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RESOLUTION PROCLAIMING OCTOBER 19, 1999 TUNE OUT THE VIOLENCE DAY.

WHEREAS, Five to six violent acts occur per hour on prime time television and 20 to 25 violent acts occur per hour on children's programming; and,

WHEREAS, 85% of premium cable programming is violent; and, WHEREAS, Children watch an average of 28 hours of television a week; and,

WHEREAS, By the end of elementary school, the average American child has seen 8,000 murders and 100,000 other acts of violence on TV; and,

WHEREAS, By the age of 18, the average American child has seen 200,000 acts of violence on television; and,

WHEREAS, Violence is often presented in the media as a way to get what you want and solve problems and is equated with power and glamour; and,

WHEREAS, Children exposed to violence in the media can become desensitized to it and repeat it in real life; and,

WHEREAS, When they are exposed to violence on television, children can develop a "mean world syndrome" in which they believe real-life violence is more prevalent than it actually is, and they become disproportionately fearful and distrustful of the world; and,

WHEREAS, The overwhelming conclusion of 30 years of research conducted by the Surgeon General, the National Institute of Mental

Health and the American Psychological Association is that media violence is linked to real-life aggression and violent behavior; and,

WHEREAS, The YWCA of the U.S.A. and the National Association of Attorneys General have joined forces to draw attention to media violence and the impact it has on children by declaring October 19,1999 Tune Out the Violence Day; and,

WHEREAS, The YWCA of the U.S.A. and the National Association of Attorneys General ask parents to closely monitor the television programs their children are watching as part of Tune Out the Violence Day; and,

WHEREAS, Parents are asked to demand responsible programming from local television stations, national networks and advertisers on Tune Out the Violence Day; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco acknowledges the negative impact that violent television programming can have on children and commends the YWCA of the U.S.A. and the National Association of Attorneys General for organizing a campaign against violence on television; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco proclaims October 19, 1999 Tune Out the Violence Day.
