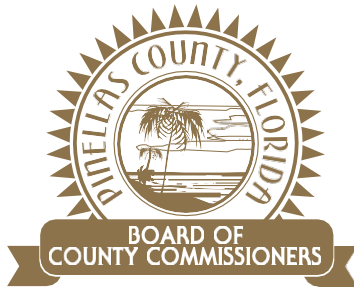

I write not only as a minister, but as one who has had the sacred privilege of witnessing Michael’s journey over these past several years. I have seen him move from vulnerability to stability, from surviving to serving, from needing care to becoming a powerful source of care for others. That kind of journey carries its own authority.
