[Supporting access to AIDS drugs for Third World Countries]

URGING THE WORLD TRADE ORGANIZATION (WTO) TO ELIMINATE BARRIERS WHICH PREVENT THIRD WORLD COUNTRIES FROM OBTAINING AFFORDABLE LIFE SAVING HIV-AIDS TREATMENTS AND FURTHER URGING THE UNITED STATES FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, AS A MEMBER OF (WTO), TO CEASE ITS BILATERAL ATTEMPTS TO DISCOURAGE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES FROM USING COMPULSORY LICENSING AND PARALLEL IMPORTING TO ADDRESS VITAL PUBLIC HEALTH CONCERNS.

WHEREAS, The AIDS epidemic continues to be a disease of the world's most impoverished developing nations; and

WHEREAS, The United Nations reports that 33.6 million women, men and children are now living with HIV and more than two-thirds are in sub-Saharan Africa; and

WHEREAS, There is a huge gap in access to drugs between industrialized and developing countries and the soaring cost of \$1,000 per month in AIDS drug therapies are out of reach for Third World countries, where 90 percent of the world's people with AIDS reside; and

WHEREAS, Avoiding pharmaceutical industry patents would lower the cost of AIDS drugs and facilitate access for developing countries; and

WHEREAS, The World Trade Organization policy permits poor countries to manufacture drugs ordinarily protected by patents; and

WHEREAS, Combinations of newly developed antiviral drugs have helped cut the AIDS death rate in the United States by half since 1996; and

WHEREAS, The WTO's "Compulsory licensing" policy allows a country to force a drug company to license its patent to a local manufacturer; and

WHEREAS, The WTO's "Parallel importing" policy permits poor countries to shop the international market for the lowest priced drug, instead of paying the rate charged in their countries by companies that own the patent; and

WHEREAS, These two policies give hard-hit nations the opportunity to produce their own AIDS drugs and cut the prices they pay by more than 80 percent; and

WHEREAS, Multinational pharmaceutical companies are working to restrict access to essential medications worldwide in the interest of "intellectual property" claims and higher profits; and

WHEREAS, The drug industry plans to lobby the WTO to implement tighter limits on the use of compulsory licenses and are working toward a worldwide ban on parallel imports; and

WHERAS, Patent compliance rules should not impede Third World countries from obtaining access to "essential medicines," a list of life-saving drugs compiled by the United Nations, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Boards of Supervisor for the City and County of San Francisco urges the World Trade Organization member countries to:

- (a) safeguard access to essential drugs, especially HIV drugs, and reaffirm the primacy of public health interests over commercial considerations, regarding the implementation of the World Trade Organization's Agreements and in the review of the Trade Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Agreement,
- (b) refer to the World Health Organization's expertise regarding disputes on health measures and the Trade Related Aspects of Intellectual Property (TRIPS) Agreement,
- (c) recognize that US trade policy should not supersede WTO agreements that permit and uphold the legality of parallel importing and compulsory licensing, and
- (d) make provisions ensuring that access to community medicines and local plants is maintained and protected, and that technical expertise be provided so that communities can be granted license for these drugs and benefit from their development and sale; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco urges the United States federal government to cease its bi-lateral attempts to discourage developing countries from using compulsory licensing and parallel importing to address vital public health concerns.
