

- Respectfully and authentically celebrate diversity








Performance Measures



Budget

General Fund Annual

Increase of \$1.3m largely due to Office of Transgender Initiative (OTI) transfer of function from the Office of the Administrator, combined with COLAs

General Fund Continuing

- Net Dream Keeper Initiative (DKI) increase of \$14.5m represents a transfer of budget from Office of Economic & Workforce Development and Department of Public Health
- \$2m cut to Office of Reparations is single largest reduction in both years but carries no impact to existing programs

Non-GFS

HRC expects \$9.9m in state funding through the Californians for All Grant, which will fund the Opportunities for All youth workforce development program
