20	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

22	Section 1. Findings	
23	(a) Recent criminal justice reform legislation (AB 1540 Ting) passed by the California	
24	Legislature in 2021, to be effective on January 1, 2022, together with existing law (Penal Code	

section 1170 (d)), will potentially provide thousands of people in California prisons and

- hundreds from San Francisco with the opportunity to have their sentences significantly
 reduced in the interests of justice and based on a variety of factors.
 - (b) San Francisco County was selected to be part of the County Resentencing Pilot Program and thus to receive \$750,000 to spend over three years in order to support individuals seeking resentencing under newly enacted Penal Code section 1170.03. (AB 145.) The County Resentencing Pilot Program is described in Penal Code section 1170.01 and mandates that, "All funding provided to a participating public defender's office shall be used for the purposes of supporting the resentencing of individuals pursuant to the pilot, including, but not limited to, ensuring adequate staffing of deputy public defenders and other support staff to represent incarcerated persons under consideration for resentencing, identifying and recommending incarcerated persons" who should be considered for resentencing, "and developing reentry and release plans."
 - (c) To meet this mandate, the County Resentencing Pilot Program, also referred to as The Freedom Project at the San Francisco Public Defender's Office, needs to add one full-time court alternative specialist (otherwise knowns as a mitigation specialist or social worker) and one full-time legal assistant, at minimum.
 - (d) The Freedom Project's mission is to exponentially reduce mass incarceration through legislative change and direct representation, ensuring all released are safe and supported.
 - (e) With the two additional grant-funded full-time positions, the Public Defender's Office will be able to monitor and evaluate both the change in client capacity and the outcomes.
 - (f) The grant award period is September 1, 2021 to September 1, 2024.
 - (g) The grant does not include any provision for indirect costs.

Section 2. Authorization to Accept and Expend Grant Funds

- (a) The Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Public Defender to accept and expend \$750,000 in grant funds from the Board of State and Community Corrections, to comply with Penal Code section 1170.01(e)'s mandate to use these funds to support the resentencing of individuals under newly enacted Penal Code section 1170.03, for example, by "ensuring adequate staffing of deputy public defenders and other support staff to represent incarcerated persons under consideration for resentencing, identifying and recommending incarcerated persons" who should be considered for resentencing, "and developing reentry and release plans".
- (b) The Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Public Defender to maximize use of available grant funds on program expenditures by not including indirect costs in the grant budget, and waiving indirect costs.
- (c) The Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Public Defender to expend any interest earned in accordance with the terms under which the principal is received and expended.

Section 3. Grant funded positions; Amendment to Fiscal Years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 Annual Salary Ordinance.

The hereinafter designated sections and items of Ordinance No. 109-21 (Annual Salary Ordinance File No. 210644 for FYs 2021-2022 and 2022-2023) are hereby amended to add two (2) positions to the Public Defender's Office as follows:
