1	[Hosting Panda Bears at the San Francisco Zoo - Behested Payment Waiver]
2	
3	Resolution authorizing the Office of the Mayor, Recreation and Park Department, Office
4	of Economic and Workforce Development, San Francisco International Airport, Office
5	of the City Administrator, and the Chief of Protocol to solicit donations from various
6	private entities and organizations to support San Francisco in hosting Panda Bears
7	from the People's Republic of China, notwithstanding the Behested Payment
8	Ordinance.
9	
10	WHEREAS, San Francisco hosted the 30th Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation
11	("APEC") Leaders' Summit, in November, 2023, attended by President Biden and various
12	heads of state from the Pacific Rim; and
13	WHEREAS, APEC showcased San Francisco as a global leader in trade, innovation
14	and culture, highlighted San Francisco's position as a gateway to Asia, and celebrated San
15	Francisco's deep ties to the region, particularly through its Chinese community, as reflected in
16	San Francisco's Chinatown, one of the world's largest and the first in North America; and
17	WHEREAS, APEC was the largest international summit held in San Francisco since
18	the signing of the United Nations Charter in 1945 and provided a forum for President Biden to
19	hold a historic bilateral meeting with President Xi Jinping of the People's Republic of China
20	where they had a constructive discussion on a range of global issues including cooperating on
21	trade, combating drug trafficking and tackling climate change; and
22	WHEREAS, Right after that meeting President Xi publicly discussed reviving the
23	tradition of "Panda Diplomacy" by sending new Giant Pandas to the United States, particularly
24	California, calling them "envoys of friendship between the Chinese and American peoples"
25	and stating "[w]e are ready to continue our cooperation with the United States on panda

conservation, and do our best to meet the wishes of the Californians so as to deepen the
 friendly ties between our two peoples;" and

WHEREAS, The following day President Xi said in a speech to leaders of San
Francisco's business community, "[t]he hope of the China-U.S. relationship lies in the people,
its foundation is in our societies, its future depends on the youth, and its vitality comes from
exchanges at subnational levels ... I also hope that California and San Francisco will continue
to take the lead on the journey of growing China-U.S. friendship;" and

8 WHEREAS, Mayor London Breed wished President Xi farewell at SFO before he
9 departed APEC and proposed a partnership in which the San Francisco Zoo would host Giant
10 Pandas from China; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Breed sent letters to President Xi following up on this proposal,
including a letter co-signed by over 70 San Francisco Chinese American and API leaders,
including City Administrator Carmen Chu and City Attorney David Chiu, stating "we stand
ready to welcome pandas to our San Francisco Zoo" and received a letter from Chinese
Ambassador Xie Feng, stating "Let's keep in close contact in this regard ... and hopefully we
will see an early arrival of giant pandas in San Francisco;" and

17 WHEREAS, Mayor Breed traveled to China on April 13 with a delegation of San 18 Francisco API business and community leaders and officials, including Administrator Chu and President of the Airport Commission Malcolm Yeung, and embarked on a multi-city tour 19 20 meeting with various Chinese government officials and business leaders to strengthen 21 economic and cultural ties, expand tourism between the nations, increase Chinese airline routes to San Francisco, build academic partnerships and celebrate the 45th anniversary of 22 23 the San Francisco-Shanghai Sister City relationship; and 24 WHEREAS, On April 19, the China National Forestry and Grassland Administration 25 (NFGA) and the China Wildlife Conservation Association (CWCA) met with Mayor Breed in

1 Beijing to announce that the San Francisco Zoo had been selected to receive Giant Pandas

as part of China's Panda Diplomacy Program; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Breed and the CWCA signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) setting forth that the CWCA and the San Francisco Zoo agreed to cooperate on the international conservation of Giant Pandas and jointly promote the preparations for this project, the zoo agreed to prepare a panda facility building, food supply, the technical expertise and the personnel capability necessary to host the pandas and the CWCA agreed to provide guidance to the zoo in these efforts; and

9 WHEREAS, The MOU sets forth that once the zoo completes these preparations and
10 the parties execute a final cooperation agreement, the CWCA will send a pair of Giant Pandas
11 to the zoo in 2025; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco has a rich history with pandas, with the very first pandas in
 the United States having stopped in San Francisco in 1936 as part of an expedition led by
 explorer Ruth Harkness; and

WHEREAS, In 1984, two pandas named Yun Yun and Ying Xin visited the San
Francisco Zoo for three months, drawing more than 260,000 visitors, roughly four times the
average attendance at that time and the busiest months the zoo has ever experienced, and
the pandas visited the zoo again in 1985; and

WHEREAS, The City and County owns the San Francisco Zoo and contracts with the
 nonprofit San Francisco Zoological Society (SFZS) to operate the zoo, which is home to over
 2,000 exotic, endangered and rescued animals, representing more than 250 species; and
 WHEREAS, In October 2013, the Shanghai Zoological Park and SFZS signed a
 Memorandum of Understanding to establish a "sister zoo relationship" to promote "bilateral
 cooperation in global biodiversity conservation, regional wildlife protection techniques, and
 conservation education" and in July 2014, SFZS Executive Director, Tanya Peterson, visited

Chengdu, China and its Giant Panda Breeding Research Foundation to support its breeding
 and research programs; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Zoo recently created an Asian conservation zone,
which was specifically designed to contain a space for a panda enclosure and which hosts
other species indigenous to Asia; and

6 WHEREAS, The San Francisco Zoo has begun preliminary planning for the 7 construction of a panda enclosure, representatives from the zoo and the China NFGA have 8 been discussing facilities and operations to host pandas, including during visits by engineers 9 from China to the zoo in December and April, and that the NFGA and CWCA will send a 10 delegation from Beijing to San Francisco in May to further engage on the preparations for the 11 zoo to accommodate the pandas; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco and China have built a special cultural and economic
 relationship through generations of immigration from the beginning of the City's history and

14 reflected today in the over one fifth of San Franciscans with Chinese roots; and

15 WHEREAS, China is the leading country for visitor spending in San Francisco,

16 contributing \$633.4 million and furthering the City's economic recovery following the decline in

tourism during the COVID-19 pandemic, and, in the months since APEC, passenger flights

18 between China and San Francisco increased to nine weekly flights between Beijing and San

19 Francisco and daily flights between Shanghai and San Francisco; and

WHEREAS, Pandas live in the wild only in China, have historically served as a national symbol of China and the provision of pandas to other nations in Asia and the West has been an important marker of cultural exchange between China and such nations in the tradition known as Panda Diplomacy; and

24 WHEREAS, While once considered endangered, the number of pandas has increased 25 in the wild through decades of conservation efforts, including partnerships between zoos in 1 China and zoos in other nations to host pandas and expand research and awareness of

2 panda biology, behavior, reproduction, health and habitat, resulting in pandas being upgraded

3 to the status of a conservation-reliant vulnerable species, and

- WHEREAS, Pandas are frequently the most popular attractions at the zoos that hostthem; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Hosting pandas on a long-term basis will be of significant importance to
 7 San Francisco's local Chinese and API communities and will provide a major boost to San
 8 Francisco's tourism attractions and offerings; and

9 WHEREAS, San Francisco is prepared to accept the honor of hosting pandas from
10 China to further strengthen the bonds between the people of San Francisco and the people of

11 China, to enhance relations between China and the United States and to partner in panda

12 conservation; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Zoo has engaged in extensive preparations to host the pandas and the Office of the Mayor, Recreation and Parks Department (RPD), San Francisco International Airport (SFO), Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD), Office of the City Administrator, and San Francisco Chief of Protocol and War Memorial Trustee Maryam Muduroglu stand ready to assist in fundraising efforts to complete those preparations and cover the costs of hosting the pandas; and

WHEREAS, These departments seek to work with RPD lessee SFZS on these efforts
 to fundraise from philanthropists and other private entities, such as airlines, that may already
 partner with the City on various programs; and

22 WHEREAS, The Office of the Mayor, RPD, SFO, OEWD, the Office of the City

Administrator, and Chief of Protocol Muduroglu seek a waiver of the City's Behested Payment

24 Ordinance (Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code, Section 3.600 et seq.) to the extent

25

1 it restricts soliciting financial support or in-kind goods or services, from persons or entities that 2 would otherwise be considered interested parties to those departments; now, therefore, be it 3 RESOLVED, That under Section 3.620(f) of the Campaign and Governmental Conduct 4 Code, the Board of Supervisors hereby waives application of the Behested Payment 5 Ordinance as to the Mayor, Chief of Protocol, City Administrator Chu, officers and employees 6 of the Office of the Mayor, officers and employees of the Office of the City Administrator, 7 officers and employees of OEWD, officers and employees of RPD, Recreation and Parks 8 Commissioners, officers and employees of SFO, and Airport Commissioners so that they may 9 solicit donations from private entities and philanthropists to support the City's efforts to host 10 pandas; and, be it 11 FURTHER RESOLVED, That granting this waiver serves the public interest by 12 promoting the relationship between San Francisco and China and boosting tourism and San 13 Francisco's continued economic recovery; and, be it 14 FURTHER RESOLVED, That granting this waiver does not create an appearance of 15 impropriety. 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25

Letter of Intent

for the International Conservation Cooperation of Giant Pandas

Party A: China Wildlife Conservation Association

Party B: San Francisco Zoological Society & Gardens, the United States

Through friendly consultation, both parties have reached the following cooperation intentions on the international conservation of giant pandas:

1. The parties agree to conduct the international conservation cooperation of giant pandas.

2. The parties shall support each other to jointly promote the preliminary preparation for the cooperative project.

Party A shall guide Party B to make full preparation for the giant panda facility building, food supply, technical expertise and personnel capability necessary to conduct the cooperative project. After the conditions for cooperation are met, Party A will send a pair of giant pandas to Party B.

Party B shall develop relevant plans and programs and implement them in a systematic manner according to the cooperation conditions stipulated by Party A.

3. As Party A and Party B promote the preliminary preparation of the cooperative project, the two parties shall actively negotiate on the cooperative agreement text and seek to officially sign the agreement as soon as possible to ensure to send a pair of giant pandas to San Francisco Zoological Society & Gardens in 2025.

4. This letter of intent is a preliminary consensus reached by both parties on cooperation. The specific cooperation content is subject to the formal cooperative agreement signed by both parties.
