

Statement of Qualifications for Child Care Planning and Advisory Council

Children's Council of San Francisco, a Child Care Resource & Referral organization and Alternative Payments organization, is at the heart of the child care community in San Francisco helping parents find child care to meet their needs, helping lower income families access payment assistance, providing training and technical assistance to child care providers, and working with parents, child care providers, government agencies, private funders, and community-based partners both locally and statewide to ensure that all children have access to quality child care.

As the Executive Director of Children's Council for the past three years, I have provided leadership to Children's Council in the wake of major state cuts to child care funding, orchestrating an organizational restructuring, streamlining operations, and securing new funding to ensure that Children's Council could continue to meet the needs of families, child care providers, and our government and community-based partners for high quality services. In this role, I have developed extensive and deep knowledge of the child care sector both locally and statewide and have developed productive partnerships with leaders in the local and statewide child care communities. I work especially closely with the child care staff at the Office of Early Care and Education, First 5 San Francisco, the Department of Children, Youth & their Families, CPAC, the San Francisco Child Care Providers Association, and the Family Child Care Providers Association of San Francisco, among others.

I have served as a community representative on CPAC since March, 2011. I was elected as First Vice Chair of CPAC for 2013 and 2014. During this past year, I chaired CPAC's Ad Hoc Committee on the Reauthorization of Children's Fund and PEEF, leading a consensus-driven process to develop CPAC's priorities for the reauthorization of both measures. I also serve on CPAC's Needs Assessment Committee and CPAC's Budget & Legislation Committee. Since 2012, I have served on the Steering Committee for the Children's Fund Coalition, a consortium of over 60 community-based organizations committed to the reauthorization of Children's Fund and PEEF.

At Children's Council, I lead an organization with a \$69+ million annual budget with 110 employees. CCSF's staff is very diverse, representing every major ethnic group in San Francisco with diverse language skills to meet the needs of the families and providers in San Francisco.

I have over thirty-five years of professional and volunteer experience as a leader in non-profit organizations in San Francisco. I have a BA from Yale University and an MBA from Stanford's Graduate School of Business and have served professionally as a CEO, COO, and CFO.

As a long-time resident of San Francisco who raised three children in the Mission District while working full-time, I appreciate the diversity of San Francisco's population as well as the challenges and opportunities of urban life for parents of young children.

Board Qualifications:

The Child Care Planning and Advisory Council consists of twenty-five (25) members. The Board of Supervisors appoints twelve (12) members: one (1) nominated by each individual member of the Board, and approved by the full Board; and one (1) nominated by the President of the Board. The Board of Education or County Superintendent of Schools, if the Board of Education delegates the appointment power to him/her, shall also appoint twelve (12) members. One (1) member shall be jointly appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education, or the County Superintendent of Schools, if the Board of Education delegates the appointment power to him/her.

The members appointed by the Board of Supervisors shall be representative of the following categories:

- A) "Consumers" - Parents, guardians or caretakers with varied income levels who use child care and/or early education services, including but not limited to clients of publicly subsidized programs such as CalWORKS, and other child care programs funded through the San Francisco Human Services Agency, the California Department of Education, Head Start or Preschool for All;
- B) "Child Care Providers" - Private and subsidized child care providers including, but not limited to, from a private center, from a family day care home, a Title 5 program, a school age program, from a Head Start center and from a Preschool for All site;
- C) "Discretionary" - Representatives of the public at-large and/or representatives from any of the

other categories, or outside of these categories at the discretion of the appointing agencies;

D) "Community Representatives" - Parent advisory councils of public and private child care programs; associations of child care providers, family child care providers and Head Start; City College of San Francisco, San Francisco State University, public interest organizations including, but not limited to, the Child Care Law Center, Low Income Investment Fund community organizations, members of labor organizations and local businesses that fall within the definition of "community representative" as described in Subsection (d)(1) (B) and other community and public agency representatives that deal with child care; and

E) "Public Agency Representatives" - Representative from two of the following agencies: the Department of Children, Youth and Their Families, Human Services Agency, San Francisco Children and Families Commission, Community Care Licensing, Department of Public Health, Recreation and Park Department, Mayor's Office of Community Investment and San Francisco Housing Authority, or other entities.

The Council is established to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, the San Francisco Children and Families Commission and, with their consent, the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools about child care issues. The Council will serve as a representative advisory and planning body to maintain, expand and improve local child care services. The Council will provide links between government and the community, and will work to maximize the amount and impact of local state, federal and private resources and funding for child care in San Francisco. Powers and Duties are outlined in Administrative Code, Section 5.200.

All terms shall be for three years. Members may serve for up to two consecutive terms, and may be re-appointed after one year off the Council. No terms served prior to March 8, 2010, shall be counted towards the term limit for Council members. A member appointed to serve a term of two years or less, including the initial term provided in the preceding paragraph, shall not be deemed to have served a full term for purposes of this term limit.

Compensation: Upon approval by the Council, each member who is not otherwise compensated to attend meetings may receive a stipend of no more than \$50 per meeting, not to exceed \$300 annually, exclusively from funds provided to the Council by the State of California.
