[Calling on the City to Launch a San Francisco Summer Jobs+ Campaign]

Resolution urging the Mayor to launch a San Francisco Summer Jobs+ campaign by identifying private and public sector funds, securing private sector job opportunities, and developing infrastructure to manage internships so as to increase the summer employment opportunities for San Francisco's disconnected young people.

WHEREAS, More youth in San Francisco are currently unemployed than have been in the past 60 years, with 33 percent of the City's job seeking youth officially unemployed according to the American Community Survey; and

WHEREAS, In Summer 2011, the Office of Economic and Workforce Development of the City and County of San Francisco received 1,100 applications for 400 positions, and San Francisco's two largest City-funded internship programs, the Mayor's Youth Employment and Education Program (MYEEP) and San Francisco Youth Works, turned away over 2,000 youth applicants; and

WHEREAS, According to the Youth Vote Student Survey of over 9,500 San Francisco Unified School District high school students, youth consistently prioritize employment over any other potential activity, program, club, or lesson; and

WHEREAS, According to a 2012 report from the Corporation for National and Community Service and the White House Council for Community Solutions, there are about 6.7 million transitionally aged youth who are disconnected from education and work across the county; and

WHEREAS, Over the full lifetime of this cohort, these youth will impact United States taxpayers by costing \$1.56 trillion in present value terms, with an additional social burden valued at \$4.75 trillion; and

WHEREAS, Many disconnected youth between the ages of 16 and 24 are not represented in employment statistics because limited employment opportunities and challenging market conditions lead to the youth feeling dissuaded from searching; and

WHEREAS, Nationally, summer unemployment is at its highest rate since 1948, with only 49 percent of youth 16-24 employed in July – the busiest youth job month of the year; and

WHEREAS, Unemployment nationwide is higher among youth of color, with only 35 percent of African American youth and 43 percent of Latino youth employed in July 2011; and

WHEREAS, studies suggest that unemployment in low-income youth further limits a young person's potential earnings as an adult; and

WHEREAS, Youth workforce development programs provide a springboard for future employment opportunities; and

WHEREAS, New York Governor Andrew Cuomo recently launched the New York Youth Works program, a statewide program to combat the high unemployment rates among disconnected young people of color in communities across New York, which provides \$65 million for youth job training programs and \$25 million in tax credits for businesses that hire unemployed and disadvantaged youth; and

WHEREAS, Previous San Francisco Mayoral administrations have successfully created public-private partnerships to provide summer youth workforce development programs, for example, in May 2000, Mayor Willie Brown raised over \$1 million for subsidized youth employment opportunities through local corporations that partnered with the City in the Say Youth Employment for the Summer (Say YES) campaign, and in 2004, Mayor Gavin Newsom secured funding for over 120 youth jobs in his Mayor's Vocational Program by making personal telephone calls to local businesses; and

WHEREAS, On January 31, 2012, at the urging of the San Francisco Youth Commission, the Board of Supervisors adopted resolution 036-12 (File No. 120053), supporting the design of President Obama's Summer Jobs+ Plan, and stating that the Board of Supervisors will "work to develop a similar plan in San Francisco in order to promote youth employment in San Francisco"; and

WHEREAS, Over the course of the past two months, at the direction of United Way Worldwide, which the Obama Administration has tasked with engaging the private sector in order to develop and implement Summer Jobs+ in dozens of communities across the country, United Way of the Bay Area has convened meetings with various private sector companies, youth employment service providers, representatives of the Mayor's Office and various City Departments in an effort to develop a local version of Summer Jobs+; and

WHEREAS, On March 19, 2012, in hopes of establishing specific targets for this effort and at the urging of the 28 diverse youth employment providers that make up the Youth Employment Coalition, the San Francisco Youth Commission unanimously adopted resolution 1112 – AL10, which calls on the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor to launch the San Francisco Summer Jobs+ program; and

WHEREAS, each youth employment position would cost about \$2500 for the summer; and

WHEREAS, Through the leadership of Mayor Lee and the Board of Supervisors, San Francisco has begun organizing an unprecedented, nationally-recognized summer jobs campaign in partnership with President Obama and the United Way of the Bay Area to provide high quality summer employment, paid internship and mentorship programs for San Francisco young people ages 16 to 24 though the San Francisco Summer Jobs+ initiative; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Lee convened all City Department heads and directed them to participate to the maximum extent possible in San Francisco Summer Jobs + through programs like Youthworks, Project Pull and others to provide at least 2,500 summer jobs and paid internships for San Francisco youth; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Lee, House Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi, San Francisco
Unified School District Superintendent Carlos Garcia and members of the Board of
Supervisors are challenging San Francisco's private sector companies to participate in San
Francisco Summer Jobs + by creating an unprecedented number of high quality summer jobs
and paid internships for San Francisco's young people to match or exceed the number of
summer jobs and paid internships provided by City Departments; and

WHEREAS, through the partnership of the City, private sector companies and nonprofit/community-based organizations, San Francisco Summer Jobs + seeks to create more than 5,000 high quality summer jobs and paid internship opportunities for our City's young people, including work-ready youth, at-risk youth, and young people from disadvantaged backgrounds and communities; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors will collaborate with the Mayor to raise \$2.25 million in new funding from private sector companies to launch San Francisco Summer Jobs+, which would result in about 900 new youth jobs this summer; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Mayor to assure that any such new employment opportunities resulting from San Francisco Summer Jobs+ will be prioritized for disconnected youth; and, be it




