per day up to a maximum of \$100. In addition, non-filers may be subject to disciplinary action by their appointing authority, including removal from office or termination of employment. Failure to file a Form 700 can result in penalties of up to \$5,000.

In addition, **Members of City Boards and Commissions** who have not filed a Form 700 and/or their Ethics and Sunshine Ordinance Training Declaration Form by the deadline are disqualified under City law from participating in or voting on matters listed on their boards'

and commissions' meeting agendas until the filing requirements are met. (See SF Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code Section 3.1-102.5(c)).

Please be assured that in the face of the ongoing COVID-19 public health emergency, the Ethics Commission recognizes that City officials and employees who have these essential public disclosure obligations are also facing unprecedented challenges as public servants. Exercising the authority provided to local filing officers under state law, the Ethics Commission will evaluate late filings on a careful and impartial basis to determine whether fines should be assessed. We know this year's annual Form 700 filing is occurring under extraordinarily difficult circumstances and we appreciate and thank all filers in advance for your patience, understanding, and flexibility during this period.

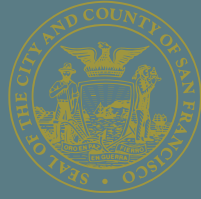



In October 2000, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to establish the Office of Labor Standards Enforcement (OLSE). Initially responsible for prevailing wage enforcement, the office has since expanded to include enforcement authority for more than 25 different laws.

OLSE respectfully submits this report to the Board of Supervisors to satisfy the reporting requirements of the Minimum Wage, Minimum Compensation, Health Care Accountability, Fair Chance, and Formula Retail ordinances, and to summarize OLSE's outcomes for FY 18-19.

Report Highlights

Unprecedented Collections for Workers and the City

OLSE collected a total of \$17.3 million in FY 18-19, nearly double its collections from any prior fiscal year:

- ◆ \$13.4 million in restitution to workers – an increase of 92% from FY 17-18 (\$7.0 million)
- ◆ \$3.9 million in penalties and fees to the City – an increase of 290% from FY 17-18 (\$1.0 million)

More Investigations, More Completed Cases

- ◆ OLSE initiated 280 new investigations – an increase of 47% from FY 17-18 (191 investigations)
- ◆ OLSE completed 278 cases – an increase of 28% from FY 17-18 (218 cases)

Robust Public Engagement

In FY 18-19, OLSE strengthened its vigorous program of outreach, education, and technical assistance to inform employers and employees about local labor laws, achieving over 55,000 points of contact:

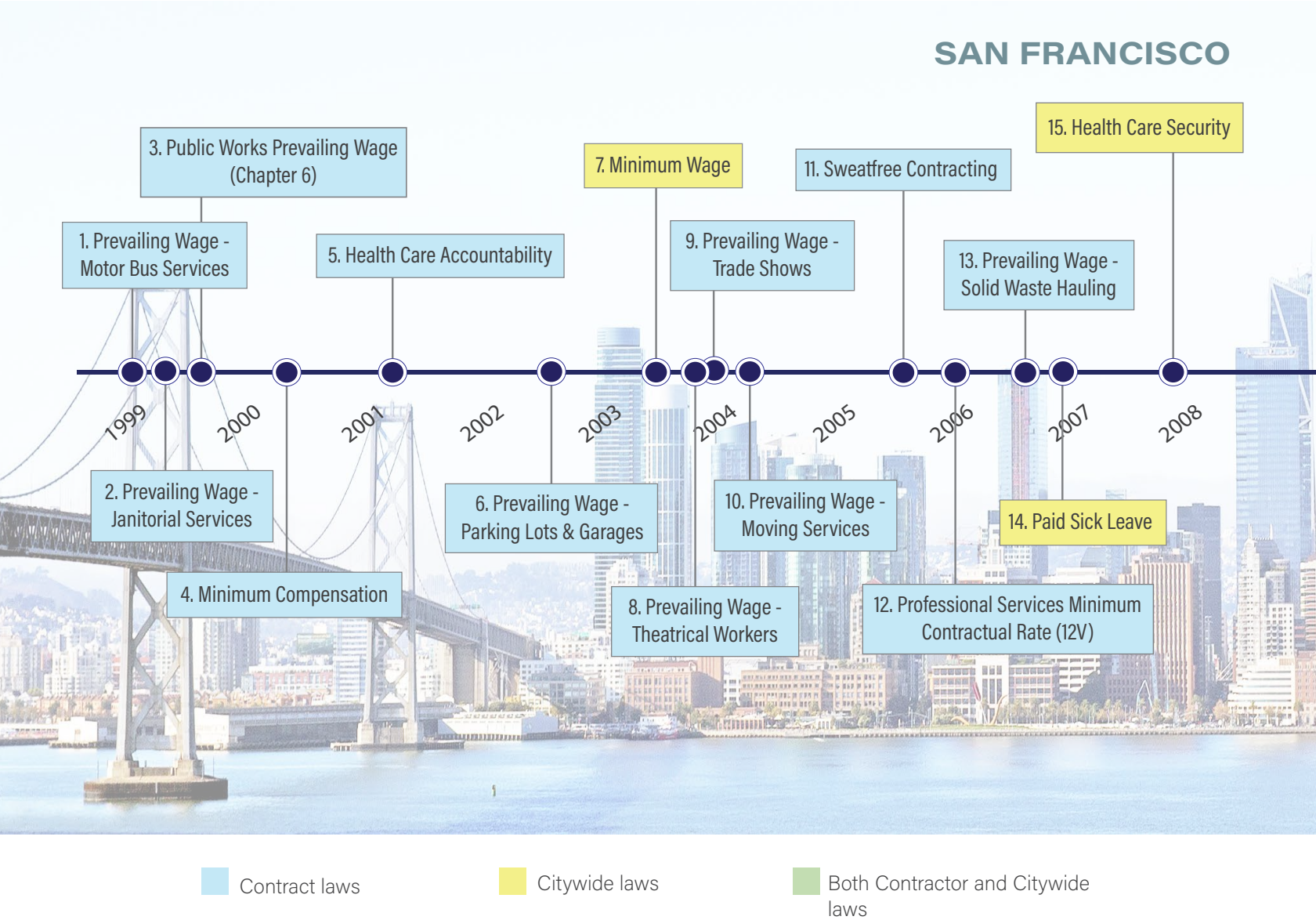
- ◆ Presented to 5,941 employers and community groups facilitated through City contractor meetings, live and pre-recorded OLSE webinars, and in-person workshops
- ◆ Answered 6,962 telephone calls through OLSE's multilingual labor law hotlines
- ◆ Outreached to 7,732 employees through OLSE's community-based outreach contract
- ◆ San Francisco's labor law postings mailed to 37,861 employers

I. BACKGROUND

Over two decades, San Francisco voters and the Board of Supervisors have adopted an extraordinary array of groundbreaking labor policies – many of them the first of their kind in the nation.

Some of these laws apply only to City contracts, leases, or permits. These include some of San Francisco’s first labor laws like prevailing wage, minimum compensation, and health care accountability. Other laws apply to employers citywide, beginning with the San Francisco voters passage of the minimum wage ordinance in 2003.

A timeline of San Francisco’s labor laws is provided below. Note that the timeline displays only the initial passage of each law; subsequent amendments are not displayed.

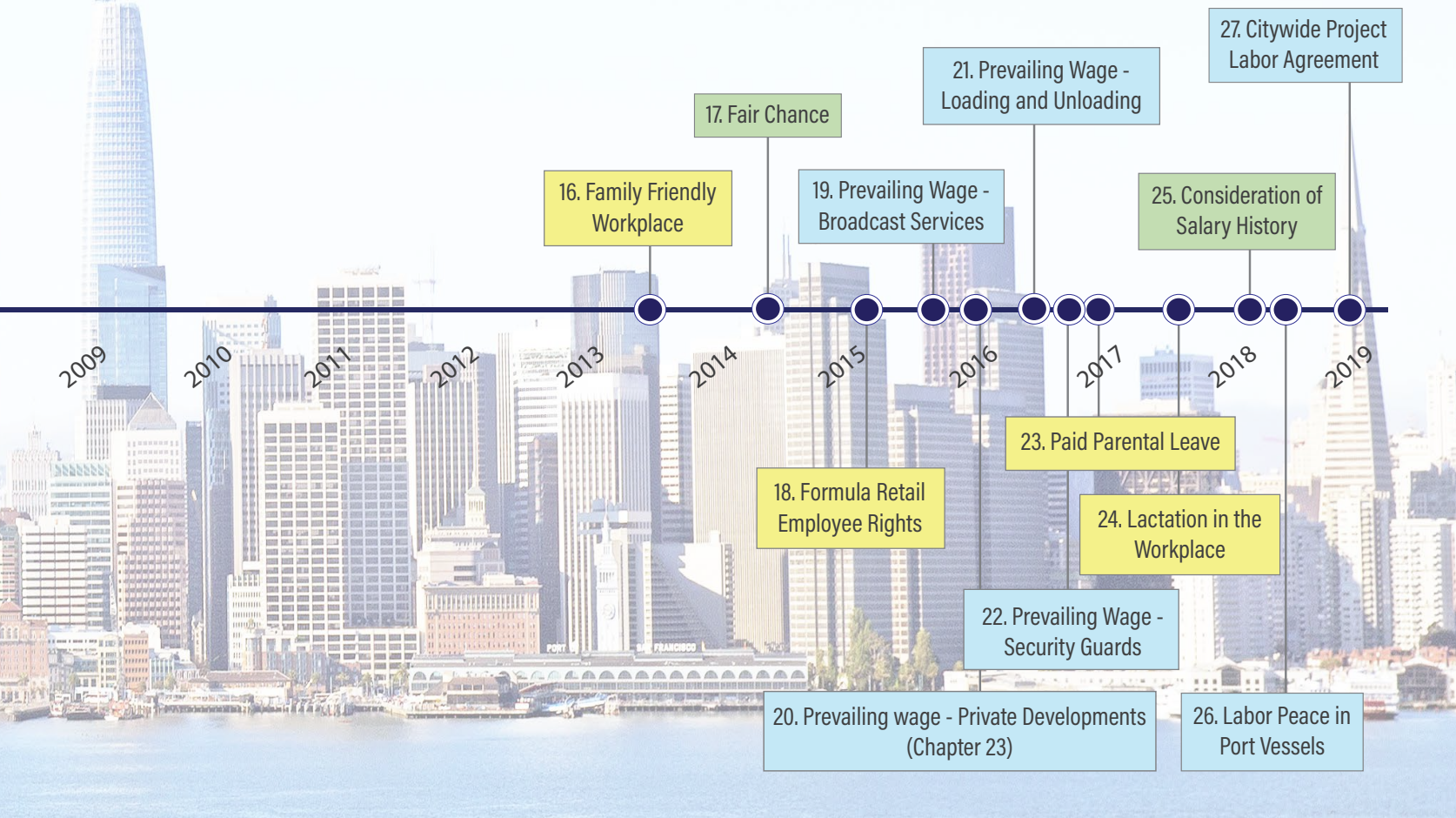


San Francisco was the first in the nation to adopt its own minimum wage, paid sick leave, formula retail, and paid parental leave ordinances.

There are now over 50 U.S. cities and counties with their own minimum wage laws, and over 30 U.S. states, cities, and counties have followed San Francisco's lead to adopt their own paid sick leave laws. Also, a growing number of U.S. cities including New York, Chicago, and Seattle have adopted their own fair workweek laws modeled after San Francisco's formula retail ordinance.

Finally, the State of California adopted statewide paid sick leave and fair chance laws – and expanded its lactation accommodation law – modeled after San Francisco's ordinances.

LABOR LAW TIMELINE

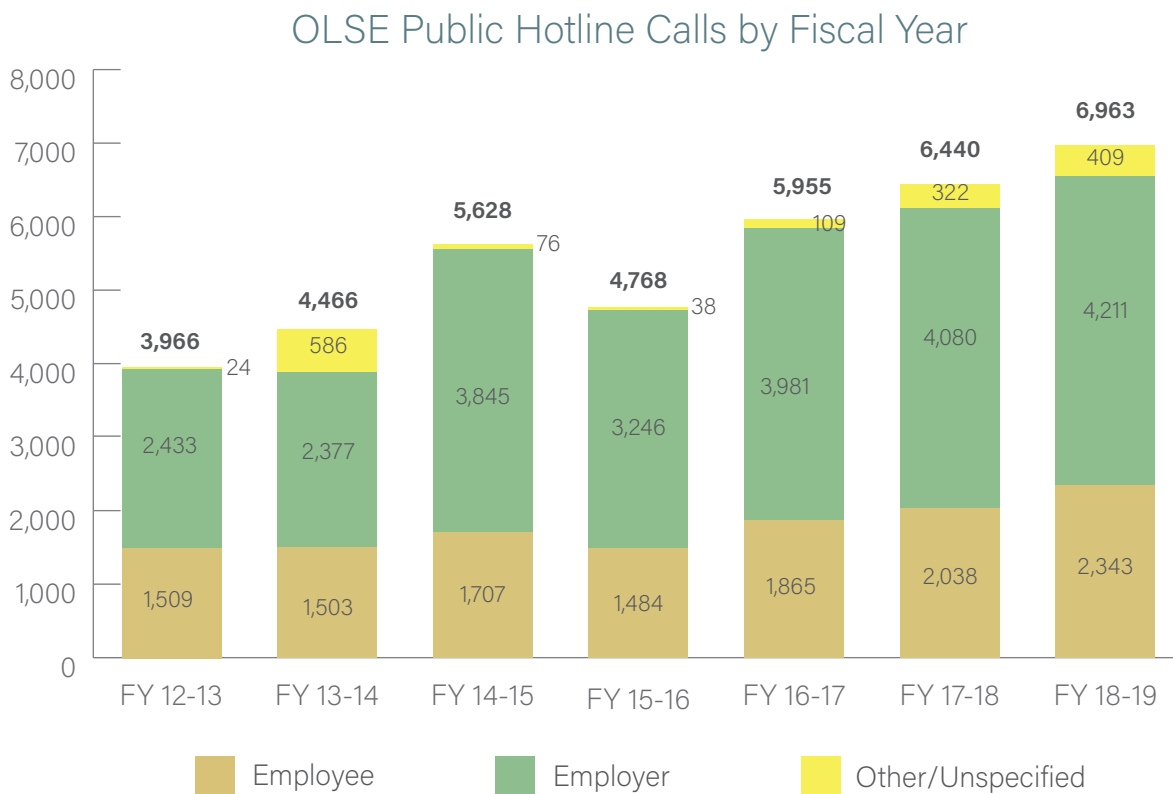


II. ROBUST PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

OLSE has developed strong outreach, education, and technical assistance programs to increase public awareness of local labor laws. The office provides multilingual telephone hotlines, dedicated email accounts, and comprehensive webinars to ensure that employers and workers can efficiently access timely information about all of San Francisco's labor laws. OLSE also works closely with community partners to support focused outreach to worker populations that may be most vulnerable to labor violations.

Multilingual Telephone Hotlines

OLSE maintains 11 separate multilingual telephone hotlines, each dedicated to a specific ordinance or policy area. Callers may opt to receive assistance in English, Spanish, Cantonese, Mandarin, or Filipino.



Of the 6,963 total calls in FY 18-19, 3,260 (42%) were inquiries about the Health Care Security Ordinance (HCSO). OLSE typically receives a spike in calls about the HCSO each year in March and April, when employers call with questions about the law's annual reporting requirement.

Employer Outreach

OLSE is committed to providing proactive informational outreach to employers. In FY 18-19 staff interacted with 55,000 employers and community group representatives including:

- 3,638 vendor representatives at pre-bid meetings, pre-construction conferences and other City contracting meetings.
- 1,443 employer representatives through OLSE’s live and pre-recorded webinars.
- 170 public works contractors at annual prevailing wage workshop hosted by OLSE and supported by State and Federal agencies.
- 37,861 employers through OLSE’s annual mailing of the required labor law postings and information summarizing San Francisco labor laws.

Community Outreach

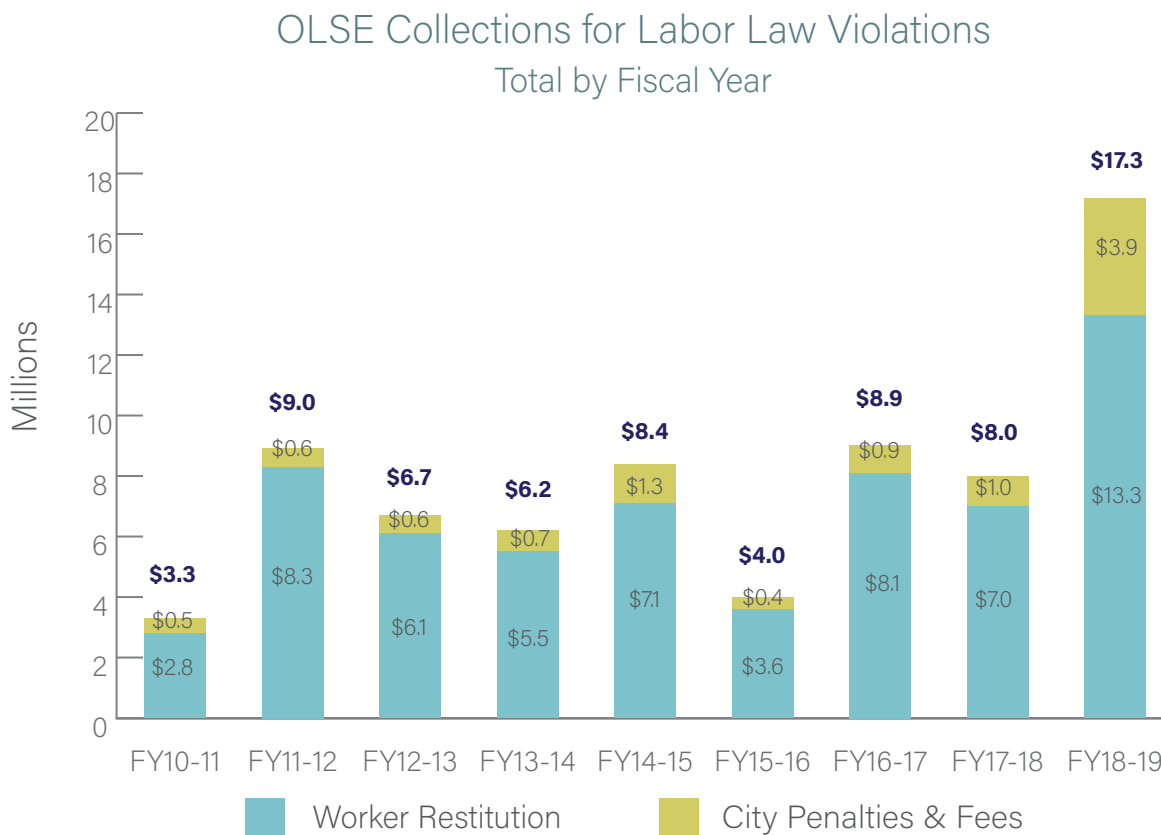
OLSE maintains a community outreach program designed to reach the workers who are most likely to be victims of wage theft and other labor law violations. OLSE contracts with the Chinese Progressive Association and six subcontractors (Asian Law Caucus, Dolores Street Community Services, Filipino Community Center, La Raza Centro Legal, South of Market Community Action Network, and Young Workers United) to reach key target communities.

Through this contract these organizations disseminate information on worker’s rights in low-income and immigrant communities, provide individualized worker rights consultations and encourage workers to file complaints regarding violations of the law.

In FY 18-19 OLSE’s community contractors reported conducting outreach to 7,732 workers and providing individual consultations on labor rights to 227 workers.

III. UNPRECEDENTED COLLECTIONS FOR WORKERS

In FY 18-19 OLSE collected \$17.3 million in restitution, penalties, and fees - nearly double the amount of any prior year in OLSE's history. This spike in collections was aided in part by the office's growing capacity as well as efficiency in processing and settling large cases with employers.



Restitution for Workers

OLSE collected more than \$13.3 million in restitution for 6,845 workers in FY 18-19. This total, which reflects actual payments made by employers to current and former employees, includes back wages, benefits, and penalties and/or interest paid to workers. This amount is by far the highest in OLSE's history and represents a 92% increase over FY 17-18.

Not included in this chart is the restoration of paid sick leave balances mandated through enforcement actions. OLSE restored a total of 7,055 paid sick leave hours to San Francisco workers in FY 18-19.

Penalties & Fees Collected for the City

OLSE collected \$3.94 million in penalties and fees in FY 18-19, equivalent to 63% of OLSE's total budget that year.

\$1.75 million in penalties was paid to the City's General Fund, which was more than three times higher than any prior year in OLSE's history. Additionally, OLSE collected \$2.19 million in fees for the Department of Public Health through enforcement actions under the Health Care Accountability Ordinance, an amount that broke all records.

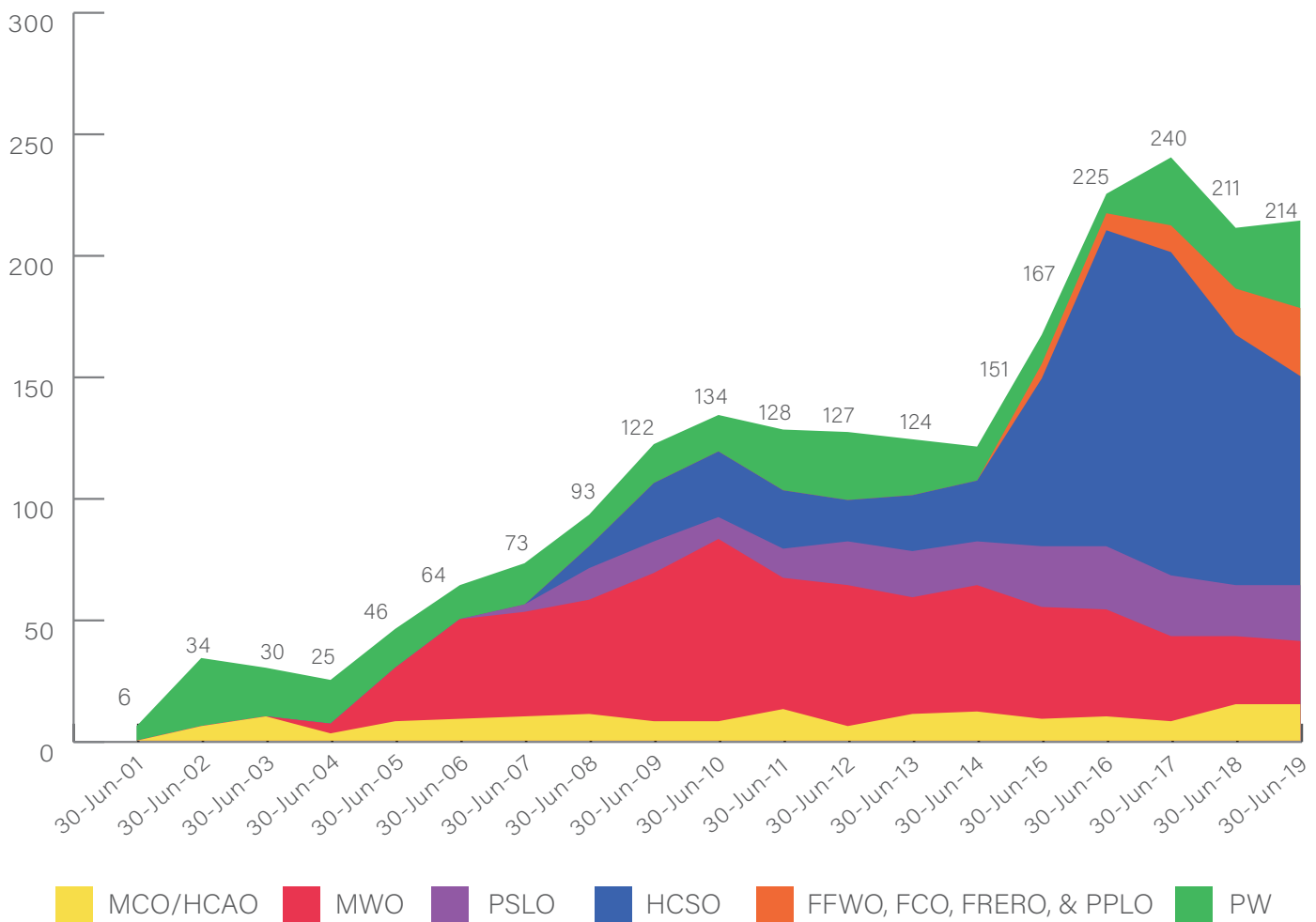

IV. MORE INVESTIGATIONS, MORE COMPLETED CASES

OLSE is pursuing more investigations and resolving considerably more cases than ever before. The office has eliminated case backlog, which has further improved the ability to respond to new complaints.

Active Cases

The chart below shows a snapshot of the number of active cases at the end of each fiscal year, by law (or group of laws).



The chart displays the rapid increase in active HCSO cases from June 30, 2014 to June 30, 2016 which resulted in a subsequent backlog. Through increased staffing and new case triage procedures, OLSE has eliminated this backlog.

Cases Opened and Resolved

OLSE compliance officers opened and resolved significantly more cases in FY 18-19 than FY 17-18. In FY 18-19, OLSE opened 89 more investigations (280 to 191) and resolved 60 more cases (278 to 218) than the prior year.

In all, OLSE is taking in and resolving more cases than ever before, achieved primarily through increased staffing, improved internal procedures, and the support of the City Attorney's Office.



V. LOOKING FORWARD

FY 18-19 may have been a watershed year for OLSE, but collectively we are always looking ahead to future challenges. Although our annual rate of collections will fluctuate from year to year, overall an upward trend is expected.

OLSE will continue its robust public outreach program as well as its aggressive enforcement of San Francisco's labor laws. The office will initiate implementation of the new Citywide Project Labor Agreement, developing enforcement procedures and technical assistance for contractors. OLSE will also work with the City Attorney's Office and the California Division of Labor Standards Enforcement to effectively apply AB-5, recently adopted State law that addresses misclassification of workers.

OLSE continues to rise to the challenge of expanding responsibilities and will ensure that the City's groundbreaking array of labor protections are meaningful for every San Francisco worker.

Honorable Supervisors,

I am writing on behalf of Stop Crime SF and our nearly 1000 members. Please reject Supervisor Fewer's proposal to speed up the closing of County Jail No. 4 without providing the ability to add beds in the remaining jails, allowing capital improvements to existing jails and expanding ankle-monitoring programs when reducing the jail population. Please let public health officials and the Sheriff do their jobs in managing how jails mitigate coronavirus infection.

When it comes to protecting inmates in San Francisco's jails from coronavirus infection, two voices should matter most: public health officials and Sheriff Paul Miyamoto.

Those who wanted to close jails and end incarceration long before COVID-19 are using the health crisis as a reason to reduce or eliminate just sentences. But the debate over the role of incarceration in the criminal justice system is a separate issue from how jails must handle the pandemic.

We need to let public health officials and Sheriff Miyamoto do their jobs in managing the coronavirus crisis without interference from politicians with a broader criminal justice agenda.

Public health officials have the expertise to determine what needs to be done to prevent the spread of the virus. For example, the Examiner [reported](#) that Dr. Lisa Pratt, the director of Jail Health Services, said the total jail population should be reduced from about 900 to between 700 and 800 inmates for effective social distancing.

Sheriff Miyamoto runs San Francisco's three jails and knows which inmates pose the most danger to public safety. He can decide which inmates -- based on factors such as age, crime committed, health issues -- are safe for release and which ones pose too great a risk for

violence and should remain in custody.

The threat of coronavirus in jail is real and must be taken seriously. Miyamoto and public health officials have been working together to mitigate it. Miyamoto told the [Chronicle](#) he has already compiled a list of inmates for early release: those with a high risk of infection and those who have less than 60 days left on their sentence.

We should not interfere with this process.

Miyamoto emphasized that simply releasing an inmate doesn't guarantee they will be safe from coronavirus. In some cases, a jail could be a safer shelter if the inmate might infect others or has nowhere to go on the outside.

“The last thing we would want to do is release them into a community where there are verified cases of COVID-19 without a place to stay.”

Miyamoto also pointed out that San Francisco's jail inmates are more dangerous than those in jails in neighboring counties. He told the [Chronicle](#) that most inmates have been booked on or convicted of serious or violent charges.

That means deciding who to release will have an effect on public safety.

But Supervisor Sandra Lee Fewer is now proposing legislation to speed up the closure of County Jail No. 4 at the Hall of Justice to this fall, supposedly because of concern over COVID-19.

“The infrastructure does not exist to support the release of serious and violent offenders and arrestees into our community while protecting the victims of crimes and our public safety,” Miyamoto said in a [statement](#).

Everyone agrees the rundown jail at the Hall of Justice is seismically unsafe and unsuitable. Miyamoto said he wants to follow a “responsible plan to close County Jail No. 4 while maintaining public safety.”

Miyamoto and his predecessor Vicki Hennessy both wanted to replace the jail with a state-of-

the-art facility. A new jail would better serve the needs of inmates since the current facility doesn't have space for counseling and other programs.

But it was the Board of Supervisors who [turned down](#) an \$80 million state grant in 2016 to build a new jail. Instead, they preferred to let inmates remain in the decrepit jail until it was slated for demolition in 2021. The larger political agenda was to reduce the number of jails so there would be less beds for prosecutors to fill.

“With no replacements planned, this leaves the city unprepared and with no capacity to manage any unforeseen changes in the criminal justice system,” Miyamoto said.

Limited alternatives

Miyamoto warned that Fewer's proposed legislation will “prohibit recommendations our office has made to relieve the pressure on the criminal justice system that closing County Jail No. 4 will create.”

If he isn't allowed to build a replacement jail, Miyamoto said he must have the ability to expand and reconfigure San Francisco's two remaining jails to meet public safety needs. But according to the [Chronicle](#), Fewer's legislation would prohibit the addition of beds to County Jails Nos. 2 and 5.

“We cannot legislate bed space away unless we are legislating away criminal acts that require arrests and custody of persons in the interests of public safety,” Miyamoto said.

The sheriff also said Fewer's legislation “blocks capital improvements to our existing jails, which are required for the safe and secure detention of the people in our custody.”

And the Chronicle [reported](#) that the legislation would prohibit the expansion of ankle-monitoring programs to reduce the jail population.

“As written, the Supervisor's legislation is not only irresponsible,” Miyamoto said, “it is a threat to public safety.”

We agree. We urge you to reject Supervisor Fewer's proposal to speed up the closing of County Jail No. 4 without providing the ability to add beds in the remaining jails, allowing capital improvements to existing jails and expanding ankle-monitoring programs when

reducing the jail population. Please let public health officials and the Sheriff do their jobs in managing how jails mitigate coronavirus infection.

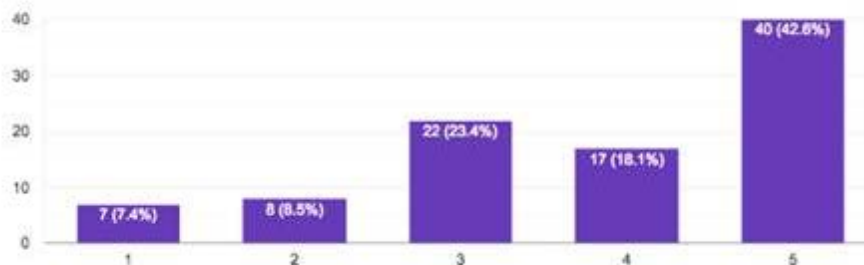

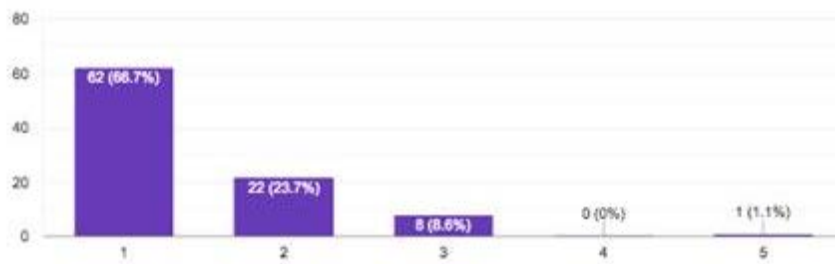
How would you rate the negative financial impact on your household over the next three months? We are assuming that the Shelter In Place order will be extended after April 7.

My name is Peter van der Pas, and I was born and raised in the Bay Area. I am a current resident of San Francisco district 9 and a resident of San Francisco since 2008. I have worked in the retail industry for many of San Francisco's most favorite and longstanding small businesses over the past 12 years. Most recently I have worked part-time for the extremely popular general store on Divisadero Street called The Perish Trust (which is next door to The Mill) which has been closed since mid-March due to the Shelter-in-place orders put forth by Mayor Breed and later extended by Governor Newsom.

I also work in the Photography Industry as a freelance photographer and photographer assistant. Again, in this arena, all future jobs have been canceled indefinitely, due to closures related to COVID-19. I live in a rent-controlled apartment building near the base of Bernal Hill with my husband and our roommate. My husband is a freelance florist with restaurant accounts which have been halted due to COVID-19 closures. Our roommate Claire works in the restaurant industry, most recently for Michelin Starred restaurant Nico, in the financial district, as well as working for the fabled Britex Fabrics in Union Square. Claire's income has also been stopped due to closures related to shelter-in-place.

I have gone into detail over our places of employment in order to make clear that our work has made vital contributions to San Francisco. We have dedicated many years of our lives to create beautiful experiences for the people of San Francisco to enjoy and to attract tourism to our city. Our landlord has extended our grace period by 30 days for the month of April but we are still in a very precarious place, and unsure if we will be able to repay him in the future.

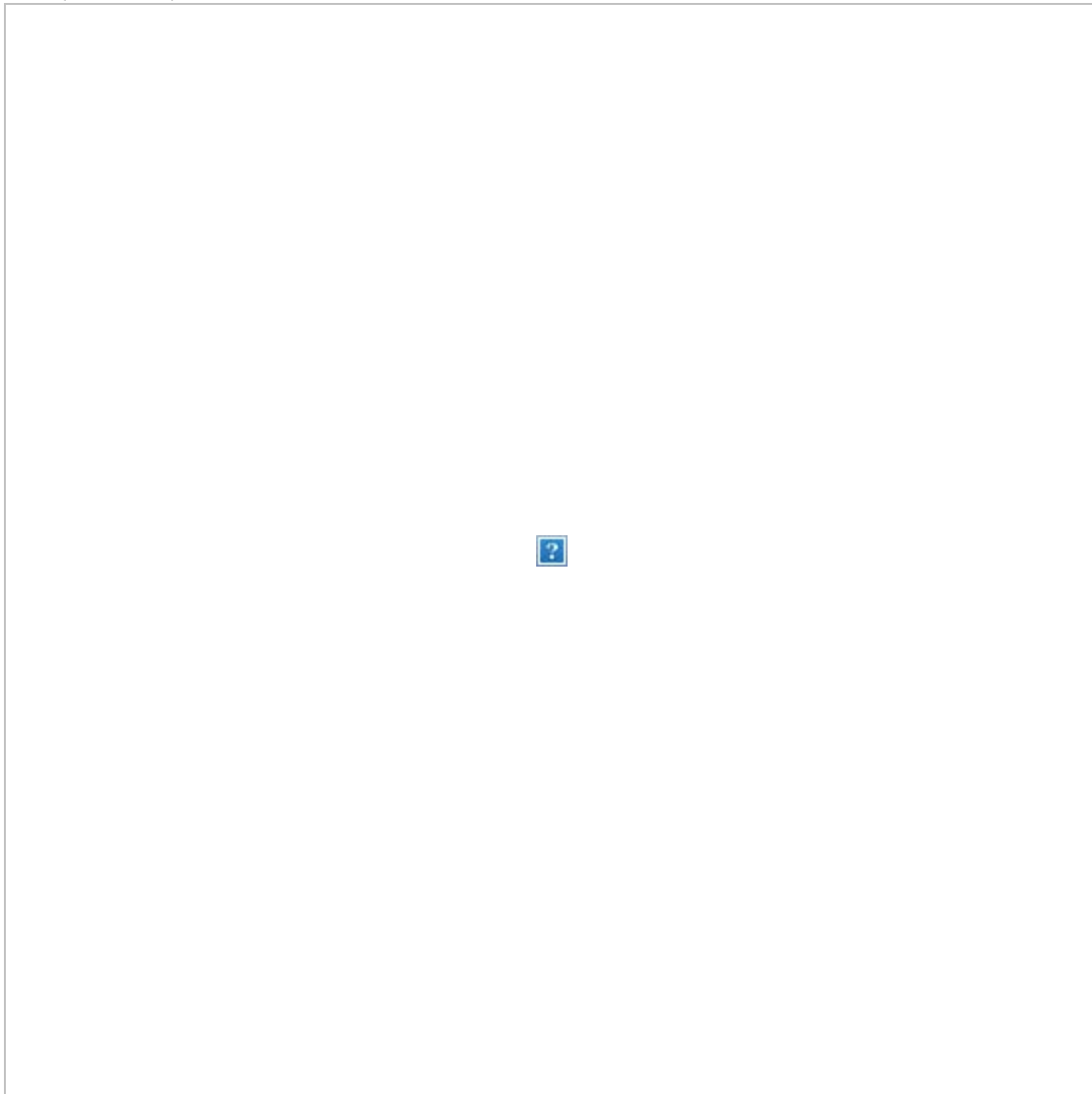

Dear Supervisor Ronen,

Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the San Francisco Public Library's administration, at the request of the San Francisco Mayor's Office, plans to open several library locations on Monday, March 30, as daycare facilities for teenagers in grades 9 - 12 who are the children of healthcare workers or low-income families receiving scholarships from the Recreation and Parks Department. They plan to staff these daycare facilities for teenagers with Children's Librarians and Teen Librarians.

It is unconscionable that San Francisco Public Library (SFPL) staff are being mandated to provide childcare for healthcare workers at this time. Most of these youth are legally old enough to stay home alone. This puts Library staff, their families and the general public at risk by not self-isolating, not avoiding large crowds, not restricting travel and not keeping a distance from others, potentially growing the spread of infection. This does not comply with the City's and State's shelter-in-place orders.

This mandate is particularly misguided given that SFUSD is providing no services at this time - including special education services for children with an IEP, which is a federal legal document. SFUSD has chosen to take this extraordinary step to protect the safety of families, staff and the general public.

Library staff are right to be concerned about interacting with healthcare workers and their families, who are at high-risk of infection. It has been widely reported that healthcare facilities in the United States are not taking sufficient precautions to protect workers from coronavirus: [SF Examiner](#), [Kron 4](#), [LA Times](#), [Kaiser Health News](#), [NPR](#), [The Guardian](#), [The Hill](#). 
This letter serves as notice under California Labor Code § 1400 et al. that Fitness International, LLC plans to temporarily furlough employees at the employment site(s) listed in attached Exhibit A. 

This letter is notice that Air Canada (“Company”) is temporarily placing employees who work at San Francisco International Airport on unpaid furloughs, or for employees represented by a Union, on Off-Duty Status without Pay, as set forth in the applicable Collective Bargaining Agreement.

There are currently 58 employees affected at this employment site. This action commenced on March 27, 2020 and will continue indefinitely, but is intended to be temporary and last less than six months.

Whether or not this action triggers the requirements of the Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act or California Labor Code Section 1400 *et seq.*, we thought it appropriate to give you this notice. We are taking this action because of COVID-19-related business circumstances that were not reasonably foreseeable. We would like to have given more notice of this action, but were unable to do so because of how quickly our operations were affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, the World Health Organization’s pandemic declaration on March 11th, the President’s declaration of a national emergency on March 13th, and other related governmental announcements and actions.

As permitted by 20 C.F.R. § 639.7(f), which is incorporated into California Labor Code section 1400 *et seq.* by reference (see California Labor Code section 1401(b)), the following additional information is available to you upon request (it is maintained on site and is readily accessible): The anticipated schedule for making separations (if a schedule applies); the job titles of positions to be affected, and the number of affected employees in each job classification; an indication as to whether or not bumping rights exist; the name of each union representing affected employees, if any; and the name and address of the chief elected officer of each union, if any.

We also have given or are giving appropriate notice to the affected workers and any relevant union representatives. Consistent with California law, those notices include the following statement:

"employees who have been laid off temporarily may be eligible for Unemployment Insurance (UI). More information on UI and other resources available for workers is available at labor.ca.gov/coronavirus2019."

This letter will serve as official notice under the Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification (WARN) Act and California WARN Act that Bon Appetit's operation at 2130 Fulton Street, San Francisco, CA 94117, has been reduced and/or temporarily suspended as of March 15, 2020 due to unforeseen business circumstance and/or government directives to cancel large events or close our location due to COVID-19. I spoke to a captain Yamaguchi (spelling?) today via phone, who called me back after I left a message for the Chief of Police. He told me they were having *significant* issues on Haight St. especially, as the people congregating on the street would say they are "together" and they could not enforce anything.

In short, my question remains, what does enforcement mean here? Besides new guidelines, what is changing? Will there be ticketing? Forced disbursement of crowds? Arrests? My concern remains around what happens if they refuse to disperse. There are new guidelines for encampments now that specify certain things, like being 6 feet apart, not sharing tents, etc, which will help clarify things.

Your March 16, 2020, shelter-in-place order – which I applaud, has placed me in a position of possibly no shelter at all, believe it or not.

I have lived in San Francisco since 1960 and homeless since 2009. Me being homeless has not stopped me from doing my part to keep San Francisco being, “Everyone’s favorite city” as you should remember from my constant emails to you when you were District 5 supervisor and even now as mayor.

On March 17, 2020, my sister informed me of an (attached) notice of shelter-in-place order at her building where she has been a resident since 2010. Recently, I was using her apartment/internet for a daily office so to speak.

On Friday, March 27, 2020, I arrived as usual to read another notice taped on the front door of her building, which read “No guest allowed...” (attached photo) Now, due to that notice, which I also understand and applaud under the circumstances, I will not be able to use my sister’s place as I have been.

I have never been able to walk and now at age 63 that has become more challenging or difficult. As a result, and with the help of a relative I purchased a mobility scooter and it was delivered to me on February 14, 2020. (attached photo)

If interested, I am more than happy to share with a member of your staff over the phone or 6ft distance in person on why city shelter “Navigation Centers” nor the recently acquired temporary hotel rooms by The City will help me in my situation. What I need is an apartment that I can maneuver my mobility scooter. This unique scooter is too large to maneuver in most older buildings. I can afford rent with my SSA benefits.

This is an urgent matter and I hope your office will assist me in securing more permanent housing. You should know I have no drug, alcohol issues nor criminal activity within the last 40 years. My sister's unit is Section 8 housing and management must follow those rules which do not permit me to be on her lease.

Updated Guidance on Use of Respirators & Masks for City Employees

March 31, 2020

Dear Department Personnel Officers:

This replaces the guidance issued on March 3, 2020. Effective March 31, 2020, the Department of Public Health (DPH) is recommending the use of simple barrier isolation masks for first responders to the COVID-19 emergency. For the purposes of this guidance, first responders are defined as follows:

- Firefighters/ Paramedics/ EMTs
- Emergency Dispatchers at the Department of Emergency Management
- Police
- Deputy Sheriffs and employees who come into contact with an incarcerated person
- Health care workers
- Emergency Operations Center staff

Some individuals who contract the virus may experience mild or minor symptoms. First responders are on the front lines of the defense against the spread of COVID-19 in our communities and we must ensure that we are protecting the public as well as employees by reducing the risk of transmission of the virus. This guidance reflects several realities in facing the challenges of fighting the spread of COVID-19, including the necessity of managing a limited supply of personal protective equipment (PPE) and the knowledge of how the virus is spread between individuals.

The new guidance is as follows:

- 1) All employees are instructed to wear a mask at the start of their work duties until the end of their shift. Masks will be worn in all service areas, including all settings where individuals and the public are served by first responders. Masks will also be worn by employees in non-service areas when they are in close proximity to other employees.
- 2) Employees will receive a mask depending on their specific work and service area. Employees' masks may be worn until they are wet, soiled, or damaged. Employees who do not need to wear the mask all day are encouraged to re-use clean, dry, undamaged masks; that is, it is not required to change the mask daily. **Employees are encouraged to keep their masks for as many days as possible**, as long as they are clean. This will help maintain an already limited supply.

- 3) Individuals or employees who may be in a service area for extended periods may need to remove their masks at times (e.g., to eat, take medication). These employees are encouraged to wear masks when in close proximity with other individuals or employees.

At this time, N95 respirators are only recommended for use by health care workers providing direct patient care.

Distribution:

- First responders in a non-healthcare setting, will obtain their masks from their home department through their supervisor or Department Operation Center (DOC). Departments will be contacted by the Emergency Operation Center (EOC) to schedule a pick-up of masks from the EOC.
- First responders working in the Emergency Operation Center will obtain their masks through their respective section (Operations, Logistics, Planning etc.) at the EOC.
- Health care workers providing direct patient care already have access to both simple barrier isolation masks and N95 respirators through their respective home department or hospital. There is no new protocol for distribution to these employees.

This policy has been implemented as a proactive measure in an evolving series of data-driven recommendations consistent with our City's priorities in response to COVID-19—slowing the spread of the virus, protecting vulnerable populations, and protecting health care workers

Employees can further reduce their risk of transmitting the disease by following these guidelines:

- Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or using hand sanitizer.
- Cover your cough or sneeze.
- Stay home if you are sick.
- Avoid touching your face.
- Follow physical distancing guidelines.
- Reduce the time you are around others outside of your home, even when practicing physical distancing.

Thank you for your cooperation as we work together to respond to this public health challenge.

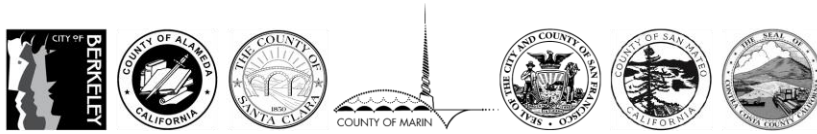

Dear Mayor Breed and Board of Supervisors,

As a leading academic studying the management of homelessness in the US I urge you to use all powers necessary to place those currently in shelters and on the streets immediately into the city's vacant hotel rooms. You have the legal authority, hotel stock, and funds to do so. Public health experts are in consensus that hotels are preferable to streets or congregate shelters for the vast majority (although certainly not all) unhoused individuals.

Other cities, which have not made adequate plans to handle outbreaks in shelters or encampments are scrambling and should be a warning to us here in San Francisco. In Seattle four shelters are on lockdown. In Las Vegas shelters have been closed and are placing people in parking spaces outdoors. New York City had 7 COVID positive cases last Monday in its shelters, 66 on Sunday, and just a day later, yesterday, 99 within 45 shelters. The shelters have now running out of quarantine space. 30% of those cases have required hospitalization. If SF has a similar situation as Seattle with 4 shelters impacted this could result in the lockdown, closure, or need to transfer 800 shelter residents to Moscone or hotels in a single day. Why tie the provision of hotel rooms to those sick or under investigation for COVID-19 when we have the powers and resources to place unsheltered people into hotel rooms now?

The arguments I've heard against such plans are largely unfounded.

1) **We need to have intensive staff in place before placing people in hotels.** Yes, this is true for some unhoused people who require intensive care, but not the vast majority. According to the 2019 PIT survey 36% of San Francisco's homeless were housed just months ago within the past year, in their own homes caring for themselves. 31% are only experiencing homelessness for their first time. According to a recent needs assessment I completed with other professors and the Coalition on Homelessness 52% were doing so within the past 3 years. The vast majority of those on the streets currently receive no services from street outreach and most shelter residents do not receive on-site support beyond food. There will no doubt be challenges providing staffing under these circumstances, but these are challenges we will face providing for the needs of those in shelters and on the streets under COVID-19 circumstances. Providing services and monitoring in hotels is safer and easier than either of the other settings for most cases. In normal times this would be a responsible consideration, at the current moment of this pandemic with lives on the line I worry this may be an irresponsible delay.

2) **This will cost the city a lot of money.** Yes, it will cost money. However, public health experts agree that this will also save lives. With estimates of COVID-19 hospitalizations running \$75k per person, without the use of ICU's, this will inevitably save society money. A study released by colleagues at UCLA and UPenn projected that homeless who contract COVID-19 are twice as likely to be hospitalized, and two to four times as likely to die than the general population. There is perhaps no more efficient way to protect our medical care workers and broader San Franciscans from reaching surge capacity than sheltering the

unhoused in individual units. In Connecticut the Governor plans to have 75% of hotel costs reimbursed by the Feds. Governor Newsom has already committed money to this purpose. The Mayor and Public Health Officer powers allow hotels to be taken and at a later date be paid a "reasonable price." I hear concerns about damage to furniture, wallpaper and property within hotels. Sure, this may very well occur when moving people who have been on the streets or in shelters for many years and others who struggle with substance or behavioral health issues, but the damage costs seem petty compared to the cost of lost life and medical expenses. Again, it's hard for me to see this as a reasonable argument that this program would cost more than the medical monetary, and non-monetary ethical costs of not doing so.

3) Let's negotiate and lease hotel rooms first before we use emergency powers to commandeer them. If the city had begun planning for this scenario in February, like it could have, I would agree with this approach. The reality is that we didn't and we are likely going to be facing outbreaks in our shelters and streets this week, or next week at the latest. Once the emergencies begin cascading I presume you are going to be expanding field hospitals and hotels as quickly as possible then. Why wait for that when we have a two-week period before the storm really hits to slow down the virus now.

If San Francisco is proactive and aggressively commandeers hotels I believe that the rate of spread, hospitalizations, and deaths among the city's unhoused will follow a flatter trajectory than other comparable cities. As critics correctly note, hotels will not be an appropriate setting for a number of individuals, but this should not prohibit us from utilizing these empty units for the thousands of homeless San Franciscans for whom it is the safest option. San Francisco has long been a beacon and model for US cities: caring for its houseless through its provision of supportive housing, pioneering navigation centers, and Homeless Outreach Team. This pandemic presents another opportunity to show cities what can be done.

Thank you for your work on this issue and happy to help in anyway I can.

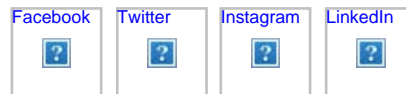

HRTC is one of SF's Behavioral Health outreach teams, and we have been developing pop-up multi-disciplinary mental health clinics in 6 neighborhoods in SF since January 2019. Since COVID, we have moved to an outreach model, delivering essential behavioral health services, COVID screening, food and water to 600-700 people in our target neighborhoods (200 more than usual and that with half our staff in self-quarantine). The scarcity of information about COVID, the increasing scarcity of access to food and water, and the level desperation and panic is palpable. The streets resemble a refugee camp, and we are swarmed whenever we go out, creating greater danger for us all. We are asking our fellow outreach teams to ramp up with us, but then we are all exposed even further to what is almost certain to be a critical disease vector in San Francisco.

Tenants who were having trouble paying the rent then are absolutely unable to pay now. Work has dried up for a lot of people, including the day laborers in our neighborhood. People are struggling to buy food and medicines, and fearful of getting sick, and are also terrified of being evicted. A friend of mine in her early 70s, a retired nurse with advanced cancer, is stressed out at the possibility of being evicted. The day laborers in front of our house on 26th street, have told me they're not getting any work and are frightened of what will happen to them if they're evicted. On behalf of Community Housing Partnership (CHP), a supportive housing provider that houses 1700 formerly homeless San Franciscans, I am writing to urge support for and enactment of today's Board of Supervisor's resolution regarding housing homeless and vulnerable residents in our city's vacant hotel rooms.

Our residents at CHP are some of the most vulnerable. We house many seniors and people with underlying medical conditions, all who have very limited incomes. Since a large percentage of them live in Single Room Occupancy (SRO) hotels, which is essentially congregate living, we are extremely worried about their health during these dangerous times.

We need to have options where residents who are medically fragile and can not self isolate or quarantine, due to living in congregate spaces, can go. Without such an option, the coronavirus could easily rip through our buildings causing serious harm, illness and even deaths.

It is not only our current residents we are concerned with however. The only difference between those we house and those who are currently forced to live on the streets is that our residents at some point were given the opportunity to come inside. Those who have not yet had this fortune, are at extreme risk and those who become infected, even more so.

San Francisco needs a plan to decrease the vulnerability and risk faced by homeless and formerly homeless individuals who live outside and in congregate settings. We are presented with a reasonable and realistic one today: to use the over 8000 hotel rooms available, as indicated by a response to a request for proposals, and get people into safe living spaces so as to protect them and us from serious illness and death.

Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors:

As a student of history, it's instructive to go back to the days prior to the Federal Reserve; specifically, 1907 and How San Francisco Rebuilt. I was worried by all the calls "for a bond" at yesterday's BOS meeting because they did not quite understand macroeconomics. That's actually true of 99% of economists who are purposefully mistaught in schools.

Here is the Memo that San Francisco used in 1907 to rebuild the economy and the city:

You will notice oddities such as extending a State Seawall Bond in 1907. On the surface, this made no sense - it would crowd out labor needed to construct housing. If you understand the magic of money, however, you will understand that it actually infused money into the economy that was put toward the creation of housing. The memo I just showed you is the simple recipe for the creation of wealth in any economy: Public Banking and Window Guidance. Interest rates have nothing to do with macroeconomic performance. That's pure propaganda and corporate media lies. In fact, interest rates have been artificially low since 1981. It's a gigantic lie that modifying interest rates have an impact on the economy. They are reactive (and deceptive in the case of the Fed which has not opened up its balance sheet in years).

To rebuild the local economy, there is a necessity for the creation of money to meet local priorities.

This is what happened in 1907. Money is a public utility, and it is created by banks out of thin air. This is how China grew. It's how Japan grew (until the US demanded it stop in 1989). It's how Germany is an export powerhouse. Economies grow when banks use a window guidance mechanism to invest money into the creation of domestically productive assets. Bitcoin and cryptocurrencies will actually hurt economic growth. Same with gold. What they are good for is batch settlement of interbank reserves. Getting the Libertarian movement onboard with them was a way of deflating the dollar in a bubble but used disinformation to lead critics of the Federal Reserve down a misguided path. Currently, the Fed is engaging in quantitative easing to replace private sector debt with public sector debt - I'm unsure if it will result in a Jubilee (this time). The problem is the allocation of money is toward national priorities, meaning San Francisco can get caught into speculative asset bubbles instead of domestic productive growth. Local Public Banking is a counterweight to the current fed. In fact - it's the alternative to the Federal Reserve (not Bitcoin). It's what you have when you don't have a federal reserve but Libertarians are so brainwashed by the corruption of the taxpayer-funded propaganda infiltrating Libertarian media like the Filth that is Reason magazine (controlled by the CIA) that they see "public" It is also the reason county Treasurers are elected - to set local credit creation priorities.

How banks grow economies is a tightly held trade secret by the power elite. In the 19th century, the Railroad Barons used it to create markets - and then they clamped down. This is the story of Frank Norris's "The Octopus" and "The Pit." San Francisco can get "ahead of the curve" by capitalizing a public bank under AB857. Why Should San Francisco pay interest to Big Wall Street Banks when we can pay interest to ourselves?

To understand Window Guidance, I recommend Prof. Richard Werner's "New Paradigm of Macroeconomics." To understand Money, I recommend Terry Boughton's "Taming Democracy." For a Canadian perspective, I recommend Judith Nelson's "Beyond Banksters: Resisting the New Feudalism."

SFTWA to City: HELP!

The San Francisco Taxi Workers Alliance is calling upon city officials to take immediate action to help cab drivers cope with the drastic impact the coronavirus pandemic is having on their lives and livelihood.

Taxis continue to operate through the crisis as an essential public service. Cab companies have provided drivers with cleaning and protective supplies and drivers regularly disinfect their cabs for their own safety and that of their passengers.

The demand for taxi service, however, has fallen precipitously. “With most of the city shut down, very few people are moving about. This is a devastating blow to drivers, most of whom are immigrants with little to fall back on,” said SFTWA Board Secretary Evelyn Engel. “We recognize that many others are suffering in this crisis. But we believe the city has a special obligation to its taxi drivers and to its regulated taxi industry, because taxis play a major role in carrying out San Francisco’s transit-first policies, in meeting its climate goals, and, most importantly, in providing transportation to the disability community.”

SFTWA has urged the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency to waive drivers’ permit fees for the remainder of the 2020 fiscal year, which ends June 30, and extend the waiver for the next two years in its proposed budget currently under consideration. The Alliance also asked the agency to work with the San Francisco Federal Credit Union and other lenders to cancel medallion loan payments and stop medallion foreclosures.

Hundreds of cab drivers purchased medallions for \$250,000 between 2010 and 2016 only to see their incomes plummet when the city failed to move quickly to regulate Uber and Lyft. “Owner-drivers were already struggling to make their monthly medallion payments. We could see a tsunami of medallion foreclosures because of the coronavirus crisis,” Engel said.

In a follow-up letter to Mayor London Breed and the Board of Supervisors, SFTWA urged the city to include cab drivers in emergency measures aimed at supporting small businesses. SFTWA also called for the city to use taxis to transport city employees on official business. “San Francisco could help struggling taxi drivers starting tomorrow, while cutting costs on its vehicle fleet,” said Engel.

SFTWA is regularly communicating about the pandemic with hundreds of drivers on its email list. The Alliance is also discussing other measures to help drivers through the crisis.

Following the city and county shelter-in-place order issued by the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco on March 16, 2020, the statewide shelter-in-place order issued by Governor Newsom on March 19, 2020, and declarations from the World Health Organization, US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and local and state health officials in regards to COVID-19, Clear Channel is exercising its rights under the Agreement to modify its Minimum Annual Guarantee (MAG) payment obligations.


During these challenging times, Clear Channel is keeping all of our Bay Area Operations employees employed and continuing to perform essential services at the City's request, including the important hygiene functions of cleaning and maintaining the Transit Shelters and Kiosks. We are helping local and state agencies disseminate information to the community by posting important public messaging on the shelter assets. We are working diligently to continue to provide the best possible service to our advertisers and the City while protecting our employees and the general public, but the reality is, like many businesses operating in the Bay Area, the shelter-in-place orders have had, and continue to have, material negative financial and other impacts on Clear Channel and our ability to perform under the Agreement. Advertisers are cancelling current and future campaigns, campaign planning has effectively stopped, and refunds are being requested daily. Changes and shutdowns of SFMTA routes, a necessity under the circumstances, further compounds the difficulties we face.

Due to these unforeseeable events, we are exercising the Unavoidable Delay clause in the Agreement and wish to discuss with you eliminating the MAG as of March 16, 2020 (the date of the City and County shelter-in-place order) until such time as the current local, state and federal emergency is lifted and government and commercial business operations in the Bay Area normalize. While we intend to pay the MAG payment due April 1 while we memorialize this agreement, any MAG paid on or after March 16, 2020 should be credited against future payments once payments resume.

Dear President Yee:

On behalf of the Construction Employers' Association (CEA), we are writing to assure you that as CEA contractors continue to operate in compliance with Shelter-in-Place Orders on Essential Infrastructure projects, their top priority is to protect the health and safety of all employees and partners. CEA members are following the information, guidance and recommended protocols provided by health and safety experts and regulatory authorities to minimize the risk of spread of coronavirus on our jobsites and in our offices.

For your information, CEA is comprised of over 100 of the largest union signatory commercial builders in California whose members perform in excess of \$30 billion annually in construction volume. CEA members perform a significant percentage of all non-transportation state and local public works projects in the state, multi-family low income and market rate housing, hospitals, medical centers and research facilities and large commercial projects.

Each project and company is different, however, generally CEA members are implementing site-specific COVID-19 safety plans to ensure that people are healthy as they enter the jobsite and are kept safe during the workday. These plans generally provide for jobsite personal hygiene, jobsite protective equipment, jobsite sanitizing, social distancing, discouraging the use of carpooling, and monitoring and enforcing the site safety requirements and documenting of these efforts. The intent and purpose of these plans is to ensure the safety of all workers on the jobsite and when appropriate, workers are excused from work so as not to potentially expose any other workers on the jobsite. Many office staff have been given the option to work from home or from remote locations. Meetings are being held virtually. Members have increased the frequency of cleaning of communal and high touch surfaces and continue to be extra vigilant in the use of PPE and hygiene protocols established by the CDC. CEA has advised members to give workers the choice to work, or not to work, if the employee is concerned for the safety of themselves or others.
