DIRECTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO DEVELOP A LONG-TERM PLAN

TO PROTECT THE CITY'S INFRASTRUCTURE WHILE PRESERVING NATURAL

RESOURCES AND RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES ALONG OCEAN BEACH AND

ADDRESSING THE CONCERNS OF THE ADJACENT NEIGHBORHOODS.

WHEREAS, Seasonal fluctuations of waves, tides and winter storm events have resulted in natural coastal erosion along San Francisco's Ocean Beach; and,

WHEREAS, In some cases, such erosion has threatened to undermine public infrastructure, including portions of the Great Highway south of Sloat Boulevard; and,

WHEREAS, The City has funded several temporary/emergency projects implemented by the Department of Public Works (DPW) to arrest erosion when it has presented a threat to public facilities; and,

WHEREAS, On July 19, 1999, the Board of Supervisors, by Resolution 698-99 which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, concurred with an emergency declaration determination by the Director of DPW relating to the dangerous condition at Ocean Beach and along the Great Highway and prohibited the expenditure of funds on the use of hard structures in order to temporarily repair the erosion south of Sloat Boulevard pending the development and implementation of a long-term plan for ongoing maintenance at Ocean Beach and the Great Highway; and,

WHEREAS, The City of San Francisco, National Park Service, California Coastal Commission, Army Corps of Engineering, and private coastal engineers have individually or collectively evaluated the coastal processes that affect the Ocean Beach environs; and,

WHEREAS, A number of long-term recommendations or potential alternative solutions have been identified in these studies or suggested by the public; and,

WHEREAS, Development of long-term solutions to protect the City's infrastructure while preserving natural resources and recreational opportunities at Ocean Beach and addressing the concerns of the adjacent neighborhoods will require the support and partnership of Golden Gate National Recreation Area, multiple City departments, and other public agencies; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors directs DPW to evaluate, plan, design, and build a long-term project that protects the City's infrastructure from erosion while preserving natural resources and recreational opportunities and addressing the concerns of the adjacent neighborhoods; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That DPW will work expeditiously in coordination with the National Park Service, other public agencies, the Ocean Beach Task Force and other public organizations to develop and implement this long-term plan; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That DPW shall seek federal, state and local funds to support this project.
