1 [Environment Code - Single-Use Food Ware Plastics, Toxics, and Litter Reduction]

2
3 **Ordinance amending the Environment Code to prohibit the sale or use in the City of**
4 **single-use food service ware made with fluorinated chemicals and certain items made**
5 **with plastic; require that food service ware accessories be provided only on request or**
6 **at self-service stations; require reusable beverage cups at certain events that**
7 **necessitate a City permit or are held at a City-owned or City-leased facility; remove**
8 **waiver provisions; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the**
9 **California Environmental Quality Act.**

17 Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

18 Section 1. The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in
19 this ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public
20 Resources Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the
21 Board of Supervisors in File No. 180519 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board
22 affirms this determination.

23 Section 2. Findings.

24 (a) The production and management associated with single-use food and beverage
25 service ware, typically used for only a few minutes before being discarded, has significant

1 environmental impacts, including environmental contamination; consumption of energy, water,
2 and non-renewable polluting fossil fuels; emissions of greenhouse gases; air and water
3 pollutants; depletion of natural resources; litter on streets and in waterways; plastic pollution;
4 and increased litter clean-up and discard management costs.

5 (b) Single-use service ware may threaten public health because many types contain
6 many additives that are known or suspected carcinogens or endocrine disruptors, such as
7 phthalates, perchlorate, and fluorinated chemicals. These additives are known to leach from
8 food service ware into the food and beverages they contain.

9 (c) Fluorinated chemicals, also known as per- and polyfluorinated alkyl substances
10 ("PFAS"), are synthetic chemicals commonly used in and on single-use service ware products
11 to repel water and grease. A 2018 Center for Environmental Health study found that 57% of
12 tested food service ware contained significant levels of fluorinated chemicals. Fluorinated
13 chemicals are extremely persistent in the environment, leach into food, and can be taken up
14 from soil into food. In 2016, the FDA rescinded its approval for use of three such fluorinated
15 chemicals from food contact materials due to associated heightened risks of cancer, toxicity,
16 and other health effects. Other PFAS chemicals have similar chemical structures, and may
17 pose similar risks.

18 (d) Plastic straws were among the top 10 items collected during the California
19 Coastal Cleanup Day from 1989 to 2014, and seven of the 10 were single-use food and
20 beverage service ware items. These items accounted for 34% of total trash collected.

21 (e) In a 2011 Bay Area study of street litter in areas impacting urban runoff to the
22 San Francisco Bay, 67% of all 12,000 litter items counted were single-use food or beverage
23 packaging. Fifty percent of the items came from fast food service.

24 (f) Eighty percent of marine debris originates on land, primarily as trash in urban
25 runoff. Marine plastic degrades into pieces and particles of all sizes, and is present in the

1 world's oceans at all levels (surface, water column, and bottom). It attracts ambient
2 pollutants, particularly persistent organic pollutants, which collect on the surface of plastic
3 particles. Marine plastic also causes animal disease and mortality, as ocean species ingest
4 the plastic or become entangled in it. Furthermore, marine plastic has been detected in
5 seafood sold for human consumption.

6 (g) Researchers have also detected plastics in bottled water, sea salt, honey, and
7 indoor and outdoor air.

8 (h) As of 2012, 120 billion single-use cups are used per year in the United States,
9 equal to 370 per person per year. By this measure, San Franciscans use more than 300
10 million cups per year, with a total estimated weight of 10 million pounds. Since the average
11 CO2 footprint of a paper cup is 0.033 pounds of carbon dioxide emissions, San Francisco
12 single-use cup use equals to nearly 5000 tons of greenhouse gas emissions.

13 (i) 500 million straws are used each day in the U.S., equal to 1.5 per person per
14 day. This adds up to more than a million straws per day in San Francisco.

15 (j) The San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) operates the City's
16 combined sewer system, which serves over 90% of the City. The system collects, treats, and
17 safely manages both sanitary sewage and stormwater runoff in the same pipes and facilities.
18 To maintain the system's function, it is critical to keep key infrastructure like catch basins free
19 of trash and debris. When filled with trash, these catch basins must be cleaned by staff –
20 increasing operations and maintenance costs. The SFPUC removes over 4,700 cubic yards
21 of trash per year (approximately 14,000 trash bags of trash) from the three wastewater
22 treatment plants located within the City. On an annual basis, trash removal from wastewater is
23 costly and time consuming for the SFPUC. The SFPUC Wastewater Enterprise spends
24 roughly \$230,000 a year on waste (trash and recycling) removal at its three in-city wastewater
25 treatment plants. Approximately 50% of the trash at the largest treatment plant in the city, the

1 Southeast Treatment Plant, is plastic items. There has been a noticeable decline in single-use
2 plastic bags received by the Southeast Treatment Plant since San Francisco's ban on single-
3 use plastic checkout bags in 2012.

4 (k) In certain areas of the city, the SFPUC operates a municipal separate storm
5 sewer system (MS4) where stormwater is released directly into waterways, while sanitary
6 sewage is directed to SFPUC treatment plants. In MS4 areas, the SFPUC is required to
7 capture litter conveyed by stormwater runoff. Banning single-use plastic items, such as
8 straws, will reduce the amount of litter discharged into waterways and support MS4 permit
9 compliance with state regulations.

10 (l) Policies that promote reusable food service ware encourage both reuse of
11 materials, and reduction of pollutants. These twin strategies are crucial for conserving
12 resources and protecting the environment. They are thus integral to San Francisco's goal of
13 zero waste.

14 (m) The Clean Water Fund Rethink Disposable program, in partnership with San
15 Francisco and other Bay Area cities, found over the last four years that reusable food and
16 beverage service ware offers environmental and economic advantages over single-use
17 products, and that the benefits multiply with each use. Switching to reusables was found to
18 save food service businesses costs, even with dishwashing, energy, and labor expenses
19 factored in. Food establishments that have participated in the ReThink Disposable program to
20 reduce the use of single-use food service ware and beverage cups have demonstrated that
21 businesses can save thousands of dollars per year while providing their customers with a
22 more enjoyable dining experience.

23 (n) The practice of freely giving customers single-use food service ware encourages
24 customers and food vendors to pay little attention to the quantity of disposable packaging
25 products they consume and the associated environmental impact.

1 (o) The City and County of San Francisco has adopted a citywide goal of zero
2 waste. Single-use food service ware poses difficulties for composting or recycling, because
3 these items are often too small to sort for recycling, or are made from a combination of
4 materials, such as plastic-coated fiber. Such combinations risk contamination problems, and
5 increase discard management costs, hampering San Francisco from achieving zero waste.

6 (p) San Francisco is a recognized leader in developing model zero waste policies
7 and programs. It was the first city to ban single-use plastic checkout bags in 2007, a step that
8 triggered a widespread movement to ban such plastic bags and to charge for other checkout
9 bags. Similar policies have since been embraced across California and beyond. In continuing
10 to strive for zero waste, San Francisco must now take the lead to reduce use of single-use
11 food and beverage service ware.

12
13 Section 3. The Environment Code is hereby amended by revising Sections 1602, 1603
14 and 1604, to read as follows:

15 **SEC. 1602. DEFINITIONS.**

16 * * * *

17 "City Facility Food Provider" means an entity that provides, but does not sell, Prepared
18 Food in City Facilities, including without limitation, San Francisco General Hospital, Laguna
19 Honda Hospital, the San Francisco County Jail, and the San Bruno Jail Complex.

20 "Compostable" means that an item or material is (1) accepted in San Francisco's available
21 composting collection program as fully compostable, as determined by the Department of the
22 Environment; (2) is listed, described, or referenced on the Department's website as compostable; and
23 (3) is either certified compostable by the Biodegradable Product Institute or other third party
24 recognized by the Department, or is a napkin, stirrer, splash stick, cocktail stick, toothpick, or utensil
25 made entirely of Natural Fiber. ~~means material that can be broken down into, or otherwise become part~~

1 of, usable compost (e.g., soil-conditioning material) in a safe and timely manner and as accepted in
2 San Francisco's compostables collection program. "Compostable" also includes a plastic-like material
3 if the material meets the ASTM Standard Specification for compostability and the product is labeled in
4 accordance with California Public Resources Code Section 42357 et seq. and Department of the
5 Environment regulations for easy identification of Compostable products meeting the ASTM Standard
6 Specification for compostable plastics.

7 * * * *

8 "Egg Carton" means a carton for raw eggs sold to consumers from a refrigerator case
9 or similar retail appliance.

10 "Event" means any indoor event at a City-owned or City-leased facility, or any outdoor event
11 subject to a City permit, where more than 100 people attend or participate.

12 "Event Food Vendor" means any business selling, or providing based on ticket purchase or
13 entrance fee, Prepared Food at an Event.

14 "Event Producer" means a person or entity who contracts with or obtains a permit from the
15 City to hold an Event, or a City entity or department holding an Event.

16 "Fluorinated Chemical" means a class of fluorinated organic compounds containing at least
17 one fully fluorinated carbon atom, also known as perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or
18 PFAS chemicals.

19 "Fluorinated Chemical Free" means an item (1) contains no intentionally added Fluorinated
20 Chemicals beyond a Department-determined acceptable threshold, as determined by the Department of
21 the Environment; (2) is listed, described, or referenced as fluorinated chemical free on the
22 Department's website; and (3) is either certified by the Biodegradable Product Institute or other third
23 party as recognized by the Department, or is a napkin, stirrer, splash stick, cocktail stick, toothpick, or
24 utensil made entirely of Natural Fiber.

1 "Food Service Ware" means all containers, bowls, plates, trays, cups, lids, straws,
2 forks, spoons, knives, napkins, and other like items that are designed for *one-time a single* use
3 for Prepared Foods, including without limitation, service ware for takeout foods and/or
4 leftovers from partially consumed meals prepared by Food Vendors. The term "Food Service
5 Ware" includes Food Service Ware Accessories and does not include items composed entirely of
6 aluminum, or polystyrene foam coolers and ice chests.

7 "Food Service Ware Accessory" means all types of single-use items usually provided alongside
8 Prepared Food in single-use plates or cups, including but not limited to utensils, chopsticks, napkins,
9 cup lids, cup sleeves, food or beverage trays, condiment packets and saucers, straws, stirrers, splash
10 sticks, cocktail sticks, and toothpicks designed for a single use for Prepared Foods.

11 "Food Vendor" means any Restaurant, ~~or~~ Retail Food Vendor, Event Food Vendor, or
12 any business that accepts orders on behalf of and delivers meals from a Food Vendor, located or
13 operating within the City.

14 "Meat and Fish Tray" means a tray for raw meat, fish, or poultry sold to consumers
15 from a refrigerator case or similar retail appliance.

16 "Natural Fiber" means a plant- or animal-based, non-synthetic fiber, including but not limited
17 to paper, wood, or bamboo. Natural Fiber does not include plastic of any kind.

18 * * * *

19 "Restaurant" means any establishment located within the City that sells Prepared Food
20 for consumption on, near, or off its premises. The term includes a Restaurant operating from a
21 temporary facility, cart, vehicle, or mobile unit.

22 "Reusable Beverage Cup" means any vessel or container for a Prepared Food beverage that is
23 specifically designed and manufactured for repeated cleaning, disinfecting, and reuse at least 100
24 times, and is dishwasher safe.

1 **SEC. 1603. SALE OR DISTRIBUTION OF NON-COMPLIANT FOOD SERVICE**
2 **WARE PROHIBITED.**

3 (a) No person may sell, offer for sale, or otherwise Distribute within the City (1) any
4 Food Service Ware that is not either Compostable or Recyclable *using the City's then-available*
5 *collection programs, or* (2) any Food Service Ware made, in whole or in part, from Polystyrene
6 Foam, (3) any straws, stirrers, splash sticks, cocktail sticks, or toothpicks made with plastic, including
7 compostable, bio- or plant-based plastic, or (4) beginning January 1, 2020, any Food Service Ware
8 that is not Fluorinated Chemical Free.

9 (b) The Director *shall, after a noticed public hearing, may* adopt a list of suitable
10 alternative Compostable or Recyclable Food Service Ware products. "Suitable alternative
11 Compostable or Recyclable Food Service Ware products" means Food Service Ware
12 products that the Director determines serve the same intended purpose as non-compliant
13 products, meet the standards for what is Compostable and/or Recyclable set under this
14 Chapter 16, and are reasonably affordable. The Director shall regularly update the list.

15 (c) Beginning January 1, 2020, no person may sell, offer for sale, or otherwise Distribute
16 within the City Food Service Ware that does not contain a minimum post-consumer recycled content
17 that may be specified by the Director in regulations according to the Director's assessment of market
18 availability and costs.

19 **SEC. 1604. USE OF NON-COMPLIANT FOOD SERVICE WARE PROHIBITED.**

20 (a) Food Vendors may not sell, offer for sale, or otherwise Distribute Prepared Food
21 (1) in Food Service Ware made, in whole or in part, from Polystyrene Foam, ~~or~~ (2) in Food
22 Service Ware that is not Compostable or Recyclable, or (3) beginning January 1, 2020, in Food
23 Service Ware that is not Fluorinated Chemical Free.

24 (b) City Facility Food Providers may not provide Prepared Food to City Facilities (1)
25 in Food Service Ware made, in whole or in part, from Polystyrene Foam, ~~or~~ (2) in Food

1 Service Ware that is not Compostable or Recyclable, or (3) beginning January 1, 2020, in Food
2 Service Ware that is not Fluorinated Chemical Free.

3 (c) City Departments may not purchase, acquire, or use Food Service Ware for
4 Prepared Food (1) where the Food Service Ware is made, in whole or in part, from
5 Polystyrene Foam, ~~or~~ (2) where the Food Service Ware is not Compostable or Recyclable, or
6 (3) beginning January 1, 2020, where the Food Service Ware is not Fluorinated Chemical Free.

7 (d) City contractors and lessees may not use Food Service Ware for Prepared Food
8 in City Facilities and while performing under a City contract or lease (1) where the Food
9 Service Ware is made, in whole or in part, from Polystyrene Foam, ~~or~~ (2) where the Food
10 Service Ware is not Compostable or Recyclable, or (3) beginning January 1, 2020, where the
11 Food Service Ware is not Fluorinated Chemical Free. All new leases and permits authorizing the sale
12 of food and beverages at the San Francisco International Airport must incorporate terms requiring the
13 lessee or permittee to comply with the terms of this Chapter 16. This requirement shall also apply to
14 any such lease or permit renewed, extended, or materially amended after July 1, 2019.

15 (e) The Director ~~shall, after a noticed public hearing, may~~ adopt a list of suitable
16 alternative Compostable or Recyclable Food Service Ware products. "Suitable alternative
17 Compostable or Recyclable Food Service Ware products" means Food Service Ware
18 products that the Director determines serve the same intended purpose as non-compliant
19 products, meet the standards for what is Compostable and/or Recyclable set under this
20 Chapter 16, and are reasonably affordable. The Director shall regularly update the list.

21 If a product is included on the Director's list, it will be deemed to comply with this
22 Section 1604. If a product is not included on the Director's list, the person using the product
23 as Food Service Ware will have the burden of establishing to the Director's satisfaction that
24 the product complies with this Section.

1 (f) It shall not be a violation of this Section 1604 to sell, provide, or purchase
2 Prepared Food packaged in Food Service Ware otherwise prohibited by subsections (a)
3 through (c), or to use Food Service Ware otherwise prohibited by subsection (d), if the
4 Prepared Food is packaged outside the City and is sold or otherwise provided to the
5 consumer in the same Food Service Ware in which it originally was packaged. Businesses
6 packaging Prepared Food outside the City are encouraged to use Food Service Ware that is
7 Compostable or Recyclable, is Fluorinated Chemical Free, and is not made, in whole or in part,
8 from Polystyrene Foam.

9 (g) Food Vendors, City Facility Food Providers, and City contractors and lessees acting
10 pursuant to a City contract or lease at a City Facility shall not provide, sell, use, or otherwise
11 Distribute, and City Departments shall not purchase or acquire, any straws, stirrers, splash sticks,
12 cocktail sticks, or toothpicks made with plastic, including compostable, bio- or plant-based plastic.

13 (h) Food Vendors, City Facility Food Providers, City Departments, and City contractors and
14 lessees acting pursuant to a City contract or lease at a City Facility shall only provide, sell, use, or
15 otherwise Distribute only those Food Service Ware Accessories that comply with this Chapter 16, and
16 only upon a consumer's specific request for such items, or in a self-service area or dispenser.

17 (i) Beginning January 1, 2020, Food Vendors, City Facility Food Providers, and City
18 contractors and lessees acting pursuant to a City contract or lease at a City Facility shall not provide,
19 sell, use, or otherwise Distribute, and City Departments shall not purchase or acquire, Food Service
20 Ware that does not contain a minimum post-consumer recycled content, that may be specified by the
21 Director in regulations according to the Director's assessment of market availability and costs.

22
23 Section 4. The Environment Code is hereby amended by revising Sections 1606 and
24 1607, to read as follows:

25 **SEC. 1606. IMPLEMENTATION.**

1 (a) The Director shall create, maintain, and regularly update the product lists
2 referenced in Sections 1603(b) and 1604(e).

3 (b) The Director is authorized to promulgate regulations, guidelines and forms and
4 to take any and all other actions reasonable and necessary to implement and enforce this
5 Chapter.

6 (c) Strict compliance with this Chapter 16 is not required in instances where it would
7 interfere with accommodating for any person's medical needs.

8 ~~(e) The Director may waive the provisions of Sections 1603(a), 1604(a), and 1605(a), (b),~~
9 ~~and (e) due to a feasibility-based hardship. The person seeking the waiver must demonstrate to the~~
10 ~~Director's satisfaction that no reasonably feasible alternative exists to a specific non-compliant~~
11 ~~product.~~

12 ~~(d) The Director may waive the provisions of Sections 1603(a), 1604(a), and 1605(a), (b),~~
13 ~~and (e) due to a financial hardship. The person seeking the exemption must demonstrate to the~~
14 ~~Director's satisfaction both (1) that the applicant has a gross income of less than \$500,000 on the~~
15 ~~applicant's annual income tax filing for the most recent tax year, and (2) that with respect to each~~
16 ~~specific non-compliant product, there is no suitable and reasonably affordable alternative product~~
17 ~~available.~~

18 ~~(e) A person seeking a waiver under subsections (c) or (d) of this Section 1606 must submit a~~
19 ~~written application on a form approved by the Director. The Director may require the applicant to~~
20 ~~submit additional information or documentation to make a determination regarding the waiver~~
21 ~~requested. The Director shall review requests for waivers on a case-by-case basis, and may grant the~~
22 ~~waiver in whole or in part, with or without conditions, for a period of up to 36 months. An applicant for~~
23 ~~renewal of a waiver must apply for a new waiver period no later than 60 days prior to the expiration of~~
24 ~~the then-current period to preserve a continuous waiver status. The Director shall review each~~

1 application anew and base his or her determination on the most current information available. The
2 Director's determination shall be final and shall not be subject to appeal.

3 ~~—(f) A City officer, employee, or department may seek a waiver from the requirements of~~
4 ~~subsections (b), (c), or (d) of Section 1604 by filing a request on a form approved by the Director. The~~
5 ~~Director may grant a waiver in whole or in part, with or without conditions, for a period of up to 36~~
6 ~~months if the officer, employee, or department seeking the waiver has demonstrated to the Director's~~
7 ~~satisfaction that strict application of the specific requirement would create an undue hardship or~~
8 ~~practical difficulty not generally applicable to other persons in similar circumstances, or the waiver is~~
9 ~~otherwise justified.~~

10 ~~—(g) In addition to individual waivers provided for under subsections (e), (d), and (f) of this~~
11 ~~Section 1606, the Director may waive the provisions of Section 1605 with respect to particular~~
12 ~~categories of uses of Packing Materials or of Egg Cartons or Meat and Fish Trays made, in whole or in~~
13 ~~part, from Polystyrene Foam, or other non-Compostable or non-Recyclable material. The Director may~~
14 ~~grant a waiver under this subsection (g) in whole or in part, with or without conditions, for a period of~~
15 ~~up to 36 months, upon finding that no suitable and reasonably affordable alternative to use of the non-~~
16 ~~compliant product is feasible. The Director's determination shall be final and shall not be subject to~~
17 ~~appeal.~~

18 **SEC. 1607. ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES.**

19 (a) The Director shall issue a written warning to any person he or she determines is
20 violating Sections 1603(a) or (c), 1604(a), (b), ~~or (d)~~, (g), (h), or (i), or 1605(a), (b), or (c), or
21 1611(a) of this Chapter. If after issuing a written warning of violation from the Director, the
22 Director finds that person continues to violate the provisions of 1603(a) or (c), 1604(a), (b), ~~or~~
23 (d), (g), (h), or (i), or 1605(a), (b), or (c), or 1611(a), the Director may apply for or impose the
24 various sanctions provided in this Section.

1 (b) Any person who violates the provisions 1603(a) or (c), 1604(a), (b), ~~(d)~~, (g),
2 (h), or (i), or 1605(a), (b), or (c)), or 1611(a) of this Chapter shall be guilty of an infraction. If
3 charged as an infraction, upon conviction thereof, said person shall be punished for the first
4 offense by a fine of not more than \$100.00 for a first violation; not more than \$200.00 for a
5 second violation in the same year and not more than \$500.00 for each subsequent violation in
6 the same 12-month period.

7 (c) The Director may issue an administrative fine to any person violating 1603(a) or
8 (c), 1604(a), (b), ~~(d)~~, (g), (h), or (i), or 1605(a), (b), or (c)), or 1611(a) in accordance with
9 Administrative Code Chapter 100, which is hereby incorporated by reference.

10 (d) The City Attorney may seek legal, injunctive, or other equitable relief to enforce
11 this Chapter, including without limitation, civil penalties in an amount not exceeding \$100.00
12 for the first violation, \$200.00 for the second violation, and \$500.00 for each subsequent
13 violation in any given 12-month period.

14 (e) The City may not recover both administrative and civil penalties pursuant to
15 subsections (c) and (d) for the same violation. Penalties collected under subsections (c) and
16 (d), which may include recovery of enforcement costs, shall be used to fund implementation
17 and enforcement of this Chapter.

18
19 Section 5. The Environment Code is hereby amended by adding Section 1611, to read
20 as follows:

21 **SEC. 1611. PROVIDING REUSABLE BEVERAGE CUPS AT EVENTS.**

22 (a) Beginning on January 1, 2020, Event Producers providing Prepared Food beverages at
23 Events must either make Reusable Beverage Cups available to no less than 10% of their attendees, or
24 be able to demonstrate to the Director that reasonable effort has been made to ensure that at least this
25 percentage of attendees or visitors brought or will have access to a Reusable Beverage Cup at the

1 Event. The Director may pass regulations to increase this percentage in furtherance of the objectives
2 of this Chapter.

3 (b) To meet the requirement in subsection (a), Event Producers may provide, lend, or sell
4 Reusable Beverage Cups to Event attendees, and promote or incentivize attendees to bring their own
5 Reusable Beverage Cups. A permit application for any Event must indicate how the requirement in
6 subsection (a) shall be met. The Event Producer's selected method for meeting the requirement in
7 subsection (a) must be included in any contract, agreement, or permit for the Event.

8 (c) Use, handling, and sanitation of Reusable Beverage Cups at Events must comply with all
9 applicable state and local laws, regulations, and guidelines.

10 (d) Waivers: Any Event Producer may petition the Director for a full or partial waiver of the
11 requirements of this Section 1611 as they apply to a particular Event, if the Event Producer can (1)
12 demonstrate that the Event Producer is not able to access Reusable Beverage Cups for the Event, or (2)
13 that the application of this Section would create undue hardship or practical difficulty for the Event
14 Producer that is not generally applicable to other Event Producers in similar circumstances.

16 Section 6. Effective and Operative Dates. This ordinance shall become effective 30
17 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor
18 returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it,
19 or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance. Unless otherwise
20 specifically noted, this ordinance shall become operative on July 1, 2019.

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REVISED LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

(Substituted, 7/10/2018)

[Environment Code - Single-Use Food Ware Plastics, Toxics, and Litter Reduction]

Ordinance amending the Environment Code to prohibit the sale or use in the City of single-use food service ware made with fluorinated chemicals and certain items made with plastic; require that food service ware accessories be provided only on request or at self-service stations; require reusable beverage cups at certain events that necessitate a City permit or are held at a City-owned or City-leased facility; remove waiver provisions; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

Existing Law

At present, Chapter 16 of the Environment Code prohibits sale, use, and distribution within the City of single-use food service ware items that are not compostable or recyclable, or are made with polystyrene foam. It also prohibits sale, use, and distribution of other specified types of polystyrene foam products, specifically packing materials, coolers, pool or beach toys, and dock floats or navigation markers, that are not encased with a more durable material, and egg cartons and meat and fish trays for raw meat or fish made with polystyrene foam. Chapter 16 includes waiver application and enforcement provisions.

Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance would add to Chapter 16 in the following ways. Beginning July 1, 2019, it would prohibit sale, use, and distribution of straws, stirrers, splash sticks, cocktail sticks, or toothpicks made with plastic, including compostable, bio- or plant-based plastic, and forbid City departments from purchasing such items. It would also require City food vendors, facility food providers, departments, and City contractors or lessees operating under agreement with the City at a City facility to provide or sell food service ware accessories only upon a consumer's request for specific items or at a self-serve station or dispenser. The ordinance would define food service ware accessories to include items usually provided alongside prepared food that is in a single-use plate or cup, such as single-use utensils, napkins, cup sleeves and lids, food or beverage trays, splash sticks, straws, and toothpicks. Leases and permits authorizing sale of food and beverages at San Francisco International Airport would be required to incorporate terms mandating that the lessee or permittee comply with the ordinance.

Beginning January 1, 2020, the ordinance would also require event food vendors serving beverages at events with over 100 attendees or participants held at City-owned or City-leased facilities, or outdoors and subject to City permit, to provide reusable beverage cups to at least 10% of attendees, or demonstrate reasonable effort to ensure that at least this percentage of attendees brought or will have access to reusable cups at the event. It would add that strict

compliance with Chapter 16 is not required where it would conflict with providing for any person's medical needs, and would remove existing waiver application provisions.

In addition, beginning January 1, 2020, the ordinance would prohibit sale, use, and distribution within the City of single-use food service ware items that are not free of fluorinated chemicals.

Background

This legislative digest reflects a substitute ordinance introduced at the Board of Supervisors on July 10, 2018. The ordinance was initially introduced at the Board on May 15, 2018.

My apologies by I will not be able to been attendance at today's Land Use and Transportation Committee. I will be in Chinatown for a workshop on the Accessible Business Entrance Program.

The Commission's official response is not in the packet and that must be my error. In short the Small Business Commission heard these items at its June 25, 2018 meeting and recommends approver with a couple of additional notes.

Item #1: - Single-Use Food Ware Plastics, Toxics, and Litter Reduction - the Commission recommended approval. There were still some nuances at the time of the hearing to be worked out regarding Events that the SBC recommends working with OEWD to finalize. The Small Business Commission recommends the Board of Supervisors ensures the Department of Environment has adequate funding to do a consumer outreach campaign at least 4 months before implementation date. This is to minimize educating the consumer at the time of service. The Small Business Commission has a great deal of trust with the Department of Environment in being well thought out and researched identifying replacement products.

Item #3: Permit Review Procedures and Zoning Controls - Neighborhood Commercial Districts in Supervisorial Districts 4 and 11- The Small Business Commission supports Supervisor Tang and Safai's amending the zoning controls regarding the 312 notice for business are zoned for permitted uses but require a change of use to open in the location desired. The Small Business Commission supports the intention of increasing the attraction to opening a business in these two districts. This is a pilot program that will be measure and tracked and the Small Business Commission looks forward to a report at the end of the 24 month period.

The Small Business Commission did not weigh in on the zoning changes made to "Art Organizations, Job Training, Philanthropic Facility, Private Community Facility, Religious Institutions and Social Services", as these are generally non-profits entities. It is more appropriate for the Office of Economic and Workforce Development to provide input to these changes.

Item #4: Planning Code - Catering as an Accessory Use in Neighborhood Commercial Districts. The Small Business Commission recommends approval. This has made this suggestion in the past. The Small Business Commission supports the Planning Commission's recommendation to all in all zoning districts and recommends you adopt the Planning Commission's recommendation.

8 WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco has a duty to protect the natural
9 environment, the economy, and the health of its citizens; and,

10 WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco has a goal of achieving zero waste,
11 which includes the elimination of toxic chemicals from the environment; and,

12 WHEREAS, Policies that promote reusable foodware encourage the reuse of materials
13 and a reduction of pollutants thereby conserving resources and protecting the environment;
14 and,

15 WHEREAS, Plastics in the marine environment are particularly problematic as they
16 degrade into pieces and particles of all sizes attracting organic pollutants which collect on the
17 surface of plastic particles, entangle or are ingested by ocean species which can lead to
18 disease and even death and have been detected in seafood sold for human consumption;
19 and,

20 WHEREAS, Researchers have detected plastics in bottled water, sea salt, honey and
21 indoor and outdoor air; and,

22 WHEREAS, 80 percent of marine debris originates on land, primarily as litter in urban
23 runoff; and,

24 WHEREAS, 12 million tons of plastic enter the ocean each year and it is estimated that
25 by 2050 there will be more plastic in the ocean than fish; and,

1 WHEREAS, A 2011 Bay Area study of street litter that contributes to urban runoff to the
2 San Francisco Bay found that 57 percent of all litter items were single-use food or beverage
3 packaging with 50 percent of those items coming from fast food service; and,

4 WHEREAS, Studies of the litter collected during California Coastal Cleanup Days from
5 1989 to 2014, found that seven of the top ten items were single-use food ware items and
6 plastic straws; and,

7 WHEREAS, As of 2012, an estimated 120 billion single-use cups are used per year in
8 the United States, which would amount to 370 per person per year; and,

9 WHEREAS, An estimated 500 million straws are used each day in the United States,
10 equal to 1.5 per person per day which would amount to more than 1 million straws used per
11 day in San Francisco; and,

12 WHEREAS, Single-use foodware may threaten public health as many types contain a
13 number of additives that are known or suspected carcinogens or endocrine disruptors, such
14 as phthalates, perchlorate, and fluorinated chemicals that are known to leach from foodware
15 into the food and beverages they contain; and,

16 WHEREAS, Fluorinated chemicals, also known as per- and polyfluorinated alkyl
17 substances ("PFAS"), are synthetic chemicals commonly used in and on single-use foodware
18 products to repel water and grease; and,

19 WHEREAS, Fluorinated chemicals are extremely persistent in the environment, leach
20 into food, and can be taken up from soil into food; and,

21 WHEREAS, A 2018 Center for Environmental Health study found that 57 percent of
22 tested foodware contained significant levels of fluorinated chemicals and in 2016, the United
23 States Food and Drug Administration rescinded its approval for the use of three such
24 fluorinated chemicals from food contact materials due to associated heightened risks of
25 cancer, toxicity, and other health effects; and,

1 WHEREAS, Other PFAS chemicals have similar chemical structures, and may pose
2 similar risks; and,

3 WHEREAS, San Francisco is a recognized leader in developing model zero waste
4 policies and programs having been the first city to ban single-use plastic checkout bags in
5 2007, triggering a widespread movement to ban such plastic bags and to charge for other
6 checkout bags across California and beyond; and,

7 WHEREAS, In continuing to strive for zero waste, San Francisco has the opportunity to
8 once again demonstrate its leadership by developing policies that reduce the use of toxics in
9 single-use foodware; and,

10 WHEREAS, Supervisor Katy Tang introduced the Single-Use Food Ware Plastics,
11 Toxics, and Litter Reduction Ordinance which would ensure that no person may sell, offer for
12 sale, or otherwise distribute in the city any straws, stirrers, splash sticks, cocktail sticks, or
13 toothpicks made with plastic, distribute any foodware accessories not upon customer request
14 or self-serve, or host an outdoor or indoor event with 100 attendees or more on city property
15 without offering a reusable cup option for at least ten percent of attendees; and,

Dear Supervisor Tang,

On behalf of Clean Water Action, we write today to express our strong support for San Francisco's proposed Plastic and Litter Reduction Ordinance. In addition to protecting San Francisco and its residents, the ordinance has national implications as it can serve as a precedent to reduce waste and protect the public and environmental health by eradicating the use of fluorinated chemicals.

Clean Water Action is a national organization with a million members, 2,000 of which live and work in San Francisco. Among our core beliefs is that we cannot continue to "treat" our way out of environmental contamination or expose the public to toxic chemicals without consequence. Instead, we need to stop exposures and pollution at the source by reducing the use of hazardous substances and single use products.

Poly- and perfluorinated alkyl substances (PFASs) are a class of approximately 4,700 chemicals made of a carbon-fluorine bond. They are known to leach into food when used in packaging or foodware, as well as into the environment when products are thrown away. According to the US EPA, contaminated food and food packaging are two of the primary human exposure routes.ⁱ PFASs have further been linked to a wide range of serious health impacts, including effects on the growth, learning, and behavior of infants and older children; interference with becoming pregnant; hormonal interference; increased cholesterol and difficulty losing weight; impaired immune systems; and cancer. Yet, because of their wide use in products, including food ware and packaging, surveys of the US population are detecting PFAS chemicals in the blood of more than 98% of Americans.ⁱⁱ

In addition to these human effects, PFASs are "forever chemicals" that travel through the environment (they are being detected in polar bears), move up the food chain, contaminate food when irrigated or fertilized with PFAS containing water and/or compost, and collect in our bodies. This not only expands the potential for continued human exposure, but impedes "Zero Waste" efforts by local and state governments because PFAS containing food packaging and food ware contaminates compost or recycled materials.

Despite claims by the chemical industry, newer versions of PFAS are not proven to be safer than their older toxic cousins. In fact, emerging science demonstrates that these molecularly smaller versions may be as or more toxic and more difficult to remove from water. As the science continues to demonstrate harm,ⁱ independent scientists from around the globe have called for the eradication of PFAS for non-essential uses (such as food packaging) and transparency about their useⁱⁱⁱ. Anything less will ensure that these chemicals – which never break down or go away- will continue to poison water, soil, and air, as well as invade humans and wildlife.

By banning the use of PFAS as a class in foodware, San Francisco is taking a major step in eliminating one major source of the chemicals in its residents and keeping these materials out of the environment. The ordinance has the additional benefit of reducing plastic waste at the source and protecting San Francisco Bay as well as ratepayer's pocketbooks by reducing the high cost of waste management. This is a win-win for the county and we see it as an important policy that can be emulated nation-wide.

On behalf of the supporters of the Center for Environmental Health who live in San Francisco, I am writing to support the City and County of San Francisco's proposed ordinance to prohibit the use of single use food service ware made with fluorinated chemicals, and certain plastic items.

Conservative estimates indicate that more than six million Americans are affected by water contamination that exceed EPA's advisory levels for fluorinated chemicals in drinking water. This ordinance will help end further water contamination by preventing chemical leaching from composted or landfilled food service ware.

CEH has been studying the issue of dishware made with fluorinated chemicals for the last several years and believes that San Francisco's proposed ordinance is necessary and forward thinking. We recently issued the report "Avoiding Hidden Hazards: A Purchaser's Guide to Safer Foodware", and our recommendations align with the mission of this proposed ordinance.

Disposable food service ware is a growing problem that hinders San Francisco from meeting its waste reduction targets. According to the Freedonia Group's 2015 report on the food service disposables market, "Demand for foodservice disposables in the US is projected to increase 3.9 percent per year to \$21.9 billion in 2019." If unchecked, this issue will only become worse.

CEH applauds the City and County of San Francisco for taking action on this issue. Reuseable and compostable foodservice ware without fluorinated

chemicals are already available and their use will increase with passage of this ordinance, improving sustainability in San Francisco.

CEH would like to thank the San Francisco Department of the Environment and Board of Supervisor Tang for their leadership to reduce the use of disposable plastic foodware as well as the use of persistent toxic fluorinated chemicals in disposable foodware.

Californians Against Waste (CAW) is an environmental policy and advocacy organization with thousands of members across the Bay Area. We respectfully urge your support of the Plastic and Litter Reduction ordinance, sponsored by Supervisor Katy Tang.

Plastic pollution poses serious threats to human health, marine wildlife, and California’s multi-billion dollar ocean-based economy. According to the US EPA, local governments in California spend as much as \$411 million each year to prevent plastic food packaging and other commonly littered items from ending up in streets, storm drains, beaches, rivers, bays, and the ocean. An estimated 12.2 million metric tons of plastic enters the oceans every year, and over 80% of this comes from land-based sources. Lightweight plastic materials, such as those targeted in this ordinance, are easily transported to waterways through urban runoff. Once in the environment this plastic material eventually breaks up into microplastics, which have the ability to absorb and transport toxic pollutants from surrounding waters. Microplastics are bioavailable for marine species to ingest, from zooplankton to fish and shellfish targeted for human consumption. This raises important questions about the long term health effects that marine plastic pollution may have on humans.

Plastic pollution is a global problem with local solutions. Takeout food packaging is a major, and easily preventable, source of this pollution. Eliminating these commonly littered items from the source is the most effective method of reducing plastic litter. One hundred and sixteen local jurisdictions in California, including San Francisco, have successfully implemented local ordinances regulating the use of expanded polystyrene, with many of those cities considering expansions of these ordinances to include other commonly littered plastic items such as plastic straws. These local ordinances have been very successful in removing these litter prone plastics from the waste stream without increasing the pollution of food packaging alternatives. Such an accomplishment is a proven solution for combating waste as well as the costs associated with cleanup.

As we saw with the San Francisco ordinance on plastic bags, which led to a wave of ordinances and, ultimately statewide action, this ground breaking policy will drive significant policy change far outside the borders of the City. San Francisco also has the opportunity to expand this ordinance in order further reduce the impact of single-use food ware. Additional provisions that should be considered include requirements for reusable food ware for on-site dining, and customer charges for single-use cups and containers in order to encourage reusable programs and the practice of bringing one’s own reusable to-go ware. We commend the City’s leadership with the source reduction of plastic waste and urge you to adopt the Plastic and Litter Reduction Ordinance as well as consider further provisions to reduce waste.
