The purpose of the Reentry Council of the City & County of San Francisco is to coordinate information sharing, planning, and engagement among all interested private and public stakeholders in order to improve services for and outcomes of people returning to San Francisco after a period of incarceration. Primarily a policy body, the Council advises on the design and operates of specific reentry initiatives in San Francisco. Since its original publication, more than 10,000 copies of the Council-produced Getting Out & Staying Out: A Guide to San Francisco Resources for People Leaving Jails and Prisons have been distributed to residents and organizations within and outside the prison and jail systems. Additionally, the Council-in partnership with the San Francisco Department of Public Health, Walden House, Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights, San Francisco Adult Probation Department, Homeless Prenatal Program, and Iris Center-received a federal Second Chance Act Adult Demonstration grant to implement With Open Arms, an initiative which provides wraparound supportive services to San Francisco women sentenced to state prison and living on state parole. Council staff are assisting in the implementation of this program, and therefore are well-positioned to direct the proposed project, which would offer mentoring and enrichment opportunities to participants in the With Open Arms initiative.

- How your program will recruit and motivate individuals to participate in the project Our goal is that the Mentoring and Enrichment component of the With Open Arms initiative will serve 90% of the women (including transgender women) accessing With Open Arms services, of which we expect there to be 150. During the calendar year 2009, 155 women were paroled to San Francisco. Of these, 94 were black, 37 were white, 14 were Hispanic, and 10 were "other" (according to the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation classification terminology). The mean age of women on parole is 37. Approximately 60 women on parole in San Francisco live in a residential treatment facility operated by Walden House on Treasure Island; while the remainder of women on parole in San Francisco are scattered across the city, the Bayview/Hunter's Point communities are home to a disproportionate number of people on parole. Outreach to prospective participants will be conducted via the partners engaged in the With Open Arms initiative (listed above). Incentives for participation—such as free movie tickets, spa visits, and transportation vouchers—will be publicized through these channels.

The purpose of the Mentoring and Enrichment component of the With Open Arms initiative is to provide formerly incarcerated women much-needed opportunities for networking and social support, and for reimagining their personal and professional outcomes through exposure to and engagement in the rich resources San Francisco has to offer. These activities will complement the services provided through the With Open Arms initiative by addressing women's needs for constructive social and intellectual engagement. Reentry Council staff will engage With Open Arms partners, community leaders, and other advocates in the facilitation of mentoring and enrichment activities such as:

- Structured visits to local college campuses, highlighting the Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) at City College of San Francisco and Project Rebound at San Francisco State University, a program which assists in the matriculation of criminal justice-involved students;
- Participation in programming and events offered by the Women's Initiative (provides low-income women education and financial assistance in business ownership); the Women's-Building (offers sliding-scale/free yoga, qigong, and other wellness classes, in addition to free tax preparation and computer access); and other local resource centers;
- Guided field trips to San Francisco museums and cultural centers, such as the Museum of the African Diaspora, Yerba Buena Center for the Arts, and the California Academy of Sciences;
- Luncheons and dinner events featuring motivational talks on topics such as parenting, personal/professional development, and recovery; and
- Activities involving both parent and child, such as visiting the children's section of the San Francisco Public Library, the San Francisco Botanical Garden, and the Zeum: San Francisco's Children's Museum.

We will plan at least two activities per month. Women's participation in all activities will be strongly encouraged and incentivized; our expectation is that 90% of women (approximately 135) accessing services through the With Open Arms initiative will participate in at least one activity, and that 75% (approximately 112) will participate in multiple activities over the course of a one year grant period.

IV. List the results/outcomes to be achieved by your project. Specify how the program activities listed above will improve the lives of people served. Examples include: obtain GED, became employed, no recidivism, stable housing, rights restored (10-12 lines)

The goals of the Mentoring and Enrichment component of the With Open Arms initiative include and exceed reducing recidivism rates for women on parole in San Francisco. According to a study entitled "Mentoring Ex-Prisoners in the Ready4Work Reentry Initiative," formerly incarcerated people receiving mentoring remained in the Ready4Work program longer (10.2 months versus 7.2 months); were 60 percent less likely to leave the program the following month; and were twice as likely to obtain a job (Public/Private Ventures, 2007). Thus, one major anticipated outcome of the Mentoring and Enrichment component is increased utilization of the services provided by With Open Arms initiative. Other anticipated outcomes include securing gainful and meaningful employment; increased rates of enrollment in basic and higher educational programs; increased participation in substance abuse and mental health treatment; and generally improved health and wellbeing of women and their families.

V. Describe your data collection system and evaluation plan for documenting the results to be achieved by your participants (8-10 lines)

The With Open Arms initiative is being evaluated for its impact on reduction in recidivism, effects on health and well being of women and children, and changes in housing and income of women. Several evidence-based practices are being implemented in this collaboration, and we expect to have a robust evaluation through the SF Department of Public Health about the impacts of this collaboration. The Mentoring and Enrichment component will be evaluated for its impact through surveys of women who participate in activities, as well as of women who chose not to participate in activities. Every activity will include a short survey to provide staff with information for continual improvements, and for evaluation at end of grant period. Staff will compile and analyze findings from these surveys, and will report levels of satisfaction with each activity and types of activities. This information will be compared to outcomes for women, including recidivism reduction and attainment of health outcomes, to identify any relationship between participation in activities and outcomes for women.

The Reentry Council is composed of 21 members, including three Mayoral appointees and four individuals appointed by the Board of Supervisors; these appointees are former inmates of the San Francisco County Jail, a California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facility, and/or a United States Bureau of Prison facility. #### Contract 2: Walden Residential Program

Walden House offers residential treatment and re-entry programming for adult female parolees at the Female Offender Treatment and Education Program (FOTEP) on Treasure Island. The program provides a gender-responsive and trauma-informed environment, using evidence based and best practices, that recognize and account for the role that trauma frequently plays in the addictive and criminal histories of female offenders. This specialized treatment approach works with each woman holistically to address her health, emotional, educational, vocational, family, and legal concerns alongside her substance abuse, mental health, and behavioral issues. Women who participate in FOTEP are able to reunite with their children, including in-program residency for some children, which creates valuable opportunities for parenting education, family activities and therapy, and healthy bonding and growth within families. Approximately 30% of FOTEP participants will be paroled to the County of San Francisco and are therefore potential SF DPH Second Chance clients. The total budgeted amount for the FOTEP is \$2,752,181. Of this amount, \$723,457 or 26% has been budgeted as cash match for the SF DPH Second Chance project.



## SEC. 5.1-1. - REENTRY COUNCIL.

The City hereby establishes a Reentry Council ("Council"). Subject to the fiscal and budgetary provisions of the Charter, the Public Defender's Office, the District Attorney's Office, and the Mayor's Office shall each designate one staff member to provide administrative support to the Council.

#### SEC. 5.1-2. - PURPOSE.

(a)

The purpose of the Council is to coordinate local efforts to support adults exiting San Francisco County Jail, San Francisco juvenile justice system out-of-home placements, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facilities, and the United States Federal Bureau of Prison facilities. The Council shall provide the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, the public, and any other appropriate agency with accurate and comprehensive information about programs that serve this population, barriers faced by this population, best practices to meet the needs of this population, and funding sources for programs and practices that address the needs of this population. The Council shall coordinate information sharing, planning, and engagement among all interested private and public stakeholders to the extent permissible under Federal and State law.

(Added by Ord. 215-08, File No. 080564, App. 9/19/2008)

## SEC. 5.1-3. - MEMBERSHIP AND ORGANIZATION.

Members. The Council shall consist of 21 members, seven of whom shall be former inmates in the San Francisco County Jail, a California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation adult facility, and/or a United States Bureau of Prison facility. The Mayor, or his designee, shall serve as a member, and shall also appoint three of these seven members. The Board of Supervisors shall appoint the other four of these members. At least two of these seven members shall have expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system. At least one of these seven members must have been released from custody within two years of his or her appointment; at least one must have served multiple terms, and at least one must be between the ages of 18 to 24 at the time of appointment, All members of the Council shall be exempt from the Charter requirement that they be electors of the City and County of San Francisco.

The following City departments or agencies shall appoint one member each to the Council: the Public Defender's Office, the District Attorney's Office, the Sheriff's Department, the Police Department; the Adult Probation Department, the Juvenile Probation Department of Economic and Workforce Development; the Human Services Agency, and the Department of Public Health. In addition, Council co-chairs shall invite the San Francisco Superior Court, the Department of Child Support Services, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Division of Adult Parole Operations, and the United States Probation and Pretrial Services System to appoint one member each to the Council. If any of these four agencies does not appoint a representative, the Council co-chairs shall appoint an additional member.

Members shall serve two-year terms and shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority. Members may serve multiple terms.

- (b)

  Quorum. Seven members of the Council shall constitute a quorum, and the Council shall have the authority to act on the vote of the majority of the quorum.
- Officers. The three members appointed by the District Attorney's Office, the Public Defender's Office, and the Sheriff's Department, respectively, as well as the Mayor or the Mayor's representative, shall co-chair the Council.
- Subcommittees. The Council may establish subcommittees to be convened as directed by the Council. The Council's co-chairs shall appoint members to the subcommittees. Subcommittees shall report findings and make recommendations to the full Council for their consideration. The membership of these subcommittees shall be open to non-members of the Council who shall be drawn from a range of diverse experiences, identities, and interests related to the issue of reentry.
- (e) Meeting Frequency. The Council shall meet in full at least three times per year.

**(f)** 

Roles of Council Members. Each member of the Council shall retain his or her official authority and duties granted under State law. In adopting this legislation, the Board of Supervisors recognizes that each member of the Council retains his or her authority and duties under State law and that where conflicts may arise out of members' dual roles. State powers and duties shall supersede the duties that the ordinance creating the council impose on Council members.

#### SEC. 5.1-4. - POWERS AND DUTIES.

The Council shall have the following powers and duties:

(a)

Identifying Funding Streams. The Council shall identify funding at the local, State, and Federal level that is earmarked or available for services or programs designed to serve individuals exiting the criminal justice system. In addition, the Council shall identify conditions, restrictions, or limitations on each funding stream, and shall document these findings in its reports to the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, and other appropriate entities consistent with subsection (d) below.

(b)

Identifying Programs Serving Individuals Exiting the Criminal Justice System. The Council shall identify programs serving individuals exiting the criminal justice system who reside in San Francisco or who will be released to San Francisco, including program capacity.

(c)

identifying Needs of Reentry Population. The Council shall identify any unmet needs of this population, and propose ways to meet those needs based on existing research and best practices.

(d)

Identifying Barriers. The Council shall also identify barriers to safe and successful reentry presented by local, State, and Federal law, and propose ways to reduce the impact of these barriers.

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Reports. At least once a year, the Council shall prepare and submit a report that shall include but not be limited to information required under subsections (a), (b), (c), and (d) above. City departments shall respond within 30 days to reasonable requests for information submitted by the Council relevant to its ability to discharge its powers and duties under this Chapter, provided that the disclosure of such information shall not be required where it would violate Federal or State law. The Council shall provide the reports to: 1) the Mayor, 2) the Board of Supervisors, 3) any City department or program identified by the Council in a report; and 4) the public. These reports shall be public documents. Any City department identified in a report may provide a response, within 30 days of issuance of the report, for inclusion into the final report submitted to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors, among others, consistent with this subsection.

(f)

Retaliation Prohibited. No City officer or employee may retaliate against other City staff or the staff of programs identified by the Council for cooperating with the Council or for participating in any activity involving the Council. This section is not intended to create a private right of action against the City and County of San Francisco.

#### SEC. 5.1-5. - ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENT.

The Council shall monitor the attendance of Council members. In the event that any Council member misses two regularly scheduled Council meetings in a twelve-month period without prior notice to the Council, the Council shall certify that fact in writing to the appointing authority, and the member shall be deemed to have resigned from the Council on the date of such certification. The Council shall request the appointing authority to appoint a new member. The appointing authority shall appoint a successor to the resigned member not later than 60 days after the date of the certification of resignation.

#### SEC. 5.1-6. - SUNSET CLAUSE.

This legislation shall expire June 1, 2011, unless the Board of Supervisors adopts an ordinance continuing its existence. The Council shall submit a report to the Board of Supervisors no fewer than six months prior to the expiration date recommending whether the Council should continue to operate, and if so, whether the Board of Supervisors shall consider legislative changes that would enhance the capacity of the Council to achieve the goals that the ordinance creating the council identifies, amendments that further the Council's goals. The Council's recommendations shall include drafts of ordinances that would implement its recommendations.
