3	Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to decrease the number of members of
4	the Mental Health SF Implementation Working Group from 13 to seven, require the
5	Working Group by July 31, 2025, to submit a final report containing an evaluation of the
6	Mental Health SF program and recommendations for program improvements, and
7	change the sunset date for the Working Group from September 1, 2026, to July 31,
8	2025.

14	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
15	
16	Section 1. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by revising Sections 5.42-2,
17	5.42-3, 5.44-4, and 5.44-5, to read as follows:
18	
19	SEC. 5.44-2. MEMBERSHIP.
20	(a) The Implementation Working Group shall consist of $\frac{137}{2}$ members, appointed by
21	the Mayor, or the Board of Supervisors, or the City Attorney, as specified in subsection (b).
22	(b) Seats 1-137 shall be filled as follows:
23	(1) Seat 1 shall be held by a person with expertise working on behalf of healthcare
24	workers, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
25	

1	(2) Seats 2 and 3 shall each be held by a person who identifies as having a mental
2	health condition or identifies as having both a mental health condition and substance use
3	condition ("dual diagnosis"), and who has accessed mental health or substance use services
4	in San Francisco, appointed by the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors, respectively.
5	(3) Seat 43 shall be held by a City peace officer, emergency medical technician, or
6	firefighter ("First Responder"), with expertise in mental health and/or substance use treatment,
7	appointed by the Mayor.
8	(4) Seats 54 and 6 shall each be held by a substance use treatment provider with
9	substance use expertise in mental health treatment and harm reduction, appointed by the Mayor
10	and the Board of Supervisors, respectively.
11	(5) Seat 5 shall be held by a treatment provider with mental health expertise, appointed by
12	the Board of Supervisors.
13	$(\underline{56})$ Seat $\underline{76}$ shall be held by a $\underline{mental\ health\ or\ substance\ use}$ treatment provider
14	with experience working with serving justice-involved populations criminal system-involved patients,
15	appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
16	(6) Seat 8 shall be held by a psychiatrist or other behavioral health professional with
17	expertise providing services to transitional age youth (ages 18-24) in San Francisco, appointed by the
18	Board of Supervisors.
19	(7) Seat 9 shall be held by a person with experience in the management or operation of
20	residential treatment programs, appointed by the Mayor.
21	(8) Seat 10 shall be held by an employee of the Department of Public Health with expertise
22	in working with dually diagnosed persons, appointed by the Mayor.
23	(9) Seat 11 shall be held by a person with experience providing supportive housing in San
24	Francisco, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

1	(107) Seat $127$ shall be held by an employee of the Department of Public Health
2	with experience in health systems or hospital administration, appointed by the Mayor.
3	(11) Seat 13 shall be held by a person with expertise in the field of health law, appointed
4	by the City Attorney.
5	
6	SEC. 5.44-3. ORGANIZATION AND TERMS OF OFFICE.
7	(a) Members of the Implementation Working Group shall serve two-year terms,
8	beginning on June 1, 2020; provided, however, the term of the initial appointees in Seats 1, 3, 5, 7,
9	9, and 11 shall be one year, expiring on June 1, 2021.
10	(b) Members of the Implementation Working Group shall serve at the pleasure of
11	their respective appointing authorities, and may be removed by the appointing authority at any
12	time.
13	(c) The Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and City Attorney shall make initial appointments to
14	the Implementation Working Group within 90 days of the effective date of this Article XLIV.
15	(d) The Implementation Working Group's inaugural meeting shall be held within 90 days of
16	the effective date of this Article XLIV, provided that a majority of the members have been appointed
17	and are present at the meeting. There shall be at least ten days' public notice of the inaugural meeting.
18	(ec) The Implementation Working Group shall meet at least once every other monthly
19	after the inaugural meeting for a total of at least six meetings per year.
20	(fd) Any member who misses three regular meetings of the Implementation Working
21	Group within any 12-month period without the express approval of the Implementation
22	Working Group at or before each missed meeting shall be deemed to have resigned from the
23	body 10 days after the third unapproved absence. The Implementation Working Group shall
24	inform the appointing authority for the resigned member's seat of any such resignation.

1	(ge) Service on the Implementation Working Group is voluntary and members shall
2	receive no compensation from the City, except that a City employee appointed to Seat 4, 10, 3
3	or $\underline{127}$ shall receive compensation from the City as an employee, because work on the
4	Implementation Working Group shall be considered part of the employee's work for the City.
5	(Af) The Department of Public Health shall provide administrative and clerical
6	support for the Implementation Working Group. All City officials and agencies shall cooperate
7	with the Implementation Working Group in the performance of its functions.
8	(ig) One representative from each of the following departments shall attend
9	meetings of the Implementation Working Group to be available for consultation by its
10	members: the Department of Public Health, the Human Services Agency, the Department of
11	Disability and Aging Services, and the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing.
12	(h) Transition and Continued Membership.
13	As of the effective date of the ordinance in Board File No. 240984 reducing the number of
14	members of the Implementation Working Group:
15	(1) The members occupying the seats formerly designated as seats 3, 8, 9, 10, 11, and
16	13 shall cease being members;
17	(2) The members occupying seats 1 and 2 shall continue to occupy seats 1 and 2,
18	respectively, until their current term expires or until their appointing authority appoints a new member
19	to fill that seat;
20	(3) The members occupying the seats formerly designated as seats 4, 5, 6, 7, and 12
21	shall occupy seats 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7, respectively, until their current term expires or until their
22	appointing authority appoints a new member to fill that seat;
23	(4) Any seats that are vacant shall be filled by the appointing authority as soon as
24	practicable.
25	

(i) A quorum for meetings of the Implementation Working Group shall be based on the new total number of seats.

## SEC. 5.44-4. POWERS AND DUTIES.

- (a) The Implementation Working Group shall have the power and duty to advise the Mental Health Board or any successor agency, the Health Commission, the Department of Public Health, the Mayor, and the Board of Supervisors, and may advise the San Francisco Health Authority, on the design, outcomes, and effectiveness of Mental Health SF, established by Section 15.104 of the Administrative Code. The Implementation Working Group shall evaluate the effectiveness of Mental Health SF in meeting the behavioral health and housing needs of eligible participants, by reviewing program data, and shall review and assess the Implementation Plan that is required to be submitted to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors under subsection (h)(3) of Section 15.104 of the Administrative Code.
- (b) The Implementation Working Group shall work with the Controller and the Department of Human Resources to conduct a staffing analysis of both City and nonprofit mental health services providers to determine whether there are staffing shortages that impact the providers' ability to provide effective and timely mental health services. If the staffing analysis concludes that there are staffing shortages that impact timely and effective service delivery, the staffing analysis shall also include recommendations regarding appropriate salary ranges that should be established, and other working conditions that should be changed, to attract and retain qualified staff for the positions where there are staffing shortages.
- (c) By no later than October 1, 2020, and every year thereafter, the Implementation Working Group shall submit to the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Director of Health a written report on its progress.

1	(d) By no later than June 1, 2021, the Implementation Working Group shall submit
2	to the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Director of Health its final recommendations
3	concerning the design of Mental Health SF, and any steps that may be required to ensure its
4	successful implementation.
5	(e) Within six months of the effective date of this Article XLIV, the Implementation
6	Working Group shall submit to the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, and the Director of Health
7	the staffing analysis required by subsection (b).
8	(f) In the event that the actual or projected annual cost of implementing Mental
9	Health SF exceeds \$150 million, as annually adjusted to reflect changes in the Consumer
10	Price Index (the "Cost Cap"), the Implementation Working Group shall submit to the Board of
11	Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Director of Health recommendations for how to reduce the
12	scope of services provided by Mental Health SF in order to reduce annual costs so that they
13	do not exceed the Cost Cap.
14	(g) By no later than July 31, 2025, the Implementation Working Group shall submit to the
15	Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Director of Health a final written report that includes:
16	(1) an evaluation of the effectiveness of Mental Health SF at addressing the mental
17	health needs of San Franciscans in its first five years of implementation;
18	(2) a summary of all of the Implementation Working Group's prior
19	recommendations;
20	(3) new recommendations relating to:
21	(A) options for Mental Health Service Center services and programs;
22	(B) future growth of the Office of Coordinated Care established under
23	subsection (g)(2) of Section 15.104 of the Administrative Code, including suggestions developed from
24	the information gathered by the Department of Public Health from community mapping exercises and
25	community engagement activities previously requested by the Implementation Working Group;

1	(C) the work of the Crisis Response Street Team established under subsection
2	(g)(3) of Section 15.104 of the Administrative Code;
3	(D) follow-up care referrals and linkages that the Street Teams can
4	implement and develop for and on behalf of individuals encountered by the Street Teams;
5	(E) the types and number of mental health residential treatment beds and
6	facilities needed to meet the needs of San Francisco residents based on the information collected in the
7	most recent beds study by the Office of the Controller and the Department of Public Health, described
8	in part in subsection (g)(4) of Section 15.104 of the Administrative Code;
9	(F) the services and programs provided by Mental Health SF based on the
10	Implementation Working Group's review of Mental Health SF metrics and other applicable data made
11	available to the Implementation Working Group;
12	(G) the types of communications to providers and the community that would
13	raise awareness of the availability of Mental Health SF services and programs;
14	(H) which populations and programs and services should be prioritized by
15	Mental Health SF if the budget for Mental Health SF were to be reduced;
16	(I) any amendments to the legislation establishing Mental Health SF that
17	would improve the program's effectiveness at addressing the mental health needs of San Franciscans;
18	<u>and</u>
19	(J) the projected impacts on Mental Health SF programs and priority
20	populations of recently enacted or proposed laws addressing behavioral health care services, including
21	but not limited, to S.B. 43 (2024), Proposition 1 (March 2024), and San Francisco's Proposition F
22	(November 2024).
23	
24	SEC. 5.44-5. SUNSET.

1	This Article XLIV shall expire by operation of law, and the Implementation Working
2	Group shall terminate, on September 1, 2026 July 31, 2025. After its expiration, the City Attorney
3	shall is authorized to cause this Article XLIV to be removed from the Administrative Code.
4	
5	Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
6	enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
7	ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
8	of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.
9	
10	Section 3. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors
11	intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles,
12	numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal
13	Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment
14	additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under
15	the official title of the ordinance.
