MOVR'S OMBUDS ROLE: DIRECT ENGAGEMENT TO UNCOVER SYSTEM ISSUES

Two (2) staffers on-boarded in February 2025 for SHARP (1) and MOVR (1) - 5 FTE total

Unduplicated clients: 64 (2025)

Types of cases: domestic violence, sexual assault, youth violence, non-fatal shootings, labor trafficking, traffic violence, elder abuse, child sexual exploitation, prejudice-fueled incidents, and dog bites.

Proactive outreach with direct service providers, departments.

Annual survey of city departments and direct service organizations regarding unmet victim/survivor needs.

FINDINGS FROM 2025 FAMILY VIOLENCE COUNCIL REPORT

NGOS SERVE AS FIRST RESPONDERS

Category	Reported Cases	Arrests	Prosecutions
Child Abuse	4896	248	131
Elder Abuse	8327	200	12
Domestic Violence	6,658 (911 calls)	1,618	492

14 cases taken to trial

492 cases filed (41%) (includes DV, stalking, elder abuse)

1,167 cases presented

3,300 calls receive police response

6,658 DV calls to 911

13,436 calls received by gender-based violence service providers



DOMESTIC & INTIMATE PARTER VIOLENCE

- 54% of violent crime not reported.
- 41% of California women and 26% of men experience physical intimate partner violence, sexual violence, or stalking in their lifetimes.
- Nationally, DV alone costs \$8.3 billion in expenses annually, a combination of higher medical costs (\$5.8B) and lost productivity (\$2.5B).
- 8 million days of paid work are lost as result of DV.

SEXUAL ASSAULT/ RAPE

- More than 2 out of 3 sexual assaults go unreported.
- In San Francisco, estimated 38.1 individuals experience rapes/sexual assaults for every 100,000 persons.
- Nation-wide, 54% of transgender and gender nonconforming people reported physical or coercive violence from a partner.

IMPACTS ON YOUTH

Victims of teen dating violence and sexual assault are more likely to suffer from:

- psychiatric and mental health disorders
- poor academic performance
- drug and alcohol abuse in adulthood
- attempted suicide

CHILD ABUSE

In California, 2024, 1.3 million estimated survivors of child abuse. 428,815 reported survivors. 46,568 substantiated survivors – 127 per day

105 fatalities

Total economic burden incurred by California for lifetime costs of survivors of child abuse and neglect in 2024: **\$16.8B**

How many children could be sent to preschool for that same amount? **1.29 million**

SF Bay Area has some of the highest rates of commercial sex exploitation of children in the country.

ELDER ABUSE

- 75% increase (men) and 35% increase (women) in nonfatal assaults involving seniors over past 20 years
- In California alone, >200,000 cases of reported elder and dependent adult abuse per year for every case known to programs and agencies, 24 are unknown.
- APS receives more than 15,000 reports of abuse per month in California
- Research estimates 1 in 10 older adults living in their homes experience elder abuse annually
- Language needs compound the isolation and/or inability to access help.

IMPACT ON VICTIMS/ SURVIVORS

ISSUES:

Operational Challenges

- Triaging Issues: Lack of clear guidance, leading to misdirection ("Go to another station"), and insufficient time to contact victims.
- Delays in Response: Limited availability of personnel ("No one to send right now"), vague reassurances ("They'll get to you, just wait"), and investigations taking too long—sometimes beyond a victim's lifetime.

Training & Policy Gaps

- Insufficient Training: Lack of understanding regarding violations and criminal activity ("Not a violation/not a crime").
- Outdated Policies: Need to review and update Department General Orders (DGOs), craft new protocols in certain areas.

Resource & Accessibility Concerns

- Language Access: Inadequate support for Limited English Proficiency (LEP) victims and survivors.
- Staffing Issues: In addition to understaffing, turnover rates and difficulty in retaining subject matter expertise based on experience.

SYSTEMIC ISSUES

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IMPACT ON VICTIMS/ SURVIVORS

IMPACT ON SURVIVORS:

- **Delayed Assistance**: Survivors experience prolonged wait times before receiving help, delaying critical support
- Escalation of Trauma: Existing trauma is compounded due to inadequate or untimely intervention
- **Heightened Risk**: Increased vulnerability to danger and a higher likelihood of retaliation
- **Discouraged Reporting & Cooperation**: Fear and uncertainty create a chilling effect, discouraging survivors from reporting or engaging in investigations

RECOMMENDATIONS

STAFFING SVU AND...

- Recruitment focus.
- Embedding advocates or social workers with SVU response.
- Prestige rotation with eye on sustainability of assignment, incentives to stay and build.
- Explore and implement best or promising practices nationally.
