I have spent my professional career working with and representing unions and working people. I have handled discrimination claims based on race, sex, sexual orientation, age and disabilities. I am sensitive to underserved communities, people of color and people who don't get a fair shake in this society.
I also know what it means to be part of a bi-racial family, as I have been married to my wife--an African American woman and retired academic dean of Hastings Law School--for 42 years. We have raised 2 bi-racial children in SF.

Business and/or professional experience:

I spent 14 years (1980-94) with the largest union side firm in the Bay Area, representing working people and labor organizations. There, I litigated cases ranging from pregnancy discrimination to wage and hour claims, unfair labor practices to antitrust violations. I also provided counsel to unions and retirement and benefit funds. I then spent 11 & 1/2 years (1994-2005) as General Counsel of a SF investment firm which specialized in managing the assets of labor/management retirement and benefit plans. We developed a program, which allowed us to invest hundreds of millions of dollars in real estate developments in California while creating millions of hour of work for the building trades. In 2006 I started my practice as an arbitrator and mediator where I have specialized in resolving labor/management disputes, including bargaining disputes between the City & County of SF and SEIU 1021 and the Building Trades. I handle law enforcement matters for Homeland Security. I know how to deal with conflict and how to bring parties together when resolution seems difficult.

Civic Activities:

I volunteer my time as a mediator with the Federal District Court in SF, the EEOC, the Alameda Superior Court, and the SF Bar Association. I also have spent many years working with not-for-profits which focus on underserved youth. I served for several years on the Board of Directors of Back-On-Track, a Citywide mentoring and tutoring program, based at the Third Baptist Church in SF. For the past few years I have served as a Board member of the Encampment for Citizenship, a nationwide youth leadership program, predominantly serving youth of color throughout the country.

I have applied for the open seat on the San Francisco Police Commission and write at the suggestion of Board President London Breed. I am currently an attorney and fulltime mediator/arbitrator, focusing much of my practice on helping labor organizations and employers (including public entities) resolve labor/management disputes. Before becoming a mediator/arbitrator, I spent 14 years representing unions as a labor attorney, and then 11&1/2 years as General Counsel of an investment firm which managed the funds of labor/management retirement and benefit trust funds. I have helped the City & County of San Francisco resolve scores of disputes it has had with some of the public sector unions here.

Among the hundreds of cases I have handled in the past 11 years, I have mediated and arbitrated disputes involving law enforcement agencies at the local, state, and federal level—involving discharge, discipline and other contract disputes. I am familiar with some of the difficult issues that arise in law enforcement, and like most Americans, I see the tensions which exist between police officers and communities of color. Having been part of an interracial family (my wife of 42 years is African American) and having raised two bi-racial children in the City, I know that there needs to be honest, open dialogue between the groups, and transparency, for policing to be effective here.

I have read the substantial report issued by the U.S. Department of Justice, critiquing the SFPD. I have also read the DOJ's report on Ferguson Missouri. We cannot just say that a few rogue officers are the problem. Institutional changes are

imperative, but so is an acknowledgment of how difficult and critical police work really is. A critical goal of the Police Commission must be to bring the SFPD and communities of color closer on issues like accountability, use of force, de-escalation, training, recruitment, and bias. I believe this is an American crisis, existing in cities, towns and hamlets throughout the country.

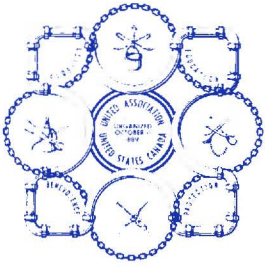



Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors,

My name is Jennifer Gaspar, I am the director for special projects at the CEELI Institute in Prague, Czech Republic, a continuing education institute for lawyers and judges from around the world. I am writing in enthusiastic support of the appointment of John Hamasaki to the San Francisco Police Commission. I was a resident and active San Francisco community member from 1995-2003. I am a graduate of the Graduate School of Education at the University of San Francisco, and I remain a member (in absentia) of Glide Methodist Church. While my time living in San Francisco was brief, it remains a dream to return to the City and become an active citizen there once more. From 1995-1998, I worked for the California Judicial Council's Child Advocacy Training Program. In 1999, I was hired as the program director for Rebuilding Together * San Francisco, a nonprofit organization dedicated to renovating and improving homes of the city's low income, elderly and disabled residents. This work introduced me to the richness and diversity of the city's communities and community volunteers who demonstrated a deep love for their hometown and fellow residents of all backgrounds. I came to love San Francisco deeply for its diversity and the spirit of its residents. Part of this spirit comes from the continuous care and trust between the San Francisco's government and its citizens. The San Francisco Police Commission plays an integral part in ensuring a trusting and resilient relationship between the City's citizens and the police.


My own personal experience with the importance of trust in systems and faith in police protection comes from the other side of the world. I lived in St. Petersburg, Russia from 2003-2014, where I worked as an adviser to international foundations supporting human rights NGOs in the country. I was married to a Russian human rights lawyer and in 2010 we adopted a daughter who is now a citizen of both Russia and the United States. In 2014, I received deportation notice revoking my residency permit on the grounds that the FSB (formerly known as KGB) deemed me a threat to Russian national security and constitutional order (http://www.nytimes.com/2014/08/06/world/europe/russia-moves-to-deport-wife-of-an-activist.html?_r=0). I spent the next few days packing my suitcases after 11 years of peaceful, law-abiding life in Russia, and knowing with certainty that there were no systems in the country that would protect my rights and keep my family together. I bought a plane ticket took our then 5-year old daughter with me to Prague. During my last few days in Russia, I lodged an appeal of my deportation that, in my absence, was appealed all the way to the Supreme Court of the Russian Federation. In each instance, the courts refused to compel the FSB to provide any evidence supporting their claim of my threat to national security. My case is now in final judgment stage in the European Court for Human Rights in Strasbourg (*Gaspar v. Russia* case # 23038/15). My personal experience in Russia and in advocating for human rights, gives me a particular perspective on what happens when there is no trust between a police and justice system and its people. While my story is a dystopian example of state impunity, secrecy and political intrigue, it can also be understood as a cautionary tale about the fundamental need for constant care and dialogue between police and their community.

I have known John Hamasaki for seventeen years as a friend and as a professional colleague committed to human rights and rule of law. Despite my departure from San Francisco, we have remained in close contact, and I have, with great happiness, witnessed John's advancement through law school, to practicing civil rights defense attorney, active and respected member of the Asian American community of professionals in San Francisco, and a committed champion of justice for those who are often overlooked and neglected by society. His passion for his community and for justice for the most under-served are clear themes of his work and private life.

John would be an outstanding choice for membership in the San Francisco Police Commission. He is welcomed in the City's communities of color, and is known to many as an honest and caring champion for their needs. Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors,

My name is Jennifer Gaspar, I am the director for special projects at the CEELI Institute in Prague, Czech Republic, a continuing education institute for lawyers and judges from around the world. I am writing in enthusiastic support of the appointment of John Hamasaki to the San Francisco Police Commission. I was a resident and active San Francisco community member from 1995-2003. I am a graduate of the Graduate School of Education at the University of San Francisco, and I remain a member (in absentia) of Glide Methodist Church. While my time living in San Francisco was brief, it remains a dream to return to the City and become an active citizen there once more. From 1995-1998, I worked for the California Judicial Council's Child Advocacy Training Program. In 1999, I was hired as the program director for Rebuilding Together * San Francisco, a nonprofit organization dedicated to renovating and improving homes of the city's low income, elderly and disabled residents. This work introduced me to the richness and diversity of the city's communities and community volunteers who demonstrated a deep love for their hometown and fellow residents of all backgrounds. I came to love San Francisco deeply for its diversity and the spirit of its residents. Part of this spirit comes from the continuous care and trust between the San Francisco's government and its citizens. The San Francisco Police Commission plays an integral part in ensuring a trusting and resilient relationship between the City's citizens and the police.


My own personal experience with the importance of trust in systems and faith in police protection comes from the other side of the world. I lived in St. Petersburg, Russia from 2003-2014, where I worked as an adviser to international foundations supporting human rights NGOs in the country. I was married to a Russian human rights lawyer and in 2010 we adopted a daughter who is now a citizen of both Russia and the United States. In 2014, I received deportation notice revoking my residency permit on the grounds that the FSB (formerly known as KGB) deemed me a threat to Russian national security and constitutional order (http://www.nytimes.com/2014/08/06/world/europe/russia-moves-to-deport-wife-of-an-activist.html?_r=0). I spent the next few days packing my suitcases after 11 years of peaceful, law-abiding life in Russia, and knowing with certainty that there were no systems in the country that would protect my rights and keep my family together. I bought a plane ticket took our then 5-year old daughter with me to Prague. During my last few days in Russia, I lodged an appeal of my deportation that, in my absence, was appealed all the way to the Supreme Court of the Russian Federation. In each instance, the courts refused to compel the FSB to provide any evidence supporting their claim of my threat to national security. My case is now in final judgment stage in the European Court for Human Rights in Strasbourg (*Gaspar v. Russia* case # 23038/15). My personal experience in Russia and in advocating for human rights, gives me a particular perspective on what happens when there is no trust between a police and justice system and its people. While my story is a dystopian example of state impunity, secrecy and political intrigue, it can also be understood as a cautionary tale about the fundamental need for constant care and dialogue between police and their community.

I have known John Hamasaki for seventeen years as a friend and as a professional colleague committed to human rights and rule of law. Despite my departure from San Francisco, we have remained in close contact, and I have, with great happiness, witnessed John's advancement through law school, to practicing civil rights defense attorney, active and respected member of the Asian American community of professionals in San Francisco, and a committed champion of justice for those who are often overlooked and neglected by society. His passion for his community and for justice for the most under-served are clear themes of his work and private life.

John would be an outstanding choice for membership in the San Francisco Police Commission. He is welcomed in the City's communities of color, and is known to many as an honest and caring champion for their needs. John's professional qualifications, his hard work and dedication to continuing San Francisco's tradition of being a model city of diversity, integrity and transparency make him an ideal candidate for the Commission.



My name is Laura Furniss, an attorney and principal at Furniss Family Law Group, based in Redwood City, with satellite offices in San Francisco. In addition, with the departure of Chief Suhr and the highly-publicized police-involved shootings, both nationwide and in San Francisco, it is a time of crisis for SFPD. Add to that President-elect Trump's promise of defunding sanctuary cities, we are facing a tenuous time of unprecedented importance. The Commission needs a member like John Hamasaki.

I had the pleasure of meeting and becoming friends with John while studying law at USF. I come from a family with deep law enforcement ties (my late father began his career as an Assistant District Attorney, and my brother is a law enforcement officer) and John, a passionate (then) aspiring criminal defense attorney – we often shared polar-opposite perspectives on criminal law matters. John stands out from any other attorney I've opposed in criminal law. During my time with SFDA (after having first been a DA in Santa Clara County), I experienced many different types of



Dear Rules Committee of the Board of Supervisors:

I am writing in support of John Hamasaki's application to serve on the San Francisco Police Commission. I know John as an excellent attorney, who is deeply committed to serving the community, especially those lacking the resources to otherwise have a meaningful voice. I believe John's background, training, and experience makes him uniquely qualified to serve on the Commission.

My Personal background.

I am a Professor of Law at the University of Colorado Law School. I have been a law professor for 15 years, during I have taught Criminal Law, and relevantly, Investigative Criminal Procedure. My scholarship focuses on criminal law and procedure as it relates to race and gender, and thus I regularly engage deeply with questions of race and policing, community police relationships, and mass incarceration. As the child of a Japanese mother who was incarcerated in an internment camp during World War II, I have long been preoccupied with matters of police power and racial discrimination. Prior to teaching, I was a public defender in Washington, D.C., and a federal public defender in Miami, FL. While in Florida, I was a founding member of the Asian Pacific American Bar Association of South Florida. I am a member elect of the American Law Institute, and in that capacity, I am currently a consultant to the ALI "Principles of Policing" project.

Not only am I deeply involved in and concerned with policing practices, and particularly how they affect certain marginalized communities, I feel a particular connection to the Bay Area. I completed my undergraduate studies

at U.C. Berkeley and worked at law firms in San Francisco (O'Melveny & Myers; Heller, Ehrman) during law school. I have resided in Berkeley, Richmond, and the Upper Haight. My mother was born in Fresno, but her family relocated to Southern California after the camps. My Aunt is the former head of pediatrics at S.F. Children's hospital, and I spent a significant amount of time as a child in San Francisco visiting her. Consequently, like many people, I would like to see San Francisco become a national leader in terms of police community relations and recognize the importance of having a dedicated, diverse, and passionate Commission to ensure that the SFPD is a model police department. It is also essential that commissioners have a depth of knowledge, truly care about communities, are willing to ask the hard questions, and approach thorny issues with an open mind. John has all of these qualities and more, which is why he has, in six short years, gained respect throughout the S.F. legal community as a skilled and dedicated lawyer.

My Relationship to and Opinion of the Applicant.

I have known John for 45 years, since I was born. John and I are from Miami—a place with a miniscule Japanese American population—and our parents are friends. John and I went to different primary and secondary schools and different colleges, but we reconnected when John became interested in becoming a lawyer. Since then, I have followed his career, and I am extremely impressed. It takes determination, strength, and self-confidence to start one's own firm right out of law school and take on criminal cases, some of the most emotionally charged, and difficult cases to try. Today, John is well-known within the criminal justice world and has an excellent reputation for hard work, dedication and compassion for his clients and all people within the justice system.

I believe that most public defenders and appointed defense attorneys are deeply committed to the rights of defendants, the constitution, justice, and equality. However, as with any profession, some are more committed than others. I have taught quite literally thousands of students and have placed hundreds in public defender jobs, so I know very well that levels of enthusiasm and dedication vary. I have been so struck by the sheer depth of John's commitment to indigent defendants—their rights, their liberty, and, indeed, the quality of their lives. Years prior to John's decision to enter law school, we talked about my work as a public defender, and I knew then that he would be one of the most dedicated advocates for the least among us. That thought proved prophetic as John's law career has unfolded.

Even with his deep commitment to his criminal clients, John has a profound respect for the police and the difficult and important work they do. In fact, one of the things most interesting and impressive about John is that he worked for a long time in the non-professional world before law school, including working in security positions. He therefore knows the challenges faced by those charged with maintaining order in volatile situations. John will bring this awareness to his work as a commissioner, and approach the task of improving police-citizen relationships with a sense of openness. John wants to help heal the very real divide between law enforcement and the communities they serve through meaningful policy changes.

Finally, John is extensively involved with the Asian-Pacific Islander (API) community of San Francisco, in part through his association with the Asian Pacific American Bar Association. John has an excellent reputation within the API community for his work promoting civil rights and social justice causes. Some his recent activities include participating in a sponsored discussion on race and policing and lecturing on the API experience in court. John is also well-known in the API community for his exemplary representation of API clients in criminal courts throughout the Bay Area.

In short John possesses all the qualities—expertise, dedication, open-mindedness, thoughtfulness, and passion—that one would want in a member of the Police Commission. Given today's climate, it is of utmost importance that cities involve the very best people in theorizing, designing, and implementing policies that so profoundly affect individuals and families in the community. John Hamasaki is the right choice for the San Francisco Police Commission. He is dedicated to progress and reform and will endeavor to do right by the people of our City.





My name is Amy Hansen and I am writing in support of the appointment of John Hamasaki to the San Francisco Police Commission. I am Associate General Counsel at AppDynamics, Inc., an enterprise software company located in San Francisco. I have lived in San Francisco since 2005 and am raising two children in Potrero Hill. My family is originally from New Jersey, but we have gradually emigrated here - my mother and father are separated but both live in San Francisco, as do two of my cousins, and my only sister lives in Oakland. I am a member of my neighborhood organization, the Potrero Boosters. As a resident of Potrero Hill, I live in a community that is sharply divided - on the North side of Potrero Hill, there is incredible wealth and privilege, and on the South side are the public housing projects. Therefore I have an interest in the Police Commission's policies as they relate to the treatment of race and class in policing.

John and I met while studying to become lawyers at the University of San Francisco School of Law, and we have remained friends since then. One of John's strongest qualities is his passion and commitment to representing those most in need of an advocate. Dear Mr. Evans,

I write this letter in support of the appointment of John Hamasaki to the San Francisco Police Commission. I am a civil defense attorney, and earned my law degree from the University of San Francisco School of Law. While my office is based in Oakland, I represent clients throughout the Bay Area, and generally have multiple active matters at San Francisco Superior Court at any given time.

I have lived in San Francisco since 2000, and I consider the City my lifelong home. I have lived in Russian Hill, the Upper Haight, the Western Addition (although I suppose folks now call this area "NOPA"), and SoMa. I currently live in northeast Bernal Heights, where my husband and I moved in 2012.

The experience of living in many different neighborhoods has shaped my multi-faceted (and perhaps seemingly inconsistent) concerns related to the Police Commission and the San Francisco Police Department. On one hand, I feel as though police response in many areas of the city is lacking, and there is a disparity regarding the general attention given to certain neighborhoods, especially those with a high percentage of rental units or SROs. For example, my husband and I lived on 11th Street near Howard for over six years, and were confronted daily with quality-of-life issues (including almost weekly car break-ins), which often went unaddressed. Once we moved to Bernal Heights, our focus as it relates to police issues shifted from a feeling of no police presence to a feeling of targeted police activity, especially following our neighborhood's response to the shooting of Alex Nieto. My husband, who is Mexican-American, and I have concerns about police accountability (or at least the perception thereof) and the related concern of repairing the SFPD's relationship with people of color.

It is from this perspective that I confidently recommend John Hamasaki to the San Francisco Police Commission. John and I first met in 2005 as first year law students at USF. He seemed deeply committed to his adopted home of San Francisco, and I recall visiting him in North

Beach, where he seemingly knew everyone. Throughout law school, John was a hard worker who often respectfully challenged my and other's world views. From early on, John was interested in assisting the underrepresented, and his transition to a criminal defense attorney seemed natural. We continue to associate socially and professionally, and I have attended multiple events he has hosted as Director of the Asian American Bar Association. I was particularly impressed at his ability to moderate one particular panel, which included both federal prosecutors and public defense attorneys (including Jeff Adachi). John was able to ask questions and balance the conversation in such a way that the panel's conflicting viewpoints were presented in a productive and non-acrimonious way.

John, like my husband and I, is deeply concerned about safety and the quality of life in San Francisco, and he shares our hope that a good relationship between the SFPD and the community – especially underrepresented members of this community– will strengthen our City. John's pro bono work and his community service emphasize his commitment to this goal, and his practical approach to working together to solve the City's problems would be a fitting addition to the San Francisco Police Commission.





I am writing in support of the appointment of John Hamasaki to the San Francisco Police Commission.

I am a criminal defense lawyer in San Francisco. I am a member of the Criminal Justice Act Panel, through which I represent indigent clients facing criminal charges in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California. I also represent indigent clients on appeal and accept appointments from the First District Appellate Project, the Central California Appellate Project and the Sixth District Appellate Program. I have been active on the BASF indigent criminal defense panel and have practiced criminal defense in San Francisco for eleven years. I studied law at UC Hastings. While a law student, I worked as an intern at the San Francisco Public Defender's Office and at the California Attorney General's Office. As a law student and practicing attorney, I have worked with countless defense lawyers, prosecutors, law enforcement officers, judges, clients and members of the community. In this capacity, and as a 15-year resident of the City, raising a family in the Mission District, I am keenly aware of the importance of healing the divide between law enforcement and the community at large. As such, I have a strong interest in the Commission's leadership and strongly believe that John Hamasaki is an excellent choice for appointment to the Commission.

I became acquainted with Mr. Hamasaki approximately seven years ago, through our respective work on the BASF indigent defense panel. Since that time, we have worked on several cases together and consult with one another often. As such, I have gotten to know him professionally and personally. My name is Christopher Chow. I am a lifelong San Franciscan who lives and works in our great city. My wife Mary and I own and operate a small business, Chow Associates, a job and immigration services agency with offices in Chinatown and the Richmond District. Our son studies at a public high school. I was the first Asian American television news reporter in San Francisco (KPIX, 1970), the first Commission Secretary and Public Outreach Coordinator for the Commission and Department of the Environment (1997), and a former Director of the Richmond Village Beacon Youth Center (2006).

As a colleague and ally on many issues for more than 20 years, I strongly Ms. Julie D. Soo to serve on the San Francisco Police Commission.

Julie Soo is a civic-minded, community-based public servant who cares a great deal about protecting the people of San Francisco, and the people who come to San Francisco, from violence, crime and injustice. She cares deeply for the rule of law, equal justice under the law, and equal access to the law by the people it is dedicated to serve.

As a fourth-generation San Franciscan she has grown up with a multicultural perspective, witnessed, experienced and participated in the demographic, social and political changes of San Francisco in the last 40 years, arguably the most aspirational, conscientious, contentious, and accomplished justice-seeking period in our history. In the most recent past two years our City, state and nation have been rocked by issues and controversies in community and police relations and interactions, most acutely concerning officer-involved shootings of civilians. This demonstrates her commitment to and abilities in educating the public about important issues.

At her request the Commission on the Status of Women held a joint meeting with the Police Commission to shed light on San Francisco's response to domestic and family violence, including the new JUSTIS computer case management system, data collection, and language assistance for victims. Ms. Soo's public service record is well-rounded. She has served as a legislative aide and advisor to members of the Board of Supervisors working on such matters as the . She is a board

member of the Chinese Historical Society of America and has served on National Asian Pacific American Bar Association's Civil Rights Committee, the Board of Trustees for Saint Francis Memorial Hospital, the board of the Asian Law Caucus (now Asian Americans Advancing Justice), and the Insurance Commissioner's Health Care Task Force.

Julie Soo would be a valuable and effective member of the San Francisco Police Commission with her community credibility, public service experience and collaborative accomplishments. Her experience and expertise in community outreach and her ability to converse in Chinese would be efficacious assets to the Commission as it continues to engage and communicate with the various constituencies of our San Francisco community.

In “Assessment of the San Francisco Police Department” (2016), the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), Community Oriented Policing Services highlighted 272 recommendations to improve deficiencies found in a review of the San Francisco Police Department’s (SFPD) operations. Much work remains to be done to move our law enforcement efforts into the next decade and I would like to offer myself to serve at the pleasure of the Board of Supervisors in advancing this goal.

As a native son of San Francisco with diplomatic, military and federal government experience, I have a perspective and skills that may benefit the Commission and San Francisco law enforcement efforts.

My work as an American diplomat at the U.S. Department of State required careful negotiations between diverse stakeholders inside and outside of the U.S. government to peacefully achieve U.S. policy objectives overseas. My experience as a U.S. army infantry officer provided me a visceral appreciation for understanding the grave consequences that occur from armed response when peaceful negotiations fail. I do not take lightly the obligations of peaceful, community-based efforts at achieving positive outcomes while undertaking the responsibilities of wielding armed force.

The perspective I intend to bring to the Commission is one of a local homegrown son who started in San Francisco’s public school system and advanced to the highest levels of the federal government. I’ve advanced the Secretary of State in meetings overseas; prepared talking points for the President; managed the Interagency process with the FBI, DHS, and various other agencies at the White House; and successfully negotiated bilateral agreements on behalf of the United States with foreign governments. When I encountered injustice during my efforts on the federal level, I was not afraid to call it out (see attached article from the *Washington Post*).

At the State Department, diversity can count against you

Michael Young would be a good guy to have on your side in China.

Born to a Taiwanese family that emigrated to San Francisco in the 1970s, he speaks fluent Mandarin. He studied martial arts in Beijing after college and considered going to make movies in Hong Kong, but ended up attending Harvard's Kennedy School of Government instead. Then he went back to China to work as a telecommunications consultant, before taking the foreign service exam and getting hired by the State Department in 2003.

For his first tour, Young was sent to Seoul, South Korea, where he processed visas for one and a half years. When a spot opened up in Beijing, Young went for it, thinking his language ability and experience in the country would be an asset — and he got the job.

But a few months before he was scheduled to depart, Young got a call from State Department Diplomatic Security saying he wouldn't be allowed to serve in China. Though no reason was given, a higher up told him it might have to do with him having recently married a Korean citizen who was living in China. Young, who was doing required training as an Army reservist, didn't know what to do.

"I was in the field, I wasn't taking showers for five or six days on end, I didn't have the recourse to figure out what my options were," he recalled on a hot July day in the plaza near State Department headquarters. "My marriage quickly began to fall apart, so I ended up taking a job in Kabul, Afghanistan — I was left with the positions that were more difficult to fill."

That took up another year. Then, Young cycled through Vietnam and Pakistan before another job came up in China — this one in Guangzhou. Again, he got the assignment. A few weeks later, Diplomatic Security said he wouldn't be allowed to go. Again, no rationale.

After that, Young stayed in D.C., where he served until recently as the deputy director of the Office of Terrorist Screening and Interdiction. But he's come across many other people who've also been prevented from serving in countries where they have

family ties or work experience — 19 Asian Americans in total, and a smattering of others. It's an indication of the difficulty U.S. intelligence agencies face as they try to both recruit staff from diverse communities and cope with threats, both real and perceived, from countries around the world. Though the State Department insists it's for their own protection, to the Asian Americans whose careers it impacts, it's seen as evidence of lingering distrust.

"I think it's wrong. I think it's un-American," says Young. "The state of racism in America has really evolved. It's not overt like it was in the 1960s. It's much more subtle. We've created a culture of fear for ourselves that we have trouble getting away from."

—

The State Department has long precluded some people from serving in certain countries for various reasons. Stuart Kennedy, a career diplomat who now directs the Foreign Affairs Oral History Program at the Association for Diplomatic Studies and Training, remembers that Jewish staff wouldn't be assigned to Saudi Arabia at the Saudis' behest, and people with Russian ancestry wouldn't be assigned to Russia during the Cold War. (It was also sometimes the reverse: African Americans would only be sent to African countries, on what was called the "negro circuit").

"I held the, perhaps mistaken, impression that foreign service officers native to a country might have too close ties to their families there and this could expose them to great pressure to give visas to family and friends," Kennedy wrote in an e-mail. "To me it did not seem fair to put officers into a difficult situation even if they might speak the language."

The department has since pushed to shed its white-guy reputation, recruiting minorities through programs like the Pickering Fellowship, as well as changing its admissions exam to be less culturally biased against newcomers. President Obama's 2011 Executive Order on Diversity and Inclusion in the Federal Workforce further solidified the initiative, and Secretary John Kerry talks on State's Web site about the need to present the diverse composition of America to the world.

At the same time, however, the post-Sept. 11 environment heightened the level of scrutiny given to security clearances (there are 13 "guidelines," including "foreign influence"). The State Department found itself with increasing numbers of personnel with international ties to review, especially spouses from other countries, according to a 2011 Inspector General report.

"HR sees itself grappling with serious assignment issues emanating from the growingly diverse service and the demands for language competent entrants," the report read. "[They] are grappling with DS about how to manage the likely inclusion of entrants with ties to a critical threat country. In addition, there are occasional, and at times emotional, pleas from regional bureaus and/or the officers involved, regarding Diplomatic Security objections to individual assignments to key embassies."

Actual restrictions are fairly rare: The report found that the department had reviewed 700 assignments in 2010 and only held three officers back. In 2011, 1,272 personnel and contractors in total were precluded from serving in a total of 20 countries. State Department spokesman Patrick Ventrell defended the policy, saying it's a better option than barring a candidate from the service entirely.

"An assignment restriction mitigates risk while allowing an individual to obtain a security clearance and work for the department; we believe this approach is preferred to denying clearance and employment," Ventrell said. Some countries, he explained, will even try to conscript officers who are dual citizens into military service.

Precluded officers usually sympathize with the need to prioritize security. Eveline Tseng, who is from Taiwan and has a Chinese stepmother, was denied her first assigned post in Beijing and sent to Mexico instead (she knew ahead of time that she'd be precluded from Taiwan, but hadn't figured it would extend to China as well). Tseng appealed the decision, and it was reversed — but too late for that tour, and even the next one, which she worries will make it difficult for her to pursue the career she'd envisioned in East Asia. Still, Tseng does understand the rationale for keeping her out of a country where she has deep family roots.

"I know I could say no to my family. But that wouldn't stop them from asking," Tseng says. "You're just constantly being bombarded. 'You're Asian, you're one of us, what do you mean you can't give me a visa, I've known your grandmother for 50 years.' So even though I'm like, 'I'm sorry, you're still a stranger to me,' could that negatively affect her relationship with my grandmother, and would that affect the way I respond? Maybe."

Others, however, question whether that's a good enough justification for precluding someone from a country when there are so many other factors that could lead someone to betray U.S. interests — as new foreign service officers are even taught in their introductory class, called A-100. Longtime Soviet spy Robert Hanssen, for example, said he just did it for the money. Clayton Lonetree, a U.S. Marine convicted of espionage in 1987, was seduced by a Russian spy. Then there are Edward Snowden and Bradley Manning, who leaked secret information for ideological reasons.

"I have wracked my brain and cannot think of any historical examples of foreign service officers comprising their country's interests because of family or other connections to the host country," says William Keylor, a professor of international relations at Boston University. The bigger problem is "clientitis," which happens when people spend enough time in one place to adopt its point of view. "That can happen to anyone, regardless of any familial or other ties to the country," he says.

In fact, officers with more cultural fluency might be better equipped to recognize and resist blackmail attempts than someone who's arriving there for the first time — as well as carry a strong message of American values. Cecilia Choi, president of the

State Department's internal Asian American Foreign Affairs Association, says she was a unique asset as a Korean American serving in Seoul.

"We are the soft power of the U.S.," Choi says. "If I go into a room and I say, 'You need to review your election laws, you need to be transparent,' and I look like the person I'm talking to, it's harder for them to say, 'It's just a cultural thing, we're not there yet, Asians like to take orders.' Or, 'It's cultural for us to have this kind of system.' I can look at them and say, 'No it's not, a lot of Asian Americans aren't using that kind of system.' "

Finally, there's the financial bottom line: It costs tens of thousands of dollars to teach someone a language from scratch, especially difficult ones like Chinese, Russian and Arabic. That's why, a few years ago, State started preferentially hiring people who already know those languages — which makes it frustrating to be told you can't put them to use. One Chinese American former foreign service officer, who asked not to be named because of the nature of her current employment, even left the department because of it.

"I think a lot of us thought that was why they'd recruited us, because we would be able to do a better job because you already know the cultural nuances," she said. "I was fine to serve in other countries. But I felt my career prospects were limited, because I was not able to use one of my biggest assets, in a department that really needs that."

—

The greatest harm of the preclusion policy, besides losing the benefit the skills of native language speakers, may be how it projects an image of distrust. Several foreign service officers brought up the historical example of Japanese Americans being interned during World War II, as well as the persecution of Wen Ho Lee, the Los Alamos scientist who was wrongfully accused of leaking information to the Chinese. Asians are no strangers to the suspicion that they might be serving another master.

For example: When Kendrick Liu was applying to serve on the D.C.-based desk that deals with China and Mongolia, he says he was asked to submit information about relatives who were foreign-born U.S. citizens, and was ultimately denied the position on security grounds (Diplomatic Security had previously forced him to forego an assignment in Hong Kong as well).

"It seemed to me they were making distinctions between American citizens and American citizens who weren't born in the United States, which in my mind seemed odd," Liu says. "Because as I was taught to understand it, an American citizen is an American citizen, period."

And then there's Andrew Ou, a Korean-born officer who spent time on a fellowship program in Japan. Years after being told he couldn't serve in Japan for security reasons, he requested his files under the Freedom of Information Act. They contained copious notes about work he'd done for a Japanese official, as well as a Japanese girlfriend. The preclusion was later reversed, but barely.

"I'm American, and this whole process challenged that concept," Ou says. "I was surprised, I was angry, I was bitter."

To the Asian American Foreign Affairs Association, the preclusions are indicative of a larger problem. While Asians are coming into the State Department at higher rates, they fade out at the highest levels, which Choi says could be evidence of a "bamboo ceiling."

"If you were in a different field, like dentistry, if someone didn't think you were American, they would still go to you to get their teeth cleaned," Choi says. "But if you're in the area of foreign affairs, if people don't think you're American, that can be devastating to your career."

The State Department's union, the American Foreign Service Association, hears about these issues often, and offers legal advice for filing complaints. Recently, they've asked for a review of the demographic composition of key offices within the Department to see whether different groups might be underrepresented, as well as those who've been precluded from different countries. It's not just Asians, says AFSA official Matthew Asada — people from Eastern Europe and the Middle East have also had trouble with their clearances. But the Asians are the only ones who've raised their voice.

"One of the reasons why you're hearing about it from Asian Americans is that the AAFAA has been good about reaching out to its members and collecting their stories," Asada says. "A comparable organization doesn't exist for other ethnic groups. Perhaps some of our Muslim employees don't feel as protected if they were to raise concerns, in this post 9/11 world. It's not easy being Muslim in America, and it's easier not to say anything."

It's not easy for Asians to speak up either. But after years of trying to get answers, Young says the waiting had gone on long enough.

"I have been told by some colleagues to be careful in raising this story, for fear of rocking the boat," he says. "That may have as much to do with us being Asian as it is being fearful of the counterintelligence apparatus. We're taught to keep our heads down, work hard, don't create a ruckus, eventually everything's going to work itself out. Which is fine, but not for me."

Board Qualifications:

The Police Commission shall consist of seven (7) members:

- > Three (3) members shall be nominated by the Rules Committee of the Board of Supervisors; and
- > Four (4) members nominated by the Mayor, at least one (1) shall be a retired judge or an attorney with trial experience.

Each nomination shall be subject to confirmation by the Board of Supervisors. The Mayor's nominations shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within 60 days. If the Board of Supervisors rejects the Mayor's nomination to fill the seat designated for a retired judge or attorney with trial experience, the Mayor shall nominate a different person with such qualifications. If the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a mayoral nomination within 60 days from the date the nomination is transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed confirmed.

To stagger the terms of the seven members, of the first four members nominated by the Mayor, two members shall serve two year terms and two members shall serve terms of four years; and of the three members nominated by the Rules Committee, one member shall serve a term of one year, one member shall serve a term of two years, and one member shall serve a term of three years. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall designate such initial terms by lot. All subsequent appointments to the commission shall be for four-year terms.

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The tenure of each member shall terminate upon the expiration of the member's term. The Mayor shall transmit a nomination or re-nomination to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors no later than 60 days prior to the expiration of the term of a member nominated by the Mayor. For vacancies occurring for reasons other than the expiration of a member's term, within 60 days following the creation of such vacancy, the Mayor shall nominate a member to fill such vacancy if the vacancy is for a seat filled by nomination of the Mayor.

The District Attorney, Sheriff, and Public Defender may recommend persons to the Mayor and Board of Supervisors for nomination or appointment to the Commission.

The Mayor, with the consent of the Board, may remove a member the Mayor has nominated. The Board of Supervisors may remove a member the Rules Committee has nominated.

The Police Commission oversees the Police Department and the Office of Citizen Complaints (OCC). The OCC investigates complaints of police misconduct and neglect of duty. The Director of the OCC may verify and file disciplinary charges with the Police Commission against members of the Police Department arising out of citizen complaints that are sustained by the OCC after meeting and conferring with the Chief of Police.
