PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project is to install mosaic tiled steps, a mural, and a garden habitat on and adjacent to a City-owned public stairway on 16th Avenue between Kirkham and Lawton Streets. The stairway is currently unadorned concrete. The project is a cooperative effort between the Department of Public Works' Street Parks Program, the San Francisco Parks Alliance, and the local community.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

On December 28, 2012, the Environmental Planning Section of the Planning Department determined that the proposed project are Categorically Exempt from Environmental Review under CEQA Class 1(c) as an existing pedestrian trail and Class 4(e) as a minor temporary use of land having negligible or no permanent effects on the environment.

GENERAL PLAN COMPLIANCE AND BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION

ARTS ELEMENT

POLICY I-1.1

Promote inclusion of artistic considerations in local decision-making.

Comment: Through the mosaic and mural, the proposed improvements incorporate artistic considerations into the decision on how to improve the public stairway on 16th Avenue.

POLICY I-1.4

Provide access to the creative process and cultural resources for all neighborhoods, cultural communities, and segments of the city and its populations.

Comment: This proposed project provides a creative process and cultural resources to this part of the Inner Sunset.

POLICY III-1.5

Include the participation of artists in City capital improvements and public works projects which do not fall under current Percent for Art programs.

Comment: The proposed improvements are being designed by local artists, and are outside of current Percent for Art programs.

POLICY V-2.2

Determine the means of providing in-kind resources and services to the arts.

Comment: The contribution of the Department of Public Works to implementing this project reflects an in-kind contribution by the City to the arts.

POLICY V-3.1

Develop partnerships with the private sector and the business community to encourage monetary and non-monetary support of the arts, as well as sponsorships of arts organizations and events.

Comment: The project reflects a partnership between the City and the private sector for both monetary and non-monetary support of the arts.

Eight General Plan Priority Policies Findings

The subject project is found to be consistent with the Eight Priority Policies of Planning Code Section 101.1 in that:

- That existing neighborhood-serving retail uses be preserved and enhanced and future opportunities for resident employment in and ownership of such businesses enhanced. The project will not affect existing neighborhood-serving retail uses or opportunities for employment in or ownership of such businesses.
- 2. That existing housing and neighborhood character be conserved and protected in order to preserve the cultural and economic diversity of our neighborhood.
