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ATTACHMENT 1: Organizational Background

Date organization was incorporated. 1932

Mission/purpose of your organization:

The San Francisco Arts Commission (SFAC) is the public agency that serves all the arts and cultural needs of San Francisco's residents and visitors. The mission is: SFAC is the City agency that champions the arts in San Francisco. Believing that a creative cultural environment is essential to the City's well-being, our programs integrate the arts into all aspects of civic life. The agency's core values are anchored to all residents having equal access to arts experiences in all disciplines, that programs are provided evenly throughout the City, and that they are innovative and of the highest quality.

Organization overview:

- a. The SFAC has seven major programs: Public Art Program (one of the nation's leading programs commissioning artwork for public works projects); Community Arts & Education (including the Arts Education Program, four neighborhood cultural centers, and WritersCorps, a program that grew out of an NEA partnership 15 years ago); Cultural Equity Grants (a program that last year granted more than \$2 million to small and mid-sized multicultural artists and organizations); SFAC Gallery (presents year-round exhibitions and educational programs in three publicly accessible spaces in Civic Center); Civic Design Review (a panel that approves all San Francisco public building and landscape designs); Civic Art Collections (containing more than 3,000 objects, including monuments and contemporary public art, worth more than \$80 million); Street Artists Program (administering licenses for hundreds of local artists selling their wares citywide); Summer & the Symphony (an SF Symphony collaboration providing free and low-cost musical events).
- b. Previous activities. The SFAC has over 40 years of experience working with prominent artists on permanent and temporary installations in civic outdoor spaces and historic buildings. In the past two years alone, Louise Bourgeois' monumental "Crouching Spider" was installed along the San Francisco waterfront, and more recently, eight Manolo Valdés sculptures were installed in Civic Center Plaza, the same location intended for the Zhang Huan sculpture. The proposed project will have a significant impact on San Francisco and the contemporary art world (based on the venue and the number of people who will experience it). Part of the citywide Shanghai Sister City Celebration, it will be an exciting banner event for this agency. It is an important though manageable activity for the year, comparable to recent temporary public art installations of works by internationally acclaimed artists.
- c. Community/region/audience: San Francisco is one of the most diverse cities in the country. It is home to more than 750,000 Chinese, Hispanics, African Americans, European-Americans, Filipinos, Japanese, Samoans, Asian Indians, American Indians, Middle Easterners, Vietnamese, Koreans, other Asian Americans, and bi- and multiracial people of all ages. It is also a City of great income disparity, containing a high concentration of both wealth and poverty, with the per capita income of \$34,946 with 11% of the population living below the national poverty level.
- d. Special efforts: At the heart of this project is the goal to reach the broadest possible audience. Set in an outdoor public venue, the Zhang Huan sculptural installation will be experienced by more than one million people, in addition to those who are visiting San Francisco for the Shanghai Sister City events—and all for free. This includes tourists, school children, Civic Center and City Hall workers, residents and those with a keen interest in experiencing the monumental work of this internationally celebrated artist.

Art Museum, SFMOMA, SF Main Library, Park & Recreation Department, the Sister Cities Committee, SF Convention and Visitors Bureau, PaceWildenstein Gallery and funders. We also hope to work with a local collector of Zhang Huan's work, and international curators of contemporary Chinese art with local ties (including Hu Hanru, Okwui Enzor and Jens Hoffman).

e) The target population:

The target audience for this project is every person who navigates around Civic Center Plaza. More than 21,200 individuals are inside City Hall (the main building in the plaza) each month, and the Shanghai exhibition at the Asian Art Museum will draw more visitors to the area. We anticipate at least one million people experiencing this work. This audience will be as diverse as the City itself, if not more so, since so many tourists will visit the artwork.

f) Plans for promoting, publicizing, and/or disseminating: Promotion and publicity efforts will begin four months prior to the artwork's installation. The project staff, in conjunction with the Shanghai Sister Cities Committee and the Asian Art Museum, will develop marketing materials and press releases once the project is underway. The SFAC also plans on documenting the installation of the work, and inviting local media outlets (KQED's Spark program; network affiliates) to air the installation (a fascinating feat of engineering itself). A color brochure will be printed in tandem with the exhibition and will be distributed through SFAC's extensive mailing lists and additional outlets within City Hall, through local, national and international traditional and new media outlets. The SFAC is confident that this high-profile installation will draw significant interest from all media sectors including Art in America, ArtWeek, ArtForum, New York Times, Sculpture, Frieze, ArtPapers, Contemporary, Wallpaper, and the on-line publication Shotgun Review. Additionally, the Asian Art Museum is spearheading and coordinating communications for all Shanghai Sister City events, and this project will appear in their print and online calendars. Three Legged Buddha will also be featured on the SFAC's cable program "CultureWire".

g) Plans for monitoring: Press coverage as well as lecture and public program attendance will all help indicate the success

of the installation and the public's receptivity to it. The SFAC website will also offer a means to comment on the installation online.

h) Plans for making the project accessible:

The SFAC and City-based programs are required to be fully accessible to individuals with disabilities. The Arts Commission works regularly with the Mayor's Office of Disability to ensure the most advanced technologies and applications are used to maximize access for all. This includes physical accessibility, and resources for the visually impaired, such as large-print documents. For any and all sculptures in a public venue, the SFAC installs textured pavers in the ground around them. This fully accessible artwork will be a wonderful follow-up to the SFMOMA 2008 exhibition, "Half-Life of a Dream", that included Zhang Huan's work.

i) Budget:

High-profile, temporary public art installations have become a staple of the SFAC workload. We will be aggressively pursuing all fundraising possibilities in order to realize this project, and will likely scale back promotional materials if the majority of this NEA request is not awarded, seek in-kind support where possible, and additional underwriting from project partners and individual donors for the educational components of the project.

While the Arts Commission's budget is not changing 15% or more from year to year, the reasons for the 9-10% decrease in income and expenses are related primarily to the decrease in allocation to our local arts agency from the City's Hotel Tax Fund, General Fund and other fee-for-service work orders from other City agencies. This agency was successful in making a case to City officials that the arts are an critical economic engine for San Francisco, and was therefore able to mitigate more significant proposed cuts for FY 2010 (up to 25% for certain allocations); by continuing to support this agency to the maximum extent possible, the City will see a continued revenue stream from tourists and visitors, and this project, as part of the 2010 Shanghai Sister City Program, will aptly demonstrate that positive economic impact. Fundraising and earned income efforts will become more aggressive as well, though estimates for generated funds remain conservative.

ATTACHMENT 5: Biographies of Key Personnel

Zhang Huan, Artist

Zhang Huan was born in 1965 in the rural province of Henan, China during the Cultural Revolution. He studied European painting at the Nan University and later undertook post graduate study in painting at Beijing's Central Academy. While there, he moved to the city's East Village, where he was influenced by the community of experimental avant garde artists. He became well-known for his controversial performance art addressing relationships between physical endurance and spiritual tranquility. He consequently abandoned painting and graduated from the Academy in 1993, despite having his final submission, an installation and performance on female infanticide, rejected.

Zhang Huan is a leading figure among second generation Chinese performance artists rising to prominence in the wake of political unrest culminating in the Tiananmen Square massacres. His work addresses trauma: the aftermath of shock, suffering and pain and is expressed both as a personal comment concerning his own and his family's histories and as a collective response, articulating, for example, China's emergence from the Cultural Revolution and oppression.

Zhang's performance work takes both solo and group forms. Much of the work performed alone involves some type of bodily mortification, referencing the practices of Buddhist asceticism and Christian sacrifice. Suffering is used as a means to transcendence. In 2006, Zhang moved back to China from New York (where he spent several years), turned his attention away from performance, set up a studio in Shanghai and started a new phase in his career. Turning to sculpture, painting, and installation art, he renewed his commitment to Chinese heritage and history. In fact, numerous curators believe that transition point in Zhang's art practice parallels his return to China. In 2007, the Asia Society in New York presented their first-ever retrospective of the work of a living artist, "Altered States: Zhang Huan". According to The New Criterion (December 2008 issue), "After a decade and a half of privations, Zhang has become a giant himself, one of the artistic titans of new Chinese economy."

Luis Cancel, Director of Cultural Affairs, San Francisco Arts Commission

Mr. Cancel has a distinguished 25-year career in the arts and public service. He was the first Latino to lead New York City's Department of Cultural Affairs, and directed the Bronx Museum of Art for 14 years. Most recently, he was Executive Director of the Clemente Soto Vélez Cultural & Educational Center in New York City where he raised millions of dollars and expanded the center's profile. Mr. Cancel has been a guest lecturer at several prestigious national and international museums and universities including Yale, Harvard, Princeton and Central University of Caracas. He has a wealth of art and curatorial experience, including researching Latin American art as a National Endowment for the Arts fellow. He has been at the forefront of urging cultural organizations to utilize the internet and new media to reach new audiences. He holds Master of Arts degrees in Museum Management/Arts Administration from New York University and in Public Administration from Harvard University.

Jill Manton, Director of Programs, San Francisco Arts Commission

Jill Manton's accomplishments at the Arts Commission include the initiation of the Art on Market Street Program, and the revision of San Francisco's percent for art legislation in 1996, which resulted in an expansion of the kinds of construction projects that are eligible for public art. She has been working to expand public art legislation to include percent-for-art measures for private developments and digital signage. She has been Program Director of Public Art Program since 1990 and was appointed to her current position in 2009. Jill was the recipient of the Public Managerial Excellence Award in 1997 from the Mayor's Fiscal Advisory Committee. With over 20 years in the public art field, Jill serves as an elected member of the national council of the Public Art Network, serving on the Advisory Board for the Public Art Review.

Susan Pontious, Public Art Program Director, San Francisco Arts Commission
Susan Pontious received her MA from UC Irvine and her MFA in Painting from the University
of Massachusetts at Amherst. She began her career in public art as an artist on a mural project,
where she was inspired by the work being incorporated into the life of a community. She has
served as the Executive Director of Public Art Works, an independent nonprofit agency that
sponsored temporary and permanent public art projects in Marin County, and on the Public Art
Advisory Boards for the City of Oakland and Alameda County. She currently serves on the
Advisory Boards for the Bedford Gallery and Public Art Program in Walnut Creek.

Kate Patterson, Public Art Program Manager, San Francisco Arts Commission
Kate Patterson received her BA in Art History from Smith College in 2000. Prior to joining the Arts Commission, Kate was Manager of Public Relations & Marketing at the Contemporary Jewish Museum in San Francisco. From 2003 to 2005, she was the Marketing & Sales Manager at Acoustiguide Inc., a leading interpretive audio and multimedia tour company. She has also interned at the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum, South Street Seaport Museum, the Vorpal Gallery and the San Francisco Arts Commission Gallery.

Mary Chou, Public Art Program Associate, San Francisco Arts Commission
Mary Chou earned a BA in Art History and Business Administration from the University of
California, Berkeley in 1999, and an MA in Modern Art and Curatorial Studies, with an
emphasis in public art, from Columbia University in 2003. She has interned at the Museum of
Modern Art in New York, the Whitney Museum of American Art, Art:21, and the Public Art
Fund. She has worked at the Asia Society Museum as a coordinator of interpretive materials and
as a freelance editor, and contributed biographies to Grove Art Online.

Rachelle Axel, Development Director, San Francisco Arts Commission
Before becoming the Development Director at SFAC in March 2007, Ms. Axel was the Arts
Education Officer at this agency for 6 ½ years, serving as AEFC Project Director and the
Membership Chair for the Arts Providers Alliance of San Francisco. She also helped launch and
develop in partnership with the SFUSD the Arts Education Master Plan. Ms. Axel served for 2 ½
years as the Director of Development and Communication for Youth Radio, a youth
development and media production agency. She was responsible for all fundraising activities,
managed media relations, served as liaison to the Board's Executive committee and oversaw
strategic long-range planning and evaluation. Ms. Axel was founder and president of Equal
Access, an independent consulting firm providing organizational development and strategic
planning, community-based economic and youth development services, grantwriting and project
development for arts, arts education and youth agencies.



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


The San Francisco Arts Commission seeks to bring to its Civic Center for the Shanghai Sister City Festival "Three Legged Buddha" (2007). The piece depicts the bottom half and partial head of a three-legged Buddha. Two of the legs are supported by posts and the third rests on the top half of Buddha's head. The arch-like structure stands at 28' tall, allowing visitors to walk underneath it. The sculpture is made of welded copper panels and is supported by a steel inner frame. 
