POPULATIONS, AND DIRECTING THE CLERK OF THE BOARD TO FORWARD A COPY

OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE CITY'S LOBBYIST IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

WHEREAS, The decennial census conducted by the U.S. Bureau of Census is mandated by the U.S. Constitution for the purpose of political reapportionment and the next count will be taken on April 1, 2000; and,

WHEREAS, The U.S. Congress has enacted federal laws and programs that rely on an accurate population count and socioeconomic information to allocate federal funds for numerous education, transportation, social service, and other programs; and,

WHEREAS, The United States Congress is currently considering legislation to fund and implement the 2000 Census; and,

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco relies on census data for planning decisions and allocating government funds; and,

SUPERVISOR, TENG, KATZ, BIERMAN, BECERRIL, NEWSOM, YAKI BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

WHEREAS, The 1990 Census failed to count over 837,000 people in California, resulting in the loss of at least one Congressional seat and over a hundred million dollars in federal funding; and,

WHEREAS, The 1990 Census missed almost 22,000 San Francisco residents, about 3% of the City's population; and,

WHEREAS, The undercount in the 1990 Census resulted in San Francisco receiving significantly less federal funding for a wide range of programs that benefit San Francisco residents; and,

WHEREAS, The number of San Francisco children missed in the 1990 census would fill nine additional public schools; and,

WHEREAS, San Francisco has large populations that have been historically undercounted by the Bureau; and,

WHEREAS, Women, children, the poor, the homeless, the elderly, and especially recent immigrants have been historically undercounted; and,

WHEREAS, Experience from other jurisdictions has demonstrated that reducing the undercount requires a coordinated effort by local government agencies, community agencies, community-based organizations, and the media; and,

WHEREAS, A San Francisco Census 2000 Complete Count Committee was convened by Mayor Brown and Supervisor Teng consisting of all City agencies; and,

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Census 2000 Complete Count Committee is conducting broad outreach to all communities to ensure a diverse

and inclusive group to join and participate in the effort to count all San Franciscans in the 2000 Census; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges Congress, President Bill Clinton, and the U.S. Bureau of Census to develop an implementation plan for Census 2000 that will ensure the most accurate decennial census possible, including plans to measure and correct any identified undercounts of the general population; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisor of the City and County of San Francisco urges Congress to appropriate adequate funding for local governments and community-based organizations to provide outreach to the difficult-to-count populations in their communities; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the Bureau of Census to spend a significant portion of its marketing and advertising budget to target low-income communities, people of color, limited-English proficient individuals, and other difficult-to-count populations; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco directs the Clerk of the Board to forward a copy of this resolution to the City's Lobbyist in Washington, D.C.
