Under this contract, the university of Massachusetts will provide our population health division staff and other internal stakeholders access to this portal at a cost of \$15,000 per year.

Ordinance amending the Planning Code to modify density limits in the Northeast Waterfront Historic District, the Jackson Square Historic District, and the Jackson Square Historic District Extension, except for projects in those areas using the Commercial to Residential Adaptive Reuse Program; affirming the Planning Commission's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act; making public necessity, convenience, and welfare findings under Planning Code, Section 302; and making findings of consistency with the General Plan, and the eight priority policies of Planning Code, Section 101.1.

President Peskin and Members of the Board of Supervisors:

I submit my veto of File Number 231079, the ordinance to reinstate density limits in certain districts in San Francisco.

In July of last year, I signed a law unanimously approved by the Board of Supervisors that made changes to support the creation of more homes in San Francisco, including by allowing for increased density without changing height limits. Now, this new ordinance will reverse some of those changes by adding back arbitrary density limits. We need to move forward, not backward.

Restricting new housing runs counter to the goals of our Housing Element, which the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved just over a year ago. It also runs counter to what we need to do to make this City a place that creates opportunities for new homes for the people who need them today and for future generations growing up in San Francisco.

This ordinance passes off anti-housing policy in the guise of historic protections. Existing rules already protect against impacts to historic resources. I believe we can add new homes while also supporting and improving the vibrancy of our unique neighborhoods. Many areas of San Francisco, including eastern neighborhoods like the South of Market, Potrero Hill, and the Mission, have also already removed density limits to encourage new housing.

The Board of Supervisors has duplicated this in committee to allow continued work on this proposal. While I am vetoing this legislation in its current form, I do encourage that work to continue as part of our efforts to make San Francisco a more affordable and inclusive city.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. Environmental and Land Use Findings

Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 231079 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms this determination.

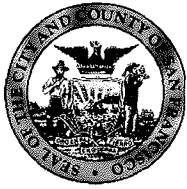

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City Ordinance 202-19 delegated authority to the MOHCD Director to enter into the following agreements under Chapter 120 of the Administrative Code.

- Loans or grants that do not exceed \$10M under Homeownership, Multifamily or Acquisition Programs
- Local Operating Subsidy Program (LOSP) grants subject to annual appropriation by the Board of Supervisors
- Emergency life/safety loans exceeding \$10M subject to availability of funds and notification to the Mayor and Board of Supervisors

The Ordinance requires the Director to report annually to the Board of Supervisors with a summary of all loans and grants made under Chapter 120. Enclosed is the summary for fiscal years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023.

MOHCD is pleased to report that during this reporting period, the department closed on nearly 250 loans or grants to support 100% affordable housing projects, public housing redevelopment, and first-time homebuyers, including first responders and educators. Delegated authority enables the department to deliver funding expediently for affordable housing while maintaining long-term affordability restrictions.

The City and County of San Francisco uses the following methodology to determine compliance: Compliance is pre-trade and calculated on a book value basis of the overall portfolio value. Cash balances are included in the City's compliance calculations.

Please note the information in this report does not include cash balances. Due to fluctuations in the market value of the securities held in the Pooled Fund and changes in the City's cash position, the allocation limits may be exceeded on a post-trade compliance basis. In these instances, no compliance violation has occurred, as the policy limits were not exceeded prior to trade execution. Government Code Section 65400 and 65700 mandates that all cities and counties submit an annual report on the status of the General Plan and progress in its implementation to their legislative bodies, the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) and Housing and Community Development (HCD) by April 1 of each year. State law further requires that all cities and counties submit an annual report on the community's progress toward implementing their Housing Element. The attached General Plan APR does not include the required information on progress toward implementing the Housing Element. This information can be found in the 2023 Housing Element APR, which will be transmitted separately.

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## Introduction

### About the General Plan

California Government Code Section 65300 mandates that each planning agency prepare, and the legislative body shall adopt a General Plan for guiding physical change in the City. Chartered cities must include specific elements in the General Plan, as listed in Government Code Section 65302<sup>1</sup>. San Francisco's first General Plan was adopted by the Planning Commission in 1945 as the embodiment of San Francisco's vision for the future. The General Plan is intended to serve as a living document in "the first step in the continuous process of planning,"<sup>2</sup> and provides a comprehensive set of objectives and policies that influence how we live, work, and move about, as well as the quality and character of the City.

The San Francisco General Plan includes objectives and policies in a series of Elements and Area Plans. Each Element addresses a particular topic and applies citywide, while Area Plans make policies found in the Elements more precise as they relate to specific parts of the city. The San Francisco City Charter<sup>3</sup> requires the Planning Commission to update the General Plan from time to time through the process of amendments and referrals.

### About the Annual Progress Report

Government Code Section 65400 and 65700 mandates that all cities and counties submit an annual report on the status of the General Plan and progress in its implementation to their legislative bodies, the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) and Housing and Community Development (HCD) by April 1 of each year. The General Plan Annual Progress Report (APR) provides local legislative bodies and the public with information regarding the implementation of the General Plan for the City.

This 2023 General Plan APR covers the period from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023.

This General Plan APR does not describe San Francisco's progress toward implementing the Housing Element. This information can be found in the 2023 Housing Element APR, which will be submitted to HCD by April 1, 2024.

# **General Plan Amendments and Updates**

## **Housing Element**

The San Francisco Planning Department updated the Housing Element of the General Plan in 2022, and it was adopted by the Board of Supervisors in January 2023. The update was the City’s first Housing Element centering racial and social equity in its policies while addressing state mandated goals of Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing, ensuring sufficient sites and zoning to meet larger RHNA requirements, removing constraints to housing development, maintenance, and improvement, and incorporating policies on environmental justice, as identified in the Environmental Justice Framework (see below). The Housing Element includes Implementing Programs consisting of over 350 actions the City is undertaking or intends to undertake to implement the Housing Element’s policies and achieve its goals and objectives. See the 2023 Housing Element APR for further details.

## **Introduction**

The Planning Department updated the Introduction to the General Plan. The Introduction now acknowledges the original inhabitants of San Francisco, distills themes from recent long-range planning efforts, and incorporates by reference the Environmental Justice Framework. The updated Introduction was adopted by the Board of Supervisors in March 2023.

## **Environmental Justice Framework**

The Planning Department developed an Environmental Justice Framework (“Framework”) which sets priorities to integrate environmental justice considerations throughout the General Plan. Rather than a standalone Environmental Justice Element, the Framework was incorporated by reference into the General Plan Introduction. The Framework was developed in accordance with SB 1000 requirements and OPR’s General Plan Guidelines, and in strong alignment with citywide racial and social equity goals. These priorities guided the development of environmental justice objectives and policies in the Safety and Resilience Element (adopted in 2022) and the update to the Housing Element (adopted in 2023). The Framework includes a map of Environmental Justice Communities which identifies disadvantaged communities as defined by state law and additional areas identified by the Planning Department with the highest cumulative environmental burden and social vulnerability. It was adopted by the Board of Supervisors in March 2023.

## **General Plan Amendments associated with the Port of San Francisco Waterfront Plan**

In April 2023, the San Francisco Port Commission adopted the Waterfront Plan Update. This plan was first adopted in 1997, as “The Waterfront Land Use Plan”. Both the original Waterfront Land Use Plan and the updated Waterfront Plan prioritize maritime uses along the Port’s 7 ½ mile waterfront and include policies that also call for complementary non-maritime uses for properties under the Port’s jurisdiction. In 2020, after a robust public engagement process, the Port produced a draft comprehensive update called the “Waterfront Plan”. This new document updated the long-term goals and policies for Port properties, and expanded the topics to include transportation, sustainability, resilience, and community participation.

General Plan amendments were adopted in August 2023 to accompany the Port of San Francisco’s Waterfront Plan Update to ensure the Waterfront Plan’s consistency with the General Plan. This included amendments to the Recreation and Open Space Element (“ROSE”), the Northeastern Waterfront Area Plan, and the Central Waterfront Area Plan. The intention of these updates was to update policies where the ideas have changed

through other planning processes or official City actions. Similarly, Port staff worked with Planning staff to ensure the Waterfront Plan would be consistent with the recently approved Housing Element, Safety and Resilience Element and the Environmental Justice Framework.

## General Plan Updates Underway

### Transportation Element

The Planning Department is updating the Transportation Element, which was last prepared in 1995. Adoption of the update is anticipated in 2027. In addition to addressing statutory requirements (e.g., correlation with land use, existing and proposed transportation networks), the update will include policies related to transportation issues salient to San Francisco, such as regional transportation, emerging mobility services, and others. The new Transportation Element will be aligned with the City’s recently updated Housing Element and incorporate content from the Environmental Justice Framework.

### General Plan Amendments associated with Housing Element Implementation

The Planning Department is in the process of drafting miscellaneous General Plan amendments to ensure consistency with and support the implementation of the Housing Element. Various General Plan Elements and

area plans may be updated as part of the rezoning that is required by the adopted Housing Element and state law. For more information about Housing Element Implementation, see our 2023 Housing Element APR.

## General Plan Implementation

General Plan policies and objectives are implemented via the San Francisco Planning Code and Zoning Map, Development Agreements, Design Guidelines, other implementation documents associated with General Plan elements and area plans, and through review and approval of private and public projects by the Planning Commission, Board of Supervisors, and other City bodies.

### Private Projects

The objectives and policies reflected in the Planning Code and Zoning Map translate the General Plan’s vision into specific rules for private development. Review and approval of private projects must also incorporate assessment of the proposed project against General Plan policies and objectives. This comes in the form of “Findings” that affirm a project’s compliance with specific objectives and policies of the General Plan, and Consistency with eight priority-planning policies in Planning Code Section 101.1(b).

### Public Projects

San Francisco’s Administrative Code requires that certain actions be referred to the San Francisco Planning Department for evaluation of consistency with the General Plan prior to their consideration by the Board of Supervisors. Actions requiring finding of consistency with the General Plan include real estate transactions by San Francisco, subdivision mapping, improvements to public structures, affordable housing projects that benefit from assistance by San Francisco, Redevelopment plans or amendments thereto, changes to public right-of-way, and capital expenditure plans (San Francisco Charter Section 4.105 and San Francisco Administrative Code Section 2A.53). In most cases, an agency with jurisdiction over a particular action to be considered by the Board of Supervisors will submit a General Plan Referral (GPR) application to the Planning Department, requesting findings of consistency with the General Plan. In 2023, the San Francisco Planning Department received 47 GPR applications.

### Master Plans

Site-specific master planning efforts for several large sites are currently ongoing. These are typically mixed-use developments with mixed-income and affordable housing, open space, and community benefits such as improved mobility, sustainability, and resilience. Notable on-going sites include:

1. **Freedom West**, a 4-block cooperative housing development in the Western Addition neighborhood, built as part of the former Redevelopment project area in the early 1970s. The project aims to rebuild and replace the existing co-op community and add substantial new housing (including additional affordable units), neighborhood-serving retail and community services, and new public open space.
2. **Presidio Yard**, a modernization project for a SFMTA-owned bus yard and maintenance facility. It will improve transit service by improving maintenance and working conditions and getting buses back into service sooner and improve street safety. It will also explore potential joint development and mixed-use opportunities.



3. **Stonestown**, a large indoor retail mall surrounded by surface parking, located on the west side of San Francisco adjacent to San Francisco State University. The project aims to add substantial housing and public spaces, create a more pedestrian-friendly street environment, and connect the site with the surrounding community.
4. **SF Railyards**, envisions the Caltrain railyards at 4th and King as a regional transit center where Caltrain, future CA High Speed Rail, SFMTA light rail and buses come together at a major node. There will be a new rail station, added Caltrain service, and a neighborhood with housing, office, and public spaces. The project will first identify potential track layouts and development concepts for the site.
5. **Treasure Island Job Corps Site**. The Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA), in conjunction with the Planning Department and other City and Federal agencies, is exploring the redevelopment of the 37-acre Treasure Island Job Corps site to integrate it into the wider Treasure Island redevelopment effort. As currently envisioned, the existing US Department of Labor Job Corps campus would be redeveloped into a mixed-use, primarily residential neighborhood, along with consolidated new facilities for the San Francisco Job Corps.
6. **Plaza East**, a re-envisioning of the existing public housing at Plaza East Apartments in Fillmore Western Addition. The project proposes a mix of market rate housing, replacement of existing affordable units, and flexible community space. The new development would be a mixed-income community that leverages tax credits for buildings with public housing units and financing to support robust property management.
7. **SF Gateway (749 Toland)**, consists of 2M GSF of PDR space, potentially including last mile delivery, fleet parking, warehousing, and maker spaces. Public benefits may include streetscape improvements, EV charging, workforce support, and air quality mitigation measures.
8. **Potrero Yard Modernization Project**, includes the complete rebuilding of the Potrero Yard bus facility by demolishing the existing facility and constructing a new 1,300,000 square foot 75-foot to 150-foot mixed-use building that would include a state-of-the-art bus facility on the first three levels (up to 75-foot) and 465 affordable dwelling units adjacent and above the facility. The project also includes ground floor commercial space and extensive public realm improvements on the bordering streets.

## Compliance with OPR General Plan Guidelines

Several ongoing planning efforts will increase the General Plan’s compliance with OPR Guidelines:

### Tribal Cultural Resource Consultation

The Planning Department conducts outreach, notification, and consultation with local Native American representatives for General Plan Updates, for affordable housing projects as required under Assembly Bill 168, and for tribal cultural resources per CEQA requirements. Additionally, the department notifies Native American tribal representatives of public interpretation projects. The Planning Department contacts representatives on the Native American Heritage Commission’s (NAHC) list for San Francisco as well as parties on the interested local Native American representative list maintained by the department.

In 2023, the Planning Department issued 13 notifications to Native American tribal representatives on project and plans, of which, approximately 92% resulted in consultation with Native American tribal representatives. The Planning Department also engaged with the American Indian Cultural District (AICD) located in the Mission neighborhood and founded in 2020 to recognize, honor, and celebrate the American Indian legacy, culture,

people, and contributions. Through an OHP grant, the Planning Department is undertaking an American Indian Historic Context Statement and is coordinating with the AICD and local Native American representatives on the development and realization of the historic context, which will help inform both our CEQA review and General Plan updates.

### Budget Request for Future General Plan Updates

Currently pending before the Mayor's Office is a proposal from the Planning Commission seeking staffing support for the development of two new General Plan elements: Healthy Cities and Land Use & Economy. A brief description of each effort is provided below.

1. **Healthy Cities Element.** If funded, work on this proposed element would begin in FY 25-26. The Healthy Cities element would build on the Environmental Justice Framework, now pending before the Board of Supervisors, and would update and consolidate content from several existing elements including Environmental Protection (last updated 1988), Urban Design (last updated 1972), Air Quality (last updated 1997), and Arts (last updated 1991).
2. **Land Use & Economy Element.** If funded, work on this proposed element would begin in FY 25-26. The Department is devoting greater resources to economic recovery from the current COVID-fueled downturn, particularly grappling with the long-term structural changes affecting patterns of employment, land use and commercial activity. The Planning Department is collaborating with OEWD and community organizations to explore the Future of Downtown, particularly looking at economic diversification of the office-based economy, growing opportunities for housing, activating ground floor spaces and the public realm, and supporting economic activity Union Square. Additionally, the Citywide Division is collaborating with OEWD to develop strategies to facilitate the growth and recovery of businesses that enhance the diversity and resiliency of the job base, with particular focus on the PDR and biotech sectors. With the foundation of these efforts the Department will be undertaking the creation of a new Land Use Element of the General Plan, consolidating into this effort updates to content from the outdated Commerce & Industry Element (last updated in 1987) and Community Facilities Element (last updated in 1990) along with content from the recently adopted Housing Element. Aligned with equity goals to ensure adequate access to public services, the Department will continue to coordinate interagency planning and community engagement around Community Facility needs.

### Interagency and Intergovernmental Coordination

The Planning Department is heavily engaged in the regional Plan Bay Area process, the Bay Area's regional long-range plan focusing on the economy, environment, housing, and transportation. This plan, which is updated every four years under the auspices of the region's Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG), is coordinated with agencies across nine Bay Area counties that represent 101 cities and towns of the region. The Plan Bay Area process also produces the region's Sustainable Communities Strategy as required by Senate Bill 375, and the Regional Transportation Plan. The most recent plan, Plan Bay Area 2050, was adopted in Fall 2021. The Planning Department continues to be an active participant in Plan Bay Area implementation activities, including commenting on guidelines for MTC/ABAG's implementation of the Transit Oriented Communities Policy, the Priority Sites program, and grant programs for the Priority Development Area, Priority Conservation Area, and Priority Production Areas.

## Strategy for Monitoring Long-term Growth

Plan Bay Area is the primary source of long-term population and growth projections for the City and Region. The Planning Department has and is working on a variety of projects to address the public service and infrastructure needs of this growth, specifically through the various General Plan updates, site-specific master plans and citywide or district-scale policy studies mentioned earlier in this report. Participating in and implementing strategies in Plan Bay Area is the Department and City's primary strategy for monitoring long-term growth.

The Planning Department provides and refines the regional projections for use by our local infrastructure and public services agencies, including, but not limited to the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, San Francisco Unified School District, transit agencies (e.g., SFMTA, BART, Caltrain), Recreation & Parks Department, and public safety agencies. Through the policies and implementation actions from the recently adopted Housing Element, the Planning Department is engaged with these various infrastructure and service-delivery agencies to ensure each agency's plan is aligned with the General Plan's vision of housing and population growth.

**SUBJECT:** **OCOH Oversight Committee Recommendations regarding Transitional Aged Youth (Youth) Housing Funds**

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On September 28, 2023, the Our City, Our Home (OCOH) Oversight Committee (the Committee) hosted its regular meeting, which included a discussion of unprogrammed funding within the Family Housing and Youth Housing categories of the OCOH Fund. At the meeting, the Committee approved a recommendation specifying uses for unallocated Family Housing funds.

Subsequently, on February 8, 2024, the Committee hosted a special meeting, which included the approval of recommendations specifying uses for the unallocated Youth Housing funds.

### Recommendations

1. The OCOH Oversight Committee recommends that the City allocate \$8.5 million in one-time Youth Housing funds for small site acquisition to support nonprofit ownership of Permanent Supportive Housing for youth outside of the Tenderloin neighborhood.
2. The OCOH Oversight Committee recommends that the City allocate \$3.7 million in ongoing Youth Housing funds to provide support services for the new Permanent Supportive Housing sites purchased through the small site acquisition.
3. The OCOH Oversight Committee recommends that the City allocate \$8 million in one-time Youth Housing funds to support rapid rehousing of youth that are leaving transitional housing.
4. The OCOH Oversight Committee recommends that the City allocate \$2.7 million in one-time Youth Housing funds to support rapid rehousing of youth impacted by violence.

5. The OCOH Oversight Committee recommends that the City allocate \$3.7 million in ongoing Youth Housing funds to provide rental assistance and supportive services for youth exiting Permanent Supportive Housing.

The recommendations were adopted with a “yes” vote by the five members present: Chair Williams, Vice Chair D’Antonio, Member Walton, Member Friedenbach, and Member Preston.

### **Supporting Information**

As the funds reflected in these recommendations have already been appropriated into the FY23-24 budget, no new appropriations are necessary. Instead, this is a recommendation to adjust the spending plan being implemented by the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH).

To inform the Committee’s recommendations, Chair Williams, Member Friedenbach, Member Cunningham-Denning and Member Walton attended a Housing Liaison meeting with HSH on September 20, 2023.

## RESOLUTION REGARDING EMERGENCY AUTHORIZATIONS AND POWER OUTAGES ON TREASURE ISLAND

Sponsors: Barklee Sanders, Jodi Soboll

WHEREAS, Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island have experienced an average of 18 power outages per year since 1997 averaging approximately four to five hours each incident, totaling at least 487 power outages (as of February 20, 2024), at a rate that is four times higher than PG&E power in San Francisco, highlighting a significant disparity in the frequency of power disruptions experienced by Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island inhabitants; and

WHEREAS, Census tract 6075017902, encompassing a portion of Treasure Island, is characterized by a demographic in which 60% of its residents are classified as low-income households struggling with high housing expenses, and also ranks within the top 25% of the CalEnviroScreen 4.0 for SB 535 Disadvantaged Communities data, meaning these residents bear a disproportionate burden when it comes to power outages in San Francisco; and

WHEREAS, Residents of Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island are entitled to safe and reliable electric service and under CHAPTER 99: PUBLIC POWER as detailed in SEC. 99.1. FINDINGS, the City's provision of electricity not only ensures the delivery of clean, reliable, and safe electric service but also bestows economic benefits to both the City and the customer; and

WHEREAS, The Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA), a nonprofit, public-benefit corporation, is tasked with the supervision of development within the Development Plan Area. TIDA manages the property under the purview of the Tidelands Trust, adhering to the land use constraints outlined in the Treasure Island Conversion Act of 1997, which amended Section 33492.5 of the California Health and Safety Code and introduced Section 2.1 to Chapter 1333 of the Statutes of 1968. TIDA has the authority and responsibility to take reasonable actions to address issues related to the power grid on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island, and has failed to take sufficient action to address the ongoing power outages; and

WHEREAS, Neither the SFPUC, the Mayor, nor the Board of Supervisors possesses the authority to compel TIDA to stabilize the grid; and

WHEREAS, On July 25, 2017, under File Number: 170649, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors passed Resolution Number R0307-17 approving an emergency replacement of two generators on Treasure Island; and

WHEREAS, While the SFPUC and Treasure Island Community Development LLC are constructing new electrical infrastructure on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island new development customers; while there are no improvements planned for the existing system which will remain operational for current residents for another 10 to 15 years creating an even greater disparity between these communities; and

WHEREAS, The City Charter (under Article III, section 3.100(14)) and Administrative Code (under Chapter 7, section 7.1(b), Chapter 21, section 21.15, Chapter 6, section 6.60, Chapter 10, sections 10.03 and 10.62) authorize the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, TIDA and SFPUC to take

immediate emergency action to protect the public that might be applicable to the situation at Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island;

WHEREAS, on May 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2023, Mayor London Breed declared that “the safety and wellbeing of our residents and businesses is our first priority, and as a fundamental principle of good government, its our duty to deliver services San Franciscans deserve” in response to a power outage in north eastern San Francisco.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Citizens’ Advisory Committee of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commissioner hereby requests the Board of Supervisors, and The Mayor to endorse the emergency declaration for the immediate inspections and deployment of the new grid.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens’ Advisory Committee requests the Board of Supervisors recommend that, by July 2024, TIDA conduct a comprehensive inspection of the electrical distribution system in accordance with the relevant utility industry standards and practices for inspections, as set forth in California Public Utilities Commission General Order 165, General Order 128, and General Order 95; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens’ Advisory Committee requests the Mayor, and the Board of Supervisors identify a public agency that has authority and responsibility for oversight of The Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA) to assure it is meeting all its obligations and responsibilities related to the existing performance, health and safety, current and future maintenance of the power grid on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens’ Advisory Committee requests the mayor, and the board of supervisors to obtain a detailed accounting from The Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA) of all spending activities from the \$15M Funds allocated to TIDA for providing reliable, healthy, and safe power to the existing residents of Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island. This report should be provided by TIDA within two weeks of the Mayor and B.O.S. request.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens’ Advisory Committee requests the SFPUC, using past maintenance reports and data, provides a complete analysis and report (referred to as the TREASURE ISLAND AND YERBA BUENA ISLAND FAILURE MODE ANALYSIS REPORT) characterizing and quantifying all past outages on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island, including but not limited to; 1) Quantity and Types of Failure Modes, 2) Quantity and Type of Corrective Actions, 3) Failure rates over time, for no less than the past 15 years, for total failures and each failure mode, 4) Total cost of corrective action for total failures and for each Failure Mode, 5) Number of repeat failures for any location, 6) Map showing locations of all failures and by each failure mode, and 7) Total outage time (customer impact including time of outage, time to respond, and time for corrective action) for total failures and for each failure mode. Believing this data should be readily available in SFPUC records, the SFPUC Citizens’ Advisory Committee requests the SFPUC provide this analysis and report within 12 weeks of this Resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens' Advisory Committee requests the SFPUC, upon review of the complete the TREASURE ISLAND AND YERBA BUENA ISLAND FAILURE MODE ANALYSIS REPORT, provides a recommended Corrective Action Plan and Preventative Maintenance Action Plan (referred to as RECCOMENDATIONS FOR TREASURE ISLAND AND YERBA BUENA ISLAND POWER GRID CONFORMANCE TO CALIFORNIA CODES AND REGULATIONS) to prevent further outages impacting Treasure Island and Yerba Buena residents. Implementation of these recommended measures should bring the TREASURE ISLAND AND YERBA BUENA ISLAND power grid performance (based primarily on, but not limited to, outages) to the same levels as the City of San Francisco. Each recommendation should have a comprehensive description, note which failure modes are addressed, and provide an estimated cost of the measure and emergency maintenance savings. The SFPUC Citizens' Advisory Committee requests the SFPUC provide this analysis and report within 6 weeks of the TREASURE ISLAND AND YERBA BUENA ISLAND FAILURE MODE ANALYSIS REPORT.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens' Advisory Committee requests the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, and SFPUC to work with the public agency that has been identified as having authority and responsibility for oversight of The Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA), TIDA, and the SFPUC CAC and Power Subcommittee to review the TREASURE ISLAND AND YERBA BUENA ISLAND FAILURE MODE ANALYSIS REPORT and RECCOMENDATIONS FOR TREASURE ISLAND AND YERBA BUENA ISLAND POWER GRID CONFORMANCE TO CALIFORNIA CODES AND REGULATIONS findings with the goal of assuring TIDA is meeting all its obligations and responsibilities related to the existing performance, health and safety, current and future maintenance of the existing power grid on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens' Advisory Committee urges the Board of Supervisors to request that TIDA immediately inspect the overhead and underground electric distribution system and to develop, by July 2024, a capital improvement plan for replacing the aging electrical infrastructure, ensuring that the plan addresses the need for resilience and sustainability in the face of extreme weather events and climate change; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the SFPUC Citizens' Advisory Committee requests that the Board of Supervisors work with TIDA and the SFPUC to identify and secure funding to ensure the long-term sustainability and reliability of the power infrastructure on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island, and mitigation of the continuing health and safety crisis affecting existing residents pending implementation of long-term corrective action.

RESOLVED, That the Citizens' Advisory Committee urges the Mayor and Board of Supervisors to abolish institutional racism within its own borders.

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## I. Summary

This report reviews San Francisco Department of Public Health (SFDPH) substance use disorder (SUD) services, in accordance with the 2008 Treatment on Demand Act (Prop T). SFDPH is committed to the goal of meeting demand for treatment and is striving to increase demand for treatment among individuals not yet seeking care. It is critical to acknowledge that in San Francisco, a preliminary total of 811 people died of an overdose in 2023. Every one of those deaths is a tragedy. SFDPH is committed to aggressively approaching drug overdoses as a public health crisis. This is critical to our efforts to meet Treatment on Demand.

Funded primarily by Medicaid dollars through California's Drug Medi-Cal program and City General Funds, SFDPH's Behavioral Health Service (BHS) and its contractors offer services in alignment with Medi-Cal requirements, including residential treatment and residential step-down, outpatient treatment, medication treatment, and withdrawal management. Additional treatment is provided in other settings across the San Francisco Health Network (SFHN). SFDPH also offers low-barrier and engagement services to save lives and build rapport with people not ready to reduce or stop their substance use.

In Fiscal Year 2022-2023 (FY22-23), 4,628 individuals received a SUD service within the SFHN Behavioral Health specialty. Sixty-six percent of clients receiving specialty SUD treatment were experiencing homelessness and 44% of these clients also had a mental health diagnosis. Opioid, methamphetamine, and alcohol use disorders were the most common primary diagnoses.

SFDPH assesses treatment demand and utilization using proxy measures while working to develop stronger estimates of demand and unmet need. In FY22-23, SFDPH observed increases in admissions across most service types compared with FY 21-22, indicating an increase in demand. Wait times held steady or increased slightly over FY21-22 levels. SFDPH is also seeking better estimates of unmet need among people not currently seeking care.

To better address demand for treatment and unmet need, SFDPH expanded critical interventions in FYs 22-24, adding residential step-down, withdrawal management, and dual diagnosis beds; increasing access to medication treatment through expanded program hours and home delivery; expanding contingency management; continuing growth of the Office of Coordinated Care; and further increasing overdose prevention and response efforts.

Looking forward, SFDPH seeks to pursue the highest-impact strategies available to address unmet need and fully realize treatment on demand. These include:

- Improving wait times for care by expanding treatment beds and capacity where needed and contracting for new and as-needed services faster.
- Expanding access to highly effective treatment. This includes medication treatment for opioid use disorder and contingency management for stimulant use disorder.
- Continuing to refine use of available data and seek new data sources to improve measurement of demand and need, as well as the effectiveness of SUD services.

## II. Introduction

The San Francisco Department of Public Health (SFDPH, or the Department), Behavioral Health Services (BHS) submits this report in compliance with the **2008 Treatment on Demand Act** (TOD, or Proposition T). Treatment on Demand requires SFDPH to report to the Board of Supervisors each year on its efforts to meet demand for substance use disorder (SUD) treatment. Proposition T is intended to ensure that the City has adequate SUD treatment capacity to meet the community demand for publicly funded SUD treatment.

The Treatment on Demand Act amended Chapter 19 of the San Francisco City & County Administrative Code to include Section 19A.30 as follows:

- 1. The Department of Public Health shall maintain an adequate level of free and low-cost medical substance abuse services and residential treatment slots commensurate with the demand for these services.*
- 2. Demand shall be measured by the total number of filled medical substance abuse slots<sup>1</sup> plus, the total number of individuals seeking such slots as well as the total number of filled residential treatment slots<sup>2</sup> plus, the number of individuals seeking such slots.*
- 3. The City and County shall be flexible in providing various treatment modalities for both residential substance abuse treatment services and medical substance abuse treatment services.*
- 4. The Department of Public Health shall report to the Board of Supervisors by February 1st of each year with an assessment of the demand for substance abuse treatment and present a plan to meet this demand. This plan should also be reflected in the City budget.*
- 5. The City and County shall not reduce funding, staffing or the number of substance abuse treatment slots available for as long as slots are filled or there is any number of individuals seeking such slots.*

This report describes SFDPH's Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23 funding; estimates of demand; SUD treatment and service design; utilization; and outcomes. We also provide updates on services intended to engage individuals in care and respond to the health consequences of substance use, including drug overdose.

## III. Overview of SFDPH SUD Treatment and Services

The goal of SFDPH SUD services is to provide treatment and care to help people improve their health and wellbeing, by increasing their access to healthcare and supporting recovery from

substance use disorders. The department achieves these goals by offering a range of evidence-based SUD services that are designed to meet people at different stages of change.

Figure 1. SUD Services and Stages of Change<sup>3</sup>



SFDPH both runs the specialty Behavioral Health Plan and provides services through the San Francisco Health Network (SFHN). SFDPH services are aligned with Drug Medi-Cal (DMC) and in order to receive Medi-Cal funds, SFDPH must comply with national standards defined by American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM). ASAM defines SUD service types including outpatient treatment, medication treatment, withdrawal management (detox), and residential treatment, and sets standards for these services.

All SFDPH SUD treatment programs aim to help people to stop using substances. However, many individuals with substance use disorder are not yet ready to enter treatment. Nationally, less than 10 percent of individuals with SUD regularly access substance use treatment.<sup>4</sup> SFDPH seeks to reduce this unmet need by also offering a range of low-threshold services to build rapport with individuals and motivate them to seek treatment (see **Engagement Services** below). Such services can improve treatment engagement and reduce harm associated with substance use.<sup>5</sup>

Many of SFDPH’s engagement services are offered by the Office of Overdose Prevention, established in 2022. Overdose prevention and response strategies are critical amidst rising overdose death rates, and support pathways to realizing treatment on demand. **Table 1** outlines the Department’s strategic approach.

### Service Organization and Service Types

SFDPH’s San Francisco Health Network offers substance use treatment in both specialty behavioral health services (BHS) and ambulatory care programs.

#### Treatment Programs in Specialty and Ambulatory Care

SFDPH Behavioral Health Services (BHS) offers SUD services required by DMC. The services BHS offers are referred to as “**specialty**” care, treatment, or services, because behavioral health is a specialty outside of primary care within the SFHN (as is, for example, cardiology). SFDPH also offers SUD treatment through its Ambulatory Care (Primary Care, Jail Health and Whole-Person Integrated Care) clinics and programs.

Treatment modalities are described below.

- **Outpatient treatment:** Outpatient treatment includes psychosocial services (counseling or therapy). Contingency management is also offered in outpatient specialty and ambulatory care settings.

**Contingency Management** is a behavioral therapy in which positive behavioral changes – such as abstinence from drugs – are 'reinforced' or rewarded using incentives. It is the most effective treatment for stimulant use disorder and is also effective in improving health outcomes together with medications in opioid use disorder and alcohol use disorder.<sup>6 7</sup> As recommended by the 2019 Methamphetamine Task Force, SFDPH is working to increase the number of programs in primary care and behavioral health offering contingency management.

- **Opioid treatment programs**: Drug Medi-Cal requires that medications for opioid use disorders (MOUD) (e.g., buprenorphine, methadone; also referred to as MAT, or medications for the treatment of addiction) be offered to people receiving treatment in all settings, as the most effective treatments for reducing death and improving health outcomes among people with opioid use disorder. Methadone is only available in Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) because of federal and state regulations: SFDPH contracts with seven licensed OTPs. SFDPH also offers medication for opioid use disorders (buprenorphine) through its **Office Based Induction Clinic (OBIC)**. OBIC is co-located with the SFDPH **BHS Pharmacy** at 1380 Howard Street. Buprenorphine is less regulated than methadone. SFDPH also provides buprenorphine in primary care, contracted outpatient and residential substance use disorder treatment programs, and hospitals.
- **Withdrawal management (“detox”)**: Withdrawal management services are short-term interventions that aim to help individuals safely manage the effects of reduced consumption of drugs or alcohol, prior to undergoing longer-term substance use treatment. Most withdrawal management is provided in an outpatient setting, but SFDPH also offers residential withdrawal management programs, which are most appropriate for individuals experiencing moderate to severe withdrawal symptoms that cannot be managed at home or in an outpatient setting, and people experiencing homelessness (PEH). SFDPH also offers different models of withdrawal management, as outlined in **Table 2**.

- **Residential treatment:** Residential SUD treatment occurs in live-in treatment facilities that help people to limit or abstain from substances and build life and social skills, improve coping strategies, and stabilize to facilitate wellness and recovery. Individuals typically remain enrolled in residential treatment for three months, but recent Medi-Cal changes allow for longer term treatment episodes when medically indicated. Additionally, clients are encouraged to transition to outpatient care and residential step-down programs upon completion of a residential treatment program.
- **Residential step-down (recovery transitional housing):** A transitional living facility for people experiencing or at-risk of homelessness who have completed a residential treatment program. Residential step-down (RSD) is not treatment; it provides stable housing and support for people, for up to two years, while they participate in outpatient treatment, and achieve more stability in their recovery and skills to live independently.

SFDPH also offers critical SUD treatment and linkage programs in ambulatory care and hospital settings, including:

- **Managed Alcohol Program:** SFDPH operates 15 beds at our Managed Alcohol Program for individuals who want to reduce their harm from alcohol use.
- **Bridge Clinic:** The Bridge Clinic at Family Health Center, at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital (ZSFG) offers medication treatment, supportive counseling, and linkages to other SUD and other behavioral health services as needed.
- **HOUDINI LINK:** The HOUDINI Link program at ZSFG serves individuals newly starting medications for opioid use disorder while hospitalized, offering treatment initiation and linkage to follow-up treatment and case management.
- The **Addiction Care Team at ZSFG** also provides SUD treatment, starting individuals on medication treatment and providing linkage to ongoing SUD care following hospital discharge.

- **Project JUNO** serves individuals who initiate MOUD while in jail, providing incentivized case management upon release to facilitate linkage to OBIC for ongoing MOUD support.

### Engagement Services

Outside of specialty, ambulatory, and hospital-based SUD treatment programs, SFPDPH also offers services to save lives and help engage people in care. These include:

- **Sobering centers:** At sobering centers, individuals can spend several hours safely recovering from intoxication in a supervised setting and be offered connection to treatment. SFPDPH offers drug sobering at **SoMa RISE** and alcohol sobering at the **Alcohol Sobering Center**.
- **Overdose prevention and naloxone distribution:** Overdose prevention activities include training people on how to recognize and respond to an overdose and distributing naloxone in a range of settings, with recent expansions to housing sites and entertainment venues. These training and engagements include vital information about accessing treatment.
- **Overdose follow up:** The Street Overdose Response Team (SORT) provides an emergency response to people experiencing an overdose in the community. Within 72 hours of an overdose event, the **Post Overdose Engagement Team (POET)** outreaches to draw individual into treatment and/or teach skills to prevent future overdoses. Additionally, the **HOPE (Home Overdose Prevention and Engagement)** program launched in FY22-23 with the goal of following up with housed individuals, including those in permanent supportive housing, within 24 to 48 hours of a non-fatal overdose.

### Organization of Services

SFPDPH provides SUD treatment and services both directly and through a network of contracted community-based organizations to provide specialty SUD treatment and services. Care and treatment for people with SUD can also be accessed in 14 SFPDPH clinic settings located throughout San Francisco. In addition to specialty care, buprenorphine treatment is available across the San Francisco Health Network, including in primary care and hospital settings.

Entry into all behavioral health services (substance use and mental health) is intended to occur through multiple settings and pathways, as shown in **Figure 2**, aiming to create swift and flexible access to care. This approach is endorsed by California's Department of Health Care Services [No Wrong Door policy](#).

Individuals may contact providers directly, but access is centralized through SFDPH’s **Behavioral Health Access Center (BHAC)**.

#### Behavioral Health Access Center (BHAC)

The Behavioral Health Access Center (BHAC) helps more than 3,000 people a year get on the path to recovery. BHAC is a walk-in clinic at 1380 Howard St. where clients can be assessed, referred, and linked to treatment options. In July 2023, BHAC hours were extended to include weekends from 9 am to 4 pm. In combination with an expansion in 2022 to weekday evenings, BHAC is open from 8 am to 7 pm on weekdays and 9 am to 4 pm on weekends. It is designed as a centralized entry point that can conduct assessment, review electronic medical records for treatment history and care coordination, and make referrals and linkages to care.

BHAC is a part of the **Office of Coordinated Care (OCC)**. Launched in 2022 under Mental Health SF, the OCC manages behavioral health central access points, provides case management, care oversight, and care planning, with a focus on priority populations. Priority populations include people experiencing homelessness (PEH); two-thirds of those receiving specialty SUD services are PEH. The OCC’s activities support both the delivery of treatment on demand and SFDPH’s ability to address unmet need for SUD treatment.

- Behavioral Health Access Center (BHAC): Walk-in center, open 7 days/week, for access to behavioral health services

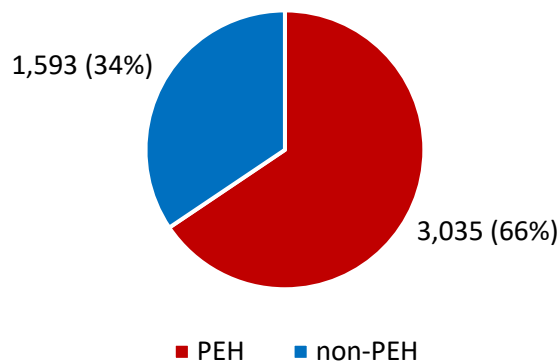
CARE Coordination – Systematic and focused services for priority populations needing engagement and connections to care.

- Priority populations include:
  - People leaving hospital: inpatient, ED, psych emergency (including 5150s)
  - People with crisis contacts
  - People leaving jail
  - People who are experiencing homelessness
  - People with high utilization of multiple systems and high behavioral health needs
  - People in homelessness/housing system: shelters, navigation centers, permanent supportive housing

SUD Treatment Capacity and Service Data

In FY22-23, 4,628 individuals received an SUD service from SFDPH specialty behavioral health care, similar to FY 21-22 (4,534).<sup>8</sup> Two-thirds of individuals receiving specialty SUD services in FY22-23 were people experiencing homelessness (PEH; **Figure 4**), and 44 percent (N= 2,042) also had a mental health diagnosis. These figures are also similar to FY 21-22 levels.

As in previous years, the majority of those receiving specialty SUD services in FY22-23 were White (42%, N= 1,955), Black/African-American (25%, N= 1,138), and Latino/a (21%, N= 957).<sup>9</sup>

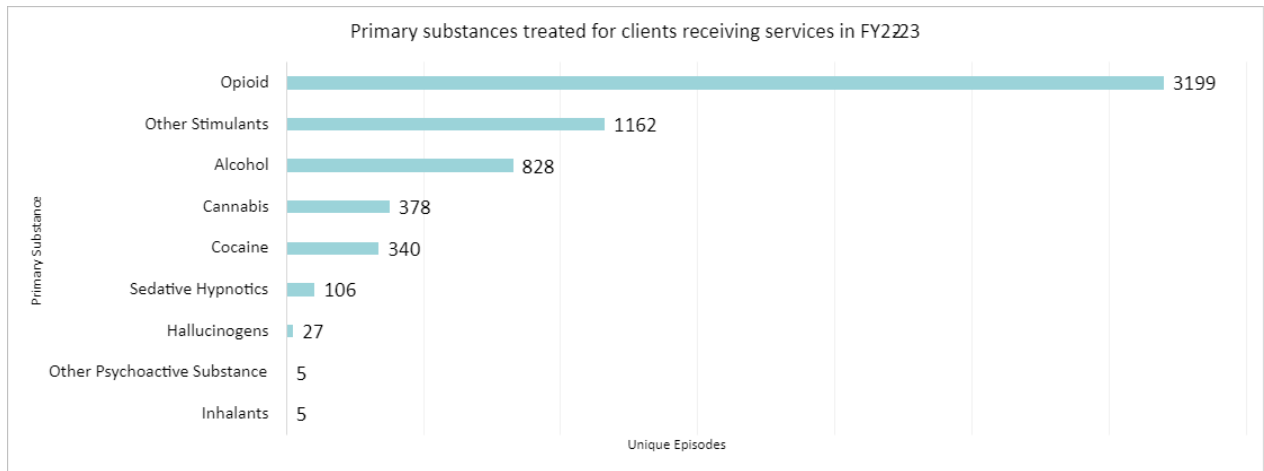

The numbers of Black/African-American and Latino/a clients who received specialty SUD services were disproportionately large relative to their populations in San Francisco.<sup>10</sup> Most individuals receiving specialty SUD services were 25-44 years old (50%, N= 2,326) or 45-60 years old (31%, N= 1,444).<sup>9</sup>

Opioids, stimulants, and alcohol were the primary substances used among individuals who received specialty SUD treatment in FY22-23 (**Figure 5**).

Opioids (especially fentanyl), methamphetamine, and alcohol were the most common substances used among people who died of drug overdose in San Francisco in Calendar Year (CY) 2022 (**Figure 6**).<sup>13</sup>

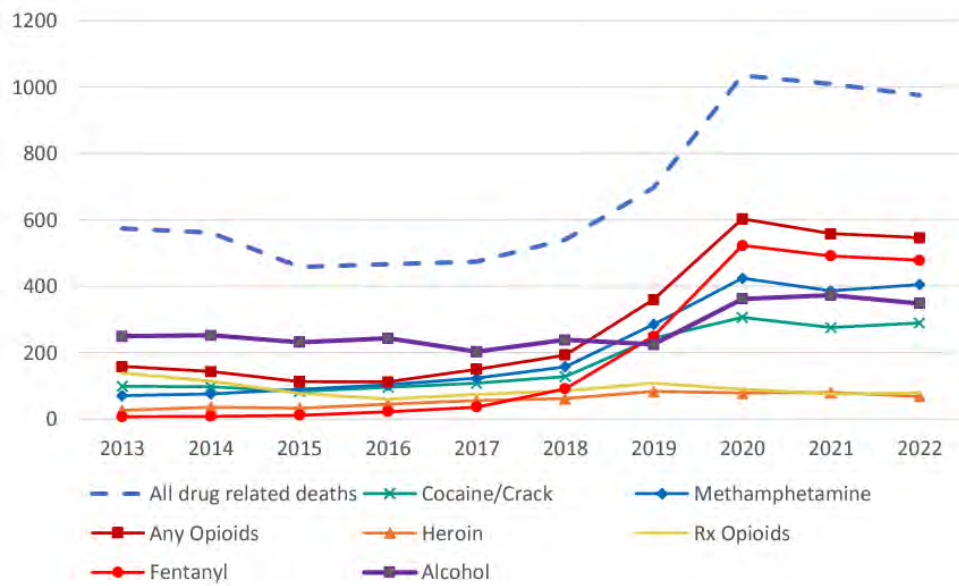

**Table 3** outlines the contracted specialty SUD service capacity in FY22-23 and includes the number of unduplicated clients (UDC) subsequently enrolled (served) within each type of treatment. Most contracted SUD services are funded through Drug Medi-Cal or federal block grant dollars.

SFDPH has additional capacity of more than 1,200 beds not reflected in **Table 3** that serve individuals with mental health needs, many of whom also have a substance use disorder. These include mental health rehabilitation centers, residential, crisis, and skilled nursing beds, as well as dual diagnosis residential treatment.<sup>17</sup>

In FY23-24, SFDPH has added treatment capacity not reflected in the table above, described in more detail under **Section VI, Outcomes** .

#### IV. SUD Funding

In FY22-23, the City budgeted \$91,274,936 for SUD treatment and services in specialty care (see **Table 4**). Funding sources include \$27,349,344 in Medi-Cal dollars and \$30,901,561 in County General Fund dollars. Drug Medi-Cal matches County General Fund dollars for most services. SFDPH also received \$9,800,298 through the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG) program. Funding for substance use services also includes an annual 3% increase for cost of living and cost of doing business.

In FY22-23, Proposition C funding supported increased access to SUD medication treatment (\$3.75M), contingency management treatment (\$1.0M), the Street Overdose Response Team and POET (\$5.85M), SoMa Rise (\$3.64M), residential step-down facilities (i.e., recovery transitional housing) (\$1.15M), and risk reduction supplies (\$540K). Prop C funding also supported the Minna Project (\$4.7M; with Adult Probation), the Managed Alcohol Program (\$4M); BHS Pharmacy expansion (\$2.5M); BHAC expansion (\$1.4M); and SUD treatment program navigators (\$915K).<sup>19</sup>

**Table 5** describes the funding for SUD specialty care by service type.

### Treatment on Demand in the FY23-24 Budget

The FY23-24 budget reflects priorities for providing treatment on demand and working to address unmet need.

- The budget continues investments in Mental Health SF, which supports expansion of treatment for substance use disorders, including medication treatment access, residential care, and services to help people get into and stay in treatment.
- The budget also continues and enhances investments in low-threshold and engagement services to reach people at high risk for overdose who are not seeking treatment. These investments aim to reduce fentanyl and other drug-related deaths; increase support for and reduce the stigma experienced by people at risk of overdose to help them take steps to improve their health; and improve the community conditions in which drug use occurs.
- To address the City’s disproportionate overdose deaths among African American people and people experiencing homelessness, the budget funds culturally congruent programs, expanded overdose prevention education, overdose prevention champions, and linkage to care.

The FY23-24 budget includes use of opioid settlement funds, first received in FY22-23 and programmed starting in FY23-24.<sup>20</sup> Specific settlement investments in FY23-24 focus on high-impact SUD interventions include expansion of contingency management (\$1.4M), expanded use of methadone (\$2.9M), naloxone distribution and overdose prevention in supportive housing (\$573K), and support for Black-led and Black-serving organizations to expand and support peer-led, racially-congruent outreach and education to address racial disparities in overdose (\$780K).

The Mayor has continued to reaffirm her commitment to Mental Health SF and the behavioral health system as part of her budget, despite a challenging fiscal picture for the City. The mid-year reductions proposed by the Department in response to the Mayor’s FY23-24 Fall

instructions and accepted by the Mayor maintain the commitment to behavioral health and homelessness responses.

## V. Assessing Treatment on Demand

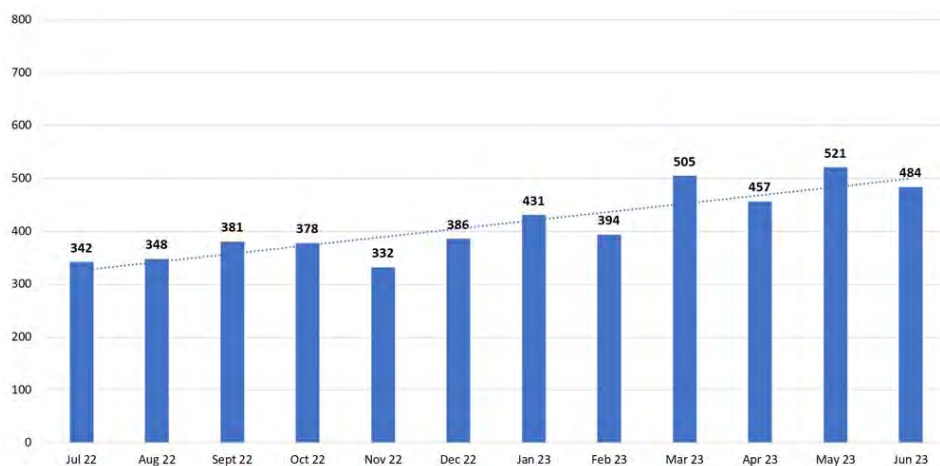
SFDPH uses several proxy measures to assess demand for treatment, including trends in treatment entry and wait times. Demand is challenging to measure. The Department is continually working to develop stronger measures of demand and better estimate unmet need among individuals not seeking care. Current measures are described below.

### Estimating Demand

#### Specialty Care Admissions

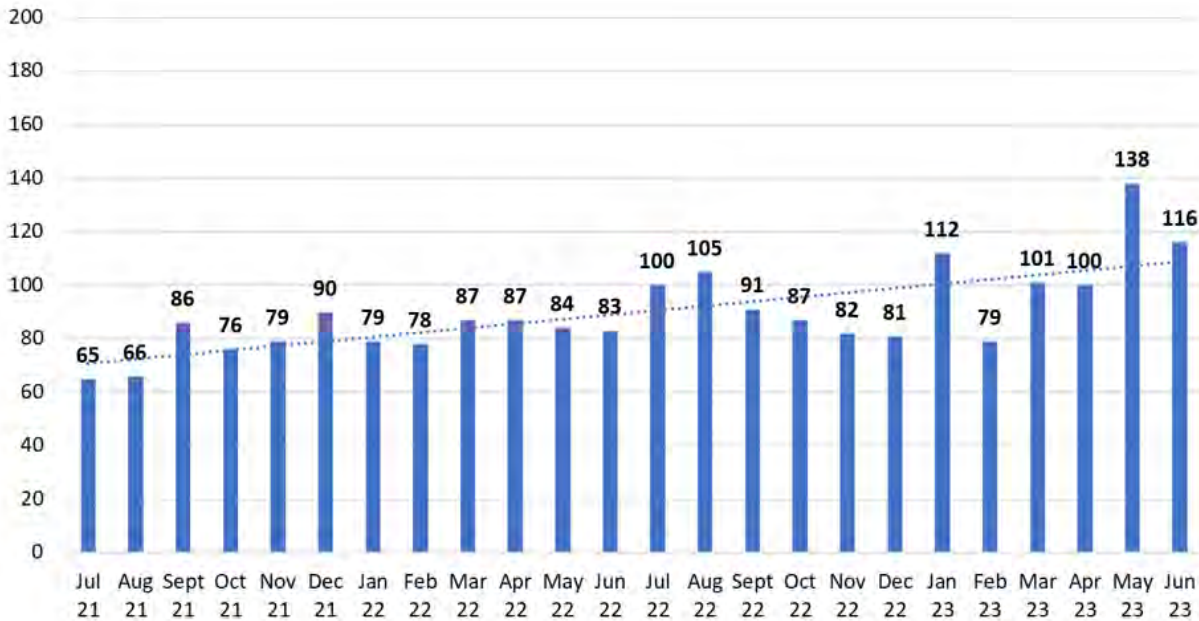
Across SUD services, FY22-23 data show an increase in admissions, especially in the second half of the fiscal year, suggesting an increase in demand. **Figure 7** illustrates increasing admissions across FY22-23, especially in the last quarter of the year.

**Figure 7. Number of Specialty Substance Use Disorder Admissions Per Month, July 2022 to June 2023**



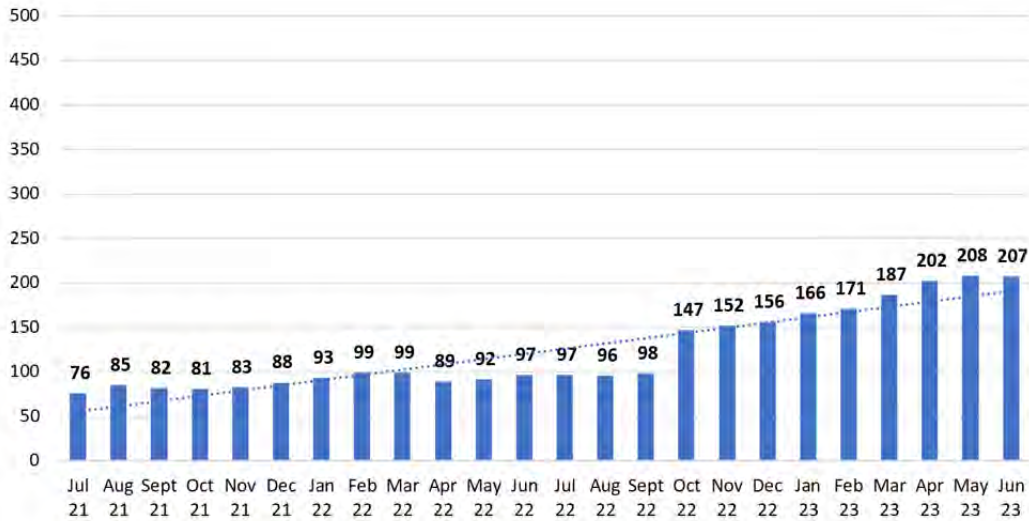
This overall increase in admissions was seen across most SUD service types. For example, **Figure 8** shows an increase in admissions to Opioid Treatment Programs for two fiscal years (FY 21-23).

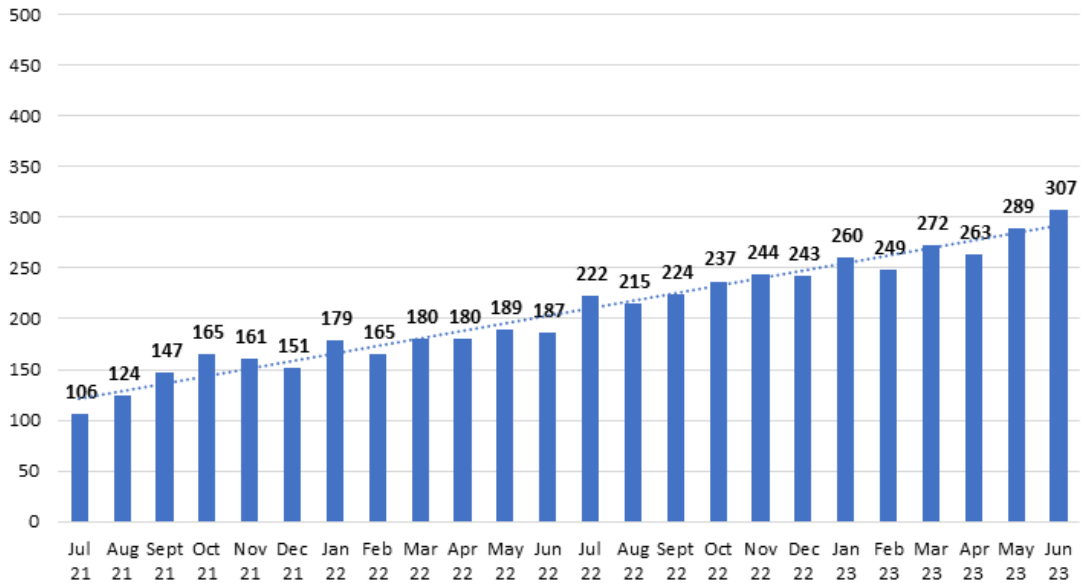
Figure 9. Unique Residential Step-Down Clients Served Per Month, Fiscal Years 2021-2023

With the addition of 70 new residential step-down beds in March 2023, the number of clients served per month—already trending upwards—increased (**Figure 9**).

The Office-Based Induction Clinic (OBIC), which offers medication for opioid use disorders, expanded hours of operation in June 2022, and the number of unique clients served per month increased (**Figure 10**).<sup>21</sup> OBIC served 328 unique patients during expanded hours alone in FY22-23.

### Service Utilization across the San Francisco Health Network

This report has, in prior years, reported on specialty SUD treatment enrollment among San Francisco Health Network (SFHN) beneficiaries with a SUD diagnosis. However, that metric did not account for utilization of the significant substance use services and treatment provided in other parts of the SFHN. For example, much of the City’s buprenorphine is prescribed through primary care. To present a fuller picture of utilization and better track trends in substance use care, this year’s report includes measurement of the number of individuals who accessed substance use services across the SFHN. In FY22-23, 14,952 unique individuals with a substance use disorder accessed services within the SFHN, including individuals receiving treatment for a condition related to their substance use diagnosis.

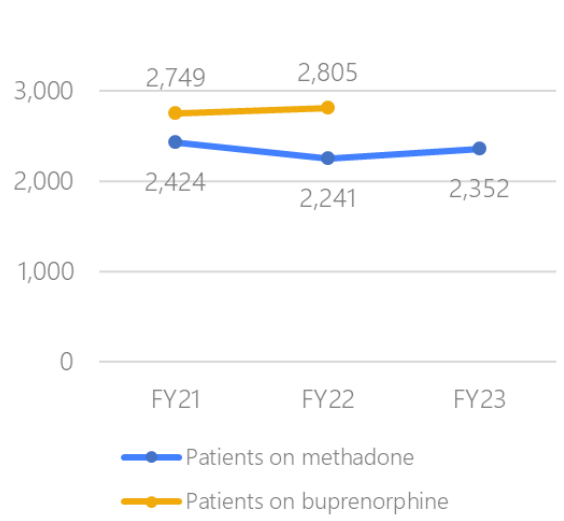
This new measure provides a baseline for future trends. The SFHN is undergoing shifts in billing data with the implementation of CalAIM<sup>22</sup> and is moving parts of the network onto a new electronic health record system, Epic (for more on this, see **Epic in SUD Treatment** below). With these changes, the Department will continue to revise this and other metrics to be more precise and accurate and consider opportunities for additional metrics. Substance use data is updated quarterly at <https://sf.gov/data/substance-use-services>.

SFDPH is also refining measurement of the utilization of buprenorphine and methadone, two medications that are highly effective at treating opioid disorders. SFDPH has invested in increased buprenorphine use, and provides it in both primary care and specialty care. The City is also working to expand the availability of methadone, provided only in licensed Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) under federal and state regulations. **Figure 11** shows that the

unique number of patients receiving these medications increased across San Francisco from FY 22 to FY23; this measure includes individuals who received these medications outside of the SFHN, showing city-wide response to demand for medication treatment for opioids.<sup>23</sup> The number of unique individuals receiving buprenorphine for opioid use disorder treatment increased from 2,749 in FY 21-22 to 2,805 in FY22-23.<sup>24</sup> The number of individuals receiving methadone increased from 2,241 in FY22-23 to 2,352 in FY23-24.

### Intake Capacity and Wait Times

SFDPH also reviews the intake capacity residential care providers report as an estimate of demand for services. Intake capacity reflects available beds with available staffing capacity to support admissions. A small degree of intake capacity is regularly needed to allow flexibility to provide beds for new admissions in a timely manner.

In FY22-23, there was, on average, some capacity for intakes across residential categories. Withdrawal management intake capacity fluctuated due to provider transitions during the fiscal year.<sup>27</sup> Average intake capacity for programs serving specific populations (e.g., perinatal, forensic) reflect varying demand for these programs.

Depending on the type of data available from SUD programs, wait times may be calculated from first request for service to admission, or from an individual needs assessment (Level of Care Assessment) to admission. In FY22-23, median wait times remained steady or increased over FY 21-22 (**Table 7**). Median wait times for opioid treatment programs continued to be less than one day.<sup>28</sup>

What SFDPH can currently measure for residential withdrawal management is the time from completion of an initial assessment to admission into a withdrawal management bed. For that measure, the median wait time continues to be less than one day. However, this does not

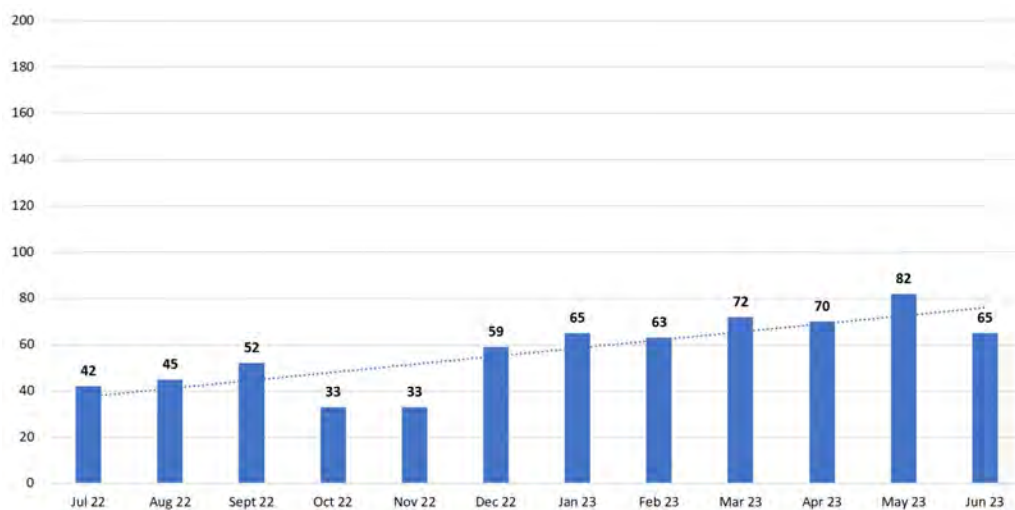

capture wait prior to assessment or the number of individuals who do not complete an initial assessment.<sup>29</sup> SFDPH is working closely with withdrawal management providers to improve measurement of wait times from first request or referral to admission. In FY23-24, we are continuing to streamline withdrawal management admission processes. SFDPH has also contracted for additional withdrawal management beds to minimize wait times. (see **VI Outcomes** ).

While median wait times for residential treatment did increase by one day, from four days in FY 21-22 to five days in FY22-23, the number of residential treatment admissions also increased across FY22-23 (**Figure 12**). We are continuing to work to decrease admission delays.

Individuals awaiting admission into residential treatment may receive care in withdrawal management or outpatient programs.

In addition to its efforts to reduce residential wait times through reduction of times to assess and place clients, the Department continually pursues opportunities to expand and strengthen access to care across the SUD treatment continuum. Please see **Section VII Programmatic updates** for an overview of these activities.

### Estimating unmet need

In addition to assessing demand for services, SFDPH seeks to estimate unmet need through additional data sources, to inform development of low-threshold and engagement services, as well as planning for treatment capacity. Expanded low-threshold and engagement services seek to reach people who are not seeking—but may benefit from—treatment. The goals of low threshold and engagement services are to promote behavior change and encourage people to

engage in care. Expansion of these services may have contributed to increased demand observed for withdrawal management, residential treatment, and opioid treatment services.

Additionally, the Department recently completed an initial update to its inventory of residential treatment beds and undertook modeling to develop preliminary recommendations for the number of beds needed for 95 percent of clients to experience zero wait time. This is intended to help address unmet need among individuals seeking care, and improve capacity for additional, anticipated demand.

Under contract with SFDPH, a UC San Francisco analysis is forthcoming, to estimate the number of people who use illicit drugs in the San Francisco. Data from the California Health Interview Survey (CHIS), a state-funded telephone survey that includes questions on behavioral health needs and care, may help further quantify unmet need in San Francisco. The Department has requested—and is awaiting—local CHIS substance use data for further analysis, as publicly available data do not provide the level of analysis needed.

## VI. Outcomes and Opportunities for Improvement

### Outcomes

SFDPH considers measures to assess the quality and effectiveness of treatment provided. SFDPH also reports on additional quality measures to the State each year, under Drug Medi-Cal oversight.<sup>30</sup>

### Retention in Care

Retention in treatment is correlated with positive outcomes in substance use care. In Calendar Year 2022, average length of stay in San Francisco’s Drug Medi-Cal services was 247 days, which is longer than statewide averages.<sup>31</sup>

### Client Satisfaction

In SFDPH’s *Fall 2022 SUD Treatment Perception Survey* of clients participating in SFDPH funded services, nearly 92 percent of 877 survey participants indicated that they were satisfied with their treatment services provided, across domains including treatment access, quality, care coordination, and outcomes.<sup>32</sup> More than 88 percent of respondents indicated that they received the help they felt they needed, and over 92 percent said they were treated with respect. 2022 ratings improved over 2021 rating by up to 3 percent.

### SUD Service Transitions

In addition to retention in care, SFDPH reviews available data on transitions between SUD services to assess follow-up care and provide more insight into retention in care. As addiction is

a chronic illness, we expect that individuals may return to treatment, or transition up from lower to higher levels of treatment. Out of 654 individuals discharged from residential treatment in FY22-23, 18 subsequently returned to residential treatment, 95 went to withdrawal management, and 268 received non-residential services (e.g., outpatient).<sup>33</sup> Of these 268 individuals, 67 percent received their follow-up service within 7 days, and 77 percent within 30 days.

Additionally, in FY22-23, there were 1,683 withdrawal management discharges.<sup>34</sup> Of these discharges, 671 transitioned to residential treatment, and 132 transitioned directly to outpatient treatment programs. Those who did not transition directly to treatment include individuals who transitioned to non-SFDPH programs, those who left voluntarily, and those who were exited from withdrawal management due to active substance use. Individuals are offered the chance to repeat withdrawal management as often as needed. Many individuals may not yet be ready to seek additional treatment upon discharge from withdrawal management.

### Opportunities for Improvement

The department performs continuous quality surveillance and identifies ongoing opportunities for quality improvement. The *FY 21-22 Treatment on Demand Report* discussed a PIP to **improve Spanish language capacity** in SUD treatment. Since the last report SFDPH has made significant progress building Spanish language capacity in its newest SUD programs: SoMa RISE, the Minna Project, and expanded withdrawal management and dual diagnosis beds all have Spanish language capacity. The Salvation Army Harbor Lights program (residential and withdrawal management) has increased its Spanish language capacity. SFDPH Behavioral Health Services is adding Spanish language capacity to new contracts. In 2024, the Department anticipates that a planned, 33-bed expansion to serve dually diagnosed women with criminal justice involvement will be Spanish-language competent.

## VII. Programmatic updates

In FY22-23 and FY23-24, many key SUD initiatives and programs expanded or strengthened services. Highlights are described below.

### Expanding Treatment and Recovery Beds

In March 2023, the Department opened 70 new **Residential Step-Down (RSD)** beds on Treasure Island, significantly expanding capacity to house individuals who have completed residential SUD treatment for up to two years. RSD provides individuals a recovery living environment while they engage in outpatient SUD treatment, seek employment, and build life skills.

SFDPH also expanded capacity in the **residential withdrawal management** system, adding eight new residential withdrawal management beds with medical monitoring at Horizon Palm Avenue in San Mateo, in late 2023.

While all SFDPH’s behavioral health programs aim to serve dual diagnoses (individuals who have both mental health and substance use diagnoses), the Department is also working aggressively to expand the portfolio of treatment beds that can provide an enhanced service model for this population. In Fall 2023, SFDPH contracted to add 12 additional **dual diagnosis beds**, including two with Horizon Cronin House in Hayward and 10 with Center Point in Marin County.

Additionally, the **Minna Project**—a transitional care facility for justice-involved individuals with a dual diagnosis—expanded its capacity from 48 to the full 75 beds in 2023. In FY 22–23, 117 clients enrolled in the program. Of the clients who left the program in FY 22–23, 93% were considered successful exits, meaning they obtained permanent housing, completed the program in full, or graduated to another recovery residence.

Lastly, SFDPH’s **Managed Alcohol Program (MAP)**, which provides a medically supervised residence for people with chronic alcohol dependency who want to reduce their harm from alcohol use, expanded capacity to 15 beds in 2023. This program served 22 unique clients in FY22-23.

### Expanding Medication Treatment: A High-Impact Intervention

Medications for the treatment of addiction, or MAT, is one of the most effective strategies SFDPH can invest in to save lives and promote recovery among people who use drugs, especially those with opioid use disorder.

#### X-Waiver

In December 2022, the federal government lifted the Drug Addiction Treatment Act of 2000 (also known as the **X-Waiver**), which had previously required X-Waiver registration to prescribe buprenorphine. This change now allows all medical professionals with a current Drug Enforcement Administration registration to prescribe buprenorphine to treat opioid addiction. The waiver also allows clinical pharmacists with a practice agreement with a physician to prescribe buprenorphine. This is a critically important policy change in San Francisco, allowing pharmacists at the BHS Pharmacy and elsewhere to join the much-needed pool of buprenorphine prescribers.

#### Expanded MAT Programs

SFDPH expanded medication treatment access by increasing hours of operation, staff, and in-community treatment.

- The **Opiate Treatment Outpatient Program (OTOP)** at ZSFG serves around 700 individuals each year. It increased hours in FY22-23 and had more intakes through the summer 2023 than it did in all of 2022.

- SFDPH increased hours at its **Office-Based Buprenorphine Clinic (OBIC)** and BHS Pharmacy. OBIC added service hours 3:00-6:30 PM, Monday through Friday (except Wednesdays) and served 328 unique patients during expanded hours in FY22-23. Overall, in 2022, OBIC treated 575 patients with buprenorphine, a 164% increase from 2021.
- In FY22-23, the BHS Pharmacy began **delivering buprenorphine** to individuals who have had difficulties connecting with other treatment models for their substance use. This service includes initiation and ongoing management of treatment. This program served 97 unique individuals in 32 supportive housing facilities in FY22-23.
- The new **Maria X Martinez Health Resource Center** has treated more than 600 patients with medications for addiction treatment.
- The **Bridge Clinic at Family Health Center**, at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital (ZSFG) offers medication treatment and referrals to SUD residential and other behavioral health services. In FY22-23, this program served 365 unduplicated clients.
- The **HOUDINI Link** program at ZSFG serves individuals newly starting medications for opioid use disorder while hospitalized, offering treatment initiation and linkage to follow-up treatment and case management. This program enrolled 53 individuals in FY22-23.
- **Project JUNO** serves individuals who initiate MAT while in jail, providing incentivized case management upon release to facilitate linkage to OBIC for ongoing MAT support. Project JUNO enrolled 52 individuals in FY22-23.

### Expanding Contingency Management: A High-Impact Intervention

Contingency management is the most effective treatment for stimulant use disorder and is also an effective treatment for opioid use disorder. In FY22-23, Drug Medi-Cal initiated a new **contingency management pilot program**. In San Francisco, two out of three contingency management programs launched under this pilot in the last quarter of 2023. A third program will launch in FY23-24. Although several County-funded programs have provided contingency management in San Francisco for more than 10 years, the new pilot enables Medi-Cal certified providers to bill Medi-Cal for this service.

### Growth in Engagement and Overdose Prevention and Response

Alongside treatment offerings, SFDPH offers low-threshold and engagement services to help address unmet need.

#### Engagement Services

##### *Sobering Centers*

2023 was the second year of operation for **SoMa RISE**, the drug sobering center opened under Mental Health SF.<sup>35</sup> In FY22-23, the program served a total of 1,699 unique individuals. SoMa

RISE serves as a crucial link between street teams and services, receiving direct referrals from the Street Crisis Response Team and first responders.

In FY22-23, SFDPH's **Alcohol Sobering Program** served 317 unique individuals over more than 700 visits.

#### *Linkage and Engagement Services*

**Syringe Access Services** provided more than 113,000 sterile syringes to people who use drugs in FY22-23, to reduce risk of harm from injection drug use. SFDPH funds community organizations to provide syringe access and disposal. These services are an engagement point to build relationships with people who use drugs and offer life-saving overdose prevention services as well as on-site connections to behavioral health and physical health care.<sup>36</sup> Comprehensive services include naloxone; fentanyl test strips; HIV and Hepatitis C testing, linkage, and treatment; medication treatment; linkage to SUD treatment programs and mental and physical health care; case management, counseling, and referral; and referral and linkage to housing services.

#### *Overdose Prevention and Response*

In September 2023, SFDPH launched a publicly available **dashboard** to share data on overdose and treatment trends. Metrics are updated regularly at <https://www.sf.gov/resource/2023/drug-overdose-and-treatment-data-and-reports>.

Through October 2023, the Office of Overdose Prevention's **overdose recognition and response training** has been completed more than 6,000 times. Information about accessing care and treatment is provided in all overdose prevention trainings.

To prevent death from overdose, SFDPH and the DOPE Project distributed more than 135,000 **naloxone doses** in FY22-23, a 109 percent increase from FY21-22. SFDPH also installed more than 100 overdose response cabinets in supportive housing sites. SFDPH is also collaborating with HSH and the SF Supportive Housing Network (SFHSN) to coordinate overdose prevention in housing sites.

The City provides follow-up services for individuals who recently experienced a non-fatal overdose. The Street Overdose Response Team (SORT) provides an emergency response to people experiencing an overdose in the community. Within 72 hours of an overdose event, the **Post-Overdose Engagement Team (POET)** outreaches to draw individuals into treatment and/or teach skills to prevent future overdoses. In FY22-23, POET successfully reached more than 750 people to provide risk reduction education and linkage to care, and to offer buprenorphine or other treatment. Additionally, the grant-funded **HOPE (Home Overdose Prevention and Engagement)** team launched in October 2022. From October 2022 to June 2023, the team successfully engaged 207 unique individuals in housing sites.

## Growth in Care Coordination and Case Management

### Office of Coordinated Care

As described earlier in this report, the **Office of Coordinated Care** plays a key role in linkage to SUD treatment by managing behavioral health central access points and providing case management, care oversight, and care planning, with a focus on priority populations including PEH, who are the majority of those served in SUD specialty care. In 2023, the OCC implemented systematic follow-up for individuals with recent Street Crisis Response Team (SCRT) encounters or 5150 holds (involuntary behavioral health holds) at ZSFG. The OCC also expanded care coordination activities, now operating six days per week. Via the OCC BEST Care Management team, services were provided to 441 clients. In March 2023, the BEST Neighborhood team, dedicated to follow-up and linkage for individuals with street encounters, had >9,292 engagements between March and December. Additionally, the Office, through case conference and coordination with other City departments, is working with highest-risk individuals, including individuals leaving hospital stays or jail.

### PHACS Program Growth

Care coordination and behavioral health services have also expanded under the Permanent Housing Advanced Clinical Services (PHACS) Program. PHACS is a team of interdisciplinary healthcare professionals who provide care at permanent supportive housing (PSH) sites and is a collaboration between SFDPH Behavioral Health Services and Whole-Person Integrated Care, the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, and contracted housing providers. PHACS provides care coordination and linkage to care, as well as short-term physical and behavioral health interventions and enhanced case management services. Over the past year, the PHACS Behavioral Health team has expanded clinical staffing. The PHACS team now serves 145 PSH buildings, with expansion to additional buildings planned.

### Case Management Expansion

SFDPH has made focused investments in FYs 22-24 to **strengthen case management** within the behavioral health system of care. This supports SUD and mental health treatment. Investments include:

- Added funding to increase capacity and support staff retention at four **Intensive Case Management (ICM)** in 2023. ICM programs provide interdisciplinary care for people with complex mental health and substance needs.
- Opened a new ICM program in late 2023 for older adults experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness. Once fully staffed, this program will offer up to 100 treatment slots.
- Added **patient navigators** at ten outpatient substance use treatment programs, with the goals of keeping clients engaged in treatment and connecting them to other services.

### Reducing Racial Disparities in Overdose

The overdose death rate among Black/African Americans in San Francisco is five times higher than the citywide rate. In FYs 22-24, SFDPH intensified our work to address this profound disparity. These efforts include, among others, working to establish meaningful **engagement and partnership with Black-led and predominantly Black-serving organizations** around overdose prevention. Through these partnerships, SFDPH has engaged more than 20 organizations. In FY 24, through an RFP process, SFDPH awarded funding to the Children's Homeless Network to further expand and strengthen overdose prevention among Black/African Americans in San Francisco.

## VIII. Challenges

The Department faces capacity, workforce, regulatory, and data challenges that impact its ability to realize Treatment on Demand more fully.

### Capacity Challenges

The City currently lacks sufficient capacity to admit individuals into treatment during the night and on weekends. Until very recently, SFDPH has not been able to quickly acquire new providers, facilities, or programs to meet updated needs, or increase the diversity of contracted providers, due to lengthy procurement and real estate processes. San Francisco often must compete with other counties and health care systems for out of county beds and may miss opportunities to competing counties and health care systems with fewer bureaucratic barriers.

### Workforce Challenges

SFDPH is experiencing recruitment challenges across the behavioral health workforce, and particularly for behavioral health clinicians, for which there is a nationwide shortage. The City is working aggressively to improve hiring and retention in key civil service and contracted programs and awaits the results of staffing and wage analyses currently underway to will help inform its strategies.

### Regulatory Challenges

Removal of the X-Waiver requirement significantly improved the capacity of buprenorphine programs to respond to patient needs and leverage existing staffing. However, state and federal regulations still limit the Department's ability to respond flexibly to need for SUD services and treatment, in some settings. For example, methadone is one of the most effective treatments for opioid use disorder but is still highly regulated and can only be provided by licensed Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), which limits the settings and methods patients can use to access this highly effective care.

### Data Challenges

SFDPH needs accurate, comprehensive, and timely data to evaluate treatment on demand and plan and coordinate services but contends with data workforce and infrastructure challenges. Data analysts are among the positions that have been difficult to recruit and retain for, limiting



analytic capacity. Data infrastructure limitations include both a comprehensive shared data system that can capture a wider range of data, and sufficient provider staffing and workflows to manage data collection.

Additionally, demand can be challenging to measure with data currently available, and the Department must rely on proxy measures for demand, as described above.

#### Epic in SUD Treatment

Services across SFDPH are moving to the Epic Electronic Health Record (EHR) which will, for those services, allow improvements to data collection and care coordination. The mental health programs of Behavioral Health Services will migrate to Epic by May 2024. However, like other counties in California and nationally, substance use treatment programs are not able to be included in Epic due to federal regulations under 42 CFR Part 2, which imposes additional protections on sharing substance use treatment information related to substance use treatment programs. There is not currently an adequate solution in Epic that protects a client who does not consent to share their substance use treatment in the EHR.

For the time being, BHS 42 CFR Part 2 SUD programs will remain on their current EHR, Avatar. SFDPH will continue to explore other options for these programs to improve data collection and development of new metrics.

#### Recent Policy Changes

Recent policy changes present both challenges and opportunities for addressing unmet need for SUD treatment.

In October 2023, San Francisco launched its **CARE Court** program, which seeks to engage adults with serious mental health issues in a court-ordered CARE plan—including behavioral health services—for up to 12 months.<sup>37</sup> Although eligibility for this program is targeted toward people with schizophrenia and other psychotic disorders, individuals dually diagnosed with SUD are eligible.

**SB43** was implemented on January 1, 2024. SB43 updates the definition of the “grave disability” necessary for involuntary psychiatric holds and conservatorship to include “severe” substance use disorder. Under instructions from the Mayor, the City has formed an executive steering committee to guide implementation, and SFDPH will adopt and implement policies to identify appropriate individuals for conservatorship.

## IX. Looking Forward

Looking forward, the Department seeks to pursue the highest-impact strategies available to address unmet need and fully realize Treatment on Demand. These include:

*Improving wait times for care by expanding treatment beds and capacity where needed and contracting for new and as-needed services faster.*

New beds tentatively expected in 2024-2025 include up to 46 new beds to serve dually diagnosed individuals, and 20 stabilization beds for individuals transitioning into SUD treatment. The Department has recently undertaken an updated review of its bed inventory and needs to optimize resource use. It will use findings to inform additional decision-making on what additional treatment beds are most needed.

It is vital for the health of people with SUD that SFDPH be able to provide care that is timely and appropriate for their needs. In February 2024, the Department sought and received Board of Supervisors approval for an ordinance authorizing the Department to directly purchase services from entities that would provide behavioral health and public health residential and treatment services, waiving any competitive solicitation or local business enterprise requirements for up to five years. The Department intends to use this waiver to reduce wait times, diversify its providers, increase flexibility to place clients, and relieve administrative burden, all while maintaining commitment to transparency, reporting, and monitoring requirements. The Department is deeply appreciative of Board support for this measure.

*Expanding access to treatment that evidence suggests has the highest impact. This includes medication treatment for opioid addiction and contingency management for stimulant use disorder.*

As outlined under **VII. Programmatic updates**, SFDPH is already expanding access to medication treatment and contingency management. Further expansion objectives include improving access to and retention in methadone in settings including at ZSFG and via mobile sites; expanding buprenorphine treatment in BHS sites; increasing the number of programs offering contingency management; and improving referral pathways to contingency management programs.

*Continuing to refine use of available data and seek new data sources to improve measurement of population demand and need, as well as SUD service effectiveness.*

This year, SFDPH aims to continue to refine metrics to better reflect the scope of need and treatment provision across the SFHN. We will continue to pursue new data sources and refined metrics to better estimate unmet need and demand and improve measurement of service utilization and effectiveness within existing data infrastructure.

Pursuant to Article XIII of Chapter 10 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, Section 10.100-324, the following memorandum reports on uses of the SOS Program Fund during Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23. This reporting period covers July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023.

In FY 2022-23, the Mayor’s Office on Housing and Community Development (MOHCD) made no expenditures, and DAS made no disbursements, of SOS Program funds. Instead, MOHCD continued to leverage one-time state Permanent Local Housing Allocation Program (PHLA) funds for expenditures that otherwise would have been covered by SOS Program funds.

### Fund history

#### Fund activity to date

The Senior Operating Subsidies Program Fund was established in FY 2019-20 through a one-time, \$5 million Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund appropriation granted by Board of Supervisors. As reported in an October 17, 2022 memorandum from HSA Executive Director Trent Rhorer to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors on SOS Program Fund expenditures in FY 2020-21 and FY 2021-22, DAS approved a \$1.8 million disbursement in FY 2019-20. Using this disbursement, MOHCD increased the affordability of all units at 1296 Shotwell in FY 2019-20 and FY 2021-22. These transactions represent all SOS Program Fund activity to date.

## **\$52 million state PHLA grant allocation**

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In February 2020, MOHCD received a one-time, multi-year, \$52 million state PHLA grant via the California Department of Housing and Community Development. MOHCD has used, and will continue to use, this state grant funding, rather than city SOS Program Fund, to support SOS Program-eligible projects until the state funding is fully spent.

## **Balances as of the end of FY 2022-23**

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As of the end of FY 2022-23, MOHCD carries a \$1,140,870 balance from the November 2019 SOS Program Fund transfer. DAS holds the remaining \$3,167,562 of the original \$5 million allocation.

The City and County of San Francisco (City), Office of the Treasurer and Tax Collector (Treasurer), coordinates with the Office of the Controller's City Services Auditor (CSA) to

conduct quarterly reviews of the City's investment fund and an annual assessment of the Treasurer's compliance with the California Government Code (Code), sections 27130 through 27137, which addresses requirements for the Treasury Oversight Committee (Committee). CSA engaged Macias Gini & O'Connell, LLP (MGO) to perform these services.

CSA today issued a report of the agreed-upon procedures for the year ended June 30, 2023. MGO found that the Treasurer and the Committee complied with the Code's investment requirements and the City's investment policy.

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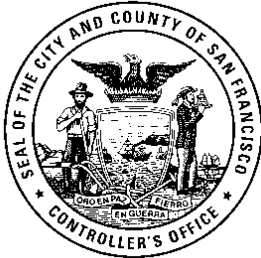

## **Independent Accountant’s Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures Related to Treasury Oversight Committee Compliance**

Honorable Mayor and Members of the Board of Supervisors  
City and County of San Francisco, California

We have performed the procedures enumerated below on the Office of the Treasurer and Tax Collector’s (Treasurer) compliance with the requirements of California Government Code Article 6, Sections 27130 through 27137 (Code), which addresses requirements for the Treasury Oversight Committee (Committee), for the year ended June 30, 2023. Treasurer’s management and the Committee are responsible for Treasurer’s compliance with those requirements.

The City and County of San Francisco (City) has agreed to and acknowledged that the procedures performed are appropriate to meet the intended purposes of assisting the City in evaluating Treasurer’s compliance with the requirements of the Code. This report may not be suitable for any other purpose. The procedures performed may not address all the items of interest to a user of this report and may not meet the needs of all users of this report and, as such, users are responsible for determining whether the procedures are appropriate for their purposes.

The procedures and the associated findings are as follows:

1. We obtained a listing of the members of the Committee as of June 30, 2023 to determine whether the members meet the requirements outlined in Article 6, Section 27132 of the Code.

**Finding:** No compliance exceptions were found as a result of our procedures.

2. We obtained confirmations from the Committee members that they are in compliance with Article 6, Section 27132.1 through 27132.3 of the Code.

**Finding:** No compliance exceptions were found as a result of our procedures.

3. We obtained the Investment Policy dated May 2021 and verified that it was reviewed by the Committee and included authorized investments; maximum security term; brokers and dealers selection; limits on the receipt of gifts; investment report; cost calculation and apportionment policy; deposit terms and conditions; and funds withdrawal criteria pursuant to Article 6, Section 27133 of the Code.

**Finding:** The Investment Policy dated May 2021 remained effective through June 30, 2023.

4. We verified that City's funds were used to pay for the costs incurred to comply with the investment compliance requirements pursuant to Article 6, Section 27135 of the Code.

**Finding:** No compliance exceptions were found as a result of our procedures.

5. We read the City's withdrawal policy in the Investment Policy dated May 2021, which read as follows:

"The Treasurer will honor all requests to withdraw funds for normal cash flow purposes that are approved by the San Francisco Controller. Any requests to withdraw funds for purposes other than cash flow, such as for external investing, shall be subject to the consent of the Treasurer. In accordance with California Government Code Sections 27136 et seq. and 27133(h) et seq., such requests for withdrawals must first be made in writing to the Treasurer. These requests are subject to the Treasurer's consideration for the stability and predictability of the Pooled Investment Fund, or the adverse effect on the interests of the other depositors in the Pooled Investment Fund. Any withdrawal for such purposes shall be at the value shown on the Controller's books as of the date of withdrawal."

For requests to withdraw funds for purposes other than cash flow, verify that such requests were made in writing to and were approved by the Treasurer.

**Finding:** Treasurer management represented that no such withdrawals were made for purposes other than cash flow, such as external investing, during the period from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023. Accordingly, we did not perform any verification procedures.

6. We read the Committee's quarterly minutes to determine that the Committee was not directing individual investment decisions, selecting individual investment advisors, brokers or dealers, or impinging on the day-to-day operations of the Treasurer pursuant to Article 6, Section 27137 of the Code.

**Finding:** No compliance exceptions were found as a result of our procedures.

7. We read the Investment Policy dated May 2021 to verify that it indicates the Pooled Investment Fund shall be prudently invested to meet the specific objectives of (1) Safety of Principal, (2) Liquidity, and (3) Return on Investments.

**Finding:** No compliance exceptions were found as a result of our procedures.

8. We selected the June 2023 investment listing and compared the investments listed to the types of investments authorized per the Code Sections 53600 et seq.

**Finding:** No compliance exceptions were found as a result of our procedures.

9. We then summarized the investments listed in the June 30, 2023 investment listing by issuer and by investment type and computed percentages of each to the total portfolio. We compared those percentages to the limits stated in the Investment Policy dated May 2021 to determine the City's compliance. In addition, we summarized investments by type and days to maturity and compared the number of days to the limits stated in the Policy to determine the City's compliance.

**Finding:** No compliance exceptions were found as a result of our procedures.

We were engaged by the City to perform this agreed-upon procedures engagement and conducted our engagement in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. We were not engaged to and did not conduct an examination or review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on Treasurer's compliance with the Code for the year ended June 30, 2023. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

We are required to be independent of Treasurer and the City and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our agreed-upon procedures engagement.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of Treasurer's management, the Treasury Oversight Committee, and the City's Board of Supervisors, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than those specified parties.

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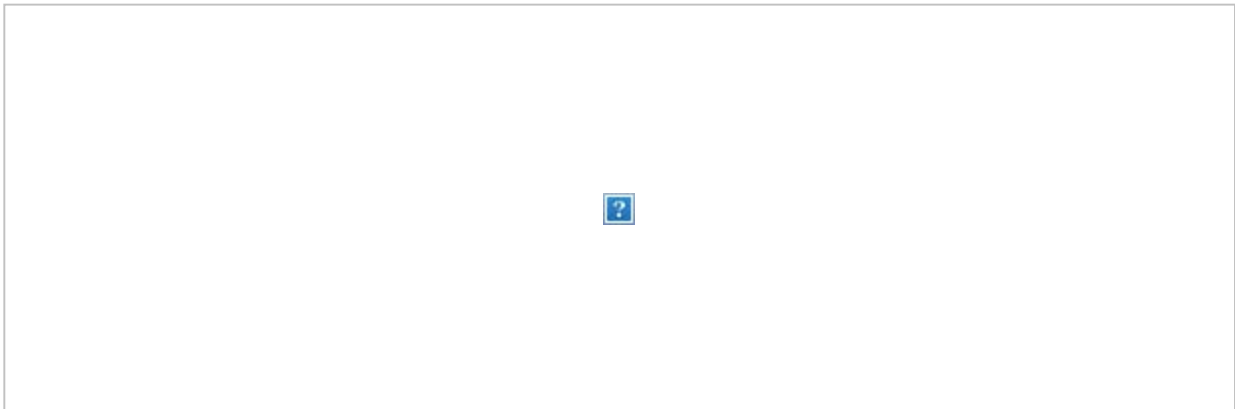

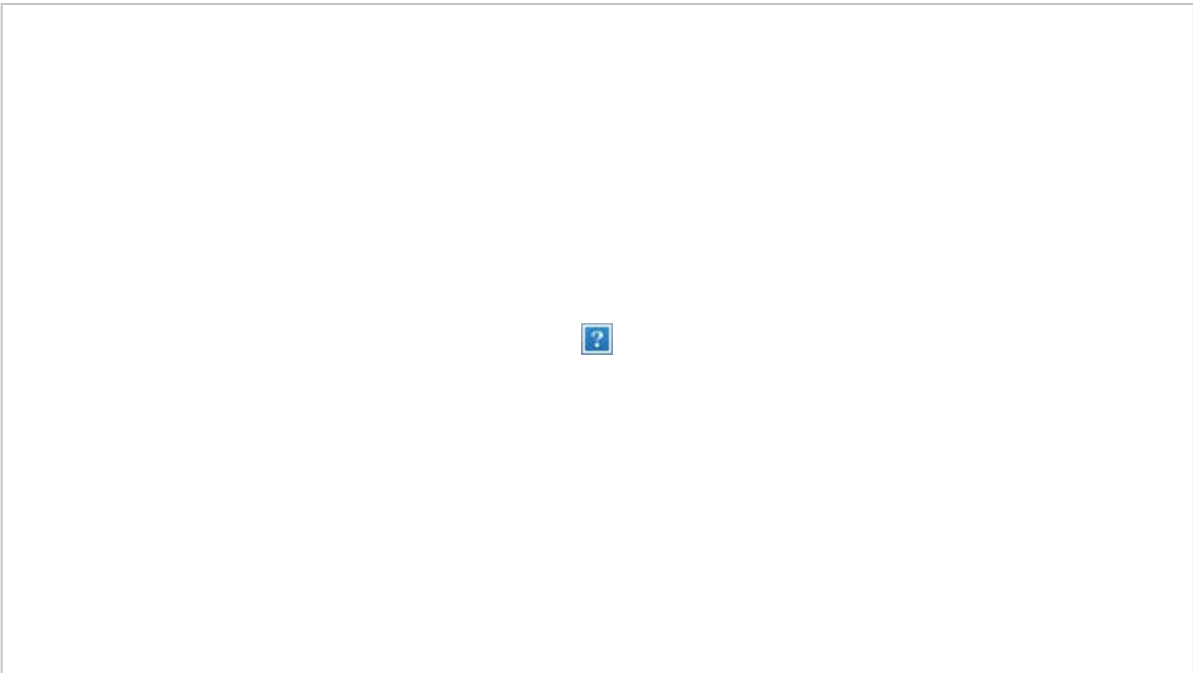

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### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In October 2022 the Office of the City Administrator (City Administrator) issued new guidance intended to streamline the contracting process for departments of the City and County of San Francisco (City). The guidance allows city departments to substitute endorsements with certificates of insurance (COI) documentation to fulfill insurance requirements. At the request of the City Administrator, the Office of the Controller (Controller), City Services Auditor (CSA), Audits Division, conducted a limited-scope assessment to evaluate city departments' compliance with the new guidance. CSA may revisit the subject in the future to determine whether an audit should be conducted.

The assessment found that city departments did not always ensure city vendors provided appropriate and sufficient insurance to meet agreement requirements. Further, city departments often provided more documentation than required by the new guidance or did not upload relevant documentation to the City's financial system, PeopleSoft. The exhibit below illustrates these exceptions in the sampled agreements.

## BACKGROUND, OBJECTIVE & METHODOLOGY

### Background

*Government Operations Initiative (Gov Ops)*. In April 2022 the City Administrator, in partnership with the Controller and Department of Human Resources, launched Gov Ops to lead the City's efforts to make city hiring, contracting, and financial operations more effective and efficient. For the purposes of our assessment, Gov Ops's goals are to streamline the City's procurement and contracting processes. According to the City Administrator, Gov Ops plans to remove barriers to accessing contracting opportunities and reduce administrative burden and red tape for city contracting staff.

*Chapter 21 & 21G*. Chapter 21 of the San Francisco Administrative Code (Chapter 21) governs the acquisition of commodities and (non-construction) services, including both professional services and general services.<sup>1</sup> Chapter 21G of the San Francisco Administrative Code (Chapter 21G) governs grants awarded by city departments.

*Proof of Insurance Changes*. In October 2022 the City Administrator, through the Risk Management Division, issued guidance that revised its criteria for acceptable insurance documentation for Chapter 21 and 21G agreements by allowing city departments to collect COIs instead of insurance endorsements to demonstrate that vendors met contractual insurance requirements. The purpose of this change is to speed up the agreement review and approval process, while also reducing the amount of correspondence needed between suppliers and city departments to collect proof of insurance.<sup>2</sup> Furthermore, according to the department, there is no evidence that insurance endorsements provide any additional protection to the City.

<sup>1</sup> Chapter 6 of the San Francisco Administrative Code governs procurement and contracting of construction-related services.

<sup>2</sup> Per Chapter 21, Section 21.20, all city contracts subject to Chapter 21 must conform to the insurance requirements established by the City's Risk Manager (carried out by the Risk Management Division).

*Nonapplicable Agreements.* The guidance did not apply to some of the agreements selected for our sample testing. Examples include delegated purchasing authority purchase orders, charitable trust departments that are exempt from the contracting process per Section 5.101 of the City Charter (which applies to the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco), and services related to employee benefits. CSA selected 65 out of 1,086 agreements for review; however, 10 of those selected were not applicable to this assessment and were therefore excluded from the fieldwork's results.

## Objective

The objective of this assessment was to determine to what extent city departments have complied with the collection of insurance documents pursuant to the new guidance issued by the City Administrator. CSA also determined whether city departments provided endorsements after the new guidance was issued.

## Scope

The assessment considered Chapter 21 and 21G agreements for professional services, general services, commodities, and grants executed by city departments from November 1, 2022, through March 31, 2023.

## Methodology

To achieve the objective, CSA:

- Reviewed relevant guidance from the City Administrator.
- Selected a stratified purposeful sample of 65 out of 1,086 agreements based on contract size and coverage across all city departments with an active relevant agreement in our scope.
- Retrieved agreement and insurance documentation from the City's financial system, PeopleSoft, or city departments.
- Reviewed agreement and insurance documentation for completeness and sufficiency, in accordance with city guidance and agreement requirements.

This assessment is for a nonaudit service. Generally accepted government auditing standards do not cover nonaudit services, which are defined as professional services other than audits or attestation engagements. Therefore, the City Administrator is responsible for the substantive outcomes of the work performed during this assessment and is responsible to be in a position, in fact and appearance, to make an informed judgment on the results of the nonaudit service.

## RESULTS

### **Observation 1: 11 percent of agreements sampled did not meet insurance requirements per their agreements.**

Of the 55 applicable agreements sampled, six (11 percent) did not have documentation that met the insurance requirements. The insurance documentation provided by departments was inadequate for several reasons, including that the documentation did not:

- Have the correct amount of insurance coverage, as stated in the agreement.
- Include a waiver of subrogation for workers' compensation.
- Verify that insurance policies were active when the agreement was executed.

Without proof that suppliers obtained complete and sufficient insurance coverage, the City does not have assurance that its contractors have the necessary insurance required by their contract. Departments can gain this assurance by collecting appropriate documentation showing sufficient insurance coverage.

### **Observation 2: Neither an agreement or COI was documented in PeopleSoft for 26 of the applicable sampled agreements.**

26 of 55 (47 percent) applicable sampled agreements were missing either an agreement or COI in PeopleSoft, despite guidance from the City Administrator encouraging departments to upload their agreements and insurance documentation requirements. For the agreements that were not uploaded to PeopleSoft, CSA reached out to departments to obtain documentation.

While it is not mandatory by city policy to have the electronic copy of the agreement and COI uploaded to PeopleSoft, the City Administrator recommends uploading agreements and associated documents to the financial system. This ensures a central location for important financial and procurement information and that documentation is complete and accounted for.

### **Observation 3: More than half of the agreements reviewed included insurance endorsements that were no longer required.**

Of the 55 applicable sampled agreements, 39 (71 percent) collected and maintained insurance endorsements that were no longer required according to the City Administrator's guidance. Contracting departments may be spending unnecessary time and effort to obtain and verify extraneous information from vendors when they could instead obtain simpler COIs to comply with the City Administrator's current insurance requirements.

The City Administrator's Risk Management Division provided training to several departments to discuss the new guidance for Chapter 21 and 21G agreements. When asked why endorsements were provided, one department responded that most of their suppliers are used to including

endorsements in their insurance documents, and that the department does not edit or delete from what suppliers submit. The department also does not specifically request endorsements and will inform their suppliers that a COI alone is sufficient.

## Recommendations

The Office of the City Administrator should:

1. Continue to remind city departments to review agreements, COIs, and other insurance documentation to ensure suppliers are maintaining the correct insurance coverage for each agreement.
2. Further consider making the retention of agreements and insurance documentation in PeopleSoft be a requirement of contract execution.
3. Continue to ensure contracting departments are aware of the new guidance, and if necessary, provide additional training to departments on the changes to the new insurance documentation requirements.

Dear Mr. de la Rosa,

Thank you for the opportunity for the Office of the City Administrator (CAO) to review the Assessment Report and respond to its findings and recommendations. We are thankful for the time and effort spent by staff members of the City Services Auditor Division of the Controller's Office learning about and assessing the City's insurance documentation.

Our office requested that the City Services Auditor complete this assessment following a change in guidance from the Risk Management Division of our office to contracting departments about proof of insurance documentation in October 2022. At that time, Risk Management expanded the definition of acceptable proof of insurance documentation, which resulted in insurance endorsements no longer being required in Chapter 21 & 21G agreements.

Following this change in guidance, our office wanted to understand the impact of this change on insurance documentation that City departments are collecting. We appreciate the Controller's Office's findings and recommendations to ensure that proof of insurance documentation is being properly collected in accordance with this updated guidance to City departments. We wish to provide additional clarification on two items noted in your Assessment Report:

- 1) CSA recommends that CAO "further consider making the retention of agreements and insurance documentation in PeopleSoft be a requirement of contract execution." While CAO agrees with having a single place where all contracting and insurance documentation is saved, we do not believe that Risk Management nor CAO possess the ultimate ability to enforce the disposition of all contracting documents. Given this, Risk Management provides guidance to departments to append the contract file with explanations about any variances in insurance documentation.
- 2) The Assessment Report notes that "more than half of the agreements reviewed included insurance endorsements that were no longer required." We wish to clarify that the updated guidance was never intended to stop the collection of additional documents, but instead to expand the definition of acceptable evidence. In some cases, insurance carriers provide this documentation to the City automatically without a City department asking for it. As such, this additional evidence is not necessarily bad or negative, but may simply represent how the insurance industry operates.

I, Chris Ward Kline, knowing the penalties of perjury, submit the following factual information.

I, Chris Ward Kline, have become aware of more than one person or agency using systems, apps, software and other technology by granting, providing credentials to third parties or using their current credentials in a manner that is inconsistent with state and federal law that violate state and federal constitutional requirements. The following is submitted:

1) Within Human Services Agency, these credentials are being used with their systems such as Sherlock (Investigative tool) to use voice technology, to record call technology, to cyberstalk citizens, place illegally on digital surveillance for purposes to alter outcomes, alter solutions, alter data collection, to discredit citizens, to force relocation (reverse gerrymandering), to force compliance, to replace current employees with new employees that are easily influenced with current political parties, and for other personal, political and religious reasons. Within Human Services Agency, they conduct investigations for adoption, taking children away from parents, illegal gun possession, substance abuse disorders, mental health disorders, restraining orders, welfare services, etc. and use voice technology and phone technology to collect information through various technologies and systems. The system uses voice technology and phone technology to use surveys, questionnaires in which a cloud is placed on the person(s) for any extended period of time - the time, legally should only be brief and not long lasting but some using the technology place on individuals for long durations or even 24/7/365 which causes undue mental stress, anxiety that can lead to mental harm and physical harm.

In San Francisco, there is a company named Gestalt Institute located on Market Street that treats mental health and substance abuse disorders amongst other things. There is illegal technology close to their established physical addresses that is used to place digital surveillance on members of the public that simply walk pass, conduct business in areas of operation, or areas that have been leased to 3rd party tenants to include a Bar named Gestalt located in San Francisco. This bar with or without the consent of the owner, is used to place patrons on illegal digital surveillance for personal, political and religious reasons. There are others affiliated with this company that are out of state providers from other states.

2) SFMTA uses systems with their normal business operations. There is one bus stop located next to city hall at McAllister and Van Ness in which they system states it is configuring with the time being one hour off of the correct time. This is a prime location for a third party, hacker or others with appropriate credentials to easily access the SFMTA and to bounce signals to City Hall or passing pedestrians or motorist to impact San Francisco in a negative manner at any time.

3) San Francisco uses Motorola Communications Computer Aided Dispatch System and Mobile Computing System - see attached which will be discussed and likely approved at today's Board of Supervisors meeting.

Any of these systems currently could face a 'man in the middle attack' with anyone using their credentials illegally, giving out credentials to third parties, or individuals accessing these and other systems illegally through various means. At least one or more persons in San Francisco has given out credentials illegally and outside the scope of their employment and job duties.

It is very likely that credentials outside the normal scope to 1) churches, 2) politicians, 3) political donors, 4) retiring public officials who want to maintain utilization of systems outside the scope of acceptable usages, 5) and due illegal hacking from other counties, states, federal entities and foreign countries.

The illegal usage of credentials can alter outcomes, alter or influence healthcare, policing, commerce, safety and personal welfare. A few are benefiting financially and altering social outcomes to include causing increases in alterations, traffic collisions, health care issues such as increases in overdoses, suicides, violence to name just a few.

I respectively ask for the DOJ and FBI to investigate the illegal credentials that are being used within the city and county of San Francisco. It is also apparent that these few are using these systems on citizens outside the city and county of San Francisco, crossing county boundaries and state boundaries.

I have spoke about this in San Francisco at the Committee of Information Technology, Board of Supervisors, Health Commission, Police Commission to alert them and seek their assistance in moving forward with resolving and correcting this issue which several could be facing civil and criminal penalties. I have not yet spoken at the Human Services Agency Commission concerning this issue.

SFMTA runs rampant and unchecked damaging San Francisco neighborhoods and business corridors, and it is destroying our beloved City. I urge you to direct SFMTA to close the intersection of West Portal Avenue and Ulloa Street to car traffic to make it safe for all people, especially children, seniors, and people with disabilities as well as those walking, taking public transportation, and biking in and around West Portal Station. Now is the time for action, and I urge you to take immediate action to make this intersection — and the broader area — safer for all people, while improving the speed and reliability of public transportation to and from West Portal.

The intersection of West Portal Avenue and Ulloa Streets is dangerously designed and, with its numerous Muni stops and large number of people walking and biking through the area, it should be closed to car traffic to make the area safe for people, especially children, seniors, and people with disabilities who often use walk and public transportation as well as visit nearby the Public Library's West Portal branch, West Portal Playground, and shops along West Portal Avenue.

On March 16, 2024, two people — including a child — were killed and three more people were injured when a driver crashed a car near this intersection.

Closing this intersection to cars will instantly make it safer for people, including people who need to drive or use cars, in addition to improving the speed and reliability of public transportation to and from West Portal.

Back in the mid-1990s, I lived on 38th avenue near Fulton. Even back then, crossing Fulton was a terrifying experience. Since there were no traffic lights near where I lived, I would try to cross at stop signs, but it didn't make a difference. Traffic would rarely stop for me. Sometimes I would just have to take my life into my own hands and run across the street if I didn't see any traffic coming.

Nothing has changed since those days. Fulton is still terrifying to cross. Cars are allowed to go way too fast on Fulton! People are dying on Fulton Street, and something needs to be done. As years pass drivers get more and more emboldened to speed. Emboldened to run red lights, to not stop at stop signs, to not slow down when making turns. San Francisco has failed at Vision Zero. But that doesn't mean changes can't still be made.

This last January 31st, an elder was killed crossing the street at Arguello and Fulton. Both of these streets are highly problematic. I cross Arguello almost every day, and I can attest to that. Even pushing a walker, cars barely notice me as I cross the street.

The vast majority of car trips in San Francisco will never pass through a speed detection zone. And this legislation still allows drivers to exceed the speed limit by up to 10 mph, a deadly margin

What's needed is more: a reduction in speed limits throughout the city, as well as increased use of traffic calming, despite a vocal anti-pedestrian, anti-cyclist majority.

Vision zero has become just another disposable catch-phrase, without significance. We need to take Vision Zero and Transit First seriously. No tragedy like this can be allowed to pass without major action.

My 90 year old mother lives in the Ingleside neighborhood. I frequently take her to hair appointments, shopping and medical visits in the area. I have been shocked at the speeding vehicles that drive through the dense neighborhood. Seniors, young students, families and small business customers must navigate the dangerous intersections where speeding drivers plow through yellow lights or drive at excessive speeds along West Portal. I feel like a security guard when walking with my Mother. It brings her comfort and joy to visit memorable businesses and enjoy the vibrant neighborhood of West Portal. Mom grew up in the neighborhood, attending Aptos and Lincoln and attending church in the area. At her age, this walk around town gives her a peaceful joy of remembrance but even she is alarmed by the speeding vehicles that are an everyday or hour occurrence on this boulevard. However the risk of walking around the street feels more unsafe. I can't imagine the worry of parents of all the students who enjoy the neighborhood after school lets out. They must be equally concerned for their child's safety after this incident.

The retired police program of safety ambassadors provide a sense of safety and security but I wondered if they might provide feedback to the city on unsafe driving conditions in this area. Are they able to play a role in providing information on this issue? Is West Portal considered to be a test location for the camera program? This would be helpful.

I have sent an email to Supervisor Melgar expressing our concern. I am deeply sorry for the loss of life due to reckless driving. The community is heartbroken. This is a tragic event. I'm advocating for speed monitoring and cameras for the neighborhood to reduce the risk of any future event of this magnitude..

Mayor Breed and Board of Supervisors,

I am saddened to hear today's news about a 3 month old baby that was the latest victim of the terrible car crash in West Portal last weekend. I am a resident of D4 but I commute to D10 mostly by bicycle (occasionally driving, occasionally taking Muni). The state of the roadways in our city is dangerous. Some of the things I see when I traverse the city every day are outrageous and what presents the biggest danger when commuting or is the blatant disregard for traffic signals and speed limits by motorists. San Francisco seems to be the Wild West where there is no incentive to follow basic road safety. Not only do motorists not adhere to the agreed upon rules of the road, but the roads themselves are dangerous with little to no basic infrastructure to decrease vehicle speeds.

I have attended vigils for 3 children that have been innocent victims of traffic violence by no fault of their own in the past six months. One in at 4th and King at the end of last year and now another in West Portal. I thought, at that first vigil, that the needle would surely move in regards to Vision Zero and the city's commitment to it. A child has died - I thought to myself - surely the outrage that follows will be enough for San Francisco leadership to drop whatever they are doing to prevent this kind of thing from happening again. But here we are today, and it has happened again. Three dead children - here in our city - a city which is supposed to be a beacon of civility and progressive ideology.

The family waiting at the bus stop in front of the West Portal Library branch were doing what I myself have done with my family too many times to count. We get off the train at west portal and transfer to the L shuttle in front of the library. I feel like this tragedy was close to home for me. These were my peers - a young family with young children. Going to the zoo. That's what we do - often - why is this activity unsafe? How could it possibly be?

The West Portal area is bustling with pedestrians, young and elderly alike. There are medical offices, restaurants, coffee shops, ice cream... too many businesses to list. And despite that, a motorist was able to drive their personal vehicle at freeway speed through it all. This should not be possible - it should not be physically possible to operate a vehicle at that speed in that particular area. There should be basic infrastructure in place which passively restricts vehicle speed or enforcement, at the very least.

For example, how is it possible that someone can still drive a vehicle through that very same intersection at the very same speed today? Right now if they wanted to. Ulloa should be closed until proper infrastructure is in place to prevent this same thing from immediately happening again.

It is your job as leadership to consider the safety of us residents - I am urging you to put infrastructure in place city wide to prevent tragedies like what happened last weekend. The streets of San Francisco are not safe, and it's because of our dangerous roadways and disregard for basic traffic safety. Someone is injured by a motor vehicle every 3 hours in our city, and someone is killed every 12 days. How is this acceptable?

If the death of three children on our roadways does not demand that you immediately take action, what would? What will it take to make the roads of San Francisco safe if not the death of a 3 month old baby?

I am writing in objection to this appeal [file no. 240162](#) submitted by Down With This Sort of Thing LLC, dba Casements, requesting an amendment to the 10 pm closure of their outdoor patio space.

As one of five long standing Mission residents who attended a recent hearing to vocalize support for the Planning Department's Conditional Use Authorization for Casements to move their outdoor activities indoors at 10:00 pm, I urge you to please consider the community's interests.

While I understand the challenges faced by small businesses like Casements and fully support effective ideas to help them survive, there are compelling reasons to maintain the 10 pm closure condition. Here are some key points addressing the claims made in their appeal:

- 1. Presence of Planning Commissioners:** The absence of some Planning Commissioners during the hearing should not invalidate the decision, as it was transparent and reached with input from both city and affected community members.
- 2. Clarity on Requests:** Casements asserted that dissenting voices were unclear on their request. As one of those voices, I fully understood their one-sided request to extend patio operating hours in a residential neighborhood to 11:00 pm on weekdays and midnight on weekends. Even though amplified sound / live music may end at 10:00 pm, the noise of increasingly intoxicated people past 10:00 pm presents an even more obnoxious noise disturbance than music. It seems, based on their appeal, that they were not clear on our concerns which ranged from excessive noise past 10:00 pm which continues to invite disruptive people to gather near the perimeter of their patio leaving piles of broken bottles, pools of urine and other trash that eventually spread to Capp Street and beyond.

3. **Operational History:** While Casements highlights their incident-free operation, it does not take into consideration the repeated complaints from us to non-emergency police and 311 about after-hours noise, public drinking, dumping and drug use that have noticeably become worse since Casements opened their open air patio at the corner of the California Parking Lot during the 2020 pandemic. We have also made repeated attempts to contact bar management both in person and over the phone only to be turned away, ignored and undermined. These should be acknowledged as incidents even though authorities may not have been involved.
4. **Opportunity to respond:** Casements stated that they were not given the opportunity to respond to our dissenting voices. Unfortunately, the process does not allow for back-and-forth arguments. Consequently, we only had two short minutes to voice our support for the condition. In contrast, they took full advantage of a complex government approval process to establish a permanent outdoor live music patio without properly contacting any of us neighbors before it was too late.
5. **Community Support:** Upholding the 10 pm closure aligns with supporting small businesses and fostering community spaces while respecting residents' needs—a fair compromise.
6. **Financial Benefit vs. Community Impact:** While Casements asserts a significant financial benefit from extending their hours, they cannot completely disregard the negative impact that their outdoor patio has already had on our community as outlined in point #3 in addition to the negative effects on our health and working lives from lack of sound sleep.
7. **Economic Impact on Staff:** The appeal highlights potential job losses and reduced hours for staff if the 10 pm patio closure is maintained. While sympathetic to the economic challenges, you also must consider the negative economic impact on our property value because of the noise and filth associated with an establishment like Casements who merely pretends to care about the community around them – hence the appeal.
8. **Sales Percentage:** The appeal provides detailed sales percentages to support the request for extended hours. Once again, the financial gains for Casements should be weighed against the potential negative impact of noise pollution on our property values which will be even more significant in a great city like San Francisco.
9. **Community Gathering Space:** Casements emphasizes its role as a community gathering space, particularly during the pandemic. This is great. We just want them to move the party indoors at 10:00 pm so that we can enjoy our evenings too, especially on weekends.
10. **Community Diversity:** Casements identifies itself as a queer, immigrant, and female-owned business, which has nothing to do with the issue. We are all part of this proud community and only wish them well. We just want them to move the party indoors at 10:00 pm like all other comparable businesses around them who truly respect their neighbors.

In conclusion, I urge the Board of Supervisors to prioritize the community's well-being. The potential financial benefits to Casements must be balanced against residents' need for peace and quality of life.

Dear Mayor Breed, Supervisor Safaí, and Director McSpadden,

Cities across the country are experiencing a surge in both immigration and homelessness as families fleeing violence and persecution come to the U.S. to seek asylum. In San Francisco, a city that has had designated Sanctuary City status since 1989, the local government has been absent in its response, leaving small children to sleep in vehicles, on MUNI, and under gas station roofs.

**We write in support of Supervisor Safaí's resolution, and ask that San Francisco immediately do the following:**

- 1) Prioritize families for shelter**
- 2) Establish additional shelter for families, including immigrant families**
- 3) Create a multilingual public dashboard where anyone can view the Department of Homelessness' shelter waitlist and where immigrants can monitor their own progress toward receiving shelter.**

These are common sense solutions that more fully meet San Francisco's proclamation as a Sanctuary City and make our city a better place for families and children. As part of Calvary Presbyterian's community—a church that has been a sanctuary congregation supporting immigrants through accompaniment, education, and advocacy—we have seen firsthand the need for more supportive, family-friendly policies that enable families to live safely and securely. We cannot continue to make up for the City's broken systems and shortcomings.

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

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

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

Dear Mayor Breed,

I urge you to direct San Francisco's Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) to aggressively increase the city's investment in water recycling today.

Last summer, a large harmful algal bloom has spread across the Bay, leaving unimaginable numbers of dead fish in its wake. We're still learning about this particular bloom, but what we do know is that San Francisco's sewage effluent contributes to excessive levels of nutrients in San Francisco Bay that make the Bay fertile territory for the

spread of harmful algae blooms.

Water recycling and other wastewater management technologies can help by reducing the volume of polluted discharges into the Bay. In addition, by producing potable supplies, water recycling will reduce San Francisco's reliance on water diverted from the Tuolumne River, increasing the city's resilience to climate change effects on water supply.

Other cities have learned the lessons of California's unpredictable climate and are quickly adopting water recycling to reduce their burden on the ecosystem, while increasing the reliability of their supply. Orange County gets more than 75 percent of its water through its water reuse program. Las Vegas recycles nearly all of its water used indoors. And Los Angeles is on the path to reusing 100 percent of its wastewater by 2035.

But, as San Francisco's draft Urban Water Management Plan recently revealed, the city currently has no plans to make recycled water widely available in the next 25 years. Instead, the city is pursuing multiple expensive and misguided lawsuits so that it can continue to rely, almost exclusively, on the Tuolumne River—one of the state's most overapped rivers—for the next several decades. San Francisco and large agribusiness water districts divert four out of every five gallons of water that flow in the Tuolumne River during a typical year.

This overuse has caused the river's once mighty Chinook Salmon populations to crash. Meanwhile, low freshwater flows contribute to deteriorating water quality—including harmful algae blooms—in the Delta and San Francisco Bay.

I agree with Supervisor Aaron Peskin that “it is time for San Francisco and our sister cities in the nine Bay Area counties to start looking at what kinds of infrastructure investments will need to be made as this becomes, sadly, the new normal.” It's unacceptable for the city with the nation's greenest reputation to shirk its responsibilities to conserve California's precious and unpredictable water supply.

I support increasing river flows to protect San Francisco Bay's fisheries, water quality, and recreation. The city should do its part to protect the Bay and its rivers—water recycling is a common-sense way to limit the city's water use, increase the reliability of its supply, and protect the Bay from harmful wastewater treatment plant effluent.
