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WHO WE ARE

A group of individuals in recovery who have been advocating for, and advancing abstinence-based solutions to end San Francisco's Drug and Homeless Crisis, and Overdose Epidemic.

WHAT WE BELIEVE

Recovery is a deeply personal journey that doesn't begin until the individual **stops using drugs**. Through this journey, one's health and well-being begin to improve, but the real change happens when the addict starts learning how to live. This is the reality of addiction: drugs were never really our problem—we did drugs quite well. Our real problem was we didn't know how to live. Once we stop using drugs, through **RECOVERY** we begin to learn how to live—that's when true transformation begins.

TREATMENT ON DEMAND

We believe Treatment on Demand is 24/7 access to drug treatment services – detox, stabilization, and residential treatment. Any barrier that prevents immediate access, including assessments, coordination, screening, and funding, inhibit the individuals ability to seek recovery.





RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Shut Down Open Air Drug Markets, prosecute drug dealers, and restore public safety.
- 2. Revise HSH and DPH program policies to align with abstinence based recovery.
- 3. Reinvest in abstinence-based solutions and decrease funding for services that enable addiction.
- 4. Address wage parity between government employees and non-profit providers.
- 5. Fully fund Drug Treatment on Demand where those seeking treatment have 24/7 access to city-funded services.
- 6. Ensure services are sequenced; people using illicit drugs should be required to go to treatment before being placed in government-funded housing.
- 7. Fund a therapeutic teaching community in the jail, to prepare people for treatment in the community.
- 8. Reform mental health diversion (PC 1001.36) through a local ordinance.
